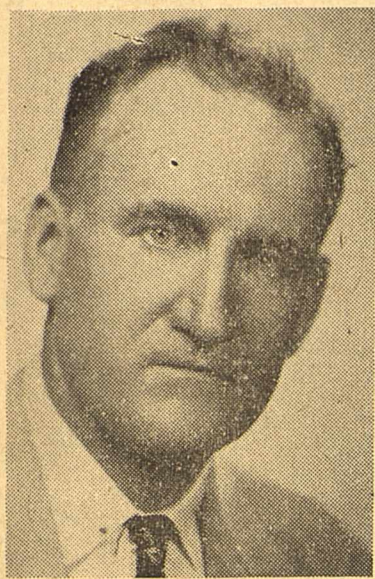

### NO SHOWS IN DST OF FOGELSON WILDCAT

E. E. Fogelson and Coston Petroleum Corporation No. 1-D-C University, Southwest Ector County Ellenburger exploration, in the Penwell shale field and in northwest quarter of section 1, block 35, University survey, ran a drillstem test at 9,305-31 feet, in the top of the Ellenburger.

The tool was open 20 minutes. There was a slight blow of air during the period. Recovery was 90 feet of drilling mud with no shows of oil, gas or water.

Operator was drilling ahead under 9,240 feet, making a foot about each 10 to 12 minutes. The top zone of the Ellenburger was extra tight. It appeared that the section now being penetrated was somewhat softer. It was planned to drill to about 9,350 feet and go in for another drillstem test late Tuesday.

13 University survey, completed for a 14-hour flowing potential of 364.5 barrels of 37 gravity oil, from lower Permian pay at 8,815-7,130 feet, which had been treated with 7,000 gallons of acid. Gas-oil ratio was 787-1.

Still Unsettled  
Shell Oil Company, Inc., No. 1 Elson, in northeast corner of section 13, block A-40, oil survey, and one mile southwest of the discovery for Ellenburger production in the Nelson field, in West Andrews County, was to drill and core to 10,773 feet, and undertake another drillstem test.

Last test reported was at 10,713-743 feet. The tool was open 60 minutes. There was a fair to good blow of air throughout the period. Recovery was 68 barrel of slightly gas cut mud; 68 barrel of salt water, carrying five per cent oil; 1.36 barrels of salt water, cut with one per cent oil, and 68 barrel of slightly gas cut salt water and drilling mud.

Informed sources say the project is not now in the true Ellenburger. It has logged some material which was classed as from that formation—but it appears that the sections are considerably mixed up.

Slight Gas Flows  
Stanford No. 1-GG University, Northeast Crockett County Ellenburger prospector, ran a 75-minute drillstem test at 8,290-8,335 feet. Recovery was 75 feet of slightly gas cut drilling mud and 450 feet of gas. After the hole is reamed down to bottom operator is to drill ahead.

W. R. Ransome of Dallas filed application with the Railroad Commission to drill a 6,000-foot wildcat in Northeast Runnels County, one-half mile west of Crews.

## British Recall UNRRA Official

### Morgan Released After LaGuardia Challenges Statement Soviets Using Agency For Spying

LONDON—(AP)—The War Office announced Tuesday that Lt. Gen. Sir Frederick Morgan had been released from his duties as UNRRA's chief of displaced persons operation in Germany.

The text of the War Office announcement: "In connection with the reorganization of UNRRA's displaced persons work in Germany, and in view of the changing situation, the War Office has been informed by F. H. LaGuardia, director-general of UNRRA, that it is now possible to release Lt. Gen. Sir Frederick Morgan from his duties as chief of the displaced persons operation in Germany. General Morgan is accordingly returned to England."

Morgan's release came after LaGuardia had challenged an unnamed "high authoritative source," quoted in press dispatches, to prove a statement that Soviet Russia was using UNRRA as a means of gathering information in Western Allied territory.

Morgan had not been specifically named as the "high authoritative source," but there had been speculation in the press that the statement was attributable to him.

Morgan created a sensation last winter with a statement that there was an organized, well-financed exodus of Jews from Europe. He said many Jews in the exodus carried with them a good supply of money. Jewish organizations immediately accused him of being "anti-semitic."

## US And Britain Oppose Soviet Hand In Control Of Dardanelles

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The United States and Great Britain have decided to meet Russia squarely on the issue of the Dardanelles.

