President Seeks abor Armistice

By MARVIN L. ARROWSMITH

WASHINGTON -(P)- President Truman Monday advocated an armistice between labor and management in his first public statement since he junked wage and price controls.

Wartime curbs on the two groups were lifted after five years when Truman swept ceilings off all items except rents, sugar and rice. Rent increases appeared "inevitable" to some government officials.

The subject of a labor-management truce came up at the President's Armistice Day news conference when a reporter asked whether he*-

had noted such proposals. Truman replied that he Pool Wildcat In had not heard of the suggestions, but said it is just what he has been urging since August, N-E Edwards To he has been urging since August, 1945, when the war ended. The Chief Executive killed off the Run Casing price and wage controls in a week-

end order, declaring: "I am convinced that their further continuance would do the nation's economy more harm than good.

At the same time the Chief Executive placed "squarely upon man-agement and labor" the "responsifor economic stability. bility"

His decontrol edict brought immediate promises from industry and business leaders that prices will be held at reasonable levelsafter a period of adjustment. "If Wages Don't Rise"

From labor unions, many of which already are seeking higher pay to offset living cost increases, there was nothing but silence on the President's action.

On the coal, steel, auto and several other fronts there is plenty of potential trouble if management and labor deadlock as they did a few .months back.

While the unions said nothing, the United States Chamber of Commerce called on labor to exercise "self-restraint" in wage demands and in the use of the strike weapon to enforce wage demands.



If Lewis doesn't come out of the present conference with a new contract to his liking, he can give his countrymen another coal strike for Thanksgiving, with prospects of stalled transportation and cold furnaces for Christmas. Already Lewis has the best contract he ever nego

Already Lewis has the best contract he ever negotiated. It was so full of new and expensive clauses that the operators took one look and then took their departure. The government had to come in, sign the contract at Lewis' terms, and agree to run the mines in order to end the last strike.

Now, of course, Lewis wants more. He's not inter-ested in any cost-of-living adjustment. He wants a fiveday, 40-hour week instead of the present six-day, 54-hour schedule—at the same money, of course.

If past history is an indication, he'll get it. And if past history is to be trusted a bit further, he'll demand a new contract with more favorable concessions when and if he resumes negotiations with the private operators.

Whether the mine operators will be able to keep on meeting Lewis' demands and still stay in business is a question. But there is less question that Lewis, by getting what he wants from the government, will start a whole new cycle of wage and other demands in other industries. The result-less production, more unemployment, more high prices, more inconvenience, more dissipated purchasing power.

Thus John L. Lewis continues to bend the United States government and the national economy to his will. It's no wonder that the American public, according to a recent Roper poll, considers him one of the most disliked labor leaders in the country. But somehow it seems that a more active defense than that is needed against the power of his private dictatorship.
