

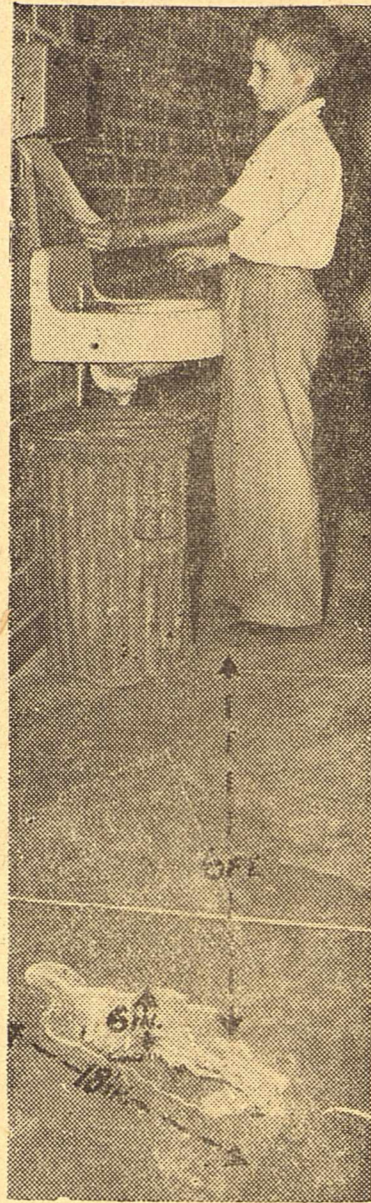

Construction Begins On Kermit-Odessa Road

KERMIT — Construction on 10 miles of the Kermit-Odessa Highway, and on a two-mile by-pass route of Highway 302, at the southern edge of the city limits, started this week.

The contract, held by Thomas and Ratliff of Rogers, calls for reconstruction of the Kermit-Odessa route, beginning at a point 1.7 miles east of here, and plans call for considerable amount of grade changes through the sand hills, and new construction or re-construction to bring the highway to modern standards.

In the meantime, the State Highway Department is advising all through traffic between Kermit and Odessa to detour by way of Monahans. Local traffic, officials stated, which must travel the highway will be provided a temporary route, but highway officials stress the fact that heavy loads should avoid the detour whenever possible.

Arriving he found a nightclothed youngster sitting in the kitchen refusing to go to bed.



Vet Remembers Meal 45 Years

CHADRON, NEB.—(P)—Mayor Sam Prey has done his part to help a Spanish-American war veteran collect a bill which the government has owed him for 45 years.

The veteran, H. B. Morelock, wrote Prey asking if he could learn the name of a man who operated a restaurant here in 1901. He explained he took a cavalry unit through Chadron and fed them at the restaurant, paying the bill himself. He couldn't remember the proprietor's name, but did recall "the cash register was to the right of the door as you enter."

From old times the mayor learned the restaurant owner was Bill Jacobus, long since dead.

4-H Club Idea Wins In Korea Election

SEOUL, KOREA.—(P)—In an election described as the first secret balloting in Korea in 4,000 years, householders of Kyunggi province have approved a proposal to introduce the American 4-H club type of agricultural program to the province's young folk.

The vote was 229,367 for the 4-H idea, 73,239 against, and 8,102 voided or defective ballots.

The 4-H proposal was originated by Lt. Col. Charles A. Anderson of Beatrice, Neb., American military governor of the province.

AUSTIN.—(P)—State Comptroller George H. Sheppard has concluded that the proposed good roads Constitutional amendment authorizes the Legislature to allow tax refunds to farmers and others who use non-highway gasoline.

He said he reached this conclusion after a study of the amendment prompted by inquiries as to its possible effect on this phase of tax exemption.

For the Hallowe'en buffet—Jack O'Lantern Salad.
By GAYNOR MADDOX
A molded salad, beautifully garnished, always adds to a party buffet. For Hallowe'en, this Jack O'Lantern special is just what your menu needs.

