

**NOTICE OF HEARING**

Notice is hereby given that a public hearing will be held before the CITY COUNCIL of the City of Midland, Texas, at the City Hall in said City, on November 20, 1946, at four o'clock P. M., on the following petition of C. M. Dunagan to formally close a portion of Carrizo Street in said City:

"PETITION"

THE STATE OF TEXAS, COUNTY OF MIDLAND, NCW CMES C. M. Dunagan, the undersigned petitioner and would respectfully show to the Mayor and City Council of the City of Midland in Midland County, Texas, the following:

THAT C. M. Dunagan is the record owner of Lots 7 to 12, inclusive, in Block 90, Original Town of Midland, in Midland County, Texas, said property being bounded on the north by Missouri Avenue and on the west by Carrizo Street, which terminates with its intersection of A Street on the west side of said property above described, the location of the south end of Carrizo Street and its intersection with A Street being more particularly shown by a sketch of a portion of a map of the City of Midland which is attached hereto, made a part hereof and marked Exhibit A.

THAT at the time Missouri Avenue was paved, it was informally agreed by and between the undersigned as the sole owner of the only property adjacent to that part of Carrizo Street at its intersection with A Street, and the City of Midland and its then mayor and city council that that portion of Carrizo Street adjoining, adjacent and contiguous to the west side of the property above described was not necessary or required as a public street or highway since it intersected with A Street at that point and A Street was sufficiently wide and properly located to care for all north and south traffic at that site and that the City of Midland would close that portion of Carrizo Street aforesaid adjacent to said lots 7 to 12, inclusive, in Block 90, if the undersigned as the sole owner of the property adjacent thereto would pay for the paving of that portion of Missouri Avenue which would constitute the north boundary of the portion of Carrizo Street to be closed.

That acting in pursuance to said agreement that portion of Carrizo Street adjacent to the property of the undersigned was closed by the City, a curb was built at the north

boundary line of said closed portion thereof, and the undersigned paid for the cost of such curb and paving on Missouri Avenue adjacent and contiguous to the north boundary line of said closed portion of Carrizo Street, that portion so closed and its present location upon the ground being shown by a sketch marked Exhibit B and attached hereto and made a part hereof as if set out herein.

THAT notwithstanding the informal agreement of the City officials and of the undersigned, no proceedings have ever been instituted for the formal closing of said portion of Carrizo Street and the abandonment thereof by the city, although the street was physically closed a number of years ago.

WHEREFORE, the undersigned respectfully requests and petitions the mayor and city council of the City of Midland, Texas, after due notice of filing of this petition and a hearing had pursuant thereto, to close and vacate, officially that part of said street above described, confirming the physical closing thereof as accomplished by informal agreement of the undersigned and the City of Midland some years ago; to divest the city council and the City of Midland of such title thereto as it may have acquired by virtue of the dedication of said street at the time of the dedication of the townsite of the original town of Midland, and to vest in the undersigned, the owner of all the property adjoining, abutting and contiguous to the east side of that portion of Carrizo Street above described and his heirs and assigns, such title as the City Council and the City of Midland have in and to the same, there being no property contiguous to the south side of the south end of Carrizo Street and the same being bounded on the west and north by A Street and Missouri Avenue, respectively.



