

Meeting Ends Tuesday; Showdown Looms In NY

PARIS — (AP) — Russian Foreign Minister V. M. Molotov Monday attacked as "unsatisfactory" many of c o'n ference, presaging a showdown on leading issues in the four-power foreign ministers' New

York meeting. Molotov, charging that the United States had dominated the conference, upheld the Soviet Union's to \$300,000,000 reparations from Finland-a figure soon afterward ratified, over United States opposition, voiced by Sen. Arthur H. Vandenberg. The Michigan senator sought to reduce the reparations figure to \$200,000,000, but the conference voted this down 11 to 5.

Molotov remarked that only portions of the draft treaties with Italy, Romania, Bulgaria, Hungary and Finland pleased Russia and indicated that many of the issues would be thrown back into the Foreign Ministers Council where decisions must be unanimous.

He accused the United States Great Britain and France of "violating their agreements" and "retreating" from four-power accord in the adoption of "a number of anti-Democratic measures" in connection with Trieste.

He spoke critically of guarantees written into Balkan treaties for free navigation of the Danube and complained that the conference had refused to fix Bulgarian boundaries as of January, 1941—an action which would have given Bulgaria

As I have said before, mid-westerners are good card players, and I would not advise doubling them unless the double is a sound one. In today's hand, East should have known that a double with the sin-



gleton king of clubs might cost him the whole hand, as it did. South won the opening lead with the nine of spades and led a small club. He remembered East's double, and he did not want East in the lead to go through his king-jack of spades. As he did not care whether or not he lost an extra club trick, he went right up with the ace of clubs, in tending to play the heart suit. Of course the singleton king dropped, and when declarer ran the five good club tricks. East was in a bad way for discards. He let a couple of hearts go, so declarer was able to cash six clubs, five hearts, a diamond and a spade, making four overtricks on a contract which might easily have been defeated, because in most classes the declarer would have taken the club finesse.
