British Fire Tommyguns Into Crowd Of Rioting Jews At Haifa

One Girl Is Killed As Mob Storms Toward Soldiers In Protest Of Deportation

HAIFA, PALESTINE — (AP) — British troops fired tommyguns and rifles Tuesday into a crowd of rioting Jews who were trying to storm through tanks, trucks and soldiers in protest against the deportation to Cyprus of 1,000 Jewish immigrants. A girl was killed. Several policemen and troops were injured by stones, bottles and other missiles which the Jews hurled soon after the outlawed Hagana radio exhorted them to "storm the streets."

HAIFA, PALESTINE — (AP) — The British deported 1,000 illegal Jewish immigrants to Cyprus Tuesday aboard two troopships while mobs of young Jews, aroused by the outlawed Hagana radio, rioted in the troop-filled streets.

The young Jews violated a curfew to demonstrate against the deportations. However, the rioting abated and the curfew was lifted Tuesday afternoon. Police reported the city was quiet at 2 p. m. as British soldiers began withdrawing.

but another 650 illegal Jewish immigrants arrived off the harbor of this half-Jewish, half-Arab port aboard the sloop Fenice.

The rioting Jews stoned troops of the British First Infantry Division, guarding the docks, and police.

The Hagana radio called on residents of Haifa to "storm the streets" and break the curfew, which the British imposed while the Jews were being loaded for deportation.

Even the Arab quarters in Haifa joined in defiance of the curfew. The Arabs, however, caused little disturbance and ventured only outside their own homes.

Several truckloads of youthful men and women were taken to police detention camps in Haifa for breaking the curfew.

No serious injuries were reported although several police and soldiers were reported struck by stones, bottles and other missiles hurled by the mobs.

In other parts of Haifa feeling was running high but apparently there was no concerted move to join the rioters in the lower part of the city.

Fires Across Bow

The Fenice apparently tried to land its passengers on the beach but was intercepted by a police gunboat. It refused an order to leave to and the gunboat fired across its bow. The sloop was anchored outside the harbor and its passengers, under the new British police, probably will be deported.

Jewish residents of the half-Jewish, half-Arab city streamed down hillside streets toward the docks a few minutes after the last refugees were loaded.

The British First Infantry Division, called into action, quickly threw a cord around the dock area, but only after nearly 2,000 persons had streamed down King's Way which parallels the quays.

The curfew breakers, mostly young men, hurled stones at police and milled around the entrances to the docks.

Approximately 500 illegal Jewish immigrants who had spent 32 hours aboard a ship anchored in the harbor within sight of their "promised land" were the first to sail Tuesday morning.

Andrews, Upton And Concho Get Wildcat Projects

Locations were reported Tuesday for wildcats in Southwest Upton and in West Concho counties.

The Andrews County exploration is another project for the Block 12 field. It will be Vennex Oil Company of Texas No. 1 State of Texas, and will be 600 feet from north and east lines of northeast quarter of section 20, block 12, University land survey.

It is projected to 7,300 feet to test through the middle Permian and will start drilling by August 16. The wildcat is on the southeast side of the Block 12 area and is on a farmout from Staniland Oil & Gas Company.

R. C. Abernathy No. 1-A C. M. Bell, in Southwest Upton County, is to be a 3,200-foot cable tool prospect and is 2,310 feet from east and south lines of section 88, block Y. It is seven miles south and east of Crane and will start making hole at once.

Richardson, Patton and Greer No. 1, Frank Smith, to be located 330 feet from north and 210 feet from west lines of section 609, German Immigration Company survey, in West Concho County. That puts it about five and one-quarter miles southwest of Paint Rock.

The project will be drilled to 4,200 feet, with cable tools, and is to start by August 25.

Will Run Pipe

Roy Goldston, et al. No. 1 Moody estate, Southeast Ward County wildcat, in section 32, block 34, H&TC survey, about nine and one-half miles northwest of Grand Falls, was taking a Halliburton jeep survey, and was then to run 7-inch casing to the bottom.