Jack O'Lantern Salad (Serves 6-8)
Three tablespoons plain gelatin, 3/4 cup cold water, 1 1/2 cups hot pineapple juice, 1/4 cup lemon juice, 1/2 cup orange juice, 2 tablespoons sugar, 1 1/2 cups grated carrots, 1 1/2 cups drained crushed pineapple, 6 whole prunes, 1 1/2 cups chopped cooked prunes, 2 blanched almonds, 1 small piece green pepper, mayonnaise.

Soak gelatin in cold water. Dissolve in hot pineapple juice drained from can of crushed pineapple. Add strained orange and lemon juice and sugar.

Pour liquid 1/4 inch deep in 8-inch-deep round layer cake pan and form Jack O'Lantern face with pieces of prunes and almonds. Chill until firm.

Combine carrots with 1/3 of remaining liquid and pour over. Chill until firm.

Combine drained pineapple and 1/3 of liquid and pour over carrots. Chill.

Combine prunes and rest of liquid and pour on top. Chill.

Unmold onto salad plate. With sharp knife cut a small, curved, V-shaped piece at top of face and decorate with green pepper stem. Surround with salad greens and serve with real homemade or commercial mayonnaise.

Molded Avocado Salad (Serves 6)
One envelope plain unflavored gelatin, 1/4 cup cold water, 1 cup hot water, 1 tablespoon lemon juice, 1 avocado, 1 cup orange sections, 1 cup grapefruit sections.

Soften gelatin in cold water and dissolve in hot water. Add lemon juice and cool. When mixture begins to thicken, peel and halve avocado, cut in 1/4-inch lengthwise slices.

Rinse quart mold in cold water. Arrange avocado and orange sections alternately in design around sides of mold.

Pour in a little of the gelatin mixture and allow to set. Combine grapefruit sections with remaining gelatin mixture and pour into mold. Chill.

When ready to serve, unmold on salad greens and serve with mayonnaise of French dressing.

Dutch Regain German War Loot
AMSTERDAM.—(P)—Almost half of the machinery taken from The Netherlands by Germans during the war has been brought back according to L. F. Otto, Dutch commissioner-general in Germany.

He said that this figure does not take into account vast amounts of equipment that was destroyed in Germany, but refers to that which still remained intact when the war ended.

Of 464 railway locomotives taken from Holland, 405 have been returned, Otto said, as well as all of the 301 streetcars which the Nazis seized as booty. Twenty per cent of all stolen art objects, representing 70 per cent of the artistic value, have also been retrieved by Holland.

Minerals In Milk Benefit Teeth

MADISON, WIS. —(AP)—Milk may maintain some unknown quantity—in addition to calcium—that helps prevent tooth decay, six University of Wisconsin biochemists report.

In their experiments, animals developed exceptionally fine teeth on a diet of mineralized milk, they said. This was not unexpected, for milk is high in protein and fat but low in fermentable sugar—a combination that promotes good teeth. But even when sugar was added to the diet to provide nearly half the fermentable sugar, the animals still developed few cavities.

The results, the biochemists said, suggested the presence in milk of a specific but yet unidentified factor which helps protect teeth against decay.

Vets In Ohio School Win Highest Grades

CINCINNATI —(AP)—Veterans at the University of Cincinnati are making better grades than non-veteran students, it has been announced by Maj. Spencer Shank, director of the institution's veterans' education division.

In proportion to their numbers there are more ex-GIs than non-veterans on the current dean's lists of students ranking scholastically among the top 110 per cent in their classes. It was announced that veterans accounted for 44 per cent of the total enrollment and 47 per cent of the students making the dean's lists. Commenting on the disclosure, Major Shank said: "Our veteran-students are demonstrating marked resourcefulness, ingenuity and originality, growing out of their service experiences."

Apaches Use Artificial Breeding To Develop \$1,000,000 Cattle Business

TUCSON, ARIZ. —(AP)—The Arizona Apaches, once the scourge of the Southwest, are getting rich.

This year the Apaches will sell more than \$1,000,000 worth of Hereford beef cattle.

