


## Soldiers Held In Texas Kidnapping

## Midland Schools To Open 1946-47 Term Monday

Midland Public Schools will open the 1946-47 term Monday morning with a record enrollment expected. Students will go to their respective schools where classes are scheduled to begin at 8:30 a. m.

A general faculty meeting was held Saturday when final preparations were made for the opening of school. The faculty for all schools is complete.

Enrollment of new students will take up most of Monday at all schools. Most of the students enrolled in a pre-school registration.

The record enrollment is expected to total around 3,222 students, the census figure for this year. This will tax the school plants, and until two new elementary schools are completed, some students will go to school only part time each day.

Six bus lines will bring students in from the community areas.

## Texas Firm Starts Mass Production Of New Type Homes

DALLAS—(AP)—A Texas company has started mass production of a new type government-approved house which will sell for less than \$4,000 and which can be erected by unskilled workers in less than one week.

The first house was sold this week.

The company said it could produce 250,000 homes within the next nine months. This figure will be increased later if the demand justifies. The company said all would be sold to veterans until their needs are satisfied.

The homes are called apartment-style FHA loans may be obtained. They come in one and two bedroom sizes.

The one bedroom house will sell for about \$3,250 installed, complete with electric wiring, fixtures and plumbing. The down payment will run from \$300 to \$400, and monthly payments would be between \$30 and \$35. It has 533 square feet of floor area.

The two bedroom house will sell for around \$3,700 or less. Down payment would run from \$500 to \$800, monthly installments from \$35 to \$45. It contains 800 square feet of floor space.

Bert J. Mitchell, designer of the apartment-style and president of the General Housing Company, makers of the units, said five unskilled workers and two carpenters could erect the larger home in six hours.

## All Escape When Theater Burns At Monahans Saturday

## LATE NEWS FLASHES

SAN FRANCISCO—(AP)—The CIO-led Pacific Coast Committee for Maritime Unity Saturday night telegraphed President Truman a demand that he put an end to the current maritime tie-up brought on by an AFL strike, by instructing the Wage Stabilization Board to reverse the decision denying the increase agreed upon by the employers and the AFL.

LONDON—(AP)—British statesmen and leaders of the Arab world gathered in London Saturday for an attempt at settling the age-old Palestine problem at conferences in which neither Jews nor Arabs from Palestine will be represented.

NEW DELHI—(AP)—Making his first broadcast as head of India's new interim government, Pandit Jawaharlal Nehru declared Saturday that the new India would be entirely free—"not merely a satellite of another nation"—and would participate in international conferences "with our own policy."

## LEFTISTS CAUSE TIDE OF VIOLENCE

## Athens Imposes Emergency Action After Yugoslavs Shoot Down Greek Warplane

ATHENS—(AP)—Drastic emergency measures were reimposed over a wide area of Greece Saturday to meet what Acting Premier Stylianos Gonatas said was a rising tide of leftist violence which was "not exclusively an internal matter."

Friction between Greece and Yugoslavia intensified as the government weighed a protest against the downing of a Greek military plane, and Greek political leaders protested Yugoslav declarations at the Paris peace conference concerning Macedonia.

The Yugoslav delegate at the peace conference Friday said it was "time to settle this question of the liberty of the Macedonian people. The people until now have found their liberty only in the popular republic of Macedonia within the Macedonian Yugoslav Federation."

Greek leaders apparently interpreted this as a Yugoslav claim to that part of Macedonia which was given to Greece after World War I. Emergency Power Reinstated

Gonatas announced the cabinet's decision to reinvoke drastic emergency measures, including the establishment of military courts empowered to impose the death penalty to meet violence which he said had increased since last Sunday's plebiscite recalling King George II to the Greek throne.

The Greek government meanwhile considered protesting to Yugoslav Premier Marshal Tito over the downing of a Greek military plane across the Yugoslav frontier.

The official Yugoslav news agency Tanjug said two other Greek

planes attempted to destroy the craft "in order to obliterate evidence of violation of Yugoslav territory," and were repelled.

(In London an Exchange Telegraph dispatch from Athens said the pilot of the downed Spitfire, Lt. George Tangalakis, once risked his life for Tito during the war and held the Yugoslav Military Cross. It said that in 1944 Tangalakis flew into Yugoslavia and picked up Tito, who was endangered. Yugoslavia said the pilot was interned.)

Deputy Chief of Staff Petzopoulos conferred for 45 minutes with the Yugoslav military attache Saturday and later quoted the Yugoslav official as saying there was no doubt the Greek pilot had "lost his bearings."

## Poland Protests U.S. Proposal To Give Reich Land

WARSAW—(AP)—Leaders of all pro-government political parties have called a mass meeting in the vast Roma Auditorium here for Sunday to protest the Stuttgart statement of U. S. Secretary of State Byrnes in which the American rejected the idea that Germany's eastern borders were fixed permanently on the Oder river.

Byrnes' statement provoked a hornet's nest of comment from government circles and the government bloc of political parties.

Poland, which is steadily expelling Germans from its territory and resettling 4,000,000 Poles in its western sections, is constantly tightening her grip on lands formerly occupied by Germany and which the government is determined shall never again pass into German hands.

Most of the nation's press declared Saturday that Poland, backed by Russia, intends to maintain its Oder borders and would not even consider discussion of possible changes. Marshal Rola Zymerski declared recently that Poland's armies always would guard those frontiers.

## Texan Leads Search For Strafed, Bombed Truce Team In China

PEIPING—(AP)—An American rescue mission of four planes flew into Jehol Province Saturday in search of survivors of a cease-fire team which was reported bombed and strafed by Chinese government planes two days ago.

These Chinese Communists, source of the attack report, said three American members were wounded.

Present whereabouts of the survivors is unknown here but they last were reported to have reached Weichang, 80 miles north of Chengteh. The team was headed by Col. J. H. Rustemeyer of Leavenworth, Kas. Col. John M. Ferguson of Wichita Falls, Texas, led the rescue mission.

While lack of communications prevented obtaining confirmation of the attack, an informed source at the American branch of the so-called Truce Executive Headquarters in Peiping said that the Chinese government air force "all along has been a thorn in our side."

This source predicted that a strong American protest would be made to Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek.

"Theoretically the air force should obey agreements made by this tripartite headquarters," the source said, "but actually it never has."

On numerous occasions, he said, the warring Communist and government armies had agreed to local truces, only to have the government air force attack the Communists just as the terms were being obeyed on the ground.

## Police Grill Suspect In Houston Slaying

VAN BUREN, ARK.—(AP)—A 22-year-old South Carolina man is being questioned here in connection with two murders—one in Oklahoma and another in Texas—Police Chief Vol Russell reported Saturday night.

No formal charge had been placed against the man who Chief Russell said had admitted robberies in several states, including Georgia, Florida, South Carolina, Oklahoma and Texas.

He probably will be released to Texas authorities for car theft or to South Carolina officers who have warrants out for his arrest on robbery charges, the police chief said.

Two sheriff's deputies from Houston are in Van Buren questioning the prisoner in connection with the slaying July 20 on the Houston-Beaumont highway of Roy Jones, and the fatal shooting August 30 of Jerry St. Clair, Tulsa, Okla., police officer.

The young man admitted being in the area at the time of Jones' slaying but has denied any connection with the murders, Chief Russell said.

## OPA To Use 2,500 Agents In Drive On 'Big Shot' Meat Black Marketeers

WASHINGTON—(AP)—OPA's enforcement crew, training for a tough Winter campaign to crack black markets, laid plans Saturday to use squealing small violators to trap the big shots.

George Moncharch, deputy OPA administrator in charge of enforcement, said a corner butcher caught peddling black market meat will get off easy if he tells where he got it.

"I will be perfectly satisfied," he said, "if not one retailer whom we catch in a serious violation goes to jail—because it will mean we have got from his story of what caused his situation."

But for the big operators, he promised, it will be "rugged" winter and spring. The "screams" expected from all over the country aren't going to stop the drive, he said.

The crusade against a black market in meat is intended to keep housewives from paying even more than the \$600,000,000 a year already added to their annual meat bills.

The \$600,000,000 is the difference, estimated by OPA, between the cost of meat on June 30, when price controls lapsed, and the higher ceilings which go into effect next Tuesday. The net ceiling prices will mean that retail meat prices will average 3 3/4 cents a pound higher.

Meat probably will be scarce after the revised ceilings apply.

