Phone Workers In Six Towns Quit Posts

Union Official At Houston Predicts Workers Throughout State Will Leave Jobs By Sunday

As employees in several small telephone exchanges in Texas left their jobs and those in other cities met to consider what action they will take, a Houston official of the Southwestern Telephone Workers Union (ind.) predicted Friday that telephone workers throughout the state would leave their work by Sunday.

More Than Inch And Half Of Rain Falls In Midland

The good fall rains came to Midland Thursday night and again Friday morning with combined moisture amounting to more than an inch and a half.

The gauge of the Midland Municipal Airport showed precipitation amounting to 1.57 inches and the City gauge recorded 1.80 inches.

Farmers and ranchers and citizens reported rainfall ranging from an inch and a half to two inches.

There was a heavy runoff following the hard rain Friday morning and the low places in the city were flooded. Water lapped at the doors of downtown business houses at some points. Many cars stalled, taxis did a rushing business, and wreckers pulled many cars out of the water in low sections.

Rain fell along the West Texas gas line from Midland to Lubbock. There were rain reports from Lamesa, Tahoka, Brownfield, and Lubbock and Plainview. Lubbock was soaked from rain Thursday and Friday morning. It is drizzling at Brownfield early Friday and three-quarters of an inch fell there Thursday night. Levelland had an inch and a half.

A good rain was reported from eight miles northwest of Midland on the E. H. Barron place. W. H. Figg, 10 miles southeast of Midland, had a good rain.

Rains Along The T-P Snyder reported not much rain. The Fullerton Oil Fields in Andrews County reported heavy rains were still falling Friday morning.

The Texas and Pacific Railroad reported much rain west during the week. The rains were heavy enough to wash at the railroad bed, and repairs were necessary.

Odessa did not get rain Thursday night, but received some Friday morning.

A motorist coming into Midland from Denver City Friday said it rained all the way from that town.

The rainfall was scattered, however, even in Midland County, as some ranchers and farmers reported more than others.

Good rains fell 20 miles north of Sterling City all the way to 15 miles north of Big Spring. Garden City had rain as did its territory east to near Colorado City. Rankin had one-half inch Thursday.

Other rain reports: Quanah, 1.47 inches; Amarillo, .47; Big Spring, Wichita Falls and Abilene reported rain falling Friday.

By The Associated Press Leaders of striking CIO marines raised hopes Friday for an early end of the ship strike as operators agreed to a federal arbitrator's award in the National Maritime Union walkout on the East and Gulf ports.

Joseph Curran, president of the N.M.U., said after a meeting of the CIO Committee for Maritime Unity, that he believed that a membership meeting of the union Friday could "result in the men's going back to work," and that he would recommend such a move—"all things being equal."

He declined to elaborate on the phrase "all things being equal."

Curran also announced that the union was in receipt of a telegram from J. Godfrey Butler, labor director of the U. S. Maritime Commission, to Frank J. Taylor, chairman of the American Merchant Marine Institute, which represents the East and Gulf Coast operators, advising him that the commission had accepted the arbitration award.

The award, made Thursday by James L. Fly, federal arbitrator, granted N.M.U. seaman salary increases of \$5 to \$10 monthly, bringing them to wage parity with AFL seamen.

However on the East Coast, Paul Palazzi, chairman of the N.M.U. strike committee, was quoted as saying after Fly's decision was announced that "the arbitrator's award is not a contract and until we have a signed contract the strike will continue."

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Truman's Statement Here is Mr. Truman's statement: "The foreign policy of this country is the most important question confronting us today. Our responsibility for obtaining a just and lasting peace extends not only to the people of this country but to the nations of the world.

"The people of the United States may disagree freely and publicly on any question, including that of foreign policy but the government of the United States must stand as a unit in its relations with the rest of the world.

"I have today asked Mr. Wallace to resign from the cabinet. It had become clear that between his views on foreign policy and those of the Administration—the latter being shared, I am confident, by the great body of our citizens—there was a fundamental conflict.

"We could not permit this conflict to jeopardize our position in relation to other countries.

"I deeply regret the breaking of a long and pleasant official association, but I am sure that Mr. Wallace will be happier in the exercise of his right to present his views as a private citizen.

"I am confirmed in this belief by a very friendly conversation I had with Mr. Wallace on the telephone Friday morning.

"Our foreign policy as established by the Congress, the President and the secretary of state remains in full force and effect without change.