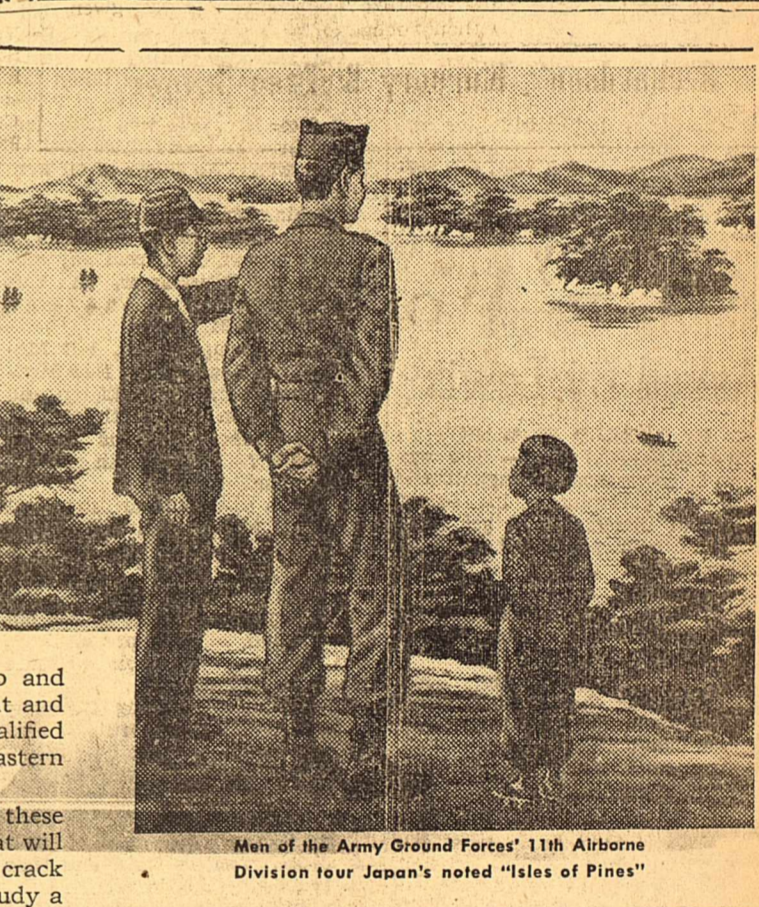

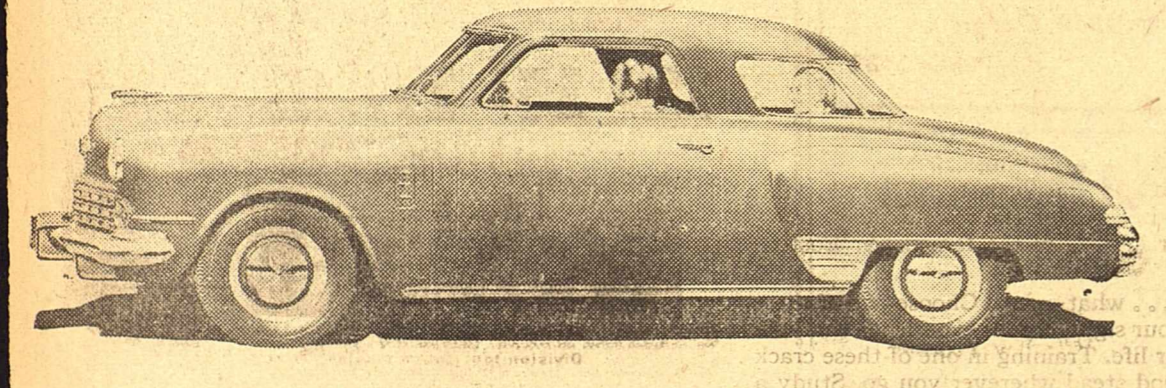

## Simple But Appropriate

Five men stood together under a tree on the White House lawn. They were not famous men, as fame is usually defined. But as President Truman said in announcing their appointment to the Atomic Energy Commission, they had just been given "responsibilities as great as any men have ever assumed in peacetime."

Their first meeting was not in itself important or productive. If it is remembered at all, it will be for its indication of how completely they started from scratch. These men were inheriting a tremendous task, and with it tremendous properties and organizations. But at the first meeting they did not even have an office.

They were simply five men successful in their various endeavors and unselfishly conscious of their duties as citizens. To them the President had assigned responsibility for the use of materials, patents and processes which human minds had put together to harness the greatest power that man had ever controlled.

The harnessing of that power began in the minds of men. It grew into something expressed in billions of dollars, thousands of workers, thousands of victims killed in an unsuspected flash. It threatened to get out of hand and destroy its controllers. So the problem of controlling the controllers came back to the minds of men—in our country, to the minds of the five men standing under a tree.

Soon these men will be in surroundings considered more fitting to the importance of their work. They will have suites of offices and staffs of advisers and assistants. They will have eventual fame. They will also lead a life divorced from many personal associations and all acquisitive pursuits, pledged to closest secrecy until the mysteries can safely be revealed.

But it is probably well that the beginning was simple and humble. It was a forceful illustration that the threat of destruction must be averted by individual, mortal men, and that their only real equipment for the task lies within themselves.

Where, then, was there a better setting than out-of-doors beneath a tree? It was a setting inclined to put man in his proper perspective. It was also a setting inclined to put him in a hopeful frame of mind. For some of the world's wisest thinking and talking has been done in just such surroundings.

It is said that Socrates spent almost his entire life out-of-doors, going inside only to eat, sleep, and probably—being a wise man—to keep out of the rain. Nor is he alone among the great philosophers who could dispense with classroom and desk and the great religious teachers who had no need of pulpits.