Deputy OPA Administrator Geoffrey Baker said, in an address Saturday:

"We may as well face the fact that there is not enough meat for everybody to get all he wants of every kind. And the fact that we've already eaten part of the supply that would be coming in during the next few months aggravates the situation."

Earl W. Clark, regional administrator for OPA in Chicago, said there that OPA Administrator Paul Porter got assurances of cooperation from leading meat packers in making meat price controls work.

Backed by a sizeable chunk of the \$100,000,000 Congress gave OPA to continue its work, Moncharch is recruiting and training upwards of 6,000 agents. Around 2,500 will concentrate on meat.

With more than 2,000 retail outlets to watch, Moncharch said his black market battlers will not operate like a local police force and check individual complaints.

"We tried that years ago and it just about killed us," Moncharch said. Complaints will be sorted by OPA and drives organized to hit at "higher levels," he said.

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## U. S. Navy Building Battleship And Cruiser Armed With Robot Rockets Instead Of Guns

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The United States, racing to maintain its naval supremacy, already is building the world's first atomic age capital ships armed with main batteries of robot rockets instead of guns.

The Navy disclosed this Saturday night in a somewhat terse announcement that the 45,000-ton Battleship Kentucky and the 27,000-ton Battlecruiser Hawaii would be "guided missile warships."

The announcement by Vice Admiral E. L. Cochrane, chief of the Navy's bureau of ships, left broad implications. He said:

"The design studies now being made for the Kentucky and Hawaii together with the development of missiles guided by carrier-based aircraft, will lead to a revolution in the striking power of naval warships. It is still too early to make any forecast of the ultimate design characteristics of these ships except to say that they will be guided missile warships."

It was patent, however, that the announcement marked the end of an era—the age of the rifled gun in the main batteries of American naval ships.

Power Increased Enormously

Naval design men, pointed out that the destructive power of a capital ship can be increased enormously by use of far-reaching missiles homed to the target by electronic beams or drawn there by the attraction of the steel or heat in the target itself. And, designers say, the advent of the rocket with atomic blast is just around the laboratory corner.

There is no indication that atomic pile power plants have reached the point where they can be in-

## Pittsburgh Power Firm Employees To Walkout Tuesday

PITTSBURGH—(AP)—A strike of power company employees in Pittsburgh and its heavily industrialized environs Saturday night was called to begin at 12:01 a. m. Tuesday unless a settlement of a wage dispute is negotiated by that time.

Such a strike might affect 1,500,000 persons in an 817 square mile area including scores of small industrial communities adjacent to this steel center which receive their electric power supply from the Duquesne Light Company.

George L. Mueller, president of an independent union of the company's workers, set the time for the strike Saturday night in a radio broadcast.

He said the "two and one-half day delay" in commencement of the strike would give the people ample opportunity to prepare for "this emergency, caused by the mismanagement of the Duquesne Light Company."

The union—the Independent Association of Employees of Duquesne Light and Associated Companies, seeks a master contract covering nine groups of employees, a 20 per cent wage increase and profit sharing among other demands.

## Explosions Rip U. S. Ship In Manila Bay

MANILA—(AP)—A series of explosions, followed by fire, ripped through the afterpart of the United States Line cargo vessel Star Knot Sunday morning as it lay anchored in Manila Bay, awaiting discharge of cargo.

The crew abandoned the ship but reboarded her after the explosions ceased. Firecraft were still pouring chemicals into the afterhold hours later.

Capt. Thomas Dorso said the explosions were caused by some 300 cylinders of acetylene and oxygen in a refrigeration hold.

## NY Port Agent Defies U. S. To Move Any Ship

## LaGuardia Appeals For UNRRA Relief Shipments

A spokesman for the American Federation of Labor Saturday night termed "ridiculous" an AFL maritime leader's threat to seek a general strike, as the greatest shipping shutdown in American history slowed the industrial pulse of the nation.

The general strike threat came from Paul Hall, New York port agent of the Seafarers International Union (AFL).

Hall declared that if the government attempted to move any of the hundreds of strike bound ships in U. S. ports "we will call on all organized labor to come out with us."

Philip Pearl of the American Federation of Labor headquarters, said that reports of a general strike threat to back up the maritime strike are "ridiculous" and have "no basis in fact."

Pearl, in charge of the information section of the AFL, said he had been assured that the government did not contemplate using troops to man ships.

William Green, head of the AFL, who previously expressed support for the seamen, was not available for comment immediately, but the CIO's Philip Murray told a reporter in Chicago "I wouldn't have any comment on a thing like that."

In Washington an official in close touch with the situation said there had been discussions of what steps the government could take to supply U. S. troops abroad, in the event of a prolonged strike.

UNRRA Director F. H. LaGuardia was in New York to appeal personally to strike leaders to free 125 ships with 250,000 tons of relief cargo for Europe and Asia.

But Joseph P. Ryan, head of the International Longshoremen's Association (ILA), said the former New York mayor knew the futility of such a move.

The third-day of the strike of 90,000 members of the IU and the Sailors Union of the Pacific—joined by an estimated 400,000 allied shipworkers' dock hands and CIO seamen—found confusion spreading inland from the nation's hushed seaports.

The Association of American Railroads said between 5,000 and 20,000 loaded freight cars were tied up because of the strike.

This added to the shortage of rolling equipment desperately needed to move the grain harvest, already piling up on the ground in some of the western areas.

The industrial East—doubly punished by a strike of more than 35,000 AFL truck drivers in New York, New Jersey, Virginia and Maryland—was hit by a third walkout of workers particularly vital to 7 1/2 million New Yorkers.

Union tugboat crews quit work in the vast New York harbor Saturday on orders of Capt. William Bradley, president of Local 33 of the Marine Division International Longshoremen's Association (AFL), in sympathy with the AFL seamen.

Harry Lundberg, head of AFL seamen in the West, said he was permitting his men to continue work on troopships and relief vessels.

Secretary of Labor Schwellenbach's personal emissary, Philip Hannah, reached San Francisco to beseech Lundberg for a truce in the paralyzing walkout.

The AFL boss, however, already had given a negative answer to Hannah, who telephoned him from Cleveland Thursday night.

## Williams To Be Tried In Midland

The second trial of Earl Hamilton Williams, 48, charged with murder in connection with the death of his wife, Beulah, on a Glasscock County ranch on July 6, will be held in Midland on October 14.

Judge Cecil Collins announced the transfer Friday after the trial at Garden City last week ended in a hung jury. Judge Collins declared a mistrial after the jury foreman reported a deadlock at 2 p. m. Friday. The jury received the case at 5 p. m. Thursday.

The jury reportedly stood at six for acquittal and six for conviction when it stopped deliberations. Forty witnesses gave testimony in the three-day proceedings which opened Tuesday.

The Williams case was the second trial for murder to be tried in the 33-year history of Glasscock County.

### Building Permits Are Nearing Two Millions


Midland building permits are edging toward \$2,000,000.

### Rumors Link Greek Prince and Princess Elizabeth of England

LONDON — Rumors of a romance between Princess Elizabeth and Prince Philip of Greece spread across the realm Saturday night despite official denials, and Britons began sizing up the handsome young royal naval officer as a potential prince consort for Britain's next queen.

Court circles said the prince was one of Elizabeth's "circle of friends," and now a guest of the royal family at Balmoral Castle in Scotland. But they denied that he and the 20-year-old heiress presumptive were engaged to marry.

A flood of rumors was started by the Long Star's report of an impending announcement of engagement. But Sir Alan Lascelles, private secretary to the king, issued a statement declaring:

"Princess Elizabeth is not engaged to be married. The report published is incorrect."

The Star, saying the engagement would be announced to the nation at a "time considered suitable by the king and his advisers," added that "until then Buckingham Palace will continue officially to 'know nothing' of the romance."

Prince Philip, a cousin of the Greek King George II, is 25 and a British Royal Navy lieutenant.

### Beef Ceilings Hikes Average Eight Cents, Pork Seven, in Texas

DALLAS —(P)— The Dallas regional CPA office announced Saturday meat retail ceiling price increases averaging eight cents a pound for beef and seven to eight cents a pound for pork in Texas, Oklahoma, Kansas and Western Missouri.

The ceilings will take effect Tuesday. New ceilings will raise lamb prices an average of 10 cents a pound and mutton about four cents. Veal cuts and sausages go back to June 30 prices but lard prices are increased 5 1/2 cents a pound.

