300 American Communications Association Union Members Walk Off Jobs

NEW YORK —(P)— The American Communications Association (CIO) announced Monday that, effective at noon Monday its members in the various international communications companies refused to handle any communications companies refused to handle any international press traffic, in a move to bring pressure on Press Wireless, International Smuggling Ring. Inc., against which 300 ACA members are on strike.

Lawrence Kelly, international vice-president of ACA's radio and cables department, in announcing the move said it had been decided upon by the department's joint executive board.

The sole exception to the refusal to handle press traffic after 12 noon, he said, would be government press matter.

In effect, he said, the only way remaining for newspaper and press association writers overseas to send their copy to the United States would be by telephone

Atlantic Will Dig Three More Tests In Block 12 Area

The Atlantic Refining Company has filed applications to drill three more explorations in the Block 12 area of North-Southwest Andrews County, recently opened to develop-ment by The Texas Company No. 1-P State, which discovered a small flowing production from the middle Permian at 7,170-7,250 feet. 

Accompanied by his aide, 1st Lt Ennis Elliott, General Beebe will arrive at Pyote Army Air Field p.m. August 13 and proceed te Monahans by car. He will return August 15.

The Fourth Army's 365th Army Ground Force Band, directed by Chief Warrant Officer William A. Mobley, will take part in the celebration and parade.

Slaughter Committee Calls First Witness In 'Surplus' Scandal

WASHINGTON -(AP)- Stepping into the spotlight yielded by Senate war investigators, the Slaughter committee of the House set out Monday to dig deeply into the Administration's handling of war sur-

The special inquiry group headed by defeated Rep. Roger D. Slaughter (D-Mo) summoned as its first witness, Benjamin F. Fields, Washington promoter and war contracts broker who made a brief appearance before the Senate committee a month ago.

Fields at that time had been accused by Senator Mitchell (D-Wash) of offering the senator a \$5,000 campaign contribution if he would try to halt the then impend-ing expose of the Garsson munitions combine.

Fields denied this to newsmen, but his testimony before the sen-ators was cut short by his refusal to waive Constitutional immunity. Hugh D. Wise, Jr., counsel for Fields would be questioned Monday about how he managed to buy up 538 rolls of scarce wire screening from the War Assets Adminis-tration and resell it quickly at what Wise described as as profit

of approximately \$4,500.

Fields has said he got a check
for almost that amount but contended the transaction presented profit of only about \$1,200.

What course the committee's inquiry might take next was not immediately clear, although Wise has said preliminary testimony indi-cates that several persons in and out of government are likely to find themselves "in a tight posi-



United Christian Action

Publication of Charles Darwin's revolutionary writings on evolution was followed by years of bitter contention between science and religion. (The famous Scopes "evolution trial" in Dayton, Tenn., took place only 21 years ago.) It seemed to many that these two forces were irreconcilable, and that the enlightened world would be forced to make its choice between fundamentalist theology and a faithless materialism.

But time passed and tempers cooled. Scientists who were devout Christians and liberal members of the clergy pleaded their cases with sincerity, and were finally listened to with respect. The idea that science and religion were compatible and complementary took root.

Today one of the top best sellers is a book called "Peace of Mind," which sets forth a persuasive argument for the power of psychiatry and religious belief, working

hand in hand, to bring comfort and cure.
So perhaps a similar reconciliation can be brought about between the antagonistic forces of religion and international politics. Certainly it should be. And there are signs from the World Council of Churches Conference in London that an effort may be made to do so.

It is encouraging to see John Foster Dulles among the leaders in this effort. Dulles is both an active Presbyterian layman and an experienced and acknowledged authority on foreign affairs. For most of his mature life he has been intimately connected with international poli-

And so when he can say, after a long and potentially disenchanting career, that "the moral and spiritual forces of the world, inadequate as they are, still have power enough to secure a just and lasting peace," one may safely put it down as considered judgment and not

Another encouraging sign from the London meeting is the sentiment which favors joint action by the Protestant and Roman Catholic Churches in the interest of this just and lasting peace.

Mutual distrust and differences of creed, along with an unclear policy regarding the church's proper participation in worldly affairs, have served to divide and weaken the strength of these two bodies and in a measure to inhibit their individual actions.

There are great difficulties in the way of a united But there is also great need of such action which religious leaders are beginning to

It has been said repeatedly that man must make great moral and ethical strides if he is to overtake his scientific accomplishments and survive their destructive possibilities. The statement has become trite and tiresome. Yet only now are there signs that its fulfillment is being given concerted thought.

The dangers of secrecy, selfishness and cynicism in

high political places may at last mobilize the various Christian churches for united action. The power of a common voice and purpose behind such action would be difficult to over-estimate.

It might indeed be the "last, best hope of earth" for We Will Move You bringing a just and durable peace to the world of the unleashed atom.

Surplus Education

Arkansas Sen. J. William Fulbright, who used to be a college president himself, is now the proud author of a bill to provide about \$314,000,000 worth of free and higher world-wide education over the next 20 years.

Fulbright's bill was passed by the Senate last April. It got by the House the other afternoon in about 10 minutes with not much attention and no opposition. It is an amendment to-of all things-the Surplus Property Act. There is no inference that higher education is surplus property. Far from it. But by an ingenious bit of higher mathematics, Senator Fulbright has found a way to finance out of the sale of war junk a system of American scholarships that makes Cecil Rhodes look like a piker. Senator Fulbright, you see, was once a scholar himself

with a couple of degrees from Oxford.

The way Senator Fulbright worked this thing out, definite amounts received from U. S. surplus war material sold abroad will be earmarked for these foreign scholarship funds. The maximum amount to be spent this way in any one year will be \$1,000,000 for each country cut in on the program.

Fulbright sold this idea on the theory that it is extremely difficult for most of the war-broke countries to find dollars to pay for war surpluses they buy. He figured that any funds kept in the purchasing countries and spent in their own currencies would ease the burden, in addition to which the United States would be the gainer by having a cultural relations program second to none.





Counted by all observers as a close one, the Wisconsin contest heads a week's political billing that includes another Republican senatorial battle in Vermont, a Democratic governorship race in South Carolina and a side. He urged a full attendance GOP state convention and a Demo-
