

## Strike Ties Up Overseas News

### 300 American Communications Association Union Members Walk Off Jobs

NEW YORK —(AP)—The American Communications Association (CIO) announced Monday that, effective at noon Monday its members in the various international communications companies refused to handle any international press traffic, in a move to bring pressure on Press Wireless, Inc., against which 300 ACA members are on strike.

Lawrence Kelly, international vice-president of ACA's radio and cables department, in announcing the move said it had been decided upon by the department's joint executive board.

The sole exception to the refusal to handle press traffic after 12 noon, he said, would be government press matter.

In effect, he said, the only way remaining for newspaper and press association writers overseas to send their copy to the United States would be by telephone.

## Atlantic Will Dig Three More Tests In Block 12 Area

The Atlantic Refining Company has filed applications to drill three more explorations in the Block 12 area of North-Southwest Andrews County, recently opened to development by The Texas Company No. 1-P State, which discovered a small flowing production from the middle Permian at 7,170-7,250 feet.

The new locations are: Atlantic 1-P-12 University, 663 feet from north and 665 feet from east lines of northeast quarter of section 21, block 12, University survey.

Atlantic No. 1-G-12 University, 665 feet from north and 665 feet from east lines of southeast quarter of section 21, block 12, University survey.

Atlantic No. 1-H-12 University, 665 feet from east and south lines of southeast quarter of section 9, block 12, University survey.

On Unproven Acreage The prospectors are all on unproven acreage and are classified by operators as wildcats. Each of them is slated to drill to around 8,500 feet, unless they get middle Permian production at a higher level. Drilling is to start on all three of the new locations at once.

The Texas Company No. 1-G Fraser, West Winkler County wildcat, about one mile north of closest well on the northeast side of the Wheeler Creek which has shown for production, ran a two-hour drillstem test at 8,702-8,825 feet.

There was a small blow of air throughout the period. Recovery was 140 feet of oil and gas cut drilling mud. No water was reported and the project is making hole below 8,851 feet in chert.

Pinson Had Water Ray Oil Company and M. Staniforth No. 1 Connell, Northwest Crane County exploration, about one mile north of the Sand Hills field, was making hole below 4,666 feet in lime.

A drillstem test was taken for one hour at 4,420-80 feet. Recovery was 630 feet of drilling mud and about 25 feet of sulphur water. No shows of oil or gas were reported. Operators were to drill ahead to around 5,000 feet. They have a chance of production in a lower section of the lower Permian above 5,000 feet.

Another Deep One Fullerton Oil Company has made location for its third Ellenburger project on the west side of the Fullerton field, in Northwest Andrews County.

It will be No. 331-A H. M. Wilson and is located 766 feet from north and 2,097 feet from east lines of section 16, block A-32, psi survey. That puts it one location northeast of the discovery for Ellenburger production in the Fullerton field. Drilling to 10,500 feet, or production in the deep pay, is to start at once.

Humble Oil & Refining Company No. 1 Mary Turner, East Midland County wildcat to around 11,500 feet, 12 miles southeast of Midland, was bottomed at 4,825 feet in lime. A string of 9 5/8-inch casing had been set at total depth with 800 sacks of cement. Operator will drill out the plug and drill ahead shortly.

# Chinese Reds Blame Peace Failure On United States

## International Smuggling Ring Uncovered By Army In Europe

BERLIN—(AP)—An international smuggling and black market ring involving five members of a New York City family was uncovered recently when the Army's criminal investigation department appre-

hended two members of the family in Berlin and Paris, an official announcement said Monday.

The five persons involved, all of New York City, were identified as: David L. Warner and his four sons:

Alfred Lewis L. Warner, 23, a former Air Corps lieutenant who was a civilian employe of the American Airlines in Berlin; Oscar Selig Warner, 29, a former Naval Lieutenant who recently started an import-export business in Paris, and Robert Warner, an officer on terminal leave from the Navy and presently employed by UNRRA in Shanghai.

The names of the Warners were issued through the Army's Berlin district press relations office by Ray Carucci, chief of the Army criminal investigation office here.

Carucci estimated that "if the business had gone on for one year the profit would have been \$2,000,000."

