# Thomas Assessed Life In Dr. Hunt Slaying

Daughter Of Littlefield Physician And Texas Ranger Testify As State Sends Case To Jury

SWEETWATER - (AP) - Jim Thomas, 51-year-old convict, was convicted Saturday for a third time on a charge of murdering Dr. Roy E. Hunt of Littlefield and assessed a sentence of life imprisonment.

On two previous convictions of the same charge, juries had decided death should be the punishment.

A jury at Plainview first convicted Thomas, who was arrested Oct. 27, 1943, a day after the bodies of Dr. and Mrs. Hunt were found mutilated and bound in bed at their residence. He was tried only in the death of Dr. Hunt. Thomas won a re-trial because of a jury irregularity and the case then was tried at Lamesa on a change of venue. The Lamesa jury also convicted Thomas.

After the conviction at Lamesa January 12, 1945, attorneys for Thomas filed motion for a new trial which got underway here on a change of venue this week. The Sweetwater jury received the case about midnight Friday.

The state rested its case Friday night after the Hunts' eight year-

night after the Hunts' eight yearold daughter, Joan, testified that on the night of the slaying she was awakened by her mother's screams. She went into her parents' room and "a big man, wearing black shoes, picked me up and put me in the clothes closet," she said.

Picture Introduced Levi Duncan, a Texas Ranger Friday identified a picture intro-duced as evidence as that of an automobile which Red Craig had testified he loaned to Thomas in Amarillo the day before the Hunts were slain. The picture was taken by Aubrey Fawver, Lubbock identification officer.

Duncan testified that car tracks in an alley near the Hunt home corresponded with tire marks on the Craig car. He also identified pieces of metal as having been sawed from a fender of the same car. He said they were scratched and indented as if by a blow from a hard object. He said a piece of concrete in the Hunt alley showed that a car had backed into it.

On cross - examination, Defense Attorney Farmer of Waco read from the transcript of Duncan's testimony at Thomas' previous trials to show that the Ranger had not then mentioned the picture, concrete block or pieces of metal.

### Slavs Deny 165 Americans Held As 'Slave Labor'

WASHINGTON -(P)- The United States charged wrathfully Friday night that Soviet-dominated Yugoslavia has made "slave laborers" of at least 165 American citizens and that a number of them, possibly 10, have died in horror

In a blistering note expressing "abhorrence and condemnation," the State Department accused the Tito regime of herding persons with a valid claim to American citizenship into concentration camps, of maltreating them so cruelly that some died, and of hiring the survivors out to private individuals to

work long hours without pay. The United States note declared that enemy soldiers captured in the heat of battle get better treatment under international law. A statement from the Yugoslav

embassy Saturday denied the American charges. Issued by Sergeije Makiedo, charge d'affaires, it said: "I most emphatically deny that any Americans are being subjected to slave labor in Yugoslavia, or that slave labor conditions exist in

# Choice Steers Close Week At Higher Value

Growing Consumer Resistance Reported

CHICAGO—(AP)—The removal of OPA controls has sent the price pattern for most major items in the American food budget into a dizzy whirl and there were indications Saturday of a growing consumer resistance to those products which turn up with

a higher sales tag. The impact of sudden decontrols hit the markets an erratic blow and it was too early to tell how the food dollar of the near future would compare with its buying power of last week.

The major staple decontrolledmeat-promises to be relatively plentiful in butcher shops across the nation in a few days but at prices above old OPA ceilings. Dealers, consumers and trade associations have joined hands in efforts to keep prices down. The prices of all livestock shot

up, despite an avalanche of receipts, and record highs were established in some markets. Both cattle and hog prices, however, experienced downward arends when offerings were the heaviest.

In the commodity markets, the price of soybeans, lard and flax also went up. Some Prices Drop

However, a long list of commodities dropped in price, including poultry, eggs, butter, wheat and cotton. Sources attributed the butter drop to the removal of ceilings

on other fats and oils. The American Meat Institute saying prices would be higher until demand is met, urged housewives to "shop around for the best buys. Some dealers refused to buy mea at high prices and the president of the New Jersey Independent Butchers' Association urged consumers to "strike" until meat prices

It makes no difference whether the vocation or call is for one to be a doctor, a lawyer, a preacher or a shoe-

A strike once set him back to railroad cleaner again. Defeat at the polls interrupted his parliamentary car-eer for nearly 10 years. But he never stopped working.

