The landmark steel building, owned by Panhandle Compress & Warehouse, had been leased for the past seven years by La Mantia, Cullum, Collier & Co., Inc., for onion processing. It's where Dimmitt had held its annual Halloween Carnival the past several years.

A tornado with a "whipping tail"

dipped out of a violent storm cloud

early Sunday and shredded a huge onion-processing warehouse in North-

Luckily, no one was killed by the tornado, which struck at 1:07 a.m. according to time clocks recovered from the building's rubble Monday.

But Eloy Cano, a night watchman for LCC, received a broken nose and severe facial cuts, while another watchman, Henry Trevino, escaped the storm's fury by getting under an onion processing machine that was bolted to the building's concrete floor.

When he heard the tornadic roar, Cano got into his pickup-which was parked inside the building-and lay on the floor. But the tornado hurled a 2x4 board downward through the cab and it hit Cano in the face. Cano's pickup cab was later crushed by flying timbers and debris as the tornado hurled twisted sheet metal 600 yards

Cano was treated and released at Plains Memorial Hospital.

Loneta Jordan, who lives at 401 NW Fourth St., saw the tornado in the brightness of the staccato lightning that accompanied the storm. She confirmed that it traveled in an unusual southeastward direction-as indicated by the trail of debris from the vegetable shed-and said the funnel came down at a 45-degree angle, pointing southeast.

The tornado narrowly missed the hospital, she said.

"I was sitting in my living room and I heard the roar, like the engine of a freight train," Mrs. Jordan said. "I went to the front door and saw it forming. It was just the other side of the hospital, and it nearly scared the life out of me. I thought, 'Oh, my goodness, what if it hits the hospital?'

"When it got down low, the tail started whipping. I went to get my husband; it was just moving beyond our trees out in the front yard then. By the time we got back to the door, it was stirring up so much dust we couldn't see anything. Then it started raining mudballs.

"It happened so fast. When I first saw it, it was just forming and the tail was coming down. It moved out of sight in just a few seconds.

"It wasn't as big as most tornadoes, but it looked plenty big enough to me-I'm scared to death of clouds.

"We're lucky," Mrs. Jordan added. "I hate it that it hit the vegetable shed, but it could have been a lot worse."

The massive destruction at the big onion shed bore all the earmarks of a tornado. Not a wall was left standing in the huge building, which was 60 yards wide and 130 yards long.

Walls were ripped out by their foundation, and one 30-ft. wall section was hurled 200 yards. But loose onion sacks in opened boxes inside the building were left untouched.

Twisted sheet metal, power poles, beams, wall sections and wire were strewn everywhere. But front-loaders inside looked as if they had just been parked there.

Debris was scattered 600 yards or more southeast of the warehouse, but nearby buildings in the tornado's path-including several mobile homes and the Church of God of the Firstborn- were undamaged.

Lee Drake, LCC manager, said he expects the damage total to the building and equipment to be in the half-million-dollar range.

LCC started a massive clean-up operation Sunday morning in an effort to get its onion-processing equipment back into operation. company is getting help from all

"The Dimco plant here, and the Howard Gault plant and Barrett & Fisher in Hereford are processing onions for us until we can get back into operation," Drake said.

(The company had some 600 tons of onions "in the bag" and ready for processing, but there were few onions in the warehouse itself when the

"Southwestern Public Service has been knocking itself out to get electricity to us, and they think they'll have it ready to tie in Thursday morning [today]," Drake said.

"We think we've got our equipment all ready to go," Drake said. "Of course, the big test will come when we tie in the electricity. We could be delayed an extra day or two, but I hope not."

He added, "It gives you a good feeling when so many people are willing to help, without any monetary considerations. The power company, the machine shops, farmers, other shippers-just a whole bunch of people have really been great in helping us, and they've been going

way beyond the call of duty. "We had people in here at noon Sunday offering their services," he said. "Our own people worked extra on Sunday. The Compress people came in from Lubbock Sundaythey've been putting in double shifts, too-and have offered to let us use any of their other buildings. The insurance companies have sent people in to inventory for us, which they didn't have to do."