It is no different today. The power of good or evil is not inherent in the trappings of modern life. It does not reside in laboratories or machines, even in those whose products called the Atomic Energy Commission into being. The salvation of civilization still rests with the wisdom, integrity and courage of mortal minds, whatever their surroundings.

## Democrats Not Sure Of 1948 Campaign

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Some traces of doubt that President Truman will seek renomination in 1948 appear to be cropping out among Democrats.  
Any possible developments along this line in the next two years seem likely to depend on whether the Republicans win an administration-discrediting victory Tuesday and the future trend of economic conditions.  
While leaders ostensibly are centering their whole attention now on the battle for control of Congress, a tour of politically important states disclosed evidence that both Democrats and Republicans are giving a lot of thought to the forthcoming presidential contest.  
If he wants it, the President's renomination seems about as certain as anything in politics. But this reporter found evidence that Democrats in some states are thinking in terms of other candidates for a 1948 battle which doubly will be difficult for them if the Republicans win control of Congress Tuesday.

**Government Aid Sought To Extend Water And Sewerage Connections**  
 WASHINGTON—(AP)—With cities running out of improved land, government financial help may be proposed to permit extending sewer, water and other facilities to potential home sites.

Housing Expediter Wilson Wyatt declared in his monthly report that to a "far greater degree" than during 1945 new houses next year will have to be built on raw land in the outskirts of cities.

To a reporter's question whether the cost of improving such sites would require federal help, Wyatt responded: "By the time Congress meets in January, there undoubtedly will be a recommendation with regard to federal aid."

**Declines To Elaborate**  
 The housing chief, already tangled in conflict with the Reconstruction Finance Corporation over his plans to grant \$65,000,000 in federal loans to prefabricators, declined to elaborate.

The report, however, forecast that the 1,500,000 new homes and apartments scheduled to be started in 1947 will create a serious problem, especially since many will be big developments which must reach into suburban areas for large parcels of land.

"Little difficulty is expected with respect to water service because of its revenue-producing character, but extension of sewers and provision of educational facilities may run into financial difficulties in some communities," the report predicted.

The young rider was scheduled to spend Monday night in Odessa and continue the next morning along Highway 80.


**New Police Officer Added To Department**

At one table West opened the seven of spades, East put on the queen and South won. He led a small club to the king and played the four of hearts from dummy, intending to finesse the nine, but East put on the ten. Declarer won with the king, ran off the five club tricks, then led a heart. He refused to take the finesse, realizing that if West had five hearts to the

queen, he would have opened that suit instead of the short spade suit. Of course the queen dropped and declarer made five trump.

When Mayor Jeffries defended the hand, he sat East and his partner opened the deuce of hearts. The four was played from dummy, the Mayor played the ten. South won with the king and then led the nine of hearts. He figured that West must have the queen to open that suit, so he took the finesse.

The Mayor won and promptly laid down the jack of diamonds. South played low and the Mayor continued with the ten of diamonds. Once again South played low, attempting to block off the diamond suit, but Mayor Jeffries now laid down the ace of diamonds and ran off the rest of his diamond tricks.

With his heart trick the contract was set two, while at the other table declarer made five-odd.

The second declarer lost the hand because he was greedy. He should not have risked the heart play, especially with an unprotected diamond suit. He should have run off his five club tricks and in all probability the discards would have given him a clue to the proper play.

**Army And Irish Top Grid Poll**

NEW YORK —(AP)—It didn't take a recount Tuesday to determine the results of the weekly election of college football's two most popular candidates.  
Even before the ballot boxes were opened in The Associated Press weekly poll of sports writers throughout the nation, the outcome was certain. Army and Notre Dame had been awarded another of those landslide votes that kept the two teams in the forefront as the people's choices this fall.  
The principals in football's national championship classic at Yankee Stadium this Saturday have been up there with monotonous regularity every week but one since this year's poll started. That week the voters put the dark-horse candidate, Texas, over Army and dropped Notre Dame to third place.  
Penn., to the surprise of practically no one, lost its hold on third place due to the Quakers' 17-14 upset by Princeton, and skidded to ninth. Penn's former spot at No. 3 was filled by Georgia.  
University of California at Los Angeles retained fourth place, and Rice, No. 8 last week advanced to No. 5, with Texas moving up a notch to sixth place. Tennessee went from tenth place to seventh.  
**Georgia Tech To Eighth Place**  
Georgia Tech went from 16th to eighth.

Based on the usual system of ten points for a first-place vote, nine for a second, eight for a third, and so on, Army piled up 1,176 points, 471 less than last week.