The criminal investigation department's announcement stated that the Warners had been operating an export and import business several months with the three sons in Paris, Berlin and Shanghai as outlets.

The department alleged that the fourth son purchased merchandise in the United States for export to the other three.

"The father," the official release stated, "was in charge and instructed his sons in their activities."

## Bakers Unions In Philadelphia And Chicago Strike

PHILADELPHIA—(AP)—Bread supplies were curtailed Monday in two of the nation's three largest cities by strikes of AFL-Bakery and Confectionery Workers Union locals.

Two-thirds of the daily output in Philadelphia was cut off by walk-outs at 13 plants of eight major firms. An industry spokesman estimated the daily production loss at a million loaves, leaving less than half that many to feed approximately 4,000,000 residents of the city.

In Chicago, a walkout affected some 360 smaller shops, leaving the large wholesale bakeries in operation. The union estimated the strike would cut the city's bread supply 20 per cent, but a spokesman for the Associated Retail Bakers of Greater Chicago said production would drop 33 per cent.

The striking unions, one local in Philadelphia and two in Chicago, seeks wage increases.

MADISON, IND.—(AP)—Jefferson County authorities Monday planned to examine four more bodies after finding mercury poisoning in viscera of a woman who died in 1945 while under the care of Mrs. Lottie (Tot) Lockman, 62-year-old housekeeper, who has been charged with murder.

Mrs. Lockman was arrested on the murder charge Sunday night after State Toxicologist Dr. R. N. Harger reported finding the mercury in the remains of Mrs. Minnie McConnell.

The woman had already been charged with attempting to murder a daughter-in-law of Mrs. McConnell, and had been free on bond.

## One Killed, Four Injured In Headon Highway Crash

Bobbie Jean Medearis, 12-year-old negro girl of Stanton, was killed and four other persons were injured in a head-on collision of two automobiles early Sunday on Highway 80 about four miles east of Midland.

Morris Standifer of Stanton, a white employe of a Midland service station, who was driving one of the automobiles, suffered a broken arm.

A negro youth, Sambo Medearis, 10, suffered foot and ankle injuries. Betty Jean Medearis, his sister, 8, received head injuries, and a negro man, Willie Scott, received slight injuries.

Highway patrolmen said Standifer was driving west on route to Midland and the car containing the negroes was traveling east toward Stanton.

An investigation of the accident was underway Monday by Midland County officers and the Highway Patrol.

WASHINGTON —(AP)—OPA Monday raised retail price ceilings on new automobiles an average of 7.3 per cent—just part of the increase required by the new price control law. The increase, effective immediately on all models, meets a requirement that OPA restore the peacetime profit margins of auto dealers.

NEW YORK —(AP)—The Ku Klux Klan is operating in many states through front organizations such as veterans and women's groups Daniel Duke, assistant attorney general of Georgia and special prosecutor on Georgia's legal proceedings to revoke the Klan's national charter, declared Monday at a press conference.

TIENTSIN —(AP)—The Republican Daily News Monday reported fierce fighting still is raging around Tatung. Military authorities of Shansi Province are parachuting flour to the populace of the communist-besieged city.

MANILA—(AP)—Jiro Motoki, former Japanese army captain charged with beheading four Filipino civilians on Panay Island in 1944, Monday was convicted and sentenced to life imprisonment by a war crimes commission.

Rescued And Rescuer

A British rescue crew found the ship and was towing the ship toward England when an American merchant seaman crew overtook the ship, took the British off, and took the ship to port. An international squabble has arisen because Britain claimed the ship as a cereal prize.

JERUSALEM —(AP)—Two more immigrant ships crowded with Jewish refugees anchored just outside Haifa harbor Monday, adding an explosive pressure to the Palestine situation already tense with reports of a pending British blockade.

Arrival of the two ships brought to 3,800, by Jewish estimate, the number of refugees aboard ship at Haifa or enroute who may not be allowed to land because they are without immigration certificates.

Many Jews have predicted bloodshed if the immigrants are not allowed to land, and there have been hints at "direct action" to bring them ashore.