LCC is asking the public to stay out of the area, for safety's sake.

"There are nails sticking out of tin and boards that can ruin a tire or a foot," Drake said. "We wouldn't want anyone getting hurt."

Once the processing equipment is back in operation, it will have three The surrounding winds twisted six more weeks of work to do, "if we can get our big machine rolling again," Drake said. Field work in the strike-plagued onion harvest is expected to be finished in two more weeks.

"Now that we've had a hail, a strike and a tornado, we've got a man up in the elevator keeping a lookout for a tidal wave or volcano," he quipped.







On June 9, 1980 President Carter signed into law the Social Security Disability Amendments of 1980. In his statement accompanying the bill he said, "It forms a balanced package, with amendments to strengthen the integrity of the disability programs, increase equity among beneficiaries, offer greater assistance to those who are trying to work and improve program administration.

Popularly known as the Pickle Bill, sponsored by Representative Jake Pickle from Texas, it makes several changes in the disability program. It is designed to help disabled beneficiaries return to work by minimizing the risks involved in accepting employment.

Some of the specifics

-Automatic reentitlement to benefits if an attempt to return to work fails within one

-Continuing Medicare protection for up to three years after a person returns to work, and by providing immediate reentitlement to medical benefits if the individual subsequently returns to the disability rolls;

-By taking account of an individual's disability-related work expenses in determining eligibility for benefits.

These amendments also provide for a limitation on the maximum benefits available to the family of a disabled person. This is in response to the specific problem encountered by disabled workers who receive cash disability benefits that are greater than their







Interest gaining in furrow diking

By BARNEY G. LEE S.C.S., Dimmitt

Furrow diking is gaining renewed interest in Castro County. Methods of furrow diking were developed during the 1930's and the 1940's but were abandoned during the 1950's. However, today we find new interest because of rapid depletion of the Ogalalla Aquifer with better technology in applying furrow dikes on our farms.

Furrow diking is a system of constructing small basins in lister furrows to trap and hold water. A device has been developed which makes small dams in the lister furrow at prescribed intervals. This system then traps and holds water in the basin which in turn reduces runoff and increases available water for the crops being grown.

concern when furrow diking lost interest in the 1950's. However, weeds can now be controlled with herbicides instead of tillage; thereby reducing the need to travel through diked furrows. When cultivation is necessary, sweeps or lister bottoms can be mounted ahead of the front tractor wheels to remove the blocks. The blocks are then replaced behind the cultivating equipment. This is all done in one operation.

southern Great Plains are normally controlled by the available water. Cotton and grain sorghum are highly responsive to water, even one inch of additional stored water can produce significant yield increases. Furrow dikes give the farmer this added available water. This diking technique must be correlated with the time of greatest potential runoff and crop water use.



Each category or level of American education emerged, it is interesting to recall, at the same time and all within a single decade; the Boston Latin School came first, in 1635; Harvard College, the following year, 1636; and 1642 saw the first general law for compulsory education," Sherman said.

'In America, we did not limit education only to nobility. Had we done so, few, if any, of us could have attended. We have offered the benefits of education to all our citizens. Many of our problems arise as we continue to meet this challenge," he added.

"The state of Texas is part of this educational tradition. Our constitution recognizes the need for sound public education. Two million acres of land were set aside for higher education. Over 50 percent of each tax dollar is expended for education. Often we disagree with the allocation of funds, but as a state, the commitment is there," said Sherman.

'Recently I was asked to address a group of legislators from 15 southern states. I concluded my remarks with this statement: I am grateful for my experience in education. As the American dream says, education has been the gateway for people in If as an overworked, overlobbied representative, you ever lose faith in education, just go once more to a college or a high school commencement and shake hands with several hundred kids who have worked and studied hard.' "Many of them also have worked 20 to 40 hours a week to have the money to go to school. When you see the pride and joy of families who gave so much of themselves and their means to make this
