"The national goals are still being drawn up and won't be ready for a day or so," commented B. F. Vance of College Station, Texas state director of the Production and Marketing Administration "Every indication points to an increase in the cash crops in Texas-

cotton, wheat, peanuts and rice, "There probably will be a total increase of three to five per cent in the acreage planted next year. about 25 per cent in cotton acreage, and in Texas it probably will be Director To Be Elected almost that great."

Big Cotton Increase The Texas increase in cotton will be principally in East and West Texas, particularly in the latter section of the state because recent rains have put the soil in excellent condition and assured underground moisture, he explained.

Vance estimated that the Winter wheat now being planted in Texas probably will exceed the 6,000,000acre goal which had been established.

The recent rains have put the ranges in the western part of Texas in such good condition that cattle growers can keep their stock and wait for more favorable prices, Vance said. He noted that a protein feed shortage was one of the biggest problems facing livestock producers who couldn't depend on



## Federal Moving Day

There have been so many reports in the last few months concerning the government's reckless and wasteful handling of its surplus property that the average person probably has the notion the government is just as careless with everything it owns.

To allay that fear, here is a report of the careful job it does when office furniture is hauled among bureaus, offices, and buildings. It should be a source of great comfort to every taxpayer to discover that the minute stake he has in each federal chair, conference table, chart, file cabinet, and outer-office davenport is protected with the tenderest care and attention when being moved.

This is important, too, because moving federal furniture is a sizable operation in the Capital. It's the mark of a live bureau to shift various offices, equipment, and personnel around as much as possible. It's a sign they're

And then, each time a lesser government official gets an in-grade promotion it's an unwritten civil service regulation that he shift to new quarters. If he doesn't, it means he doesn't draw much water in the shop.

The same thing goes for every time a new section head is appointed, too. There must be a complete switch of all furniture to suit his particular esthetic notion of how the typewriters and cuspidors should be lined up.

It would be a green new section head, indeed, who failed to do this. He'd immediately lose the respect of his underlings and start out with two strikes against him. In short, moving the furniture is just about as significant an operation of the federal government as is collecting the taxes. That is why no effort is spared to assure that it is done properly.

## Page Charlie Dawes

The rash of congressional investigations now breaking out is probably a healthful thing. Following the rotten disclosures in the May-Garsson case, half a dozen other ham acts are getting a smearing. Shipbuilding profits, surplus property disposal, Senate and House election campaigns, the "dead horse" Canol, the Pan-American highway and Hawaiian construction scandals all are under

But some place in the proceedings, somebody ought to get up before one of these committees and tell 'em what Charlie Dawes told similar investigators 25 years ago, "Hell and Maria! We had a war to win".

General Dawes had been called to Washington for testimony because he had been on Pershing's staff, in command of Service of Supply. He spoke out in words that everyone could understand, to the effect that war in itself is wasteful and that all the penny-pinching accounting of peacetime economy couldn't be practiced when men were being killed and time was more important to save than money.

Industrialist Henry Kaiser had a golden opportunity to speak a piece of this kind in his appearances before the House Merchant Marine and Fisheries Committee, but, unfortunately, he blew his top and his lines. Thereby he failed to straighten out some of the lame-brain thinking.

## Scientific Snoozing

We see where science, having pretty well liked the problem of how to blow up or poison most of mankind, is again turning its attention to the familiar but still baffling phenomenon of sleep. At least some of the General Electric scientists are tackling it.

They're investigating, we understand, the claim of some experts (including your grandmother and ours) that it's the quality of the sleep you get in your first few hours in bed that counts. They're also investigating meteorological and seasonal factors. And they've already discovered that women are colder than men. Lower metabolism, that's why.

What may come of all this is a two-control automatic blanket, and perhaps one that can be heated regionally, or zonally, on each side. We're all for that, as any sensible person is bound to be. We don't know what such a gadget would do for sleep, but it looks like a great boon to domestic felicity.

We can see only one drawback. By the time Pa and Ma get the port and starboard sides of the electric blanket adjusted and have made further regional fore-and-aft regulations to their liking, it's just possible that one or more of those refreshing early sleeping hours might be