Gunshot Wound Kills Mayor Of Ruidoso RUIDOSO, N. M.—(AP)—Mayor Owen Walto McElhaney, 55, of Ruidoso, who moved here in 1939 from Houston, Texas, died of a gunshot wound last Friday. A coroner's report said the wound was self-inflicted.

Arrival Of More Immigrant Ships At Haifa Adds To Explosive Pressure The Jewish underground radio broadcast that "British military action against us is pending," and warned Jews to "stock up on food because long curfews are before us."

Declaring it had learned of British plans to arrest all Jewish resistance leaders still free, the radio said Haganah, an underground organization, planned to resist with all its strength any blockade designed to halt immigration.

Jewish circles said they believed the British intended to load the newcomers on two British troop transports, standing by in the barricaded and heavily guarded harbor, and take them away, possibly to a prepared detention camp on the island of Cyprus in the Eastern Mediterranean.

One of the troop ships, said a Jewish agency spokesman, arrived Sunday with the captain's quarters enclosed in barbed wire, indicating the officers were prepared to fence themselves in event of emergency.

London dispatches said Britain is expected to announce Monday night its immediate Palestine program, a program which government informants already have said will include an ironclad sea blockade to halt the flow of unauthorized immigration, and land operations to halt at its source in the displaced persons camps of Europe the tide of Jews seeking a home in the Holy Land.

## Agency Says Marine Officer Expects Recall Of U. S. Forces

Report Says Part Of Troops Will Be Sent Home—Others Sent To Various Chinese Ports

SAN FRANCISCO —(AP)—The Chinese Communists' New China News Agency Monday blamed a breakdown in Chinese truce negotiations on "an erroneous United States government policy of backing Chiang Kai-shek's civil war and dictatorial designs."

The agency, in a broadcast from Communist headquarters at Yen-an, listed three "main divergences between the Kuomintang (Government Party) and the Chinese Communist Party which United States aid aggravated by backing Chiang Kai-shek's civil war stand:

"1. The Chinese Communist Party upholds unconditional cessation of hostilities but Kuomintang authorities insist on armed occupation of North Kiangsu, Jehol, Chahar and the northeastern nine provinces.

"2. The Chinese Communist Party insists on implementation of political consultation conference decisions and immediate convening of the PCC but Kuomintang authorities insist that there can be no discussing of political problems before army occupation of these places.

"3. The Chinese Communist Party stands for a democratic coalition government responsible to congress, but Kuomintang authorities insist on preserving one-party dictatorship.

"4. The Chinese Communist Party stands for 'obedience of the army to a coalition government' and 'separation of the army from civil affairs' but the Kuomintang insists on preserving military dictatorship."

These reports followed the statement of the two highest American mediators that general peace for China seemed impossible even though the people were unanimous in desiring it.

Await Chiang's Talk Torn by the long and devious struggle between the government and the Communists, this unhappy country awaited with gloomy expectancy a statement promised for Wednesday by Generalissimo Chiang Kai-shek.

Much depended on whether the head of the government would offer new concessions seeking an 11th hour settlement or would reaffirm the stand against his Communist rivals, but there was no answer.

General Marshall, special presidential envoy, and Dr. John Leighton Stuart, American ambassador, conferred at length Sunday, and then Dr. Stuart prepared to fly to Peiping.

Marshall and Stuart Saturday pointed out in an unprecedented public statement that peace appeared impossible because both the government and Communists disagreed on the fundamental issues of the makeup of local regimes.

No Confirmation The Central News Agency, a government organ, quoted Brig. Gen. William T. Clement, commander of U. S. Marines in Tsingtao, as saying part of the Marines soon would be returning to the United States and that others would remain in Tsingtao or be transferred elsewhere in China.

There was no confirmation of this report. The Communists long have clamored for the Marines to get out, contending they were actively helping government troops, and pro-government papers recently have published rumors that the Marines would leave.

Adm. Charles M. Cooke, Jr., overall commander of the Marines in China, said only last week that the force totaled 22,000 to 23,000 and he had no orders to reduce it.

Tehran Warns Officers To Stay Out Of Politics TEHRAN —(AP)—Premier Ahmad Qavam directed officers of the army, police and gendarmes Sunday night to refrain from joining any political party.