They can do this largely because of their artificial breeding plant, second largest in the world and first in the United States, according to A. E. Slaver, U. S. Indian Service representative and Dr. John F. Lasley, USIS agricultural agent who established the plant in 1939.

In the spring, the Apaches led the state of Arizona in the price received for their feeder steers. Artificial insemination is given credit for this by Dr. Lasley.

Of particular interest is the tribe's "social security" herd. Belonging to the people as a whole, 5,000 head of cattle produce the money to pay pensions to the aged, infirm and others in need.

Shrewdness Is Characteristic

The shrewdness demonstrated in centuries of bitter, continuous warfare helps the Apache cowman of today.

Tradition says they came from Canada's northwest. Natural fighters, tireless and relentless, they swept over the cliff dwellers of this area, then forged further south. For generations before the coming of pioneer Americans, the Apaches battled Spaniards and Mexicans, killing, looting and kidnaping.

As American settlers pressed westward, they found the Apache the most warlike tribe in the Southwest. In Geronimo they met one of the craftiest and most powerful leaders in the West.

Killed 2,000 Pioneers

The Apaches ravaged and plundered the countryside, killing an estimated 2,000 pioneers in addition to U. S. soldiers. Even after the defeat and capture of Geronimo, the Apache Kid and a group of renegades terrorized parts of the Southwest. The last real fight between the Apache and white men was in 1900.

The nomadic Apaches confined to the San Carlos Reservation in the White Mountains of Arizona were given an area of rugged land about 100 miles square. The district was not rich in resources, but contained more than 1,000,000 acres of grazing land.

It seemed easier for the Indians to lease their valuable ground to the white man. Cattle companies moved in, hiring Indians as cowhands.

Staged A Comeback

The Apaches were shrewd enough to see that their land was being abused and overgrazed. Many of them were good cowmen, and decided they could get along by themselves. As a result of an Apache appeal to Washington, the cattle companies were told to remove their stock from the reservation.

During the past 25 years the Indians have improved their ranges, built fences, dug wells and changed

Big Fishing Fleet Planned For Poland

WARSAW —(AP)—The semi-official Polish newspaper Rzeczpospolita said a fishing fleet capable of supplying 140,000,000 pounds of fish annually for the home market is being planned under the three-year investment program of the chief maritime institute. The journal said "this should contribute to a general improvement in Poland's food situation and protect at the same time the cattle population."

Hunting Ain't What It Used To Be

HELENA, MONT. —(AP)—Hunters expect a good 1946 season in Montana but it won't be so much like it was 45 years ago when the 1901 season ran from September 1 through December 31 and each license holder was entitled to kill eight deer, eight mountain goats, eight mountain sheep and eight antelope.

Note to the steak-hungry: That would total up to about two tons of meat.