"No change in our foreign policy is contemplated. No member in the executive branch of the government will make any public statement as to foreign policy which is in conflict with our established foreign policy. Any public statement on foreign policy shall be cleared with the Department of State. In case of disagreement the matter will be referred to me.

OPA Moves To Review Policy On Restaurant Prices

WASHINGTON — (AP) — OPA moved Friday to review its meal price policy as the restaurant industry promised aid to any case overruled in court for failing to observe new meat dish ceilings.

Wide differences persisted over how any higher menu prices could be justified.

OPA Administrator Paul Porter took this position: "If the industry can show that its earnings are below 1942 levels x x x an increase in ceiling prices can be provided under the law."

George R. Le Sauvage, chairman of the government relations committee of the National Restaurant Association, argued: "OPA already has been given ample proof of greatly higher costs of food, labor and supplies but has declined to give figures on profits because these are 'not conclusive and OPA does not have anything to do with profit control.'"

Le Sauvage told reporters it is clear the restaurant industry "is ready for a fight to the finish."

He said his association will do all it can to protect and help any restaurant operator cited for violation of OPA's August 16 order rolling back meat menu items to levels of June 30.

John L. Hennessy, chairman of the food committee of the American Hotel Association, expressed a like stand at the news conference. A group of Milwaukee restaurant operators Thursday secured a temporary injunction from a federal district court against OPA's enforcement of the roll-back order. It is to be argued Monday.

Beaumont and San Antonio locals, who met Thursday night, are awaiting word from SWTU officials on whether sympathy walkouts are desired in their cities, local representatives said. If this is requested, Beaumont operators will meet Friday and probably start a "continuous meeting," Mrs. Mayburn Labrache, local president, announced.

"San Antonio telephone workers are preparing to walk out 'at a moment's notice,'" G. B. Reed, SWTU strike committee chairman, said.

Wyatt To Tighten Lumber Priority To Aid Veterans

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Housing Expediter Wilson Wyatt plans to extend the veterans' priority system all the way back to the lumber mills in a new effort to speed the flow of lumber into new homes.

This was learned Friday as leaders of the lumber industry gathered here for a meeting with housing and production officials. The lumber men are expected to resist the new crackdown on grounds that it is unworkable and a harsher form of control than was imposed in wartime.

Reports were afloat in the lumber trade that Wyatt also proposes to tighten the government's requirement that 50 per cent of all softwood residential lumber be set aside at the mill for priority buyers, but this was not confirmed at Wyatt's national housing agency.

NHA spokesmen did state privately, however, that the agency proposes to reinforce its sweeping construction-control orders of September 1 with a broadening of the priority system.

Lumber yards and other dealers now are obliged to honor orders bearing the "HH" or housing, priority and to hold 80 per cent of their residential-type lumber for priority users. But NHA believes, the spokesmen said, that too much lumber is being sidetracked at the mill into the hands of commercial and industrial users, without ever getting to the dealer.

By permitting the lumber yard to serve the "HH" priority on the sawmill, NHA contends, less lumber would be sold at the mill to railroads, shippers and industrial plants and other heavy consumers.

Byrnes Will Make No Comment On Resignation PARIS — (AP) — Secretary of State Byrnes will issue no statement "either now or later" on the ouster of Henry A. Wallace as secretary of commerce, an associate said Friday.

"He hasn't said anything since the whole affair started, and he is not going to say anything now," the aide said.

But persons close to Byrnes reported "he didn't look displeased" at the news.

Was Byrnes surprised? "Well, yes and no," was the answer. "If he was expecting anything like this, he didn't show it last night or today."

Anderson Dies From Plane Crash Injuries The Skyhaven Airport in Midland Friday morning received a report that Wallace Anderson, one of its operators, died early Friday at Portland, Indiana, from injuries he received in a plane crash there Wednesday.

No details of Anderson's death were given. He had been in a hospital at Portland since the crash. His wife flew there from Midland to be with him.

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Two GIs Sentenced To Hang For Rape Of German Women FRANKFURT, GERMANY — (AP) — Two American Air Force soldiers have been sentenced to be hanged and three others to life imprisonment on conviction of raping two German women, headquarters of U. S. Air Forces in Europe announced.

It listed those sentenced to die as Cpl. Asbury L. Wells of Wala-wala Shoals, S. C., and Pfc. Gonzalo Salinas of Lincoln, N. M.

Sentenced to life imprisonment at hard labor and dishonorable discharge from the Army were Pfc. Willis L. Daigle of Beaumont, Texas; Pfc. Edward B. Hayes of Oak Forest, Ill., and Pfc. Glen R. McKenzie of North Minneapolis, Minn.