Bandits Try To Steal Potatoes From Woman

2nd Robber Identified As Brother Of Other

ANTLERS, OKLA. — (AP) — A cat-mouse chase of 100 possemen for two bank bandits continued Tuesday in the rugged Klamich Mountains of Southeastern Oklahoma with the outlaws so hard pressed for food that they tried to steal a sack of potatoes from a farm woman.

Mrs. Lewis Trent, who lives three miles west of here, told officers she surprised a man—tall, dark-haired and answering the description of one of the robbers—in her house as she returned from gathering eggs. He was attempting to steal a sack of potatoes.

She related the man knocked her against a backyard fence and fled a few minutes before Highway Patrol Captain Dale Petty came along.

Deputy Sheriff F. S. Low of Electra, Texas, meanwhile reported the second bandit in the \$33,000 Walters, Okla., bank holdup had been identified by one of the victims through a picture. The other bandit previously had been identified through a picture. The two were identified as brothers.

Big Credit Business Is Predicted Soon By Texas U. Specialist

Plasco G. Moore, training specialist of the University of Texas, Division of Extension, told 30 Midland merchants Monday night at the opening session of the Midland credit school that the largest credit business the nation has ever known "is just over the horizon."

"Larger towns are making a bid for your good credit customers now," Moore said. "Tomorrow, when competition is keen, the smaller town will be confronted with the problem of keeping much of their retail business at home. If this is to be achieved to its fullest extent, business men in these smaller towns must use some of the same tactics as used by the larger cities in getting and holding good credit customers."

Moore produced several out-of-town newspaper advertisements soliciting credit customers.

He urged merchants to prepare now for the new credit era when many customers will have an urge to over-buy on installment or deferred payment plans.

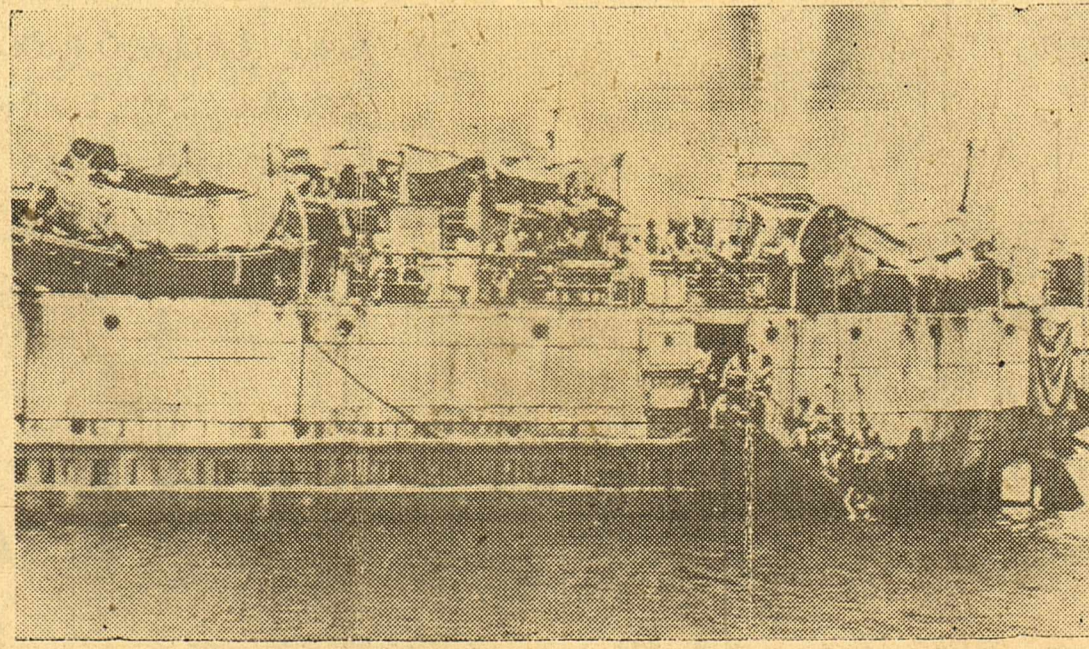
"Community cooperation will do a lot to prevent this tendency," he said. He pointed out the fact that Fort Worth and several other Texas cities already have adopted community credit policies to take the place of Regulation W, when that restriction is abolished.