New ceilings in the region are (grade AA listed first, grade A last): Beef—Porterhouse steak 56 and 52 cents; round steak 48 and 45 cents; rib roasts (10-inch) 35 and 33 cents. Lamb—Loin chops 72 and 68

### Psychologist Says Army Did Make Best Use Of Bright GIs

PHILADELPHIA —(P)— Dr. Thomas W. Harrell, University of Illinois psychologist, Saturday offered "circumstantial evidence completely contrary to popular conceptions that the Army kicked bright people around and placed them in routine jobs."

Saying that the Army Air Forces had made a survey of the general intelligence of Air Forces enlisted men doing military jobs which had a definite civilian counterpart, he declared the results were compared with a survey of men who were definitely known to be following the same occupation in military life which they had followed in civilian life.

He told the American Psychological Association that the latter group was thus considered as a "civilian" representation, whereas the former was considered as a "military" representation in the respective jobs.

It was found that the test average of the "civilian" group in the Army's general classification test—which includes arithmetic reasoning, word knowledge, and so forth—was at least five points greater than that of the "military" group.

"I would say the Air Forces did a damned good job in making good use of the intelligence that was available," Harrell added.

Poorest grades, he said, were achieved by "airplane handlers" who "were men who pushed the airplanes around."

BATAVIA, ILL.—(P)— There'll be no more kissing at a Batavia church during weddings, the pastor ordered Saturday, because it causes "giggles and guffaws."

"Kissing in public is never in good taste," said the Rev. Walter Schlie of Immanuel Evangelical Lutheran Church in a statement to the congregation.

General kissing of the bride was forbidden in the church, but the pastor's order okayed kissing of the bride by the best man and members of the newlyweds' immediate families in the church vestibule.





### Deep Underwater Test Of A-Bomb Postponed

WASHINGTON —(P)— The deep underwater atomic bomb test tentatively set for next Spring was indefinitely postponed Saturday by President Truman.

Whether it ever will be held was left indefinite, though the announcement laid stress on the idea that only considerations of the "near future" were involved in the decision and the White House pointed out that the order was not an actual cancellation.

Truman's statement, as the reason for the decision, said the President's military and civilian advisers have concluded that the data the new test would produce is not necessary at this time.

Officers connected with "Operation Crossroads" however, have indicated that a major factor was cost.

Besides Truman's order for a \$650,000,000 cut in this year's naval budget, they mentioned a scarcity of technically trained personnel as a big difficulty.

A civilian evaluation board headed by Senator Hatch, together with the joint chiefs of staff, the chiefs of the Army, Navy, and Air Forces and the secretaries of War and Navy recommended postponing the third Bikini experiment.

"4. The congestion of new securities offerings.

"5. Renewed strikes and threats of strikes.

### Little Nations Steal Show At Armed Forces Olympics In Berlin

OLYMPIC STADIUM, BERLIN — (AP) — The "Big Four" took a back seat to the little nations of Europe Saturday as Belgium and Denmark dominated the opening preliminaries of the Armed Forces Olympics in this huge flag-decked stadium with eight nations competing.

Three European Theater army records fell.

Up to meet time, officials had assurances that Russia would be on hand with a team, but the Red Army tracksters never showed up.

While the United States team, led by record-breaking Ed Quirk of St. Louis, showed the most latent power in qualifying men for the finals, Belgium, Denmark and a one-man-track team from Luxembourg captured the crowd's attention.

Quirk broke the ETO 16 pound shot put record with a heave of 50 feet 4.2 inches. The old mark was 48 feet 8 inches.

Belgium's team was paced by Erman Kunnen, crack middle distance runner, who lopped five tenths of a second off the meet 400 meter mark to win one trial easily in 49.1 seconds.

The third record fell to tiny Luxembourg's one man team, Rene Kremer, who broke the javelin mark with a throw of 189 feet 8 inches. The old mark was 180 feet 10 three fourths inches.

### 36th Vets Convene To Celebrate Salerno Day

FORT WORTH — (AP) — Former wearers of the T-patch greeted buddies here Saturday as the first of an expected 2,000 members of the 36th Division association arrived for their three-day meeting.

Monday they celebrate the third anniversary of the Salerno landing made by the division in Italy.

General Jonathan Wainwright, Fourth Army commander, arrived Saturday morning and will address the convention delegates Sunday. Brig. Gen. H. Miller Ainsworth of Luling, association president, was expected at noon.

Other guests expected included Lt. Gen. Fred L. Walker, and Brig. Gen. John Dahlquist of Washington, both former commanders of the 36th.

### Kidnapped Texas Girl Starts Journey Home

RICHMOND, VA. — (AP) — Miss Will Ruth Teague, 18, who told officers she was kidnapped at Texarkana, Texas, and forced to drive two soldiers to Farmville, Va., has been reunited with her sweetheart, J. P. Martin, and has been released from the Prince Edward County jail. She had been held as a material witness against her accused abductors.

FBI officials said Miss Teague had satisfied them with her account of the three-day motor trip. Police Sgt. Walter F. Morton said that Miss Teague and Martin presumably were on their way to Texas.

The accused soldiers, Frank Valentine Famular, 20, of Jersey City, N.J., and Clarence F. Kummert, 19, of Pittsburgh, Pa., are being held in the Richmond city jail pending a hearing September 10 on a charge of kidnapping two Richmond residents, William Abernethy, 21, and his sister, Ruth, 25.

Miss Teague said she escaped her captors when they momentarily left the automobile at a filling station.

### British Arrest Nazi Who Blasted Bridges

HERFORD, GERMANY — (AP) — The British announced Saturday the arrest of Josef Grohe, a top ranking Nazi war criminal accused of giving orders to blow the five Rhine bridges at Cologne, one while hundreds of refugees were streaming across it to find safety behind Allied lines.

Grohe, former Reichskommissioner for Northern France and Belgium, was described by the British as being in the "topflight of Nazi officials and major war criminals," and the last Nazi gaudier still at liberty.

He was found in bed by a British intelligence officer on August 21 at Warburg, the announcement said.

### Houston Presents Blind Vet Deed To New Home

HOUSTON — (AP) — The darkest days were over for the blind James T. Sanders of Houston Saturday as City Councilman Ward Farrington presented him official title to the home a grateful city built.

The house was complete except for painting before sundown on Labor Day. More than \$4,000 had been contributed by hundreds of people, scarce materials and supplemental furnishings were donated by business firms, and a contractor and workmen gave their time and skills.

Deeply moved, Sanders Saturday could say only "Thank you, sir," as Farrington handed him the piece of paper guaranteeing title to the house and lot.

Mrs. Sanders spoke for the family. "There was a time when things looked dark for us, but they don't any more. We can begin to thank you for all you have done."

### Red Star Says Britain Is Preparing For War

LONDON — (AP) — The Soviet army newspaper Red Star flatly accused Britain Saturday of preparing for war.

"Intensive war preparations are now afoot in the Middle East," an article broadcast by the Moscow radio said. "Construction of military installations continues in Trans-Jordan," closely allied to Britain, "and the British command has turned Palestine into a war base."

The British war office, told of the report, said "although it is necessary to keep British troops in the Middle East, their numbers and strength make any talk of preparation for war ridiculous."

### Aerial Stunts Open Texas Air Day Show

HARLINGEN — (AP) — Army, Navy and Marine aerial acrobats and exhibition teams looped and twisted over the Harlingen All-Valley Airport Saturday for three hours to open the two-day "Air Day in Texas."

A formation of 29 Navy planes from Corpus Christi flew over the field spelling out "Tex" and then "AAF."

The Army exhibition team included all types of planes except the helicopter. Two P-80 jet planes flew here from San Antonio.

Sunday the Harlingen field will be dedicated formally. Climax of Saturday's show was a speed run by a P-80 whistling across the field at 1,000 feet, indicating 550 miles per hour.

### Man Burns To Death In Gas Truck Fire

TEXARKANA — (AP) — William W. Cooke, 28, burned to death Saturday in the flames of his gasoline truck 23 miles west of Texarkana.

Cooke was en route to Mount Pleasant to pick up a load of gasoline.

Texas State Highway patrolmen reported that Cooke's truck and a transportation company truck driven by C. G. Grimmett, of Dallas, collided. Grimmett escaped injury.

Cooke's survivors include his wife, a son and daughter, and his parents, the Rev. and Mrs. J. C. Cooke of Lockhart, Texas.