In a cards on the table gesture, this country already has informed Moscow that it is flatly opposed to Soviet demands for a voice in the military control of that highly important water link between the Mediterranean and the Black Sea.

Furthermore, diplomatic officials who reported this action said Great Britain will take the same step, if she hasn't already done so.

Thus the two big Western powers are siding firmly with Turkey, current guardian of the Dardanelles, upon whom Russia has served two highly unpalatable demands:

1. That the straits should be jointly defended by Turkish and Soviet forces, and

2. That future control policies should be laid down by agreement among the Black Sea powers alone.

To the first demand this country is said to have objected on the ground that it virtually would mean granting the Soviet Union military bases in the straits.

USSR Too Dominant  
Because Turkey and Russia are the principal Black Sea powers, the second point reportedly was rejected because of fears that Russia would be able to dominate the smaller nation on any major issue.

However, the American note which Fedor Orskov, Soviet charge d'affaires, was handed at the State Department Monday leaves the way open for Moscow to negotiate for freer rights to the straits—with American support.

The Montreux treaty which governs control of the waterway currently gives Turkey the right to bar passage of warships of any country during time of war.

Secretary of State Byrnes, however, has declared that the United States is willing to back Russia in any request for unlimited transit rights for her war and merchant ships at all times.

Survivors are his parents, Mr. and Mrs. T. O. Buckland; three sisters, Patsy Mignon, Marlene and Sandra Sue; his maternal grandmother, Mrs. Lee Herman, Winters, Texas; an uncle, A. E. Buckland, Port Arthur; and an aunt, Mrs. O. O. Crutchfield, Austin.

Funeral services will be held at the Calvary Baptist Church under the direction of the Ellis Funeral Home with the Rev. Fred McPherson officiating, but are pending arrival of relatives.

Burial will be in Fairview Cemetery.

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# Yugoslav Claims Right In Shooting

## U. S. Displays Armed Might Near Border

### Division Parade Plays Part In War Of Nerves

GROIZIA, ITALY—(AP)—The U. S. 88th Division paraded Tuesday in an impressive display of American military might close enough to the Morgan Line for Yugoslav soldiers to watch through glasses.

The parade came at a time when American and British relations with Yugoslavia were under fresh strain from incidents, some of which occurred after the review was scheduled:

1. Two sharp officials contradictions of Yugoslav versions of recent events in the Venezia Giulia occupation area involving Yugoslav soldiers.

2. The disappearances, presumably into Yugoslavia, late last week of eight British soldiers and seven German prisoners of war who were traveling south of Trieste.

3. The disappearance Monday of an American transport plane between Vienna and Udine, which reported shortly before its radio went dead that it was flying through tracer bullets and antiaircraft fire.

At higher levels, moreover, there had been the acrid Yugoslav protest against the beating of two Yugoslav officers here on August 9 and the American reply retorting its contentions.

There also had been the American protest against Yugoslavia's shooting down of another American transport plane on August 9.

Sharp Notes Sent To Tito  
In addition, the American and British government Monday released the texts of the sharp notes sent the Marshal Tito government accusing Yugoslavia of violating the American-British occupation zone and waging a war of nerves against Allies.

Conspicuous for his absence at the parade was Colonel Bencic, commander of the detachment of Yugoslav troops in the American-British occupation zone of the Italian northeast area which Yugoslavia covets with Russian support.

It was the 88th Division's first parade in its 32 months overseas and its announced purpose was to honor the Second Battalion of the 351st Infantry for heroic fighting around Monte Capello in Italy from September 27 to October 1, 1944. The 88th Division is the major American unit in Venezia Giulia.

The 10,000 or more troops of the 88th Division who paraded were all that could be spared from guarding the Morgan Line, which marks the occupation zones of the American and British troops from the Yugoslavs.

Maj. Gen. Bryant E. Moore, division commander and acting commander of the 13th Allied corps in Venezia Giulia, reviewed the troops with General Lee and other ranking American and British officers.

Involved were both naval men and civilians, the Leader said.

Most of the property was believed to have been recovered. It included electrical equipment, various instruments, and other items aboard ships.

### State Department Reveals State Of Near War Between Yanks And Yugoslav Troops At Trieste

BELGRADE, YUGOSLAVIA—(AP)—A spokesman within the government said the Yugoslav forces "did the right thing" in commenting on the shooting down of an unarmed American transport plane Monday and forcing another to land earlier.

