Report To State Department Expresses Doubt That Any Of Men Parachuted To Safety

WASHINGTON-(P)-Hopes for the safety of five American fliers shot down by Yugoslav fighters last Monday faded Friday with a State Department report that the Yugoslav Fourth Army had expressed doubt any of them had parachuted to safety.


### Rental Housing


As results of the public housing program continue to e something short of miraculous, it is encouraging to ead that a \$150,000,000 program of rental housing by merican life insurance companies is under way, with welling places for 75,000 persons already under contruction or scheduled for a start within the coming year.

One weakness of the federal program seems to have At H and Illinois Streets een its emphasis on home ownership. Many veterans efused to buy \$6000 houses for understandable reason. oday's material and labor costs don't supply much house or that money. 