### U. S. Considers Group To Study Rationing

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Formulation of a committee representing the OPA and the Department of Agriculture to consider all the aspects of whether meat, fats and edible oils might need to be rationed again is under discussion, it was learned Saturday night.

The idea has not progressed beyond the discussion stage so far, an official said. He added that there was no immediate likelihood of a return to rationing.

### RED ARMY TANKS TO PARADE IN MOSCOW

LONDON — (AP) — Generalissimo Stalin issued a special order of the day honoring Soviet tankmen and tank makers, the Moscow radio reported Saturday night. He ordered a 20-salvo salute fired in all Soviet capitals Sunday, with a full dress tank division parade through Red Square in Moscow.

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## Two Winkler Discoveries Completed As Flowing Oil Producers; Levelland Field Extender Tests For 300 BOPD

Official completions have been reported from two new oil discoveries in Winkler County and a one-mile northeast stepout from the Levelland field in Central Hockley County made a 24-hour flowing potential of 659.56 barrels of pipe line oil, from Silurian pay at 8,247-8,507 feet, after that section had been treated with 2,000 gallons of acid.

Corrected gravity of the petroleum was 32.8 degrees and gas-oil ratio was 602-1.

This project, located 1,980 feet from north and east lines of section 20, block 77, psi survey, was low geologically on the lower beds. It drilled to total depth of 11,156 feet in the Simpson, middle Ordovician, and then plugged back and tested the Silurian shows and now has the distinction of being the best producer so far completed from that formation in Winkler County and a discovery from the horizon.

**Made 300 Barrels Of Oil**  
Ralph Lowe No. 1 Sealy-Smith, in West-Southeast Winkler, and about 12 miles southeast of Kermit, made a daily flowing potential of 300 barrels of oil from Holt-Permian section at 5,220-60 feet, after treating with 500 gallons of acid.

The completion test was taken through a one-half inch choke. Gas-oil ratio was 1,200-1. Located 650 feet from south and west lines of section 71, block A, G&MMB&A survey, this well is two and one-half miles west of nearest production from the Tubb zone of the Permian, at around 6,100 feet, in the North Monahans field.

It has been in course of completion for several weeks. Now that the potential test has been run, operator is putting it on regular production.

**Hockley Extender Flows**  
Ballard and Cody No. 1 Talley, in the southwest corner of labor 17, league 773, State Capitol Land survey, one mile northwest of the Levelland field, in Central Hockley County, and about the same distance northwest of the town of Levelland, was flowing Saturday at an estimated rate of 300 barrels of oil per day, from pay section at 4,760-4,845 feet.

The project had swabbed for four barrels per hour, or approximately 100 barrels per day, after an initial acid treatment of 2,000 gallons.

It was given 8,000 gallons more acid Friday, and after most of the load and residue had been swabbed out it was shut in overnight. The well was opened Saturday morning and it kicked off and started flowing. Operator reported that it was producing at the rate of 300 barrels per day. There was a small cut of acid residue, but no formation water had developed.

Informed sources indicated that operator likely would continue flowing the well until it was thoroughly cleaned out and would then take potential test and complete it, as an extension to the Levelland field, Seaboard Cores Ahead.

Seaboard Oil Company of Delaware No. 1 Adkisson, North-Central Lubbock County wildcat, in the Monroe township, cored from 6,024 feet to 6,075 feet, through Tubb-Permian dolomite, in four cores. The specimen had thin streaks showing slight to fair porosity and from slight to good blebbing oil. Operator was coring ahead below 6,075 feet, late Saturday.

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
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

—Delay in getting delivery on structural steel for the frame for the building is given as the reason for the suspension of operations for several weeks.


—Present plans call for the structure to be completed with two floors above ground and a full basement.

## Winkler County Will Operate Wink Airport

KERMIT—The future of Winkler County, so far as air transportation is concerned, was given a big boost Thursday when county commissioners, in a meeting with the board of directors of Kermit Chamber of Commerce, who sponsored the movement, and the city commission of Wink, passed a resolution whereby the county will take over the huge CAA constructed Wink airport and operate it as a county project to serve both Kermit and Wink.

Plans are underway to apply for federal funds, as allowed under the recently enacted Federal Airport Bill allowing the government to match dollar for dollar for public expenditures, to construct an administration building and other public facilities.

The airport is one of the very few Type Six ports in the Southwest. It was completed by CAA during the war at a cost of approximately \$1,000,000. Runways are from 6,000 to more than 7,000 feet in length, and are completely lighted for night flying.

Also on the field are a government operated weather station, a radio beam station, control tower, a 30 by 80-foot hangar, and other improvements.

The port includes 1,000 acres of land leased from the University of Texas with a 50-year paid-up lease, and approximately 87 acres of land which were purchased by the City of Wink to lengthen runways.

One of the first steps planned is the building of a road over the most direct route from Kermit to the field. The city of Wink is to be reimbursed for what it actually has invested in the port, which amounts to approximately \$12,000. This sum includes the 50-year lease, title to the 87 acres of land, the hangar, a five-room residence, and other buildings. Tentative plans are on to call a bond issue to match federal funds for construction of an administrative building and other public facilities.



## Oil And Gas Produced In 166 Counties



Oil and gas development covers all of Texas, a map prepared by the Texas Mid-Continent Oil and Gas Association shows. Oil and gas are now produced in approximately 1,100 different fields in 166 counties scattered through Texas, while an additional 17 counties formerly produced. The 71 other counties are now being actively explored for oil and gas, with land under lease for drilling. Nearly 54,000,000 acres, or virtually one-third of the state's total land area, are now leased to Texas oil and gas operators. Last year their lease and royalty payments to Texas farmers, ranchers and other land-owners totaled \$215,000,000, providing a large "extra crop" for Texas agriculturalists. Since 1919 such payments have aggregated more than \$2,000,000,000, or an extra cash bonus of nearly one-seventh of the value of all Texas agricultural crops during this period, the association reported.

During the year following VE Day, he was stationed in France, where for nine months he was at the Marselle, and the remainder of the time in Paris with a Military Police force. Captain Grafa visited many European countries while there, his tours extending through Italy, Switzerland, Belgium, Holland, England, and Scotland. ## Fine Softball Park Is Proposed By Two Individuals For Midland

One of the finest athletic parks in Texas will be Midland's if a project of two young veterans and businessmen goes through. It would offer a good recreation spot for the city.

A Midland Amateur Softball Park is the dream and the project on which A. T. Pierce and I. B. Ridgeway are working.

The park has been described to the City Council, and the Junior Chamber of Commerce sanctions it. The park would be a miniature of La Grave Field in Fort Worth and

would contain a sodded outfield and infield for a softball diamond. It would be surrounded by a 12-foot board fence.

Grandstands to seat 1,500 people would be constructed and 200 box seats made available. It would have a press box and public address booth.

As planned the overall park would contain two acres. The inside would contain 9,000 square feet with 300 feet along first and third baselines.

**Cost To Be \$25,000**  
Approximate cost of building this park would be \$25,000 when completed. A trustee, a reliable Midland banker, has been appointed. The planners will solicit some \$16,000 in advertising.

One of their advertising offers is space on the boarded fence around the park for firm signs.

Two locations are prospective. One is on North Big Spring Street and the other is near the West city limits.

Owners of the park will maintain and run it. They offer the Midland Junior Chamber of Commerce, 10 per cent of the gate receipts, regardless of the athletic event put on. The park would be available free to civic organizations in off season.

Concessions would be offered at the park and a public address system would be installed.

**Propose Fast Leagues**  
Looking ahead the owners propose an Oil Belt softball circuit embracing Odessa, Big Spring, Monahan, Kermit, Wink, Midland and other cities of this area. Also the proposed park would sponsor Midland's city leagues next summer.

The two owners would require an eight-team, fast industrial league here with uniformed and top notch teams with paid umpires and official scorers furnished by the park.

The proposal is not a fly-by-night. The two young men are Midland citizens interested in recreation. They are offering written contracts for advertising. They point out they contacted the city and JayCees before attempting the project.





**Unrecognized Republic**

**Of Indonesia Strives**

**For Full Independence**

By JAMES D. WHITE

SAN FRANCISCO (AP)—If the leaders of 70,000,000 Indonesians have their way, their unrecognized republic—now more than a year old on a provisional basis—would be fully independent.

This provisional government has a constitution. The Dutch say it was written a month before the Japanese surrender, by Achmed Soekarno and Mohammad Hatta, the two nationalists who became president and minister of information when the provisional regime was set up.