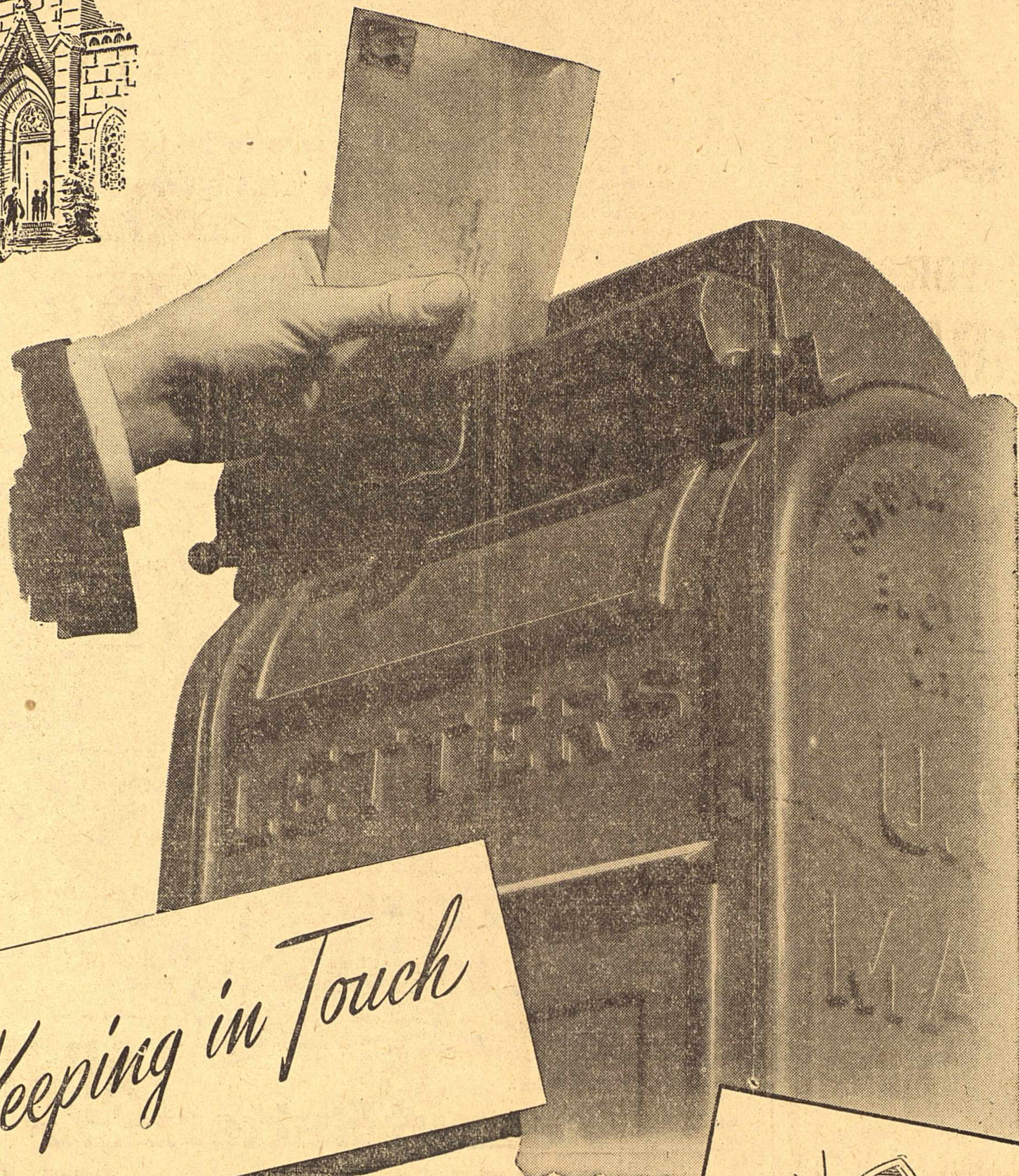
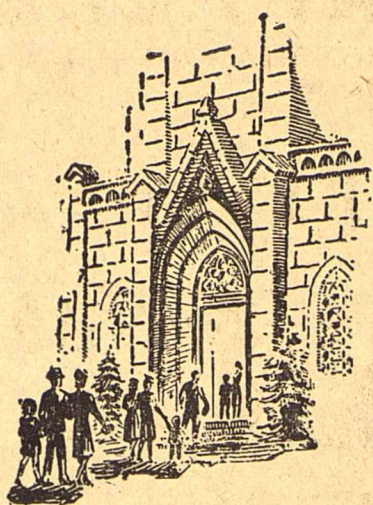

Krupp Munitions Family Scattered By Death, Illness

ESSEN, GERMANY—(P)—The Krupp munitions family, like thousands of other German families, now is scattered by death, illness and the aftermath of war.

It was different in the summer of 1939 when nine members of the Krupp family posed for a huge oil portrait that reflected unity, security and wealth.

The canvas, 10 feet high and 18 feet wide, still hangs in the Krupp estate, Villa Hugel, now occupied by British authorities in charge of Ruhr coal.