H. G. WELLS DIES AT LONDON HOME

LONDON — (AP) — H. G. Wells, the world famous author, died Tuesday at his home in London. He was 79.

His secretary said Wells died "peacefully at 4 p. m."

The statement, on which the secretary would not elaborate, added:

"He had been in failing health for a considerable time. The funeral will be private."

Wells had used science as a vehicle in turning out stories and fantasies which were best sellers on both sides of the Atlantic. One of his most monumental writings, however, was an "Outline of History."

CONNALLY INTRODUCES TEXAN—

Cattlemen, Packers Oppose Revival Of Meat Ceilings Before Decontrol Board

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Wesley Hardenbergh, president of the American Meat Institute (packers) argued Tuesday against revival of meat price ceilings on the grounds that the industry is rapidly meeting public needs.

This return to "order" in the business, he told the OPA Price Decontrol Board, contrasts with "the chaos created by the four years of price control."

Hardenbergh said a survey of meat advertisements in cities throughout the country recently showed consumers are buying meat at "prices generally in line with OPA's ceiling," plus the subsidies OPA formerly paid to help keep retail prices down.

Senator Connally (D-Texas) became the first member of Congress to take part in the decontrol hearings when he introduced a fellow Texan, Jay L. Taylor of Amarillo.

Taylor appeared for the Joint Livestock Committee representing 134 associations of livestock producers, feeders, marketing agents and stock yards.

Taylor, a beef producer and stock yard operator, said: "By every test of logic, by every test of morality, and by every test of public interest the answer is the same: livestock should, by you, be ordered to remain decontrolled."

"Plenty of Meat"

A. A. Smith, Colorado cattleman testified there now is an adequate supply of meat in this country at reasonable prices.

Also, with large corn and feed crops, Smith said, producers are assured a regular supply of beef and other meats during the next year unless the government again applies price controls.

Smith said, the "beef business will again return to black market operations with the consequent unsanitary conditions and exorbitant prices."

Waiting to follow Smith was a long list of farmers, livestock producers, packers and others who oppose any return to ceilings.

Later in the day, the three-man board will hear the other side of the case from organized labor and consumer groups spokesmen.

Negro Charged After Snyder Sheriff Shot

SNYDER — (AP) — Charges of assault with intent to murder were filed in Justice of the Peace W. C. Davidson's court here Monday against Floyd Wellington, 55-year-old negro, in connection with the shooting and wounding of Sheriff Earl Strawn Saturday night.

Strawn was reported recovering from wounds inflicted with his own gun, which witnesses said Wellington took from the sheriff when he tried to enter a negro house to break up a dice game. The bullet entered Strawn's right arm above the elbow.

Telephone Company To Spend More Than \$197,000 On Expansions Here

An expansion program for the Midland telephone system which will cost more than \$197,000 was announced Tuesday by H. F. Fox, district manager of the Southwestern Bell Telephone Company.

The expansion of facilities to improve telephone service and provide necessary connections for new customers will be pushed to completion as rapidly as materials are available, Fox explained.

Meanwhile, every position on the switchboards of the company here is being staffed by trained operators and every effort is being made to improve the service.

Midland's telephone system is carrying the greatest load in its history, a load far greater than the equipment was designed to handle, but telephone officials and employees keep smiling and are doing their utmost to serve the community.

The number of telephones in service and the number of calls made daily through the system have set new records, surpassing even the marks made during the war. The demand for new telephones has continued at a pace never before equaled and materials still are very scarce.

This all adds up to the busiest time the telephone company has ever experienced.

More Than 4,200 Phones

Midland now has more than 4,200 telephones, and 565 of these have been added since V-J Day. This is an increase of 1,700 or 67 per cent over the 2,500 telephones in operation here in 1941.

Despite this increase, more than 400 persons Tuesday were on the list waiting for telephone connections. On V-J Day 319 persons were awaiting service. Since then 565 new telephones have been installed, and yet 400 still await service due to the lack of necessary materials.