The English translation of this constitution, provided by The Netherlands Information Service, indicates that it might concentrate unusually great power in the Indonesian president. Soekarno still is president.

The constitution mentions the word "democracy" once—in the preamble, which also tersely declares independence. It says the Indonesian state "shall be unitarian with a republican form of government."

The president would be elected by a congress for five years, and apparently could be re-elected indefinitely. The congress itself would be composed of a "council of representatives" plus "delegates of regional territories and corporations or other groups", but nothing is said about how delegates shall be chosen.

The president would have the usual executive power, plus the power to declare martial law in emergencies, at which time he also could enact ordinances with the force of law until the council of representatives either ratifies them into law at the next session or refuses to do so.

The council would meet at least once a year, and would share law-making power with the president.

One contributor is the increased activity in the oil industry in the Permian Basin of which Midland is the capital. Practically all oil companies headquartered in Midland have increased or are increasing their offices and staffs. Four new office buildings now under construction will help furnish them office accommodations. One major company is moving its entire production department from Amarillo to Midland. Another has leased eight floors of the 12-story Petroleum Building. It formerly occupied one and one-half floors. This same company reportedly is moving 195 families to Midland. Plans of other companies call for expansion when space is available. **Building Zoons** In 1940 Midland had \$814,116 in construction permits. The figure Saturday for 1946 was \$1,847,670. Telephone connections have increased from 2,683 in 1940 to 4,299 in 1946. Public school enrollment has increased from 2,237 in 1940 to a scholastic census of 3,222 for the term opening Monday. By years the school enrollment since 1940 has been: 2,320 in 1941; 2,404 in 1942; 2,530 in 1943; 2,602 in 1944; 3,006 in 1945. Bank deposits have increased from \$4,982,968.65 in 1940 to \$22,658,220.85 as of Dec. 31, 1945. Bank deposits by years since 1940 were: \$5,548,444.28 in 1941; \$8,082,569.56 in 1942; \$10,723,498.96 in 1943; \$17,505,997.63 in 1944. Postal receipts have increased from \$77,123.62 in 1940 to \$190,818.90 in 1945. By years since 1940 postal receipts were: \$88,091.17 in 1941; \$109,839.29 in 1942; \$121,151.52 in 1943; \$159,431.46 in 1944. Water meters have increased from 1,764 in 1940 to 2,630 in 1946 (July 1). Water meters by years since 1940 were: 1,878 in 1941; 1,968 in 1942; 2,065 in 1943; 2,100 in 1944; 2,578 in 1945. Gas meters have increased from 1,742 in 1940 to 2,636 in 1946 (July 1). Gas meters by years were: 1,967 in 1941; 2,100 in 1942; 2,195 in 1943; 2,366 in 1944; 2,512 in 1945. Other utility connections have increased proportionately. As for population, in 1940 Midland had 9,352 persons. Estimates of the growth are: 12,000 in 1943, 14,000 in 1945, and 17,000 in 1946. The estimates were based on increased utility connections and the calculations of directory company compiling a new City Directory.

Albania To Take Charges Against Greece To UN

LAKE SUCCESS —(AP)—Albania Saturday drafted a series of bitter charges against Greece which its representatives hopes to present personally Monday when the Security Council again takes up the Soviet Ukraine's complaint against Greece and Great Britain. Col. Tuk Jakova, Albanian minister without portfolio, has demanded a seat at the table to offer his side of the case, and this Soviet-supported move was expected to touch off another sharp debate. Persons close to Jakova said the charges would center around these points:

1. A new list of Greek-Albanian border incidents which Jakova holds are being provoked by the Greeks.
2. Contentions that the Greeks are persecuting Albanian minorities in Chamuria in Northern Greece.
3. A detailed rebuttal to Greek claims on Northern Epirus (Southern Albania).

It was understood that the United States would not oppose Jakova's bid for a seat, a precedent-setting request in that a non-member of the UN never before has been granted a place at the council table. However, Great Britain contends

GOP Pins Red Label On Democrats As Campaign Tactic

WASHINGTON —(AP)—Republicans are attempting to pin a Communist label on some Democratic opponents in a crescendo of attacks indicating they hope to make this charge a major issue in the November congressional elections. Democrats generally are meeting this maneuver by calling the charge untrue and asserting the Republicans are appealing to prejudice.

GOP Chairman Carroll Reece and Gov. Thomas E. Dewey of New York took the lead this week in almost simultaneous assaults on what they termed the Left-Wing connections of the regular Democratic Party. Sen. Hickenlooper (R-Iowa) told a reporter it is his judgment that the issue of American relations with Russia is beginning to loom large in the congressional campaign in the Midwest. In an editorial in the current issue of the Republican News, Reece quoted comments of the Russian trade newspaper "Trud" to support his charge that there is a "sympathetic understanding between the Moscow dictatorship and the PAC."

In a radio speech attacking the Democrats' nomination of Henry Epstein for associate judge of the New York Court of Appeals, Dewey charged that the Democrats were "buying" American Labor Party support for the rest of their ticket. Paul Fitzpatrick, Democratic state chairman, fired back that Dewey's charge was false and was a "calculated appeal to prejudice."

Aihens City Officials Quit After Gunfire

ATHENS, TENN. —(AP)—Mayor Paul Walker and the city board of aldermen resigned Friday because "we now find the safety of ourselves and our families jeopardized by continuing the city government."

Athens was the scene of the recent McMinn County election gun battle. McMinn County Sheriff Knox Henry said two shots were fired in the home of City Alderman Hugh Riggs early Thursday. He reported that the shots apparently were fired from a slow-moving automobile. The Veterans of Foreign Wars and American Legion Post of McMinn County had asked Riggs to resign after the August 1 election. The political organization of Paul Cantrell was ousted following the recent election gun battle. Veterans called Riggs a "Cantrell man."

"We fully realize that our resignation, as a group, is a drastic action, but it is our considered judgment we cannot serve the community effectively, any longer," Mayor Walker said in a prepared statement. Walker said later: "We tried sincerely to work with the G.I.'s," he commented. "But every program we'd attempt would only cause more trouble in Athens. We're just washing our hands of the whole matter."



## Detecting Cheaters Of Government Is Major Assignment

WASHINGTON (AP)—Anybody who gets money from the government when he isn't entitled to it has to buck the General Accounting Office (GAO).

It's the biggest accounting outfit on earth. It has thousands of ways of nosing out leakages of government funds, whether through fraud or error.

Fifteen women, for instance, have learned how GAO catches up on marital wrong-doers. Each was married, or said she was, to two servicemen at the same time and drew wives' allotments from both men's pay.

**Trapped By First Names**  
But they didn't know that GAO has a file of paid allotment checks arranged by first names. GAO figures that when a woman commits bigamy or adopts a false surname she is likely to retain her true first name. If in the "Mary" file the endorsements of two checks look alike, the cases are checked—sometimes with surprising results.

Every voucher paid by a disbursing officer of the government is reviewed by GAO's Audit Division. In the fiscal year which ended this July, 39,000,000 vouchers were checked.

GAO filed exceptions to 417,000 of the vouchers—resulting in the government's receiving refunds of \$43,400,000. The discrepancies are usually the result of error and not fraud, says E. W. Bell, chief of the division.

**5,000 Busy Checking**  
Bell has 5,000 bookkeeping sleuths in his division, some of them at his headquarters in Washington and some at 250 field stations.

Largest field offices are in Cleveland, where 500 accountants and lawyers check on payments made under Navy contracts; and in St. Louis, where 600 more keep tab on Army transactions.

Most of the work of Bell's division is simply checking vouchers to see whether they comply with the law and with the contracts involved. The division may make a complete audit, however, when directed by Congress, as it often is, or in the case of cost-plus-fixed-fee contracts.

**Still Wider Scope**  
It also can make an audit of "termination settlements"—the contracts which the government terminated at the end of the war before performance had been completed.

Another GAO unit, the Corporation Audit Division, headed by T. Coleman Andrews, makes commercial audits of all wholly-owned government corporations, now numbering about 95.

It has submitted to Congress audits of Federal Prison Industries, Inc., the Virgin Islands Company, the Federal Deposit Insurance Corp., Tennessee Valley Associated Cooperatives Inc., and the U. S. Spruce Production Corp.

## Dirt, Squirt And Quirt

— FARM, DAIRY AND RANCH NEWS —

Plans for a Fall fair to be held in Midland are being worked on by the county home demonstration agent and the Midland County Home Demonstration Council. Tentative plans have set the affair for the later part of this month.