Painted by the English artist, George Harcourt, it shows the family gathered before a large tapestry. From left to right:

Berthold, third son, then about college age, wearing a dark coat and flannel trousers, standing with his arms reclining on the back of a chair—now living in Austria.

Married to Baron
Irmgard, eldest daughter, seated in the chair and wearing a green dinner dress and pearl necklace—married to Baron Raitz Von Frenz and living in Hannover.

Alfried, eldest son, seated on the arm of the chair, dressed in a gray business suit with black and red striped tie—director of the Krupp works in Essen, he was arrested at Villa Hugel when American troops took the town shortly before the war ended. Disposition of his case still is to be determined.

Herald, fourth son, then about high school age, wearing sports clothes with a fawn colored sweater and white sport shirt—captured by the Russians at Bucharest.

Waltraut, youngest daughter, a child of about 12 with blonde curls, wearing a pink dress with white collar, white socks and black leather slippers—married to a wool merchant.

Eckbert, youngest son, about 10 years old, dressed in a white eon type suit with white socks and low black shoes—killed in Italy in April, 1945, while serving with the German army.

Bertha, the mother, seated in a chair, wearing a blue dinner dress, pearls and a white shawl over her shoulders, and holding the youngest boy's hand—living in Austria.

Krupp Is Ill
Gustav, the father and head of the once-powerful Krupp dynasty. He looks the part of a big industrialist. Aman with steel gray hair, ruddy complexion and alert expression, he stands, in morning attire with winged collar, behind his wife. He was saved by illness from going on trial with Hermann Goering and 20 other Nazi leaders at Nuernberg. Depending on his recovery he still faces the possibility

of liquid to the type of shortening chosen.

A little frosting goes a long way if you use it to decorate the squares with cat's faces, bats, Jack O'Lanterns, or other spooky symbols. Light your table with eerie candlelight; use the molasses cake as a centerpiece and flank it with bowls of apples and nuts and brimming mugs of cider.

Party Molasses Cake

Two and one-quarter cups sifted cake flour, 1 1/2 teaspoons double-acting baking powder, 1/2 teaspoon soda, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1 1/2 teaspoons cinnamon, 3/4 teaspoon ginger, 1/4 cup sugar, 1/2 cup shortening, 2 eggs, unbeaten, 1 cup molasses, 3/4 cup milk (minus 2 tablespoons, if butter, margarine or lard is used).

Sift flour once; measure into sifter with baking powder, soda, salt, spices and sugar. Have shortening at room temperature; mix or stir just to soften.

Sift in dry ingredients; add milk and mix until all flour is dampened. Then beat TWO minutes. Add eggs and molasses and beat ONE minute longer.

Turn into 10x10x2-inch pan. Pan should be lined on bottom with paper, then greased.

Bake in moderate oven (350 degrees F.) 40 minutes, or until done. Serve warm, plain or with applesauce or foamy sauce, or cut in squares and top with Hallowe'en symbol in frosting put on through a pastry tube.

Baked Apples With Honey Filling
Wash and core the apples. Leave part of the core in the bottom of the apples, to act as a plug. Fill the cavity with honey, using as much as the tartness of the apples requires.

For variety, add a bit of lemon juice, or a few cinnamon candies. Or stuff the cavity with raisins and dates or other fruit combinations.

Engine Stowaway Makes Good

DARWIN—Bas Wie, a 12-year-old Indonesian boy who flew from Koepang to Darwin in an engine nacelle of a Dutch Dakota, has been given his equivalent of "Log cabin to White House" promotion.

In Koepang, Timor, Bas Wie was a cook's offsider in an Indonesian kitchen; in Australia—where he has been given permission to remain—he is scheduled to go to Government House under the care of Northern Territory Administrator A. R. Driver.

Bas Wie stowed away in the Dakota nacelle on August 8. Three hours later, burnt in places, cold in others, he landed on Darwin air-rome, where a mechanic found him, unconscious, still twined round the mechanism inside the nacelle. He has since spent many weeks in Darwin Hospital.

Now Administrator Driver has said he intends to take Bas, an orphan, to Government House to live and work after his recovery. An exception has been made in Australia's no-Asiatic immigration policy.