Before the war, the average increase was about 150 per year. The rapid growth of Midland is responsible for this tremendous demand for service, despite the fact that Midland was fortunate in having its telephone facilities increased just before the outbreak of the war. This put the community in a more favorable position for telephone service than many other cities of the nation.

Approximately 26,000 local calls are handled daily by the Midland exchange compared with 18,000 in 1941. Toll calls in 1941 averaged only 444 daily, compared with more than 1,200 daily in 1946.

Since 1941, the number of operators at the telephone company has increased from 45 to 85.

The new telephones, plus the greatly increased number of calls, are taxing the present system to the limit, but the operators continue to smile and go about their work in a quiet and efficient manner. A visit to the switchboard of the company found every position filled, the operators busy as bees, and all cheerful, despite jibes of telephone users. They are determined to do the best job possible with the available facilities and to provide service to as many persons as possible in Midland.

AUSTIN—(P)—Former Governor James V. Allred in a formal statement commented on a report which he said was printed in "a newspaper which is supporting Beauford Jester," saying Allred was writing Rainey's speeches.

"Mr. Jester, himself, started this report in the presence of witnesses over a week ago," Allred said. "So this type of report is in keeping with the general tactics Jester has been using against Homer Rainey—getting someone else to say things for him and reaping the benefit himself."

"Since Beauford Jester has dragged me into this campaign, I am going to write a speech, not for Homer Rainey, but for myself. And I am going to get on the radio (Texas Quality Network) Wednesday night at 9 o'clock and give the people the facts."

Midland's Financial Problems Again Outlined By Mayor

Midland's financial problems concerning paving, water and sewers were outlined by Mayor Fred Hogan at a meeting of directors of the Midland Chamber of Commerce Monday night in the Schaubauer Hotel.

The large increase in paving and engineering costs were detailed by Hogan in discussing the city's financial situation. He said if any paving is done property owners must assume all the costs except possibly engineering and necessary rearranging of water and sewer lines.

He predicted the next bond issue would have to go for increasing water and sewer facilities and for erecting a large disposal plant.

"Our city is growing rapidly and all tax money in sight already is obligated," he said, after predicting an increase in valuations to more than \$14,000,000. "We are putting in new water and sewer lines now as fast as we can get pipe."

Hogan told of increases of 50 per cent in the costs of fire hydrants and valves and said not a piece of four-inch pipe now is available here to the city. He said the water system needs developing as Midland now is using more than 4,000,000 gallons per day.

O. C. Harper, Chamber of Commerce president, appointed Tom Sealy chairman of a resolutions committee to cooperate with the city officials in developing water, sewer, paving, garbage and other necessary programs.

Hogan also told of requests from the National Housing Agency asking him to appoint a mayor's emergency housing committee to assist in the building of more homes and buildings for Midland. Directors of the Chamber of Commerce recommended that the committee be named and Hogan said it would be appointed promptly.

W. L. Kerr called attention to the fact that the Junior Canteen will be without a home September 1 and asked the directors to consider plans for its future. Harper said this problem will be referred to the canteen committee of the Chamber of Commerce.

MILAN—(P)—The body of Benito Mussolini has been found in a trunk hidden in the certosa of the Pavia monastery near Milan and is now in police custody, a police statement said Monday night.

The corpse had been hidden in the monastery at St. Angelo until Monday morning, the police communique said.

Undiplomatic Diplomats

It is always a little surprising to discover that diplomats do not think in a bloodless emotional vacuum. The reason for the surprise is not quite clear. Perhaps the serious subjects they discuss are supposed to engender an equally serious approach. Or maybe we just expect diplomats to be diplomatic.

The fact remains, however, that international conferences are not judicial proceedings concerned with the niceties of established law. Neither are they arid scientific disquisitions. They are horse-trade bargaining at the top level. As a result, we sometimes get an exchange of unpleasanties such as Molotov and Byrnes engaged in the other day in Paris.

This was obviously a personal matter, even though countries, governmental systems, military effort and other impersonal topics entered into it. It is easy to imagine that the wearying impact of divergent aims and policies and the accumulated frustrations, banquets and midnight confabs of many weeks had worn nerves and tempers to the point of combustion.