Midland County has ginned a total of 225 bales of cotton to date this season. This cotton has averaged being classed middling 7/8 inches. The extreme dry weather this Summer has caused a loss in staple length and the recent rains have spotted most of the crop, with some exceptions. Most farmers are paying \$1.75 cents for pulling on a field weight basis.

Last week's sale at the local livestock auction saw prices very strong with a small offering. A total of 250 head were run through the ring and bidding was good.

Recent rains have slowed down the heavy movement of livestock from the dry ranges and have at the same time caused a demand for light stuff to go on sudan and stalk fields which have suckered out after the rains.

Of interest to some of our hog growers is the recent announcement of the publication of an official Texas Swine Breeders Directory by the educational committee of the Texas Swine Breeders Association. In addition the directory will have educational articles on swine breeding, selection and management, written by outstanding authorities. E. M. Regenbrecht, swine husbandryman of the Texas A&M College Extension Service, is the secretary of the association.





**Shortage Of Trained Teachers Is Basic Problem In Nation**

WASHINGTON —(P)— Education, being what it is, loses the headlines to things like price control and foreign affairs. But, with schools bulging from a record number of students, the shortage of trained teachers is a real problem. This summer the National Education Association called a meeting of about 300 educators—teachers and superintendents of education—at Chautauque, N. Y. They met to see what could be done to get more and better trained people to take up teaching. Then they went home with various kinds of programs to drum up interest in teaching among people now going through school. Whatever results they get won't come overnight. One of the basic problems in getting more and better teachers is better pay for teachers. Many experienced teachers left the schools during the war for higher-paying jobs and now won't return. The U. S. Office of Education gets figures on teachers' salaries from the states which, in turn, have to get them from the school districts. Because of this lag, the figures usually are a couple of years out of date when they are released. The last ones—for 1943-44—show that the average salary for grammar and high school teachers in this country was \$1,728. That's an average figure. In those years New York paid an average of \$2,726, but Mississippi, at the bottom of the list, paid its grammar and high school teachers an average of only \$790. Latest figures from the U. S. Office of Education—for 1941-42—show that in 52 state colleges the average salary of a full professor was \$4,300. Instructors averaged \$1,950. This year about 100,000 people will be teaching in the grammar and high schools on emergency certificates. Which means: for one reason or another they couldn't meet the standards set, in most cases, by State Departments of Education.

**Cotton Tree Experiment Conducted At Lubbock**


LUBBOCK —(P)— Cotton tree seed is being distributed by a Lubbock resident to West Texas farmers who are interested in experimenting in cotton tree production. It isn't likely that cotton fields will disappear from the South Plains any time soon but if experiments with the cotton trees in this area should prove successful, cotton forests may find a place in Texas agriculture.

**KRUEGER TO HEAD FINAL USO DRIVE IN OCTOBER**

AUSTIN —(P)— Gen. Walter Krueger of San Antonio has been named by Gov. Coke R. Stevenson as regional chairman of South Texas for the final United Service Organizations drive in October. The governor praised Krueger's acceptance of the chairmanship as "typical of his life." The goal for the state next month is \$800,000. Krueger is approximately 12 feet high at four years of age and can have squares, blooms, various sizes of green bolls and open cotton on them at the same time.

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**King And Queen To Attend Revival Of Scottish Highland Gatherings**

EDINBURGH —(P)— The revival of the traditional Scottish highland gatherings culminating in the Royal Braemar gathering in September, to be attended by the King and Queen, has stirred up a lively war between the sexes in the heather-clad highlands. The Braemar gathering of the clans has had a special place on the calendar ever since Queen Victoria put the seal of royal approval on this picturesque meeting in the Deeside mountains. It is not the colorful march of the kilted clansmen nor their many feats of tossing the caber or throwing the hammer that has stirred up controversy, but the dancing and piping competitions. **Predatory Females Deplored.** From his highland fastness at Oban, Atholl Robertson fired a broadside charging that highland gatherings have for too long been infested with small, predatory females, masquerading in male dress, and covered with as many medals as there are scales on a salmon—"an eyesore and a heartbreak to anyone with the interests of highland dancing at heart." Robertson, former member of Parliament, former chief of the Scottish Clans Association in London, editor of the Scots Year Book and a writer on highland customs, folk lore and legend, holds that the sole reason for the decline in "this manly art" of Scottish dancing has been the admission of women. In the old days, he says, the dances were the prerogative of the male, and served to demonstrate the warrior's agility, endurance and lightness of foot. No woman says this authority, can perform them properly, and highland ladies in the old days had the good sense and good manners to realize that. **Another Castle Heard From.** Another round of shot came from Cakemuir Castle, Tynehead, Midlothian, fired by L. Balfour Paul, enthusiast for highland dancing and piping. Paul is of the opinion that the whole character of highland dancing can be shown only by a man in a kilt—the perky, jumping movements being out of keeping with women's movements—and he is convinced that there is danger of the great art dying out. This also applies to piping competitions, on the ground that nothing looks so ridiculous as a woman piper. If "performing mites and kilted Amazons" must be included in the programs for the sake of encouraging tourists, then, he pleads, let there be no mixed competitions and let mites and women supply their own judges and not tax the nerves and stomachs of piping judges. **MaJ. FitzRoy H. Myers,** assistant sergeant-at-arms in the House of Commons, has weighed in in support of Paul. In mixed competitions at highland gatherings it is not uncommon for a girl to beat the male entrants, and the preponderance of girl competitors has tended to keep men out of the lists. To make matters worse, it is said that the majority of the girls hail from the lowlands. **The Gals' Retort.** Counter-blasts from the women have so far been mild. Miss Winstanley Brown, principal of the Edinburgh School for Dancing, says they have been doing it now for many years and have scored many successes. There is no reason whatever, in her view, why girls should not engage in highland dancing. When a young woman gets beyond 20, however, she does not look well in a kilt and stockings, says Miss Brown. Mrs. E. M. Mackay, secretary of the Clan Mackay Society, also thinks that highland dancing is all right for little girls, but a bit out of place for grown women.

**Underwater Blast Mists Deadlier Than Airburst**

WASHINGTON —(P)— The atom bomb's radium-like poison can penetrate a tightly closed ship and spread death throughout the interior. This was disclosed in an "Operation Crossroads" report dealing with the animals used in the Bikini tests. The report said that radiation sickness proved fatal to all of the 20 pigs stationed on four of the target ships used in the underwater bomb test. The pigs had been placed in the medical quarters of the vessels, which were in "buttoned up" battle condition with hatches and ports closed. Six pigs were found dead within four days, the remainder died within two weeks. The atomic depth charge, by creating a deadly radioactive mist and tossing tons of heavily contaminated water aboard the target ships, produced a far more poisonous effect than the first airburst bomb.

**ALLIES PLAN TO TRY NAZI INDUSTRIALISTS**

WASHINGTON —(P)— The Allied governments are working on plans for the trials of Nazi industrialists who aided the Hitler war machine, President Truman has disclosed. A decision on whether there will be an international trial will be made when current prosecutions of Nazi military men have been concluded, the President said.

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

## Some Day The Customer Will Count

An Omaha auto-dealer recently got the shock of his life. Into his show-room walked a normal-looking man who confided that he knew a fellow who wanted to buy one of the dealer's new cars. For \$10, he said, he'd give the dealer the prospective customer's name and address. Maybe the fellow isn't crazy after all. Maybe he is just making it his mission in life to remind the world that there was once a time when a potential customer with money in his pocket was an important chap. If so, he has picked out a full-time job for himself. There are plenty of folks who need reminding.

They are the ones who keep saying that business is "too good," who are annoyed with the buying public for wanting hard-to-get goods, who stopped being polite and giving service during the war and have never bothered to resume worrying about "good will." The buying public, perhaps, needs to be reminded of its own importance, too.

Buyers have been so brow-beaten, so humbled by begging, so used to being pushed around, that they have lost their spunk. The buying public doesn't talk back any more. It just takes any kind of treatment without protest.

But things were different not so long ago—and they are going to be different again. Some day the prospective customer is going to be a nice fellow to know—and that time may come sooner than we think.

Perhaps that's what the man who knew a fellow who wanted to buy a car was trying to get across.

## Pre-Treaty Policy

A year ago, President Truman, Generalissimo, Stalin, Prime Minister Churchill, and Clement Attlee, after a three weeks' conference in Berlin, issued the Potsdam Communiqué.