"Offenders will be dismissed and brought to court for severe punishment," said the premier's announcement.

**General Beebe To Talk At Monahans V-J Day Program**

FORT SAM HOUSTON — Brig. Gen. Lewis C. Beebe, Fourth Army chief of staff, will be guest speaker Wednesday at the Monahans V-J Day celebration, it was announced here Monday.

At the invitation of J. N. McKean, secretary of the Ward County celebration, General Beebe also is scheduled to judge a beauty contest and an old fiddlers contest and to participate in the parade.

Accompanied by his aide, 1st Lt. Ennis Elliott, General Beebe will arrive at Pyote Army Air Field at 5 p.m. August 13 and proceed to Monahans by car. He will return August 15.

The Fourth Army's 365th Army Ground Force Band, directed by Chief Warrant Officer William A. Mobley, will take part in the celebration and parade.

General Beebe, a native of Iowa, was commissioned as a second lieutenant of infantry, Regular Army, in November, 1917, after having served as an officer in the Oregon National Guard, coast artillery.

During World War I he served in the Aisne defensive, the Champagne-Marne defensive and the Aisne-Marne offensive and was wounded in action July 15, 1918.

He was a lieutenant colonel and assistant chief of staff to General MacArthur was transferred to World War II and until General Australia, when he became chief of staff for General Wainwright and served in that capacity until the surrender of Corregidor on May 6, 1942.

He was a prisoner of the Japanese until August 17, 1945.

His decorations include the Distinguished Service Cross, for extraordinary heroism in action near Crozancy, France, on July 15, 1918; the Purple Heart, the French Croix de Guerre with gilt star, and the Distinguished Service Medal, awarded in November 1942 for service in the Philippine Islands.

**Slaughter Committee Calls First Witness In 'Surplus' Scandal**

WASHINGTON —(P)— Stepping into the spotlight yielded by Senate war investigators, the Slaughter committee of the House set out Monday to dig deeply into the Administration's handling of war surpluses.

The special inquiry group headed by defeated Rep. Roger D. Slaughter (D-Mo) summoned as its first witness, Benjamin F. Fields, Washington promoter and war contracts broker who made a brief appearance before the Senate committee a month ago.

Fields at that time had been accused by Senator Mitchell (D-Wash) of offering the senator a \$5,000 campaign contribution if he would try to halt the then impending expose of the Garsson munitions combine.

Fields denied this to newsmen, but his testimony before the senators was cut short by his refusal to waive Constitutional immunity.

Hugh D. Wise, Jr., counsel for the Slaughter committee, said Fields would be questioned Monday about how he managed to buy up 538 rolls of scarce wire screening from the War Assets Administration and resell it quickly at what Wise described as a profit of approximately \$4,500.

Fields has said he got a check for almost that amount but contended the transaction presented a profit of only about \$1,200.

What course the committee's inquiry might take next was not immediately clear, although Wise has said preliminary testimony indicates that several persons in and out of government are likely to find themselves "in a tight position."

**Throws Ring In Back Seat—Bandit Takes Car**

CHICAGO —(P)— Miss Lucille McGuire, a school teacher, threw her \$1,100 diamond engagement ring into the rear seat of the car when she and her fiancé, Philip Quinn, were held up.

The bandit relieved them of \$115 and Miss McGuire was quietly congratulating herself on her stratagem of saving the ring—but the bandit then ordered them out of the car and drove off with it.

GALVESTON —(P)— Funeral services will be held Tuesday for Henry W. Ostermayer, Jr., 11-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. H. W. Ostermayer, Sr., who was crushed beneath the wheels of a truck Sunday while assisting his father in unloading horses. The youth died before reaching a hospital.

Do you separate a dress from its belt—which, however negligible in weight, can distort the shape of the garment—when you hang up your clothes?  
When you sit, do you lift a narrow skirt past the point of strain? And do you open the jacket of a suit that's buttoned below the hip level?

If you don't take these measures to protect your clothes, it's high time you start. They deserve this care—and more—in these days of shortages and expensive replacements.  
Ready to tell you how, as professionals think you should, are the dry-cleaning experts. They can judge from the stories that clothes tell on visits to their establishments just how badly most of us need advice.