The immediate issue of the Byrnes-Molotov flare-up to which Britain's Hector McNeil added a few pokes—seemed pretty silly. The American and British representatives had finished their pious protestations that they had no thought of trying to control the 21-nation vote through adoption of a simple majority procedure. Molotov had as piously disclaimed that the Soviet satellites' ability to block a two-thirds majority had anything to do with Russia's enthusiasm for the two-thirds majority rule.

The Big Three representatives were well on their way to a compromise when the fur started flying. And the whole thing was doubly silly since the Big Four must make the final decisions by unanimous agreement, anyway.

So it might seem that this personal spat was of little consequence. It may prove to be so. Yet everything said at these meetings is tremendously amplified. Even a simple, vodka-induced hiccup can come out sounding ominous.

At the same time, this full coverage has its compensations. For as statesmen become more accustomed to this healthy publicity, they may come to realize what an imposing chain reaction their words can set up.

Molotov says something nasty to Byrnes. Byrnes replies in kind. The hot words go back home to millions. Suddenly the Anglo-American imperialists are getting bolder, and the Russians more difficult. Suddenly the hard work of peace-making and international understanding is even harder. And all because Molotov's stomach was a little upset, or Byrnes had a headache from too little sleep.

Thus the statesmen attack their superhuman tasks beset by human frailties. Their decisions, like ours, are swayed by personal traits and extraneous circumstances. But while most of us can be careless, thoughtless or spiteful without causing much damage, they, alas, must watch their diet and health as well as their tongues. The fate of millions may depend on it.

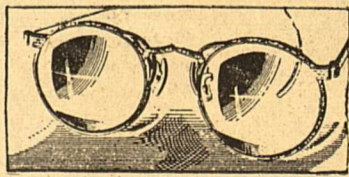

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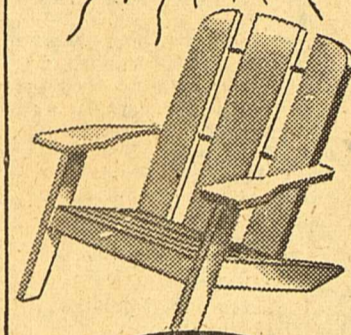

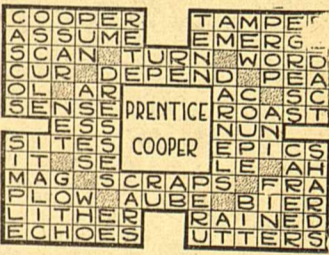

sons in the shortest possible time." Fox explained. "There were 319 persons waiting for service at the close of the war and it seemed fair to us to share the equipment we had with as many persons as possible. We have done this by installing only party line service in homes and by connecting telephones to existing equipment in the central office until we now are literally out of telephone numbers or facilities.

"Although 565 additional telephones have been installed, 400 persons still are awaiting service. But through temporary, emergency measures, more persons are getting service in Midland than ever before, despite the disturbed conditions and acute shortages which have delayed plans for rapid expansions. Of those still without a telephone, only 181 were waiting at the start of the year and they will be served just as soon as possible."

Vital Materials Needed
"The company is doing all in its power to make the waiting period as short as possible, but like everyone else, the telephone company is waiting in line for the vital materials needed to make a telephone system work—poles, wire, copper, lead, switchboards and even cotton yarn, among other things. In each possible case, the company is using substitutes for the scarce materials, but there is even a shortage of substitutes."

The expansion program calls for additions to both the central office equipment and the outside wire and cable networks. Work will be started as soon as the equipment becomes available, but it may be next spring before many of the projects are underway, he cautioned.

In the central office, six additional switchboard positions, which will be able to handle about 1,300 more telephones, will be installed. Work will start about the first of the year. Four months or longer

Advisement and guidance centers, where veterans are given free tests to determine their aptitudes, were opened by the VA August 6 at North Texas State Teachers College in Denton and at the expanded East Texas contact office in Longview.