As the first peace conferences have just convened in Paris, this is a good time for a careful look at the past year's record. It provides background for a prophecy as to what may be expected from the Paris conference and for an analysis of the relationship between the peace treaties and the Potsdam Communiqué.

The first thing to understand about the Potsdam declaration is that it is a medium-range statement of policy. It was never intended to be anything else. The agreement reached by Roosevelt, Churchill, and Stalin at Yalta was the short term policy. The final peace treaties will determine the long-range policy.

Whether or not the Potsdam Communiqué has been a success is a question historians will be arguing about for years. But much of the criticism leveled at this declaration has been based on the wrong assumption that Potsdam spelled out the Allies' permanent policy for the government of the Axis countries and their satellites.

In the main, the Potsdam principles have worked, and the four major powers—the United States, Great Britain, Russia, and France—have stuck to the communiqué's declarations of policy. But the communiqué was necessarily a somewhat loosely-drawn statement of general principles. The details of actual government of the defeated nations were left to the military government authorities.

## Better World Ahead

For the first time in many long years, the American traveler today has reason to hope that a better world lies ahead. Delving deep into cobwebbed files of the distant past, the American Hotel Association recently revived a set of sound business practices long neglected, and mailed them, in pamphlet form, to its 6000 members. Reads this booklet of joyful implication: "Tomorrow, the problem will be to devise ways and means to meet competition on every side. For America faces a new era of travel and business expansion."

It then goes on to stress, on a "check list of sales made of future business lost": The smart appearance and cordial manner of the room clerk; the neatness, courtesy, and efficiency of the bellboy and elevator girl; and the friendliness of the telephone operator.

If individual hotels take the association seriously, here is what you may expect from the room clerk when next you register at a hostelry: "Your room clerk is pleased to see you; he has the attitude of expecting—not just anyone—but you. He makes you feel welcome and that both he and the hotel are there to serve you."

Please disregard that early call we left at the desk, sir—we have some postwar dreaming to do. . . .

## Per Capita


We have been pondering the Department of Commerce statement that the per capita income in this country last year reached the all-time high of \$1150.

## Midland Boy Works On Wyoming Ranch

Bill Bissell, son of Mr. and Mrs. C. E. (Bud) Bissell of Midland, has returned from his second summer's work on the Diamond Bar Ranch at Newcastle, Wyoming.

Young Bissell, who is a high school junior and who will be out for the Bulldog football team, plucks down a cowboy job on the ranch. And receives full pay of a cowboy.

The youth plans a ranching career. He will continue working on the ranch in summers and will work one complete year on all phases of ranching there before going to an agricultural college.

Inc., and it makes newsprint (the paper newspapers are printed on) and kraft board, used to make frozen food containers, milk containers, and other items.

The Southland Paper Mill started as a gamble, and it's paying off. During these days of acute paper shortages, it's a godsend to 40 newspaper publishers in Texas, Louisiana, Arkansas and Oklahoma. Thirty Texas papers obtain about half their necessary paper from Lufkin.

Later they'll get more, because the plant is doubling its capacity. Work on a new unit started in January, and will be completed late in 1947.

One reason for the national interest is the new process being used.

Once the industry said southern pine couldn't make newsprint. Dr. Charles Herby of Savannah, Ga., proved that it could. He developed a process that uses all pine, 80 per cent mechanical pulp and 20 per cent chemical pulp. Mixed together they make good, strong newsprint.

The Lufkin plant was built and in operation in January, 1940. Its head is E. L. Kurth, Lufkin, president. E. W. Wortham is vice-president and W. L. McHale is mill manager.

The man who keeps the plant rolling 24 hours a day, three shifts, is Charles Carpenter, general superintendent, young, handsome and enthusiastic. He was trained by Dr. Herby.

All Texas Plant  
It's an all-Texas plant. Most of the 600 employees, getting \$120,000 a month in salary, are Texans. A few skilled paper men had to be imported.

The timber is cut in East Texas, which has an inexhaustible supply. Water, of which 10,000,000 gallons are used daily, is from deep wells nearby. Salt cake comes from Monahans; chlorine for bleaching from Corpus Christi; lime from Houston; fuel is natural gas, from Texas and some from Louisiana. They pay the former OPA ceiling of \$9.75 per cord of wood, and a neat source of revenue has been opened to East Texans. Selective cutting insures a steady supply of timber—they just don't go in and level a forest.

Texas uses about 125,000 tons of newsprint a year (1940 figures) and the plant produces about 50,000 tons a year today. Later, with a new plant, it will be producing well over 100,000 tons annually.

Its present daily capacity is groundwood 140 tons, sulphate pulp 200 tons, bleached sulphate pulp 50 tons, and newsprint 125 tons. The process is so fast that a lumber can cut down a tree in the morning, haul it to the mill, and then read his afternoon paper on paper made from his own tree.

The wood is debarked, ground, and made into huge rolls of paper in a matter of hours. A string of boxcars waits at one end of the mill—ready to take the paper immediately to Southwest plants.

Texas, truly, is developing a new industry—watched by the entire nation.

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## This Little Pig Went A-Milking In Machine Age

ITHACA, N. Y.—(AP)—A miniature milking machine for use on guinea pigs is the latest addition to the dairy research laboratory at Cornell University.

Built by Prof. B. L. Herrington, the machine, patterned after the large dairy milker, is so small that all the necessary parts are linked together on a board about 18 1/2 inches.

Milk is extracted by the suction process into a "milk can," which, in the case of a guinea pig, is a small glass container.

Milking a guinea pig is a two-man job. Prof. H. H. Williams usually holds the small animal while Professor Herrington operates the equipment.

Professor Herrington's work has aroused considerable interest, and there's usually an audience on hand when "milking time" rolls around. "It's almost got to the point where I think I'll have to charge admission," he commented.

## Large Numbers Of Vets Settle Down On Farms

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Judging from government loan records, war veterans are settling down on Western farms in considerable numbers.

This despite the fact that only a few acres of public land on reclamation projects will be available for homesteading this year. That means that the veterans are buying private land, rather than establishing new farms.

Veterans by the thousands are buying or expanding established farms, by means of loans from the Farm Security Administration or from private sources aided by the loan insurance feature of the GI Bill of Rights.

In the past year and a half, the FSA has made 2,100 loans for this purpose for a total of \$18,345,175. About one third of these loans have been in Western and Southwestern states.

Over approximately the same periods, the Veterans Administration has participated in 8,060 farm loans for a total of \$25,673,123, about one-fifth of which was invested in the West.

It was pointed out that these loans are restricted and that two other sources of investment—the buyer's private funds and loans by private capital—represent an additional unestimated factor.

The Farm Security Administration has made loans for purchase or enlargement of farms in Oklahoma, 136 for \$1,019,658; Texas, 330 for \$3,043,671.

In the same area and over approximately the same period the VA had participated in these loans: Texas, 753 for \$2,141,421; New Mexico, 54 for \$150,772.

### War Inevitable If Russia Insists On Major Expansion

In discussing the insistent question of whether we are headed for another world war because of the clash between Russia and the Western Allies, this column has ventured the view that conflict isn't inevitable if the Soviet Union has about satisfied its ambition for extending its zones of influence, but that it is inevitable if Moscow is bent on further major expansion.

Those conclusions invite two other vital questions: (1) Is there anything to indicate what is in Moscow's phynx-like mind? (2) Is Uncle Sam prepared to meet any eventuality.

I understand from an excellent source that Marshal Stalin not long ago said Russia had got about all it wanted. However, that isn't very definite, for "about" is a relative term.

We know, for instance, that Moscow wants to secure military bases on the strategic Dardanelles and to play an important role in the Middle East and the Mediterranean.

We know, too, that Russia has staked claims in Manchuria and Korea and from all the signs being bent on winning Japan over to Communism.

The week-end brought some startling light on the situation in the Far East. Saturday Russell Brines, Associated Press chief of bureau at Tokyo, gave this plain language report:


**Yanks May Stay In Japan**

"Although the military phase of the occupation is nearly completed, American forces may remain indefinitely in Japan to hold what is regarded here as the eastern anchor of a world-wide American line against the Soviet Union and Communism."

Sunday the six members of the Military Committee of the U. S. House of Representatives, who have been touring American bases in the Pacific, called for a strengthening of the United States position to meet the threat of Russian encroachment on American zones of control.

