NANKING -(AP) -- Chinese Communists, rejecting Chiang Kai-shek's peace program, Thursday stepped up theirs assaults on Yenhsien and Tatung and turned their verbal fire upon General Marshall, U. S. peace envoy.

Byrnes Blasts Soviet Economic Treaties

New Secret Weapon

Says U.S. Asks No Recompense For War Effort

Secretary Offers Friendship To World

PARIS —(AP)— U. S. Secretary of State Byrnes, in an address patently aimed at Soviet Russia, told the peace conference Thursday that economic treaties concluded in contradiction of the Potsdam agreement would lead to "enslavement and exploitation."

At the same time Byrnes took exception to Russian allegations made during the debate on Italy's statement to the conference—that certain nations had enriched themselves during the war.

Byrnes declared that the war cost the United States \$400,000,-000,000 "loaned by the American public," but was "seeking no recom-

"Before America was attacked Franklin D. Roosevelt announced that the United States would be the symbol of democracy," he added. "America seeks no territories or recompense.

Byrnes added that the United States was willing to help in the

He spoke after Foreign Minister Jan Masaryk of Czechoslovakia had told the conference that Hungarian Foreign Minister Janos Gyonkyosi had tried to "gloss over" his nation's record as an Axis satellite by castigating Czechoslovakia in an address before the parley Wednes-

There was loud applause in the conference chamber when Byrnes said the United States would offer reciprocal friendship to any na-

Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov in a firm voice, occasionally gesturing with one hand.

The American secretary praised both Italy and Greece and objected to recent speeches by Russian and other Slav delegates giving the "impression that other countries were more democratic than Italy because they have harmonized their views with the Russians."



Is Soviet Policy Realistic

It is often said, in explanation or extenuation of Soviet government policies, that the Russians are "realsts"—practical politicians who know what they want

Recently there have been a few dissenting opinions. Brooks Atkinson of the New York Times, for one, brought from Russia the impression that Soviet leaders are conused and uncertain, due to a one-sided education and ack of knowledge of the outside world. This view would seem to be strengthened by Andrei Gromyko's recent elaboration of Russia's previously stated position on the question of atomic energy control.

If Russia instead of the United States were sole possessor of a proven, workable atomic bomb, the Soviet position might be considered realistic, or even ruthless. f Russia has never intended to attempt production of atomic bombs-which is to be doubted from some statements by Stalin and Molotov-this attitude could be ascribed to an admirable trust in sister nations never exhibited by the Soviet Union up to now.

But since the first hypothesis is untrue and the sec-ond unlikely, the present Russian plan appears surprisingly unrealistic. Russia wants control of atomic energy kept in the Security Council, not vested in an independent interna-tional agency. But in any event, the veto power must remain. Russia admits that Security Council action might be necessary to prevent atomic violations, but at the same time she wants an arrangement whereby any of the big powers could block such action by the veto.

Russia would have the individual signatories to a treaty of atomic energy control enact their own "severe punishments" against treaty violations. Atomic development, however, is such a vast, expensive proposition that only a government could finance it. Hence a government would not only know of violations, but would order them. It is naive to suppose that a government, under such circumstances, would "severely punish" itself.

Russia opposes international inspection of atomic installations as a violation of national sovereignty. Thus a great power bent on atomic war would have yet another safeguard during its preparation. In short, the Russian plan would give all the breaks to a "war-mongering" America which already has the bomb, while the American Baruch plan would seem to offer Russia much better protection under present circumstances.

This is cold-blooded reasoning which fortunately does not conform to our official policy. But it seems that if Russian leaders are as "realistic" as advertised, and as inimical to western capitalism as their official Q. When will forms be available? Q. H. Allies Ignore Potsdam Principles

Breaking up of Germany's powerful cartels, trusts and monopolies was one of the principal agreements reached in the Potsdam declaration. Destruction of these great concentrations of wealth was considered necessary to end Germany's ability to wage war.

In reorganizing the German economy, the planners at Potsdam called for the development of agriculture as the principal industry. This was the so-called Morgenthau plan. There has been considerable change in this view in the past year, as the victorious powers have realized that Germany cannot exist solely as an agricultural state.


The Potsdam Communique also sponsored the treatment of Germany as a single economic unit during the period of occupation. To this end, it was declared that there should be common policies in the four occupation zones on mining, farming, wages, prices, banking, currency, taxes, transport, communications, and removal of reparations.

There has been little of this program realized in the first year that Potsdam has been in effect. It is one of Potsdam's worst failures.

It was decided at Potsdam that Germany should have a living standard no higher than the average for the rest of Europe, excluding Great Britain and Soviet Russia. After months of arguing by the staffs of the Control Council, agreement was finally reached on what this level should be by determining how much steel Germany would be allowed to produce for her own needs.

It was also decided at Potsdam that a fair distribution of German commodities should be established among the four zones, so that each would have a balanced economy and there would be no need for inter-zonal com-

merce. This has not been done, either.
Practically none of the administrative machinery called for by the Potsdam agreement to make Germany an economic unit has been created. The fault here is not with the Potsdam principles, but with the inability of the Control Council to get together in carrying them out.

Cut giblets into small pieces and

add, with neck, wing tips, etc., to boiling salted water. Brown turkey pieces which have been seasoned with salt and pepper in the fat in a heavy skillet or Dutch oven. When the turkey has browned, remove from fat and make a sauce by adding the onions to the fat and sauteeing over low heat until

soft. Then add the salt, garlic salt, celery salt, tomatoes, and poultry seasoning. Add the cooked giblets which have been chopped fine, and the stock in which they were cooked.

America's Card Authority Timing plays a very important part in all sports. Proper timing of the play of the hand is one of the most difficult features to learn in the game of bridge. Today's hand is an ideal example of timing.

Declarer may decide to win the opening heart lead with dummy's ace, lead a spade and take the finesse; but if he makes that play, he has not given sufficient thought to making the contract. If the spade finesse fails, another heart will come back, which South will have



to ruff. Then if the trumps break four-two, he is in a bad fix because the diamond suit still is not set.

South should decide at the very beginning that he is going to lose just two spades and a diamond When he wins the first heart, he should take two rounds of trumps and then play the ace, king and a small diamond. Now if a heart comes back, trumps it and leads another diamond. In this manner the contract would be assured.

The line of play described is really a safety play because it offers protection against four trumps in either of the opponents' hands. The wise declarer takes precaution against bad breaks.