The sentences, handed down September 13 by court martial, will be reviewed by the commanding general of the Ninth Air Force Service Command and must then be confirmed by the War Department in Washington before the condemned men can be executed.

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Ickes Supports Wallace, Others Commend Truman

By The Associated Press Harold I. Ickes, who also served in the original New Deal cabinet, said Friday in Washington that "Wallace comes out of this with more credit than Truman."

Ickes left the cabinet several months ago after a row with President Truman over the nomination of Edwin W. Pauley to be under-secretary of the Navy. When Franklin D. Roosevelt left the White House in 1933, he named Wallace secretary of agriculture and Ickes to the Interior Department.

Ickes told reporters "I don't think it is very brave on his (Truman's) part" to oust Wallace. He added that Wallace had "over-stayed himself in the cabinet," but said the President "humiliated himself in agreeing to the speech (on foreign policy) and then throwing Wallace to the lions" when "all of this row was kicked up."

In Chicago, Senator Taft (R-Ohio), a Senate GOP leader, said: "I don't see how he (Truman) could do anything else and have an Administration foreign policy at all."

Rep. John Sparkman of Alabama, head of the Democratic National Committee's speakers bureau and a caller on President Truman after the Wallace announcement, said: "It came to me as a complete surprise. I think under the circumstances there was no other alternative."

Murray Declines Comment CIO President Philip Murray, who supported Wallace for the vice-presidential nomination at the 1944 Democratic National Convention, declined any immediate comment and told Washington newsmen he was "not sure" if he would comment later.

Senator Brewster (R-Me.) said: "The American people will now realize that only a Republican administration can offer any hope of responsible party government. The defection of the Left-Wing leaves the Administration grounded. The bipartisan support of the Byrnes program is altogether good."

Representative Gossett (D-Texas) said: "I think the President is to be commended for his prompt and forthright action. He could have hardly done otherwise."

Representative Kilday (D-Texas) said: "The President was correct in removing Secretary Wallace from the cabinet. Secretary Byrnes has the confidence of the people and cannot be further embarrassed by Mr. Wallace in catering to Russia."

Representative Patman (D-Texas) said: "I am sure that Mr. Truman has done in asking for Mr. Wallace's resignation. World peace is our No. 1 problem and it could not be promoted otherwise."

Witnesses said a section of the rock wall 120 feet in length at the top and about 30 feet across at the bottom of the falls tumbled into the gorge shortly after 9 a.m. (CST) with a terrific roar.

They reported that it was on this side of the V-shaped section which broke off in 1942.

Tony Guinta, a member of the Niagara Falls Gazette staff, said the blast "shook hell out of the city."

"Our building shook like a maple leaf in a breeze."

At Fort Worth, Paul J. Beasley, president of the Telephone Plant Workers local, has reported that union members there will vote next Tuesday to decide if they will stage a continuous meeting in support of the Houston situation. Approximately 900 members of the seven units of the local will vote during off-duty hours.

Over Seniority Rights

The dispute arose from union claims that the company violated their contract by promoting two men over whom the union claimed five others had seniority rights.

Company officials at Houston declined comment.

Mrs. Whatley disclosed the union has recommended Rev. Leo C. Brown, professor of economics and director of the Institute of Social Science at St. Louis University, as the arbitrator.

Arbitrations will be held in St. Louis.

Meanwhile four other strikes continued in Texas:

The Beaumont Enterprise and Journal were printed on engraved plates as printers struck for higher wages and other union demands.

At San Antonio the CIO Food, Tobacco and Agricultural workers union began picketing the Pioneer Flour Mills to enforce demands for a general 20-cents-an-hour pay boost plus other concessions.

Galveston port activities resumed gradually as picket lines were moved by union agreement from dock entrances to allow several thousand dock workers to pass. The seamen's strike continued, however.

The Denison plant of the Jacques Power Saw Company was picketed by workers demanding a union contract.

Port Arthur-Beaumont bus operators are asking a wage increase from 83 cents per hour to \$1.10.

Wallace was secretary of agriculture under the late Chief Executive for eight years, then moved into the vice-presidency, was shelved when Mr. Roosevelt turned to Truman for a running mate in 1944, and subsequently re-entered the cabinet in the commerce post.

Thus did the Chief Executive attempt to eliminate for the future any repetition of the Wallace affair.

By booting Wallace from the cabinet, Truman also removed the gag the former Iowa farmer had imposed on himself, which would have held through most of the Fall political campaign.