"They did nothing which was not in coordination with our own and international rights," said the spokesman, who declined to be quoted by name. The government itself refused official comment.

## Starvation And Disease Threaten Rioting Calcutta

CALCUTTA—(AP)—Military and police units, working their way through the blood-stained streets of Calcutta, restored a measure of order Tuesday in this weary city where an estimated 3,000 men, women and children were killed in four days of fighting between Hindus and Moslems.

Shaking off the terror and hysteria which had gripped them since last Friday, the more than 2,000,000 inhabitants of the city found they faced the threat of starvation and disease.

Calcutta's food distribution system has been thrown so badly out of gear that many of the poorer residents have been without food for days.

People moved freely through the streets Tuesday morning after a quiet night. Obstructions in trolley tracks were being removed, and transportation was expected to be resumed shortly.

Some city employees declined to work in the street, in the absence of full protection.

Military police and rescue parties, wearing masks, worked to remove decomposed bodies lying on the streets.

Thousands of refugees jammed railway stations.

The soldiers and police were turning the streets not only to prevent fresh outbreaks but also to search for food. Fresh vegetable and fruit stalls in new market, the largest in the city, were damaged in the disorders.

Four or five cannon shots were heard from the ground.

The plummeting plane disappeared in the mountains and "then we saw a big column of smoke appear," he said. The Yugoslav army immediately began a thorough search, the informant added.

The area is approximately 25 miles from the place where the other American C-47 was forced down by gunfire, 11 days ago. One passenger of that transport was seriously wounded.

A report telephoned to Vienna said that the airport at Udine, destination of the plane, picked up a call Monday from the pilot of the missing transport saying that he was under attack by a fighter plane in Klagenfurt corridor just north of Yugoslavia. The radio then went dead.

A Trieste dispatch said the plane left Vienna Monday morning but failed to arrive at Udine, in the Allied-occupied Zone "A" of Venezia Giulia. The flight normally takes about two hours. It was indicated here that the Yugoslav foreign office might make a statement during the day on the machine gunning of the plane forced down August 9.

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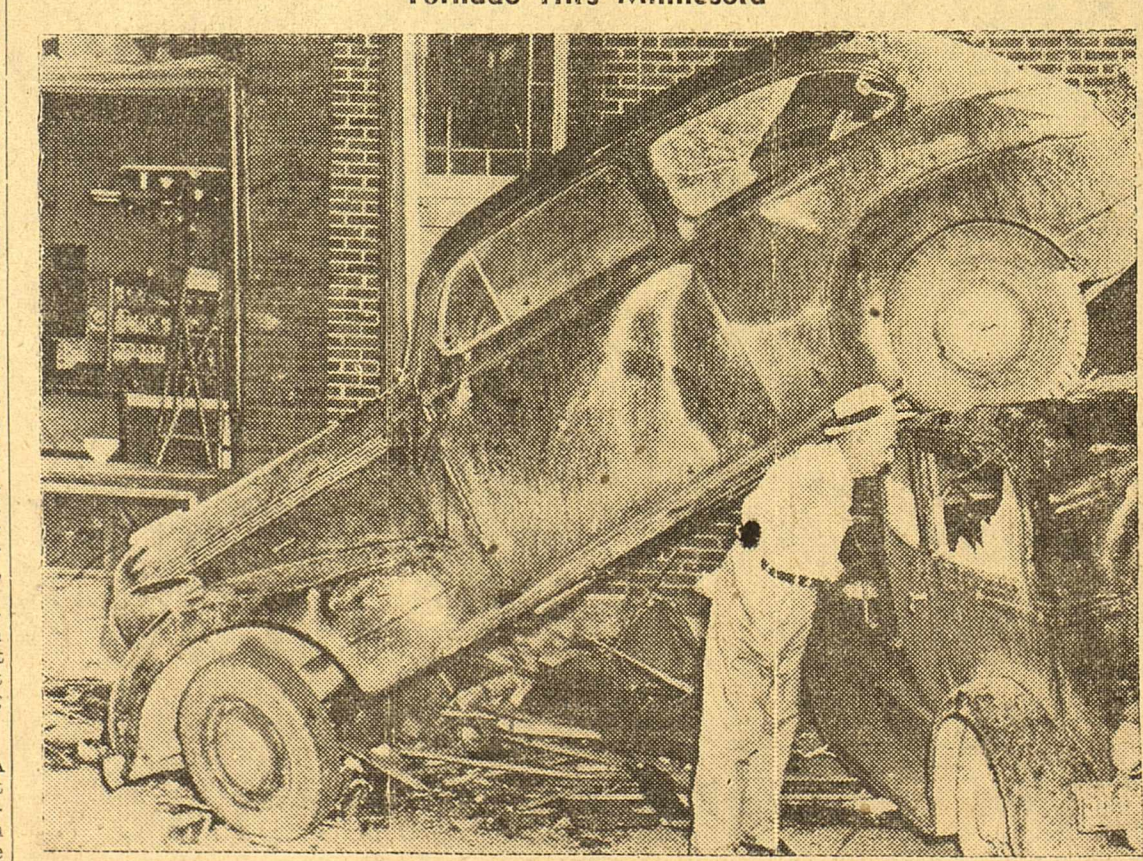

