Former Emperor Of China Steps Out of Year's Mysterious Obscurity To Appear As Witness

ATSUGI AIRFIELD, TOKYO —(P)— Henry Pu Yi, last emperor of China and later Japan's puppet ruler of Manchoukuo, Friday stepped out of a year's mysterious obscurity behind Russian lines.

In Russian custody, he landed at 5:29 p. m. from Vladivostok to appear as a witness before the international military tribunal trying Hideki Tojo and 26 others as war criminals.

The tall, lean, bespectacled scion of the Manchu dynasty of China came in a Soviet PBY plane which was accompanied from Vladivostok by a second Russian PBY and a C-47 transport carrying a truckload of luggage. The Pussian party headed by Col. Alexander Transport totalled by a second Russian PBY and a C-47 transport carrying a trackload of luggage. The Russian party, headed by Col. Alexander Ivanov, totalled 20 persons and included five newly accredited Russian correspondents. The party also included seven Russian civilians whose names were not on the manifest presented beforehand to Allied officials. The seven were detained at the field for several hours after arrival while American counter-intelligence officials awaited desification of their status.



World's Largest Bomber Makes First Flight At Fort Worth



Consolidated Vultee XB-36, huge six-engine U. S. Army Air Forces bomber rises slowly from the Fort Worth Army Air Field runway Thursday as it takes the air for the first time. The pusher-type 6- engine bomber, the world's largest, successfully completed its maiden hop. The XB-36 completely dwarfs a war-veteran B-29 Superfortress. The wingspan of the XB-36 is 230 feet, compared to 141 feet for the B-29; XB-36 length is 163 feet, the B-29 is 99 feet; XB-36 maximum bomb capacity is over 30 tons, the B-29 is 20,000 pounds; XB-36 maximum range with bomb load is 10,000 miles, the B-29 is 4,100 miles; XB-36 take-off power is 18,000 horsepower, the B-29 is 8,800.

Infra Rays Used In New Repair Process



A revolutionary new method of tire repairing is demonstrated to a tire repairman by Harold V. James, inventor of the equipment and president of the OK Rubber Welders System. Making use of infrared rays. James developed a process of welding rubber with these electro-magnetic radiations. Above he places his hand between the infra-ray lamp and the tire to show how the heat required for weiding is confined within the area being repaired due to the penetrating action of the rays. 





Bureaucracy In Action

As a prime example of bureaucracy in action, we ommend the fecent train of events which resulted in stponing the Maritime Commission's construction of en passenger ships for operation by American lines.

On July 2, Vice-Adm. W. W. Smith, Maritime Comnission chairman, wrote to Reconversion Director John Steelman, inquiring about this construction program and apparently asking authorization to get on with it. week later the Navy Department recommended that onstruction proceed without delay, since it was intersted in having fast passenger ships available for emerency conversion to transports.

On July 17, Dr. Steelman, in the name of the Presient, told Admiral Smith to postpone awarding contracts or two luxury liners for the South American trade for at east a year, and to hold up scheduled construction of ve other liners while the whole project was re-examined.

This was the first notice to American shipbuilders nd operators that the program to build fast liners for nternational competition was halted.

Dr. Steelman gave as reasons for the cancellation a hortage of materials, the heavy tax burden of construc-ion costs and operating deficits, "substantial naval contruction" and reconversion and repair work.

Yet at this time of material shortages, the State Deartment was approving an Export-Import Bank loan to hile to buy American steel for ships to be built in Britin, while the Civilian Production Administration was ineasing Britain's steel allocation by 500,000 tons for this

The two cancelled liners for our "good neighbor would have taken less steel than the five Chilean o vessels to be built with American steel and financed m American loan.

As for construction costs, the Shipbuilders Council of merica pointed out in a letter to Dr. Steelman that shipard wages are up 38 cents an hour since the war began, argely through government influence and effort. Now, letter continued, the shipyard workers, having been ven their demands, are having their work taken from

The Council quoted Navy figures to show that naval onstruction is rapidly being completed, and that there e no naval contracts for new ships in fiscal 1947. It loted the Bureau of Labor Statistics to show that by muary 1 there will be only about 130,000 workers in ivate shipyards, as against 223,600 in May, 304,600 last cember, and a wartime peak of 1,396,400.

All this would seem to indicate a lack of co-ordinated ormation and policy among the various government encies concerned. And it makes one wonder: Did Dr. elman have all the facts at hand when he issued this stic order? Why did he not even consult the shipilders and operators whose business he is running?

And what has become of all the wartime plans to ake this country a great maritime nation in peace, with adequate, expandable nucleus of builders and operars in the interest of our national defense?

Commendable Decision

The decision of the UAW to abandon its threat of rther strikes and concentrate on preserving the dollar's sent purchasing power is no less commendable because decision was so obviously necessary.

UAW members feel that their 18 1/2-cent wage gain a few months ago has been wiped out by rising prices. st of us are feeling the difference, but the present nch is nothing, of course, to what we should feel as a sequence of a new wave of strikes.

Most of the postwar wage gains have been made in manufacturing industries, not on the basis of producn but of need. Now, however, the trend of events has esented workers with the duty of keeping production ing and keeping it high. It is one of the most visible, mediate and powerful weapons against inflation.

We congratulate the UAW upon seeing and acceptg this duty. And we hope that its example will be folwed throughout organized labor for the duration of emergency and to the benefit of every American

Well, Ilya Ehrenburg, writing about his trip America in Izvestia, has charged both government and ople with serious faults. His indictment has been inted, and apparently Ehrenburg is still alive.

The faults? Oh, yes—bureaucracy, occasional rude-

s, technical backwardness and bad telephone service. So there you have a Russian admission of the evils nd defects of communism. It would probably be too uch to hope that this mild criticism is a start toward the ealthy self-examination that prevails here. Still, it hould be remembered that confession, like weight-liftr, is something that you have to start slowly and work to gradually.

When a national situation is reported as "hopeful," means the dickering so far has been a flop.





Sweeden Will Apply For UN Membership

NEW YORK-(AP)-Advices from Stockholm indicated Sweden's application for membership in the United Nations would be forwarded to New York after a cabinet meeting Friday in the Swedish capital. These reports said the move would not be announced in Stockholm until the United Nations secretariat acknowledged receipt of the application.

The Swedish application appeared unlikely to meet opposition, for the Swedish government had canvassed the major powers in advance to learn what reception the Swedish bid might receive.

The membership committee meanwhile resumed drafting of questions to be submitted to Albania over her hotly contested application, which has the suport of Soviet Russia and Poland and the bitter opposition of neighboring Greece.