Dr. Evatt turned from a university to a law career and at 36 became the youngest man ever appointed as judge of the Australian High Court. Then he became the first man ever to resign from the High Court to re-enter politics. He represented Australia at the United Nations organizational meetings in San Francisco, at U.N. sessions in New York City, and then at the Paris Peace Conferences. Everywhere he has been recognized as spokesman for the "little" powers. Today Evatt is back in Australia

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

Goodman, noted that colds were very rare among the soldiers. The cause, in those few cases, he said, was that they wore too many clothes and didn't take them off fast enough while working.

Plans To Go Back For all his Texas patriotism, Goodman can't get Alaska out of his blood.

"I'm definitely going back up there some day," he said. "It is a hunter's and fisherman's paradise. It's like walking into a dream world. The territory has multitudes of moose, caribou, bear, mountain sheep, grouse, ducks and geese-by the millions.

Hunted Animals For Rations "Many of the meat rations for the American troops were from the wild game along the highway. Regular hunting squads went out to bring in the game.

"Wolves and bears were in abundance. No one was ever attacked by the wolves. The stories told back in the States are far-fetched. Wolves or bears will attack only when crowded up where they can't get out or in extreme cases when they can't get food.



#### Would-Be Censor

A literary organization as hard-boiled as some of his literary characters is the new creation of James M. Cain, author of "The Postman Always Rings Twice" and other rough and rowdy fiction. Called the American Authors Authority, it seems designed to be a closed-shop clearing house for magazine, screen and radio writers.

All writers in these fields, it seems, would have to belong to guilds representing their various professions. Once joined up, they could send their works to the AAA, which would handle the copyright and marketing. It would lease material only to such magazines and radio and movie firms "as comply with the basic agreements of these guilds." In other words, the AAA would have the market sewed up at both ends.

uation with the writers doesn't fit these models.

ASCAP came into being largely to protect song writers who formerly had to sell all rights to their work for whatever a publisher offered them. If the song was a hit, the publisher might sell a million copies. But the composer and lyric writer didn't get a cent in royalties.

Petrillo imposed a tax on records for the same basic reason. His musicians got naid for making a record, but a radio station might use this same record over and over free economy—that free enterprise again on paid broadcast time.

#### Bodies Of Fliers Found In Heroes Grave In Holland

VERSAILLES, FRANCE -(AP)-The American Army graves registration command, in final reports issued here, told how the bodies of 11 United States Army air corps fliers, missing since Sept. 9, 1944, were found in recent Scandinavian operations of a U.S. Army disinterment team.

The crew in a four-engined bomber bound with heavy cargo for Norwegian underground forces crashed into towering Mount Skorvejfell, in the Telemark Mountains, shortly after midnight on Sept. 10,

The disinternment team found that their bodies had been buried in a common grave by loyal Norwegians with a stone marker nearby engraved "they gave all a man can give for freedom and peace Fresh flowers decorated the white

cross marking each grave, the reoort said-flowers that had been renewed regularly throughout nearly two years until the American squad could reach the grave and bring the bodies back. Other Army searching teams pushed nearly 300 miles north of

the Arctic circle as far as Hammerfest, Norway, and brought back 44 bodies of Americans, many of them underground liaison men of the Office of Strategic Services.

The Norway mission was headed by Lt. Col. W. A. Cauthen, or Orangeburg, S. C.

The ten of spades was then West won with the king and shifted to a club, East winning with the ace. At this point all East had to do was to lead a diamond and West would get a trump in.



Rather it was a growing feud with Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek and considerable integrated back-stabbing that removed Stilwell in the autumn of 1944. when only minor clean-ups remained before the road was opened to Kunming and Chungking in Janu-