Wallace now is free to speak up and to stump the country, if he chooses, in behalf of the foreign policy he advocates—one which envisions more lenient treatment of Russia.

What the political effects of his removal will be remains for future determination.

Midland VFW Members To Visit Big Spring Chapter On October 1

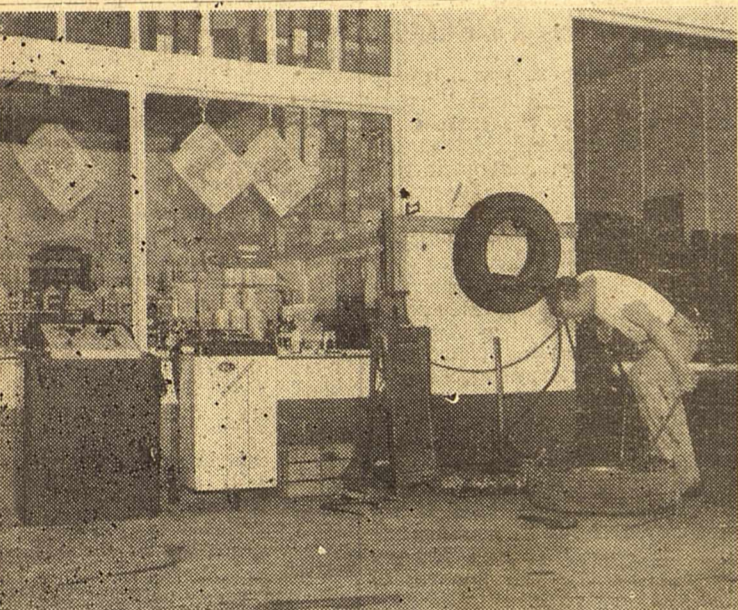

U. S. And Britain May Speed Return Of Japs From Southeast Asia

WASHINGTON —(AP)—An Anglo-American decision to speed the return home from Southeast Asia of more than 100,000 Japanese reportedly is in the making Friday.

Its objective obviously is to pull the rug from under any possible Pan-Asian contention that this country has sanctioned the use of "slave labor."

Officials familiar with the discussions now going on told a reporter that an announcement probably will be issued in a week or 10 days, depending on the shipping situation in the Far Pacific.

These officials said it was the shipping situation, now improving—scattered Japanese—that has been responsible for the delays. They added that they expect the task to be completed by year's end.

In line with the Potsdam Big Three declaration calling upon Allied governments to permit prisoners of war to return home, the State Department's stand has been taken in the face of a strong desire by some former occupied countries to use the prisoners for reconstruction work.

While sympathetic over the plight of these countries, the State Department nevertheless has taken the position that American endorsement would be inconsistent with the repatriation of about 800,000 Japanese troops captured by the Red Army in Manchuria and Northern Korea.

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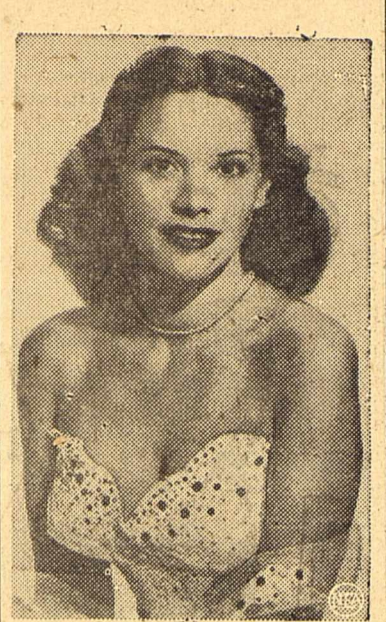
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DRINKING WATER NORMALIZES SKIN

Charles Seiberling, Tire Builder, Dies

AKRON, OHIO —(AP)—Charles W. Seiberling, 65, first vice-president of the Seiberling Rubber Company of Barberton and one of the founders of the Goodyear Tire & Rubber Company, died Friday in Akron City Hospital.

He entered the hospital Thursday after he was stricken with a heart attack.

With his brother, Frank A. Seiberling, he founded the Goodyear Tire & Rubber Company in 1898, with \$3,500 borrowed capital. The Seiberlings lost control of Goodyear in 1920, along with their fortunes, and when past 60 established the rubber company bearing their name at Barberton.

Noted for his philanthropy, Charles Seiberling's place in industry was gained chiefly by following the leadership of his 86-year-old inventive brother, who survives.