Other rainfall included Nacogdoches .75 inch, Pampa .25, Clarendon .11, Bridgeport .23, San Angelo .15, Shamrock .16, and Panhandle .25. A light shower fell east of Monahan.  
Rainfall throughout the northern portion of the state Monday lowered temperatures five to 10 degrees at most points.  
Nacogdoches was high for the state with 105 degrees.

## University Figures Prominently In Gubernatorial Campaign Speeches

The University of Texas figured prominently in campaign speeches of Texas' two battling gubernatorial run-off opponents, Homer P. Rainey and Beauford Jester, Monday.  
Rainey, starting a big-city drive that will continue until election eve in San Antonio on Friday, charged in Fort Worth that the present state surplus of \$75,000,000 "is a disgrace taken out of the lives and health of Texans."

He said the present administration has not used the surplus towards constructing "any buildings at the University of Texas, while veterans cannot go to school there because they cannot find a place to live."  
Jester, completing a tour of the heavily populated Houston area, said at Goose Creek Monday night that he would be willing to run for governor on the basis of his record as a member of the board of regents of the University of Texas.  
"I will gladly run for governor on my record at that great school as contrasted with the record made there by my opponent," Jester said.

The Corsicana railroad commissioner said he served on the university board from 1929 until 1935, a period which he said has come to be known as one of the greatest in the history of the school.  
"It was an era that saw the temporary shacks replaced by permanent buildings and saw the university placed on a sound footing," he said.

"Contrast that record with that of my opponent who became president in 1939," he added.

"What was his record?"

"He sowed discord and reaped hate."

L. A. Woods, state superintendent of public instruction and unopposed candidate for reelection in the July primary, endorsed Rainey in a statewide broadcast Monday night.

Pat Coon, Dallas attorney and former assistant U. S. and state attorney general, spoke in Jester's behalf over the Texas State Network Monday night from Dallas.

Speaking at the high school football stadium in Goose Creek, Jester Monday night also attacked Rainey on the issue of campaign expenditures.

"It is not Beauford Jester who is conducting an all out money campaign in trying to be elected gov-

ernor," Jester asserted. "My opponent is campaigning in a fleet of airplanes all over the state and he has a whole floor of an air conditioned Austin hotel, manned by campaign workers from all over Texas and outside the state."

"I ask you who is spending the big money?"

Throughout the day's campaigning, Jester repeated his pledge of no new taxes.  
In his Fort Worth speech, Rainey declared that the main issue of the campaign was "do-nothingism versus intellectual, progressive action."

After charging that his opponent is backed by "the big boys who rule Texas by an economic and political hierarchy," Rainey said, "the fundamental issue is whether they shall continue to rob the state or whether the people through their representative shall have a share in its government and resources."

Referring to Jester's "people's path" program, the former university president said the plan "serves these forces who control our government and natural resources."

Woods in his broadcast from Austin, said:

"I want you to know that I am not fighting anyone, but I want friends of education throughout the state to know that, in my opinion, our cause can best be served by the election of Homer Rainey as governor."

He summarized his reasons for coming out for Rainey as follows:

Rainey is a conservative, has a specific constructive school program, is an outstanding scholar and Christian gentleman, and has a record that proves he can get along with people.

