Industry Promises Beef For Non-Control

Turner Will Drill 5,000-Ft. Wildcat In Shafter Lake

Fred Turner, Jr., of Midland, has filed application with the Railroad Commission covering immediate drilling of his No. 1 M. M. Fisher, to be a 5,000-foot wildcat, ten miles north of Andrews, in North-Central

Andrews County.

Location is 660 feet from north and west lines of the west half of northwest quarter of section 16, block A-36, psl survey. It is in the east side of Shafter Lake.

The project will be drilled with rotary by Spencer and Turner of Lovington, New Mexico, and Midland. Turner has several hundred acres of scattered leases surrounding the drillsite. The wildcat is to explore the San Andres zone of the

Two Backed-Up Stanolind Oil & Gas Company No. 1 Kayser, Central Ector County wildcat, plugged back to 13,494 feet, and was to perforate casing above that point and test. The Ellenburger, topped at 13,500 feet, had shown some oil, but it was drowned out by salt water.

Stanolind and Westbrook-Thompson Holding Corporation No. 35-A Hendrick, West-Central Winkler County wildcat, set a retainer at 13,735 feet, and was to squeeze perforations at 13,760-815 feet, in the bottom section of the Ellenburger, which had yielded salt water. After the squeezing, it is understood that the upper section of the Ellenburger will be tested through casing perforations

German Doctors Face Trial For Guinea Pig Tests

NUERNBERG-(A)-U. S. authorties said Thursday that German doctors charged with using human beings as guinea pigs for inhuman experiments in SS (Elite Guard) aboratories would face trial about November 15 in renewed war crimes proceedings in Nuernberg.

Attorneys said SS officials and loctors involved in such experiments on concentration camp in-mates and other persons would be grouped together in the first of a series of six trials. The second group, they said, would include Nazi Peoples Court judges who issued summary death sentences, often without even hearing defense tes-

Argentina Offers Aid In Emergency

WASHINGTON -(AP)-The beef industry coupled a demand for immediate scrapping of price controls Thursday with a promise of ample supplies of meat 'very soon" — possibly before November's congressional electionsif the Administration acts.

R. G. Haynie, chairman of the OPA beef industry advisory committee which petitioned formally for decontrol, told reporters there are plenty of cattle and calves ready for market as soon as price ceilings are lifted.

ernmental agencies Says There Is No Shortage The petition argued that there is no shortage of cattle and calves under the meaning of the Price Con-

trol Act and said: "Under these conditions Congress has ordered decontrol in order that

"Whether prices would rise after decontrol is wholly immaterial." The committee said that Anderson should release all livestock and meats from controls—including hogs and sheep-if he should find it impractical to decontrol cattle and

calves only. Discussing the industry move at news conference, Haynie said that under the law the only question involved is supply. He said the petition showed "by the government's own figures" that cattle and calves now available for market are above long time average. Cattle on Shortage List

Anderson, however, has placed cattle and calves on an official list of agricultural products in short supply

Aides said Anderson had promised to give the petition "top" consideration. He has 15 days in which to act. If the petition is denied, the committee may appeal to Anderson for a formal hearing. Should a hearing, the committee may then appeal to the three-man Price Decontrol Board.

Henry Wallace's resignation from the cabinet strengthened American foreign policy abroad, but it also sharpened differences of opinion on the same subject here at home. This is clear from public reaction to the resignation, and from Wallace's own statements.

Thus we may expect that domestic debate on foreign policy will grow in intensity before the November elections, and that some bitter and extravagant words will be spoken. Those words may not have any immediate effect on our foreign policy, but they are certain to have some effect on those whose minds are susceptible to the transitory emotional stimuli of a political campaign.

So, before things get any hotter, we should like to offer a few truths which we hold to be self-evident, for whatever good they may do:

Let us remember that it is a matter first of foreign relations, and of domestic politics only in a relations. foreign relations, and of domestic politics only in a secondary degree.

Let us remember that while both camps have made mistakes and will make others, their purposes are not destructive. Let us remember that it is one thing to Hoover Body quarrel with a man's political methods, but quite another ware to impugn his motives.