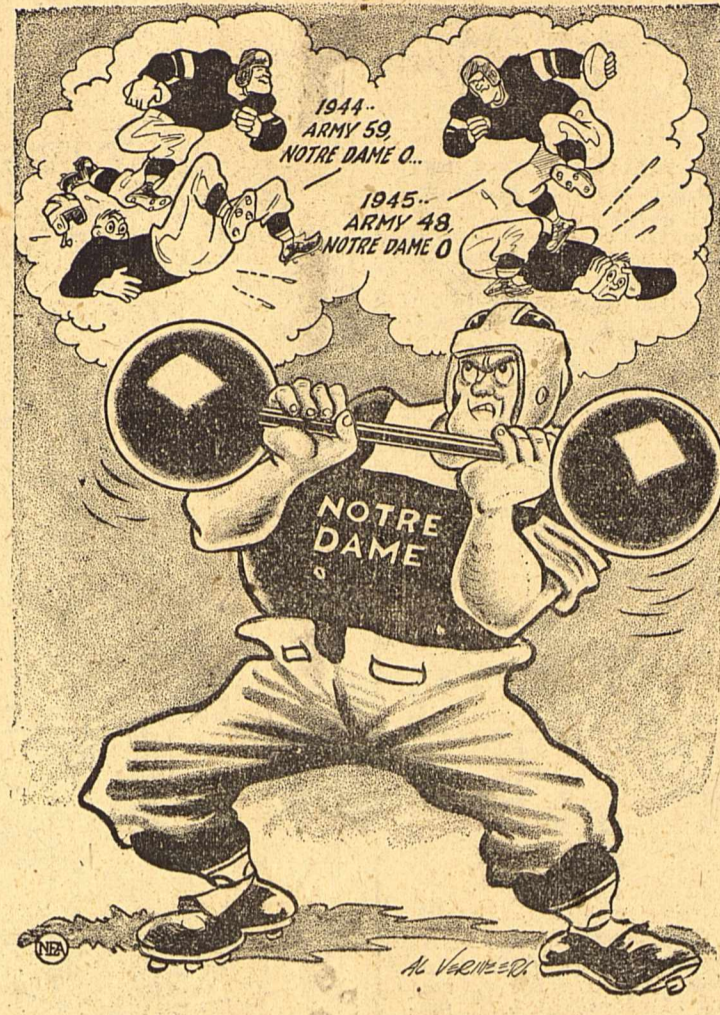

Ted Williams, Stan Musial's chief rival for the title of baseball's most dangerous hitter today, believes that the St. Louis Cardinal clout is in Ted's own words—the "great" player in the National League.

The Boston Red Sox socker, who with his Manager Joe Cronin and others of the team's top-flight stars, were interested spectators at the Cards-Braves game in Boston, got a large eyeful of Mr. Musial in action Thursday afternoon.

While admitting he hadn't seen much of the National League except for a few games in Brooklyn, New York and Boston, Williams said "Musial has shown me more than anybody else with the stick".

The clouter from Donora, Pa., currently leading the National League batters with a mark of .373, showed Williams, Cronin et al. plenty.

He slammed out five straight hits in as many times at bat and drove in the winning run in St. Louis' 5-4 victory with his final safety, a ninth-inning single. Two of his hits were doubles.

The Musial-made victory enabled the Cardinals to preserve their first-place margin of one and a half games over the Brooklyn Dodgers who kept close to the leaders by whipping the Pittsburgh Pirates 7-0 at Ebbets Field.

Red Birds Need Eight Wins

As matters stand now, the Cardinals need any combination of eight wins or as many Brooklyn losses to clinch the pennant. The Red Birds have eight games left to play as compared to nine for the Brooks, including Friday's playoff of the 19-inning 0-0 tie with Cincinnati.

In the American League, the Cleveland Indians defeated the Washington Senators 5-1 for Bob Feller's twenty-fifth victory of the season.

Scoring seven runs in one big inning and five in another, the Tigers outslugged the Philadelphia Athletics 14-7 for their seventeenth victory in 22 meetings with the Mackmen.

Lefty Dave Koslo hurled the New York Giants to a three-hit 1-0 victory over the Chicago Cubs. The win ended a six-game losing streak for the Giants.

Clay Lambert outpitched Dick Mauney to give the Cincinnati Reds a 2-1 victory over the Phils under the lights in Philadelphia.

After losing a 4-0 lead, the St. Louis Browns came back with two runs in the last of the ninth to defeat the American League Champion Boston Red Sox 6-5 in a night game.