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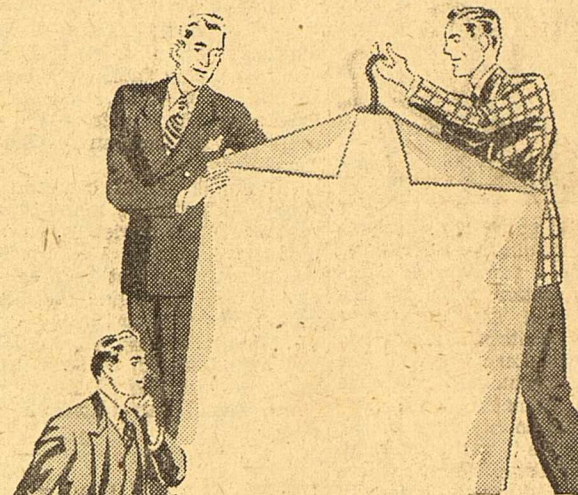

**Magic Modern Designs Shine In Any Setting**

With a deft sleight-of-hand worthy of a magician, designers are conjuring up new and unusual home decoration accessories with plastics and fluorescent lights to fit with equal aplomb into the rich background of Victorian furnishings or into the simplicity of a modern setting.

Expandable picture frames of plastic, as magnifying and dwarfing as the cake that Alice-in-Wonderland ate, can be made big or little to accommodate photos of varying dimensions. Adjustable and grooved, the frame expands at the flick of a finger to take an eight by ten inch portrait. It contracts as easily to take a four by five inch snapshot.

Flower-carved plastics make such postwar pretties as bookends, paperweights and decorative boxes. Etched and colored beneath the surface, these objects look as delicate as blown glass, yet boast resistance to breakage.

Threatening to oust the antique what-not from its corner, are plastic shelf-ensembles. Favored as a showier back-drop for miniature figures and other decorative objects are the translucent shelves and the trick arrangements into which they are assembled. Also groomed for their postwar debut are plastic lamp shades, carved plastic boxes and card tables which bring along as a design a surface etching of their own backgammon boards.

Not ready for popular distribution yet but worth jotting down and pasting in your hat for future reference are radiant plastic wall panels. Etched in stylized patterns, tinted in pastel hues and laminated to produce a three dimensional effect, these panels will put on a performance as spectacular as an underwater garden. Another revolutionary design—still hush-hush and experimental—is a lamp with a bulb concealed beneath the base. A curving, clear plastic shield transmits non-glaring illumination to the desk or table-top.

## Pleasing The Audience

Up to now the Paris peace conference has been neither very hopeful nor very edifying. There are rebukes and charges of insult among the big powers. There are adamant stands and insistent demands by smaller nations. Yet there is reason to believe, without being Pollyanna-ish, that things maybe aren't quite as bad as they seem.

We read a lot about what this one or that one, victor and vanquished alike, will or won't do. Even the weakest and most hopeless country represented seems to have power to add to the delay and confusion. But one may suspect that some of the loudest talk is directed toward the gallery.

These delegates have an audience to please. They may be representatives of a political party hopeful of retaining power, or of a government which has a precarious popular backing, or of a nation hyperconscious of its prestige in world matters. But whatever the situation, they know that the folks back home are watching them, and that they had better look good.

So they ask for the maximum, and perhaps a piece of the moon besides. They present their case in the most heroic or most piteous terms, depending on what seems likely to be the most impressive.

This technique resembles that of union or company officers who, in negotiating a new contract, start out with impossible demands or implausible objections. They know they haven't a chance of getting what they ask or of refusing what is asked of them. But they also know that when they arrive at an agreement the rank and file or the stockholders will be convinced that they put up a stirring fight and got no worse than a draw.

Again, the approach is like that of a baseball player or manager arguing with the umpire. He knows he can't win. His conversation, accompanied by vehement gestures, may be reasonable. But from the stands it looks like a colorful exhibition of fighting spirit, an outraged sense of justice, and a will to win.

The real work of the Paris representatives, as of the collective bargainers and, in many instances, of the members of Congress, will be done behind closed doors. The idea of open covenants openly arrived at is admirable, but it can be very embarrassing to the participants to an agreement.

If it were really known how a nation's representative sometimes arrives at a settlement of his country's demands, if all the concessions and counter-proposals and unemotional dickering were made public, there might be serious political repercussions back home.

The people of a country whose attention is focused on a spokesman at any important international conference must have the assurance that their man is in there making the best possible fight for the best possible terms. Hence a good deal of window dressing, and a good many apprehensive moments for the spectators.