Other Plans

A larger portion of the fund will go to the wire and cable networks. This job will involve extension of underground conduit and cable principally to the north, east and west sections of the city, Fox said. Approximately 7,900 feet of conduit will be installed beneath the streets, about 440 poles will be set for aerial lines, and a total of 145,000 feet of cable will be installed.

Telephone equipment factories now are working at top speed, Fox asserted, to produce the needed switchboards, central office apparatus, wire and cable. Many thousands of persons throughout the country are waiting for service and it will take months to produce the needed equipment. Midland must await its turn for its share.

The problem of furnishing new service in Midland has been complicated by the rapid growth of the city and its telephone system in recent years. Ten years ago Midland had only 1,634 telephones. Now it has more than 4,200.

"I searched far and wide throughout India for a good elephant but those I could have bought would have cost me a fortune," he says.

In East Africa he found elephant prices more reasonable and bought seven of them together with two hippos and two pink pelicans.

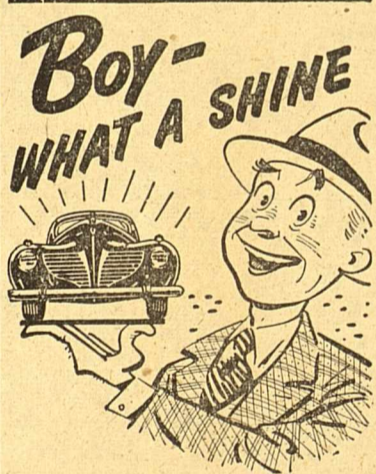
Texas To Get US Funds To Construct Airports

WASHINGTON—(P)—The Civil Aeronautics Administration has announced state apportionments of \$30,822,750, including \$2,091,311 for airport construction and development for the year ending June 30, 1947.

State allotments must be matched by sponsors of projects, the agency said in explaining that the figures were based on state population and area. The Texas apportionment was the largest announced, with California second with \$1,598,582. Other states included New Mexico, \$667,735, and Oklahoma, \$621,432.

MUNSTER, GERMANY—(P)—Hugo Walloch, an Austrian prisoner of war who has made archeology his hobby, has requested that his repatriation be delayed because he has found at the prison camp here what he believes to be ice age relics.

The 40-year-old former bank clerk has uncovered more than 150 carved stones he believes to be of the Mesolithic culture and has received permission from British authorities to dig in an area about 60 yards square so he can continue his investigation.

Australia Scrapping Combat Aircraft

MELBOURNE—(P)—Hundreds of combat aircraft released by the RAAF to the Commonwealth Disposals Commission likely will be destroyed. They include Spitfires, Hurricanes, Beaufighters, Beauforts, Oxfordees, Boomerangs, Fairy Battles, and Gannets, all of which have been declared surplus. They will be stripped of all saleable parts and the metal will be sold as scrap.

The Civil Aviation Department will not license the aircraft because they are below civilian standards in strength of materials and safety.