Let us also remember that the cause of peace is a holy cause, but that holiness does not reside in the manner chosen to advance that cause. The issue of world peace and of America's contribution to it is above selfseeking advancement. The manner of settling the issue may be in question, but a monopoly of virtue does not reside with the champions of either camp.

We are sure that the principals in the foreign policy debate realize this. Let us hope that their followers will show the same good sense.

Canada's northwest. Natural fighters, tireless and relentless, they swept over the cliff dwellers of this area, then forged further south. For generations before the coming of pioneer Americans, the Apaches battled Spaniards and Mexicans, killing, looting and kidnaping.

As American settlers pressed westward, they found the Apache the most warlike tribe in the Southwest. In Geronimo they met one of the craftiest and most powerful leaders in the West. Killed 2,000 Pioneers

The Apaches ravaged and plundered the countryside, killing an estimated 2,000 pioneers in addition to U. S. soldiers. Even after the defeat and capture of Geronimo, the Apache Kid and a group of renegades terrorized parts of the Southwest. The last real fight between the Apache and white men was in 1900.

The nemadic Apaches confined to the San Carlos Reservation in the White Mountains of Arizona were given an area of rugged land about 100 miles square. The district was not rich in resources, but contained more than 1,000,000 acres of grazing land.

It seemed easier for the Indians to lease their valuable ground to the white man. Cattle companies moved in, hiring Indians as cowhands Staged A Comeback

The Apaches were shrewd enough to see that their land was being abused and overgrazed. Many of them were good cowmen, and decided they could get along by themselves. As a result of an Apache appeal to Washington, the cattle companies were told to remove their stock from the reservation.

Grass is on the Move

Out of the sandhills of Nebraska, up from the Chama country of New Mexico . . . all the way from the state of Washington to Texas, there's a flood of livestock on the move. Feeder cattle and lambs raised in the great grass-growing regions of the United States are flowing into the feed lots of the nation. This movement reaches its peak each October, and its significance is of great economic importance to all of us in the livestock-meat in-

These millions of head of feeder cattle and lambs are nothing more than grass turned into meat. True, these feeders will require a certain amount of grain to finish them as satisfactory meat animals. That's why they go into the feed lots. But were it not for these grazing animals, 779,000,000 acres of the land area of the United States would produce little, if any, human food. In other words, 41% of the total land of our nation consists of grass land which cannot be used for producing other feeds and foods. Also taking into consideration the plowable land used to produce pasture, hay and other forage crops, approximately half of our land would produce no food of human value, were it not for livestock.

Of the total feeds consumed by beef cattle, 78.7% is grass, hay and dry roughages. With lambs, it is 95.6%. These are official figures of the United States Department of Agriculture. Thus,

the grain that goes into feeder cattle and lamb rations is but a relatively small part of the feed that makes our meat. A minimum of corn is needed to bring feeder steers from 700 to 1,000 pounds when the principal part of the ration is made up of fodder, corn silage, other available roughages and some concentrates.

In addition to utilizing grass which otherwise would be wasted, the production of livestock nishes the nation with its finest nutritional foodmeat. In the great movement of meat from the Western range to the kitchen range, the stop-over in the feed lots increases the amount of meat. It also levels out the fall flood of livestock into a more even year-round marketing. Thus seasonal price fluctuations are not so marked. In the production of livestock, the majority of America's 6,000,000 farmers and ranchers find the chief means of marketing their grass and other home-

SELECTING JUNIOR CLUB STEERS by W. H. Peters

Every boy and girl who enters a junior feeding contest would like to secure a feeder steer good enough to become a champion. In selecting calves with this high aim in mind, the "satis-

factory prospect" must be a purebred or high-grade of one of the recognized beef breeds, Shorthorn, Hereford, or Angus.

The calf or yearling steer in thin condition must appear short in legs in proportion to his depth of body, or to put it the other way around, he must

appear deep in body in proportion to his length of legs. He must then appear to be wide in his body and thickly covered with muscle, especially over the loin and down through the thighs. The feeder calf should have a short neck and a short, broad head. He should appear moderately

fine or small in the legs and head as an indication that he will fatten smoothly and show quality when fat. Large, coarse-appearing calves and small over-refined ones seldom develop into winners. Calves that appear nervous and easily excited or frightened should be avoided as they are likely to not do well and to be hard to train to lead.