This is not to say that the Paris conference doesn't have many critical decisions to make and many fateful crises to avoid. It is only to suggest that some of the most trying dilemmas of the present will undoubtedly be settled by reasonable compromise, and soon be forgotten.

## Hurry Back

We feel that we can safely speak for most of the country's editorial writers in addressing this message to Congress:

We shall miss you. We shall miss your admirable accomplishments, and even more we shall miss your errors, omissions, delays, long-windedness and petty politicking. It's going to seem like a long time from now till the first of January without you there in Washington. It always does.

The dog days will seem more oppressive, and the first bleak days of winter even bleaker because you aren't there. On too many of those days we shall slip a piece of blank paper into the typewriter, where it will remain blank while we gaze off into space, bereft of congressional doings to write about.

The Bilbos and the Rankins, the Wagners and the Tafts, the Peppers and Vandenberg and Barkleys, all our favorite heroes and favorite targets, will be off about their private business, for the most part. And with their departure there vanishes temporarily one of the best sources of copy in the world.

So hurry back, ladies and gentlemen—you and your new colleagues. Whatever the rest of the country may think of you, and whatever we may have said about you and intend to say in the future, you know that we're deeply and professionally fond of you. And, boy, how we're going to miss you!

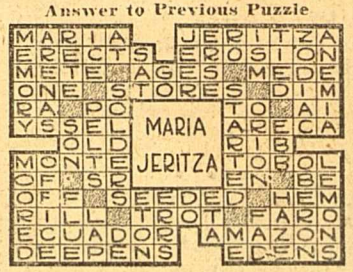

The public schools get one-fourth of the gasoline tax revenue. The amendment writing this into the Constitution has been endorsed by the Texas Good Roads Association. It will be voted on at the general election in November.

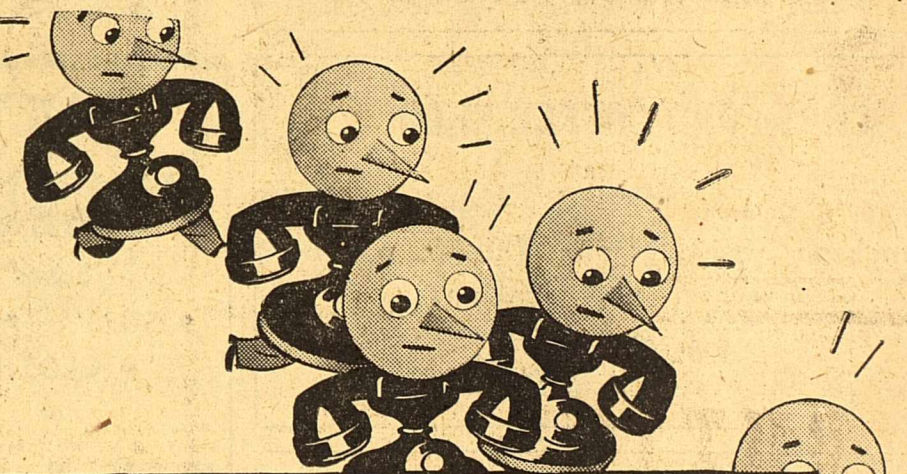

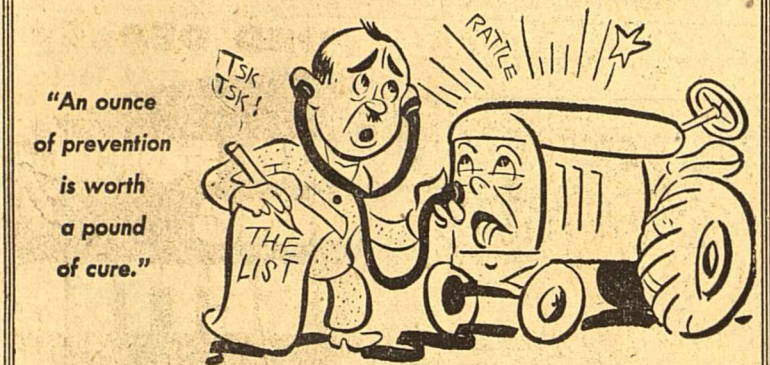
Air Day is expected to attract 100,000 visitors to the big show during the two days of the affair, with many celebrities attending, and with both Army and Navy sending flight teams to participate.

**OPA Hikes Prices On Canned Fruits And Auto Parts**

WASHINGTON —(AP)—The OPA Monday night increased the ceiling prices of canned fruits, and automobile parts.