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### LaFollette Faces Test In Wisconsin Primary Tuesday

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Senator Robert M. LaFollette, Jr., takes his politically famous name and 20-year Senate record into Wisconsin's primary Tuesday against a bitterly opposing Republican organization. The race has strong overtones of national import.

LaFollette is seeking the GOP senatorial nomination in a battle with Circuit Judge Joseph R. McCarthy, former Marine Corps captain who carries the party's state convention endorsement.

Counted by all observers as a close one, the Wisconsin contest heads a week's political billing that includes another Republican senatorial battle in Vermont, a Democratic gubernatorial race in South Carolina and a GOP state convention and a Democratic primary in Delaware.

In the governor's race, 33-year-old Gov. Walter S. Goodland is running for renomination. The GOP convention endorsed Delbert J. Kenny, 50, investment banker.

The Democratic ticket has Daniel W. Hoan, former Socialist mayor of Milwaukee, unopposed for the governor's nomination and former Rep. Howard J. McMurtry as the sole candidate for the Senate.

In Vermont, Ralph E. Flanders, former head of the Boston Federal Reserve Bank and an industrialist who carries the endorsement of the CIO, battles it out in the primary with S. E. Waterman, 44-year-old attorney who has been active in young Republican circles.

South Carolina's Democratic gubernatorial race has been enlivened by what Gov. Ransome J. Williams, a candidate for renomination, has described as his "crusade" against wholesale liquor dealers in his advocacy of state liquor stores.

A drillem test was run at 6,491-6,562 feet for two hours and 12 minutes. Operator reported that in the last hour of the test the drill pipe flowed 11 barrels of distillate.

Another drillem test was taken at 6,514-6,562 feet. The tool was open four hours. In the last one hour of the period the drill pipe flowed nine barrels of oil.

Reports that flowing oil had been developed at 245 feet on the W. F. Wallace ranch in Northeast Lea County, by Shell Oil Company, Inc., have been found to be incorrect.

The company is doing some geophysical work in that area and shot a hole in section 1-12s-37e, in the area northeast of Tatum developed flowing fresh water at around 245 feet, but no signs of oil have been encountered, according to Shell representatives in Midland.

Golston To Test Moody Roy Golston, et al, No. 1 Moody estate, Southeast Ward County wildcat, nine and one half miles northwest of Grandfalls, and in east quarter of section 32, block 34, H&TC survey, was bottomed at 2,535 feet in the Seven Rivers Dolomite and was to take a drillem test.

It had drilled through about 80 feet of sand and lime showing some indications of oil. The project had kicked out some gas. The zone to be tested is the Yates and the Seven Rivers dolomite.

SHERMAN — (AP) — County Attorney Olan R. Van Zandt said Monday that the story of a Denison fortune teller's reading in the cards of the location of the body of Mrs. N. O. Kreager has been discarded as having no relation to the slaying of the 82-year-old woman.

The fortune teller and a Denison man to whom she told the story were released after questioning, Van Zandt said.

The Denison man was arrested Saturday night after a three-day search. He had been arrested July 5 for intoxication. Police found a note in his possession giving the location of Mrs. Kreager's body as "read" to him from the cards by the fortune teller. Mrs. Kreager's lime covered body was found Aug. 7 in an abandoned well near Sherman, only a short distance from the fortune teller's prediction.

### FPC Hears Testimony On Texas-Michigan Line

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The second week of a natural gas hearing before the Federal Power Commission started Monday with testimony shifting to plans for building an \$84,000,000 pipeline from Texas to Michigan.

Michigan - Wisconsin Pipeline Company, a subsidiary of American Light & Traction Company, said in its application that the completed system would be capable of maximum daily deliveries in excess of 630,000 million cubic feet.

The initial cost of the project is estimated at \$56,808,076. Additional construction during the first four years would increase the total outlay to \$84,056,547.

Michigan Consolidated now obtains natural gas from the Panhandle Eastern Pipeline Company but says Panhandle has refused to increase deliveries to meet its growing requirements. Panhandle disputes this.

