Coronado conquers Mules in Caprock

LUBBOCK - Muleshoe coach Ralph Mason stopped short of calling it a wasted day. He was being kind.

Class 5A Lubbock Coronado intimidated and embarrassed Muleshoe 91-41 Thursday in a first-round game of the 38th annual ABC Caprock Holiday Basketball Tournament at Lubbock High School.

The Mustangs controlled the game from outset Thursday, running the Mules ragged to lanes, leading to numerous 3-

Coronado converted every Mule miscue into an easy hoop. Coronado also dominated the offensive boards and hit a torrid 7 of 10 3-pointers while shooting well above 50 percent from the field.

Mason admitted his team was intimidated.

"We talked before the game not so much about winning and losing, but about learning from a game like this," Mason said. "But we didn't get something out of it.

"We're still a puppy - a successful puppy - but we've still got a lot to learn. We've got to get something out of game like this."

Muleshoe (12-6) played Lorenzo in a first round consolation game Friday in the 32-team field loaded with Class 4A and 5A schools.



Report gives Home Health good checkup

The Muleshoe Area Hospital patients are not being directed to a competing home health company, according to a report Thursday at a regular meeting of the Board of Directors of the Muleshoe Area Hospital District.

OSPITAL BOARD

MAHD interim administrator Jim Bone reported on the status of Muleshoe Area Home Health Agency in response to charges by local practicioner Mark McClanahan at an earlier

In the Nov. 22 meeting, McClanahan said he felt Methodist Hospital in Lubbock was assigning patients to its own home health agency without giving patients a choice. He added the practice could compromise the welfare of the local hospital district.

Margeret Heathington, director of Muleshoe Home Agency, said Health McClanahan was not asked to speak on the agency behalf and that she was not aware why he spoke on the matter. Aside from referring patients, McClanahan has no business relationship with Muleshoe Home Health, Heathington said.

Bone noted that of nine patients referred to Methodist Hopsital from MAMC since October, seven now receive their home health services from Muleshoe Area Home Health.

Heathington said that she was not aware of how Bone came about getting the infor-

As the Muleshoe area entered another year, the immediate economic future was in doubt early in 1996, with the prospects of a new farm bill as scarce as rain.


On one side, farmers were left in the dark as by a seemingly endless Congressional debate over the new farm bill. Without knowing what the new regulatiuons were, farmers and field sat idle.

On the other side, nature was dealing the agricultural world a double whammy. Drought conditions that had plagued the area for two years persisted with no end in sight.

Cattlemenalso felt the effects of drought as the price of cattle feedskyroceed, forcing many cattlemen tosell off part of all of their herds.

Cattle markets across the country began to feel the scourge of bovine spongiform encephalopath, better known as mad cow disease. Even though the outbreak of the disease occurred in England, cattle markets across the country suf-

fered from the bad publicity.

The passage of the 1996 Farm Bill late in early April was a ray of hope to most farmers, but a sign of future worry for others. While the bill spelled out specifics about market transition subsidies, it also included a plan to slowly remove government subsidies in the future.

Muleshoe Area Hospital Administrator Richard Murphy's resignation caught many by surprise. Murphy held the post for six years.

Murphy accept an administrative position at a hospital in El Campo. Current administrator Jim Bone replaced him in June.

The Muleshoe Chamber of Commerce held its annual banquet March 30, with Western 66 recognzed as the Business of the Year.

Angelica Toscano received the Employee of the Year Award for her 24 years of service to Leal's restaurant.

George Washington, a former coach at Muleshoe High School, was honored as Man of the Year. Rowena Myers, who has served the South Plains Mental Health and Mental Retardation Center for 25 years, was honored as Woman of the Year. The Marshall Pool family of Muleshoe received the award for Farm Family of the

Sports at Muleshoe High School remained on track, despite changes in the coaching staff. After a three-month search, David Wood was hired to replace Randy Adair. Adair was forced to resign November '95 after an 0-10 football season and four years.

Muleshoe snapped an 18game losing streak late in the season and finished 1-9. Wood was credited with installing discipline throughout the whole athletic program by vteteran observers.

mation in his report. "We have no way of tracking patients from Methodist," Heathington said. "We don't know how long they stay at Methodist or who they choose to provide home health when they are released."

The board agreed that Bone's report should be taken as an optimistic view of the current status of Muleshoe Home Health Agency. The board decided the best thing for the agency is to educate the public about the presence the agency.

In other business, the board voted to renew the district's coverage under the FirstCare Health Plan.

According to administrative secretary Sharon Plott, FirstCare is a health maintenance organization (HMO) that covers both doctor and hospital visits. Plott said most of the hospital district's 90 employees are covered under FirstCare.

The board also approved the reappointment of four courtesy staffmembers: Stephen Ringel, M.D.; Arnold Wallace, D.O.; Sanford Ward, D.O.; and Michael Ray Falk, a certified registered nurse/anesthesiologist. The board also approved the initial appointment of Daniel Cofie, M.D. to the hospital's courtesy staff.

The courtesy staff is mostly comprised of doctors who specialize in a particular field of medicine. Courtesy staff members can order tests in the hospital facility, but do not have admission privileges local staff doctors are given.