The increases on canned fruits apply to the 1946 pack as soon as it reaches the stores, and to all fruits except applesauce, citrus fruit and juices, and grape juice. On No. 2 1/2 cans, they amount to one cent for peaches, two cents for apricots, plums, figs and prunes, seven cents for pears and four cents for fruit cocktail.

They were granted to offset higher costs. In the case of pears and fruit cocktail, the OPA said, the boosts represent the first application of the Barkley substitute for the Taft amendment which stipulates that prices must return current costs plus "a reasonable profit."

The increases on automobile replacement parts are to offset higher wage and material costs and become effective Saturday. Parts for new cars already are free of control. The increases are 15 per cent on engines and engine parts, 26.8 per cent on radiator hose, 17.3 on fan belts, 12 per cent on bearings, 24.5 per cent on dump bodies and hoists, and 15 per cent on all other parts.

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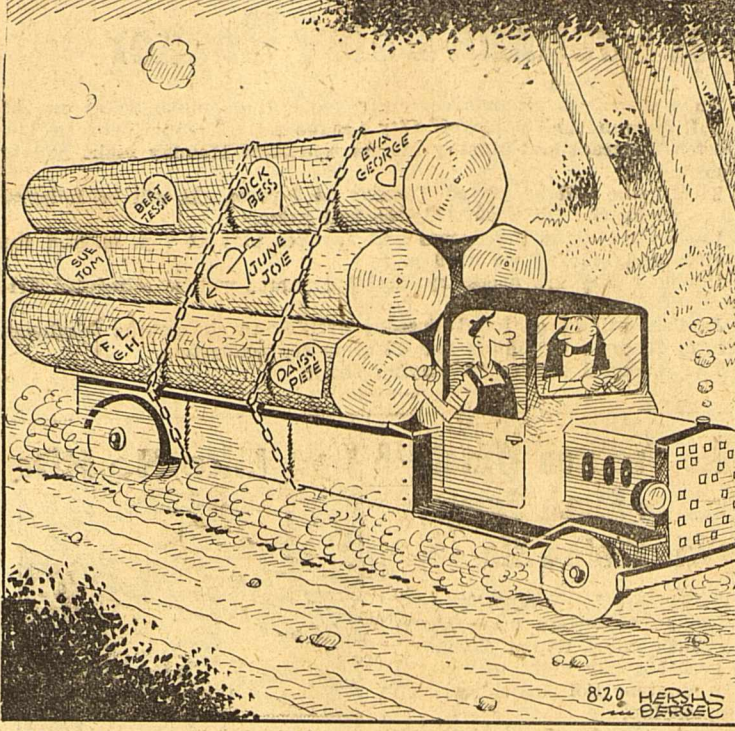

**Dewey Plays Role In N. Y. Election**

ALBANY, N. Y.—(AP)—Although not on the ballot, Gov. Thomas E. Dewey played an influential role in the three top New York state primary election contests Tuesday.

The governor was one of a relatively small number of voters expected to ballot in the state's 61 primary fights, including 21 congressional contests.

Monday was the closing day of the reunion. The Rev. Joe B. Reynolds of Perryton preached a sermon Sunday, J. S. Henry of Midland presided at a steak dinner which followed the Sunday services.

There was not a whiteface cow or barb wire in Texas when the elder McReynolds, J. M., brought his family up in East Texas. The combined ages of the children is 474 years, more time than has elapsed since Columbus discovered America.

The McReynolds family includes Lee, 70, a farmer of Chickasha, Okla.; G. H. (Herman), 68, a farmer of Ardmore, Okla.; Joe B. of Borger, a Methodist minister; L. D. of Brea, Calif., lumberman; Mrs. Bessie Burkett, 59, of Memphis, Tenn., housewife; Arthur, 57, of Seymour, farmer; Mrs. Ollie B. Richter, 55, of Los Angeles, teacher; and Howard M. of Midland, 52, wholesale meat dealer.

Dewey bestowed his blessing on State Senator F. R. Coudert running against Rep. Joseph C. Baldwin.

Upstate, former Rep. Hamilton Fish's choice, Mrs. Katherine St. George, a cousin of the late President Franklin D. Roosevelt, was testing her political strength at the polls in the 29th district for the first time. Her opponent for the Republican nomination was Rep. Augustus W. Bennett.