Part of the present commission hearing concerns Panhandle's application for a \$23,644,000 expansion of its system. Testimony on this will come later.

### Midland HD Women To Attend Parley

Mrs. Jim Baker, Mrs. J. Z. Parker, Mrs. I. J. Howard, clubwomen, and Mrs. Nettie Messick, demonstration agent, will leave Tuesday to attend a Texas home demonstration association convention in Amarillo.

The club women are delegates from Midland County and the agent is representing District 6. Three delegates from each county in Texas and one agent from each of 12 district will attend the parley.

### LaGuardia Decries High Food Prices, Beer In Prague

PRAGUE, CZECHOSLOVAKIA — (AP) — The pilsener beer that first appeared and then galled the La Guardia palate still rankled the UNRRA director Monday as he departed for Geneva.

"If edible grain was used, I can't understand it," F. H. La Guardia told reporters. "The use of hops is okay, because I don't believe anyone has been able to make bread out of hops. We in the United States are sharing our grain and our own brewers get five days' supply monthly."

The beer stein denouncement happened Saturday. Welcoming Czechs at the sweltering Prague airport met La Guardia's plane and handed him a stein of pilsener. He smacked his lips, sipped and then remembered. He stopped sipping abruptly. Shortly he issued a pronouncement:

"This country is making a great recovery. I don't think they'll need any more grain when the director general is met at the airport with a glass of beer."

He said he would "institute a resurvey of Czechoslovak grain needs, with the likelihood that supplies should be reduced."

The stunned Czechs asserted that no wheat was used in the brew. La Guardia said Monday he was exercised also by prices fixed by the Czechoslovak government, whose Prime Minister Klement Gottwald is a Communist, for UNRRA foods sold to the public.

"We aren't giving this stuff away to supply a luxury market here," he said. The Czech government says it uses the revenue from UNRRA sales for rehabilitation and welfare.

### Sweden To Publish Report On Daily 'Ghost Rockets'

STOCKHOLM — (AP) — Swedish military authorities plan to publish within the next few days a communication on an investigation they have been making of the "ghost rockets" that have been streaking daily over Sweden since early July.

Official sources have declined to speculate on the source of the mysterious spool shaped missiles, but it is generally believed that the rocket propelled objects come from some place along the Baltic coast of Germany.

Between July 9-12 authorities received 300 reports of the missiles and since then reports have poured in daily. Fragments examined by scientists give little in the way of clues.

In general the rocket is described as a small object with a flaming tail, which speeds at great height, making little sound. The

clubs, hoping for a club ruff. This was won in dummy with the queen. The nine of hearts was led, and when East failed to put on the ten-spot, Miss Sherman let it ride, West winning with the ace.

The king of clubs was led, East ruffed dummy's ace and returned a trump. Declarer won with the ace, then cashed the jack of hearts, discarding a small club from dummy. A small diamond was ruffed in dummy, the nine of clubs cashed and dummy's last club ruffed with the five of spades. Thus Miss Sherman won her contract after all, losing only two heart tricks and a ruff.

I will not try to condone East's lead of the jack of clubs. He should have realized that declarer had bid a psychic, and should have returned a trump. But that was one of the reasons Miss Sherman called this her "razzle-dazzle" hand.

H. J. R. No. 62 HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION proposing an Amendment to Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas by the addition of a new Section to be known as Section 49-b creating a Veteran's Land Board and establishing a Veteran's Land Fund; providing for an election and the issuance of a proclamation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS: Section 1. That Article III of the Constitution of the State of Texas shall be amended by adding thereto a new Section to be known as Section 49-b which shall read as follows: "Section 49-b. There is hereby created a Board to be known as the Veteran's Land Board, which shall be composed of the Governor, the Attorney General, and the Commissioner of the General Land Office. The Legislature shall provide by law for the issuance of said Board of not to exceed Twenty-five Million Dollars (\$25,000,000) in bonds or obligations of the State of Texas for the purpose of creating a fund to be known as the Veteran's Land Fund. Such bonds shall be executed by said Board as an obligation of the State of Texas in such form, denominations, and upon such terms as shall be prescribed by law, provided, however, that said bonds shall bear rate of interest not to exceed three per cent (3 per cent) per annum. "In the sale of any such bonds a preferential right of purchase shall be given to the administrators of the various teacher retirement funds, the Permanent University Funds, and the Permanent Free School Funds; such bonds to be issued only as needed, in the opinion of the Veteran's Land Board under legislative authorization. "The Veteran's Land Fund shall be used by the Board for the sole purpose of purchasing lands suitable for the purpose hereinafter stated, situated in this State (a) owned by the United States, or any governmental agency thereof; (b) owned by the Texas Prison System, or any other governmental agency of the State of Texas; or (c) owned by any person, firm, or corporation. "All lands thus purchased shall be acquired at the lowest price obtainable, be paid for in cash, and

