Cockreham to Run Hospital

In a special meeting last Thursday afternoon, the Plains Memorial Hospital board hired Jerry Cockreham, Dimmitt Junior High School teacher, as the new hospital dministrator.

AND IN AN unexpected action, the board also for the first time hired a separate business manager for the hospital.

Cockreham, 27, will succeed Don Newman, who resigned as administrator two weeks ago to take a State Department post in South Vietnam.

The new administrator will take the helm of the hospital Oct. 30 at a salary of \$750 per month.





Therefore, even from a selfish point of view, one should support the Church for the sake of the welfare of himself and his family. Beyond that, however, every person should uphold and participate in the Church because it tells the truth about man's life, death and destiny; the truth which alone will set him free to live as a child of God.

The poor manager will wait until his beans are ready before he gets his machine ready and limp through his harvest without replacing worn parts or making necessary adjustments to do the best com-

Check your combine thoroughly. Replace worn parts and cracked V-belts. Check slip clutches. Check engine speed, beater speed, and cylinder speed. Make sure that these are set according to the manufacturer's specifications for soybeans. Locate all adjustments and know how to use them.