While Dewey has not said a word publicly about this contest, his opposition to Fish two years ago still is remembered.

Dewey also keenly desires the defeat of Rep. Vito Marcantonio in the 18th Congressional (Harlem) District's Republican Primary.

PITTSBURGH—(AP)—Members of the Pittsburgh Pirates baseball team go to the polls Tuesday in the first collective bargaining election in baseball history.

In that vote, they can either tell Robert Murphy to say goodbye to his dream of a labor union for baseball players—at least for the time being—or they can approve his American Baseball Guild as their bargaining unit.

Murphy said he holds membership cards for 26 Pirates. Thirty-one are eligible to vote in balloting from 9:30 a. m. to 6:30 p. m.

To rumors that the ball players had cooled toward the union since last June when they almost went out on strike, Murphy answered: "The players definitely feel that if they don't vote for the guild, the player-management committee will mean nothing. The players feel the club owners will forget all about them if nothing is hanging over their heads."

**Justice Rules Scout Died Of Alcoholism**

DALLAS—(AP)—Justice of the Peace W. L. Sterrett Monday rendered a verdict of "acute alcoholism" as the cause of death of Edward Leslie Wilson, 37, baseball scout for the St. Louis Cardinals, whose body was found Saturday in a Dallas hotel room.

Sterrett said his verdict was based upon his findings of an autopsy performed by three Dallas physicians. The examination failed to reveal any injury sufficient to cause death.

**Sisler Stars As Cards Beat Reds**

Dick Sisler, the forgotten man of the St. Louis Cardinals since his early season failure at first base, is changing the jeers to cheers at Sportsman's Park with his clutch hitting in the Red Birds' drive to catch the first-place Brooklyn Dodgers, who lead by 1 1/2 games.

The son of the great, George Sisler started the campaign as the regular Cardinal first sacker, prompting Manager Eddie Dyer to okay the sale of Ray Sanders to Boston.

When Sisler failed to hit big league pitching, Dyer gave him a rest. Sisler "flopped" on a second try. Dyer tried him in left field August 9 and he has hit at a .310 clip since he regained a regular job.

Monday night the brawny youngster started the birds off to a 6-0 romp over Cincinnati on a double with the bases loaded in the first inning.

Young Sisler's father now is one of the top talent scouts for the Brooklyn Dodgers.

Sisler has to share top billing with Ken Burkhardt who shut out the Reds with eight scattered hits, the fourth time he has whipped Cincinnati this season.

St. Louis' shutout over Cincinnati was the only scheduled game in the National and was the only big league game played as threatening weather forced postponement of Chicago-New York and St. Louis-Boston tilts in the American League.

(Continued from Page 1) had been flowed steadily for 20 hours to cleanout.

The production was from perforated section at 5,570-5,618 feet, which had been treated with 2,500 gallons of acid. Gas volume was estimated at one-half million cubic feet per day.

Phillips Petroleum Company No. 1 Wyman Northwest Ector County exploration 660 feet from south and 1,980 feet from east lines of section 12, block A, ps1 survey, and a one-quarter of a mile southeast stepout from the discovery for production from the Clear Fork-Permian on the northeast side of the Goldsmith field, tested for 170 barrels of oil, and no water in 24 hours from pay above total depth at 6,287 feet.

The production is coming through casing perforations at 6,240-60 feet. Operator is continuing to flow to test.

Roy Golston, et al, No. 1 Moody estate, Southeast Ward County wildcat, about nine and one-half miles northwest of Grand Falls had made 15 feet of new hole, to a current total depth of 2,550 feet, in lime, and was preparing to treat with acid and test.

Clark Tests Again Shell No. 1 Clark, North Glasscock County Ellenburger wildcat, was bottomed at 10,046 feet, in dolomite, understood to be Ellenburger, and was reported to be testing.

Honolulu Oil Corporation No. 1 Burson, East Hockley County exploration, about seven miles northeast of Smyer, and in northeast quarter of section 8, block A, B. M. Thompson survey, has been abandoned and will be plugged as a dry hole on a total depth of 6,978 feet in lime.

This prospector had no signs of oil or gas that warranted testing.

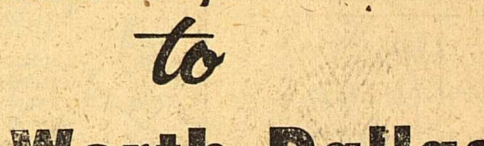