Section 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election, and shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. Section 4. The sum of Ten Thousand Dollars (\$10,000) or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury of the State not otherwise appropriated to pay the expenses of such publication and election.

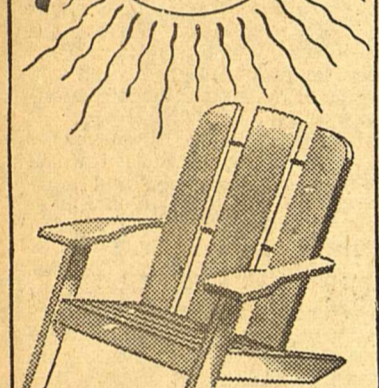

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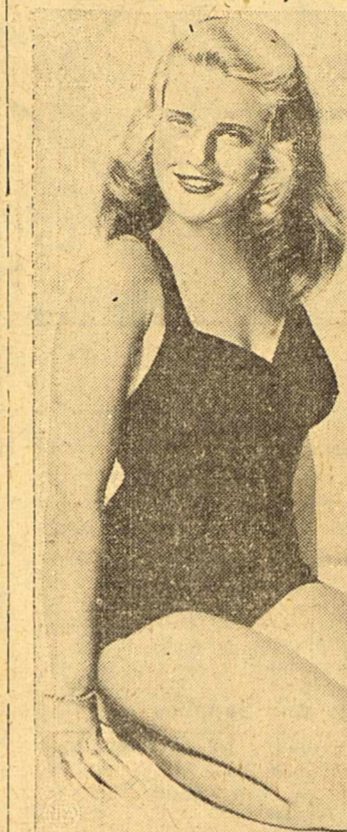
**Double Win Puts Cards Within Half Game Of Top As Dodgers Lose Pair**

The St. Louis Cardinals once more are breathing on the necks of the National League leading Brooklyn Dodgers, principally because of the prodigious stickwork of their great one-two punch, Stan Musial and Enos Slaughter.

The runner-up Cards swept both ends of a double header from the Cincinnati Reds 15-4 and 7-3 Sun-

day to advance within a half-game of the Dodgers, who lost twice to their erstwhile "cousins," the Philadelphia Phillies.  
Musial divided his safeties equally in the two games, getting a double and triple in the opener and his 10th homer in the nightcap, while his Roxboro, N. C., teammate went hog-wild with the stick in the first game, driving in seven runs on five hits, including his ninth four-bagger.  
Musial's eight-hit barrage enabled him to take over the individual batting leadership of the loop with a mark of .369. He also leads in hits (154), runs (84), doubles (31) and triples (13), and ranks third to Slaughter with 69 runs batted in. Slaughter is hitting .302 and has driven in 88 runs.

Funeral services will be held in Kileen. Two sons and two daughters survive.

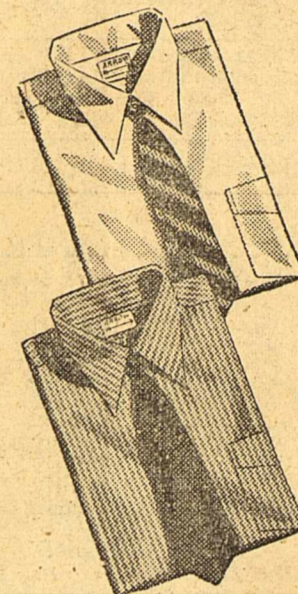
