Texas voters were straggling to the polls Tuesday through rain, mud and snow to cast ballots in a biennial general election which is considered necesary only to place a formal stamp of approval on a slate of Democratic candidates

Political leaders have indicated they will be as surprised to see a vote of more than 250,000 as they would to see a handful of Republican candidates make a race out of the necessary formal-



By JAMES MARLOW WASHINGTON, -(P)-The resilents of the District of Columbia-Washington, D. C.-will vote Tuesday on whether they'd like to be allowed to vote.

Which means 1. To vote for their own city officials. They can't now. The federal government appoints the city officials. Under the U.S. Constitution Congress is boss of Washington. It is. It runs the show.

2. To vote for president, vice president, and their own representatives in congress. There's nothing Department Store here to assist in the Constitution giving the people here the right to vote for President, Vice President or to be represented in Congress.

So the 900,000 people living in Washington are voteless except for those who came from states which permit former residents of those states to cast absentee ballots for federal officials. More Persons Than 11 States

Yet the 900,000 population cent drive for Boy Scout funds larger than the population of 11 states whose people have full voting rights and can elect their own representatives and senators to Congress.

(Those states are Arizona Deleware, Idaho, Maine, Montana, Nevada, New Hampshire, New Mexico, North and South Dakota and Rhode Island.)

Between 100,000 and 400,000 persons are expected to cast a ballot Tuesday on the two questions outlined above.