Then we have from General MacArthur himself the declaration — made in the course of his summary of the first year of American occupation of Japan — that the "dread uncertainty" of ideological conflict between Democracy and

### Palestine Arabs Arm From Across Border And British Black Market

JERUSALEM—(P)—Arms for the military organizations of the Arabs of Palestine are pouring into the hands of willing warriors these days from over the border, out of hiding and through the black market.

Complete evidence of all three sources of arms and ammunition for burgeoning military movements is visible openly.

Supplies now in the hands of three separate military organizations—Najada, Futuwah and Jawallah (Arabic words for Helpers, Youth and Scouts, respectively)—are not impressive.

But supply streams are deepening fast.

At present Najada's 5,000 men are about half armed. Futuwah's estimated 13,000 about a third. What arms Jawallah, the Moslem Brotherhood's military branch, possesses was not learned, but they are believed to be comparatively few.

What guns there are in the hands of the Arabs are far from the quality and quantity the Brit-

ish army has been finding in the caches of the Jewish underground. They are mostly revolvers, a few rifles and fewer machineguns. And they are less than half as efficient, some dating back to the days when the Turkish army occupied Palestine, before and during World War I.

The principal source of supply appears to be Arab tribesmen living just over the Palestine borders in Transjordan, Syria and Lebanon. Arab sources have told this writer in the past week of their own purchases in tribal villages, such places as the Jebel Druze and the towns of Trans-Jordan, where private ownership of guns without license is legal.

**Many From Hiding Places**

The second important source is the hiding places of guns stored by Arabs, mostly in isolated villages, after the 1936 uprising.

The third and fastest increasing source of supply is the black market to which British military officers and men stationed in Palestine contribute.

This source, a trickle two months ago, has now become a veritable source of munitions flowing to unlicensed owners at prices governed only by what the traffic will bear.

An unimpeachable source gave me an eyewitness account of deliveries last August 18 at 10:45 a. m. of 40 Thompson submachine guns to a group of Arabs in Nabulb. The delivery was arranged by a British army officer. The name, rank and unit of the officer is in my possession.

On the same date in the late afternoon another truck delivered 50 light automatic weapons to an Arab (named Issa Hamzi) in the village of Ein Karem near Jerusalem. The delivery was arranged

# McKENNEY ON BRIDGE

Thousands of people who are playing party bridge today will be participating in duplicate and tournament bridge in another year or two. I believe that tournament bridge offers the finest national intellectual competition. Participants in a local duplicate game or in a world championship event are competing with every other tournament player in the country in the mad race for Master Points.

Declarer's play of the cards at duplicate bridge is often dictated by a realization of what would have happened if the opponents had been allowed to play the hand. In today's hand South's bid of four spades is a sacrifice bid based on the assumption that East and West could make four hearts.

If they could, they would score 120 points for tricks and 500 for a vulnerable game—620 points. Therefore South must go down less than 600.

West cashed three club tricks, then played the ace and a small

heart. Declarer ruffed the third heart and cashed the ace of spades. Should he finesse the next spade?

South should realize that four hearts could not have been made by East-West if the spade suit was divided two-two. Therefore, even though he drops the spades, he will not have a good score. With a three-one split in spades, East and West could make four hearts, so the correct play for South is to take the finesse.

Many experts do not like sacrifice bidding in rubber bridge, but it is a very important angle in tournament bridge.




From the enormous deposits of phosphate on the two islands about 1,250,000 tons were shipped every year before the war. Farming economy in both Australia and New Zealand rests very largely on extensive use of phosphate as fertilizer to keep the pastures in good condition.




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

**Customs Evaders Swell Burma Treasury**

RANGOON, BURMA — (AP) — A concrete strong room has been built onto the Rangoon Customs House to hold thousands of rupees' worth of goods seized each month from persons accused of attempting to avoid paying import duties when returning to former occupied areas from war-time havens in India.

The penalty for attempted evasion is three times the amount of the duty. Most persons choose to abandon the goods, sold periodically to swell the Burma government treasury.

**American Red Cross To Beat Hurricanes To Punch With Aid From U. S. Weather Bureau**

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Let the hurricanes blow. The Red Cross and the weather bureau are ready.

This is the heart of the hurricane season. If and when a big blow strikes, the Red Cross expects to be on the scene this time, before— not after.

Weather bureau reports on all possible threats of disaster stemming from weather conditions are being fed into Red Cross centers throughout the country so that advance preparations can be made. Minute-by-minute storm reports will let the Red Cross know where to set up its shelters, where to assign extra medical and nursing personnel and where to start evacuating residents.

**Will Recheck Sheriff Vote In Dallas County**

DALLAS — (AP) — A recheck of the August run-off elections for sheriff and surveyor of Dallas County will begin Monday, Democratic County Chairman Arthur Stevenson has announced.

District Judge John A. Rawlins has agreed to supervise the recheck of voting machine tabulations.

Six tons of human ashes—those of hundreds who were slain and cremated in Warsaw by the Nazis during their long occupation—were scooped up by a Red Cross committee and placed in 100 plain, wooden coffins.

After a requiem service, a funeral procession formed consisting of ten trucks carrying the coffins and a large crowd of people, headed by the Rev. Col. S. Warchalowski, of the Polish army.

An honorary company of soldiers accompanied the procession to a cemetery and fired three salutes as the coffins were opened and the ashes poured into a common grave.

Many, including soldiers, cried, even though they did not know for whom they wept, for there was no way of identifying whose ashes were among those cascaded into the grave.







According to Sen. Warren Magnuson, of Washington, the United States will ask the UN General Assembly, at its September meeting in New York, for sole trusteeship over the vast chain of Pacific island bases shown on map above. The bases stretch over an arc of 4000 miles, covering direct air and sea lanes from Hawaii to Australia and the Orient. Area includes Caroline and Marshall groups, both Japanese-mandated; the Gilberts, a British mandate; the Marianas Islands; Manus, in the Admiralties, where the U. S. built a \$200,000,000 base, with Australia's permission.

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**'I Did It With My Bow And Arrow,' Says Jane Russell, Famous For Curve**

If you want a beautiful figure, reach for the ceiling, girls! That's the advice of movie star Jane Russell, famous for her curves.

On a recent trip east, Jane demonstrated some of the exercises she says are responsible for her lovely figure. She also told how archery, one of her favorite sports, serves as a continuation of her figure-building exercises.

In the stretching exercises, Jane took an easy standing pose before a mirror and said:

"Before starting any of the exercises, pull the body into position. Lift the chest out of the stomach, the shoulders out of the chest, the neck out of the shoulders, and the head out of the neck. As you shed your slump, you can almost see yourself drop pounds."

Jane, in jersey and shorts, then raised herself on her toes, put her arms up and stretched as far as she could.

Next she illustrated an exercise which she says will strengthen the muscles of the upper arms and shoulders as well as those muscles above the bust that help to keep the bust-line firm. Here is how you do it:

Clasp your wrists with your hands, bend arms at elbows and hold at the height of your shoulders. Without sliding the hands away from the wrists give a quick push-jerk as if you were trying to push the skin of the arm up to the elbow.

Another exercise for strengthening the upper arms is done this way:

Draw your arms up shoulder high and bend at the elbows, with hands doubled into fists. Standing with back against the wall, beat the wall with the back of your upper arms.

For a slim waistline, Jane advises:

"Bend forward, keeping the knees straight, and then bend backwards as far as you can. These may seem like the same old bending exercises but they can do much toward making the body supple and shapely. At work or in sports, if you have to pick up something, don't squat—bend, with the knees straight. Then it becomes an exercise."

Archery is Jane's pet exercise for keeping her shoulders and bust well-rounded and firm. She believes that every muscle of the upper part of the body and arms is brought into play in archery, because you can't let your body slump for a minute.

Jane says that to develop lovely

curves a girl should be active in some outdoor sport. Jane swims, plays tennis, badminton, rides and skis and doesn't believe there is any excuse for a young girl not being interested in at least one sport.

**Basic U. S. Industries, Straining To Fulfill Demands, Almost Reach Limit**

WASHINGTON—(P)—The country's basic industries, straining to catch up with ravenous public demand for goods, have nearly reached the limit of their capacity. The Civilian Production Administration in reporting this said that having attained "continuous, high level" output, steel, coal, rails and the power industry cannot push much higher in the near future.

Even so, CPA John D. Small said "that means that industry is within sight of full production of finished goods if industrial peace continues".