Texas-Missouri, TCU-Kansas Battles Highlight Opening Of Southwest Play

The Southwest Conference football campaign opens Saturday with defending champion Texas taking up right where it left off last January in the Cotton Bowl—meeting Missouri's Tigers in one of the nation's feature intersectional games.

Four other conference members—Texas Christian, Texas A&M, Baylor and Arkansas—also swing into action, the Christians in another intersectional headliner as they meet the Kansas Jayhawks at Kansas City in a night game. A&M, Baylor and Arkansas have what are considered breather, with the Aggies engaging North Texas State at College Station, Baylor meeting Southwestern at Waco and Arkansas entertaining Northwestern Louisiana State at Fayetteville.

The Texas-Missouri game, if it is a continuation of the Cotton Bowl joust, should be something to see. In the January classic the Longhorns and Tigers hooked up in one of the wildest offensive battles in history. Missouri, again hitched to its dazzling T formation and Giant Jim Kekeris, biggest tackle in football, is not expected to reverse things from the Cotton Bowl but the critics expect a fairly close ball game.

Texas Christian runs into a tartar in Kansas, which has been a con-gregating point for stars from far and near including Ray Evans, one of the best backs in America. TCU definitely has its work cut out for it.

With three of five games of intersectional nature, the conference will soon know how it stacks up with other areas. The other two conference members—Southern Methodist and Rice—open the campaign next week, each in an intersectional clash, with SMU tackling Temple at Philadel-

phia and Rice taking on Louisiana State at Houston.

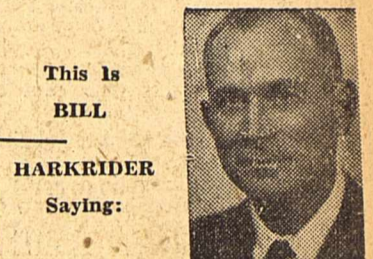

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Red Sox Watch As Cards Beat Braves

Ted Williams, Stan Musial's chief rival for the title of baseball's most dangerous hitter today, believes that the St. Louis Cardinal clouter is in Ted's own words—the "great" player in the National League.

The Boston Red Sox socker, who with his Manager Joe Cronin and others of the team's top-flight stars, were interested spectators at the Cards-Braves game in Boston, got a large eyeful of Mr. Musial in action Thursday afternoon.

While admitting he hadn't seen much of the National League except for a few games in Brooklyn, New York and Boston, Williams said "Musial has shown me more than anybody else with the stick".

The clouter from Donora, Pa., currently leading the National League batters with a mark of .373, showed Williams, Cronin et al. plenty.

He slammed out five straight hits in as many times at bat and drove in the winning run in St. Louis' 5-4 victory with his final safety, a ninth-inning single. Two of his hits were doubles.

The Musial-made victory enabled the Cardinals to preserve their first-place margin of one and a half games over the Brooklyn Dodgers who kept close to the leaders by whipping the Pittsburgh Pirates 7-0 at Ebbets Field.

Red Birds Need Eight Wins

As matters stand now, the Cardinals need any combination of eight wins or as many Brooklyn losses to clinch the pennant. The Red Birds have eight games left to play as compared to nine for the Brooks, including Friday's playoff of the 19-inning 0-0 tie with Cincinnati.

In the American League, the Cleveland Indians defeated the Washington Senators 5-1 for Bob Feller's twenty-fifth victory of the season.

Scoring seven runs in one big inning and five in another, the Tigers outslugged the Philadelphia Athletics 14-7 for their seventeenth victory in 22 meetings with the Mackmen.

Lefty Dave Koslo hurled the New York Giants to a three-hit 1-0 victory over the Chicago Cubs. The win ended a six-game losing streak for the Giants.

Clay Lambert outpitched Dick Mauney to give the Cincinnati Reds a 2-1 victory over the Phils under the lights in Philadelphia.

After losing a 4-0 lead, the St. Louis Browns came back with two runs in the last of the ninth to defeat the American League Champion Boston Red Sox 6-5 in a night game.

"Send your man to the railroad station and pick up a carload of race horses just in from Saratoga, N. Y.," the voice on the other end said.