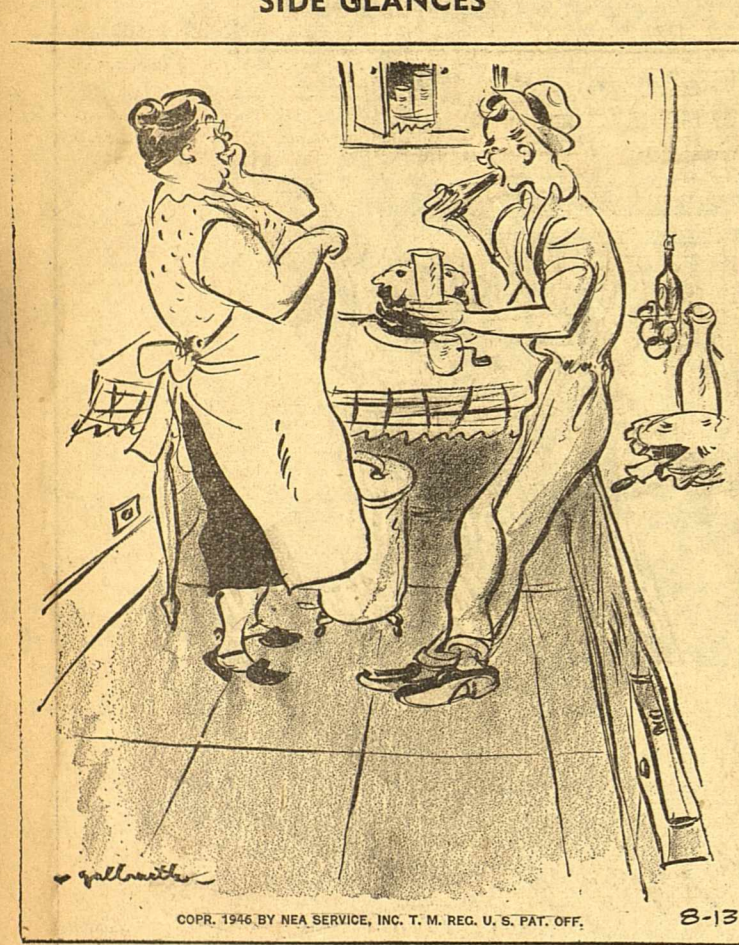

I believe this will continue because contract bridge is the one game that gives an opportunity to all, regardless of age, to enjoy keen competition with their fellow men and women. Undoubtedly it provides the widest social contacts of any game. Tournament bridge players know a group of people in almost every community in the United States.

In rubber bridge the first obligation is to make the contract. A player never should jeopardize his contract for an overtrick.

maximum number of tricks. Making a contract of four may give you a bottom score on the board if everybody else makes five.

In today's hand declarer won the opening diamond lead in dummy, then finessed the jack of clubs, West winning. Another diamond was led and won in dummy. The deuce of hearts was played. East put on the seven, declarer the ace, and West turned his king of hearts face down on the table indicating that declarer had caught a singleton king. Of course he immediately turned it over, but declarer had been warned not to try to make five-odd.

He started to play clubs and let East cash his two high trumps. If West had played the king normally, declarer would have had to guess whether or not West also held the queen of hearts. In that case the proper play would be to lead a small heart and drop the two adverse hearts together, making five.

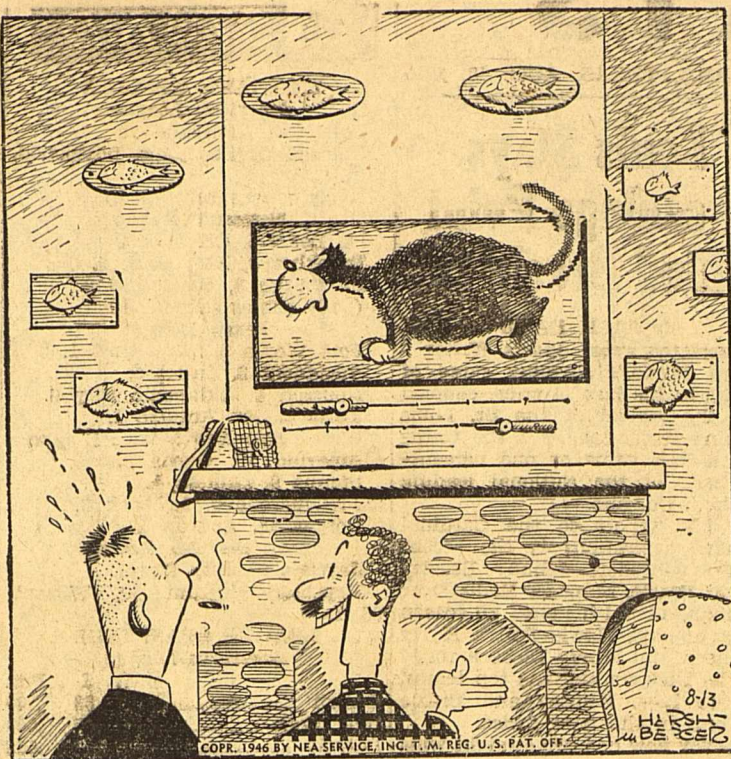