Now she made her tricky play. She led the queen of clubs, and while declarer's proper play might have been to cover with dummy's king, he made the mistake of playing low.

Mrs. Glick then led the king of diamonds to kill dummy's queen. Her partner trumped with the eight of spades and led back a small club. Mrs. Glick won and played a small diamond, and declarer sent a boy, trumping with the seven of spades. North over-trumped with the nine and returned the eight of clubs. Declarer elected to discard one of his losers, so South trumped with the deuce of spades, then played the jack of hearts. Declarer went up with the ace, cashed the king of spades, but his contract was down one trick.

Many an expert has fallen for the play of the queen from the ace-queen. It will not work often, but when it does, it is a lot of fun.

The Auckland Zoo would like a duck-billed platypus, one of the world's queerest creatures which lays eggs and suckles its young, but the government will not allow it to send the kiwi egg overseas.

The kiwi, New Zealand's strange wingless bird, is becoming increasingly rare. The birds are strictly protected and the government fears that if one egg were sent out of the country, zoos all over the world would want them and the number of kiwis remaining in New Zealand would be still further reduced.

SYDNEY—(AP)—What is believed to be the world's longest fence stretches for 1,969 miles from Bedford Harbour, in Western Australia, to the Indian Ocean.

It is rabbit-proof throughout and was built by the state government of Western Australia in an attempt to keep destructive hares out of the fertile coast belt.

The fence consists of three units, which are joined. The longest stretches unbrokenly for 1,200 miles.

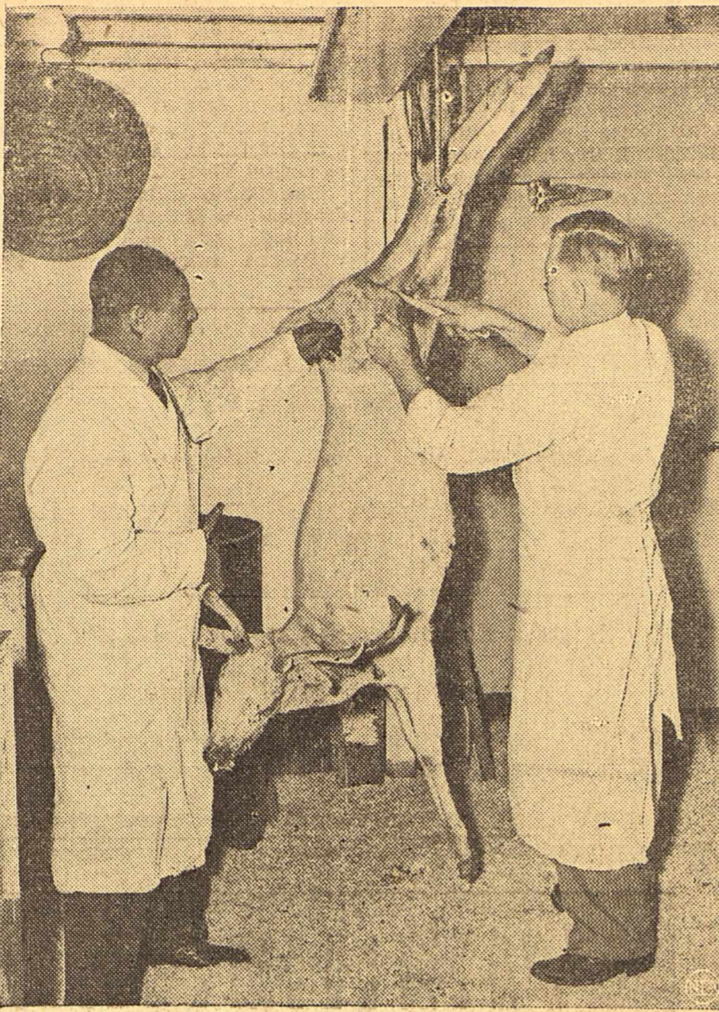