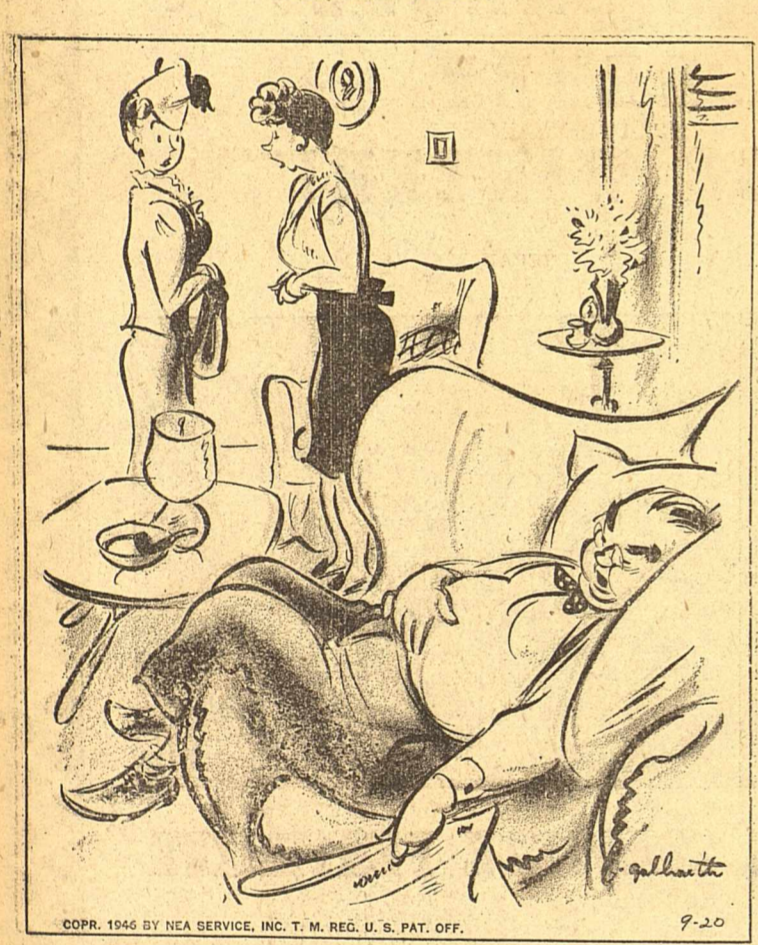

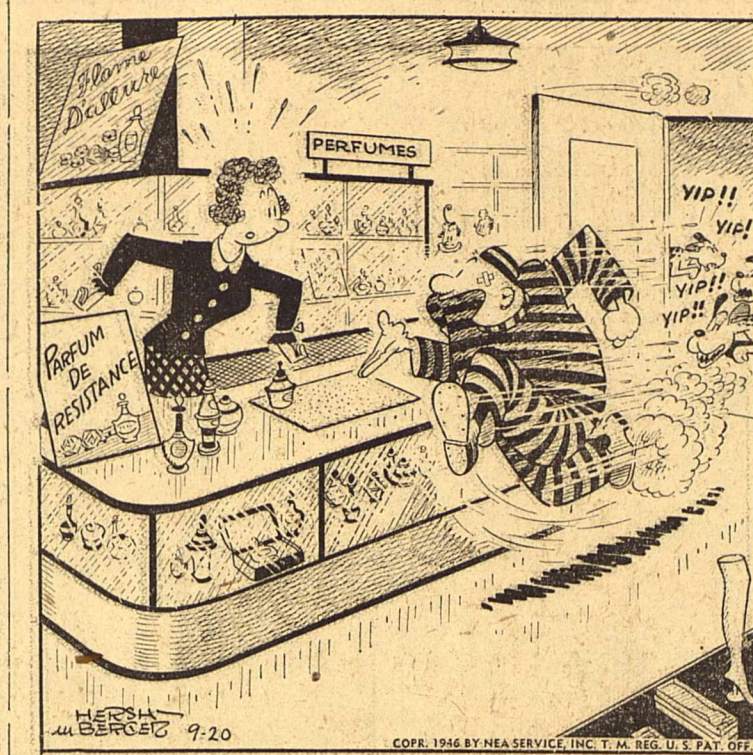

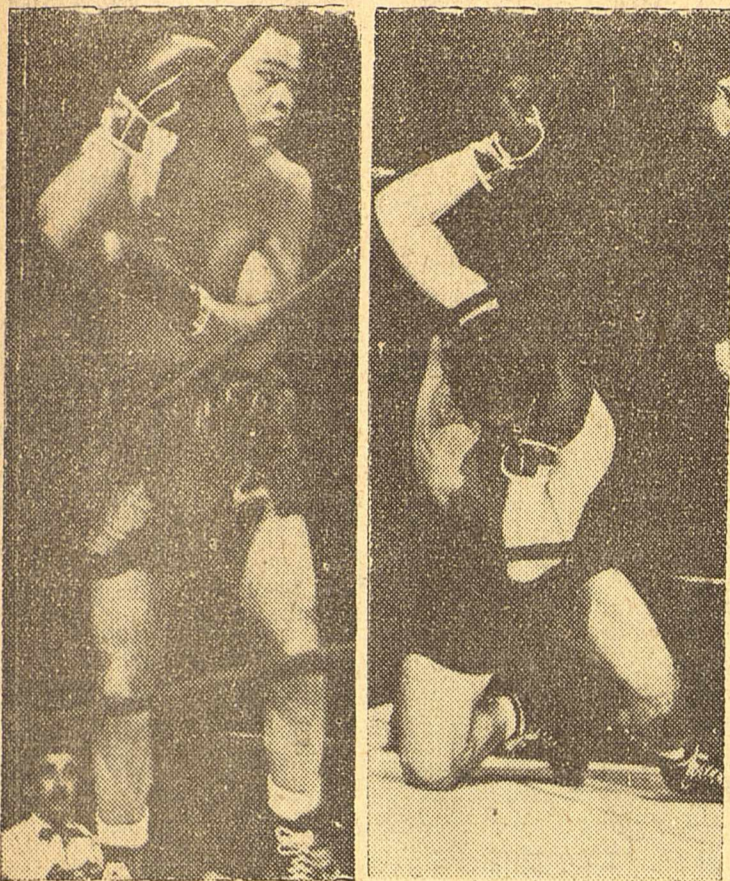

Hirschon's three-run homer came in the first inning and after that the Rebels were never behind.

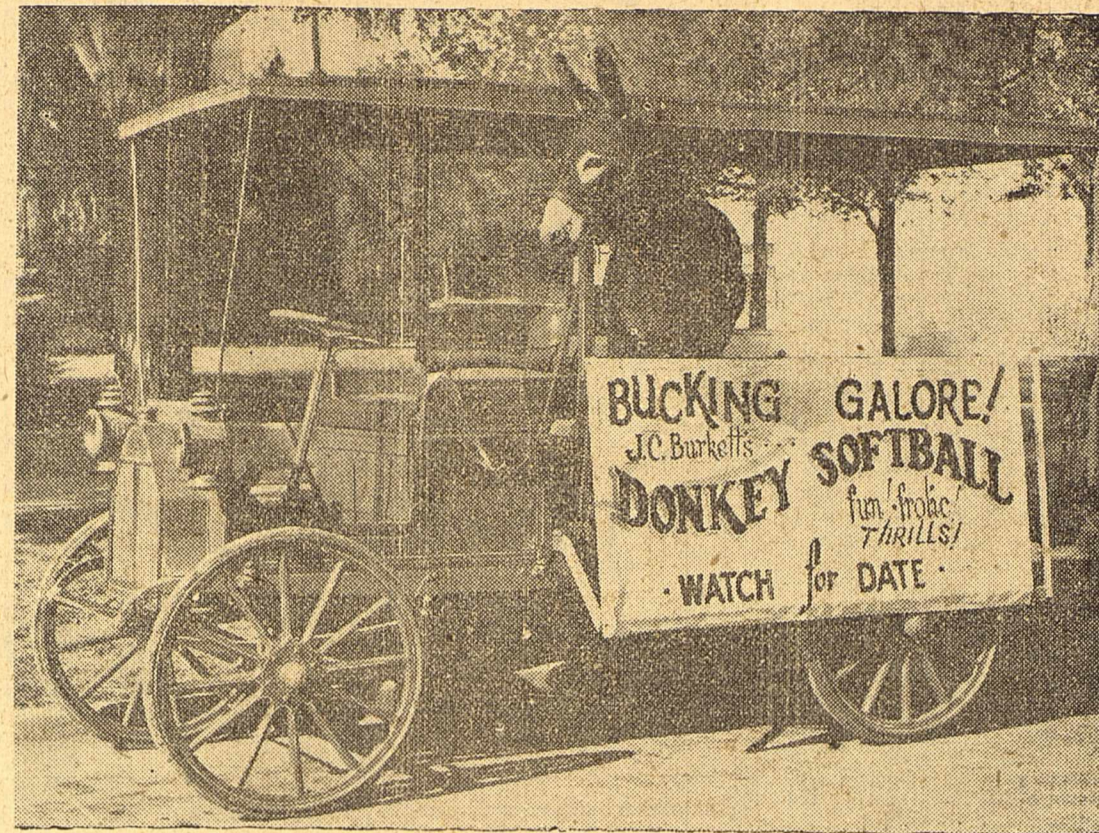
