

Thousands Of Coal Miners Quit Work

Jester Says Oil Industry To Be Consulted About Railroad Commission Appointment

Governor-elect Beauford H. Jester said here Monday efficiency and oil experience, rather than political considerations, will prevail in the appointment of his successor to the Texas Railroad Commission next January.

Commenting on an Associated Press story Saturday quoting the Houston Chronicle as saying William J. Murray, Jr., 32, of Houston and formerly of Abilene, "very likely" would get the appointment, Jester said, "Murray is receiving strong support from many quarters," but that the decision as to the appointment has not been reached yet.

Jester said the oil industry is being consulted concerning the knowledge and efficiency of several candidates and that the position is too important to be used as a political office.

"This may not be good politics, but efficient service is more important than politics," the governor-elect commented.

To those who have asked me who would be appointed as railroad commissioner I have consistently stated that my experience on the Railroad Commission has given me the opportunity to determine the qualities a man should have to successfully fill this position. He should possess these qualifications:

1. He must be honest; 2. He must be fair; 3. He should have a judicious temperament to enable him to analyze and decide the many controversial matters and applications that come before the Railroad Commission;

4. He must be industrious and accustomed to work; 5. He should have the ability to work harmoniously with the other two commissioners and the railroad personnel; and, 6. Be able to deal fairly with the industries regulated by the Railroad Commission and be able to get along with people.

"Since oil and gas regulation is the major problem of the Railroad Commission and gas conservation will be its greatest problem for the next two years, it would be highly desirable to select a man who, in addition to his other qualifications, has a professional experience with these problems."

Jester said he had made known to members of the various industries regulated by the commission the type of man that in his opinion should be appointed as his successor and that he had received suggestions from many parts of the state.

Jester said West Texas oil and gas development will make great strides in the future. "Oil development and the conservation of the Permian Basin have great potentialities." (Continued on page 2)

Eleven Texans Killed In Weekend Accidents

Eleven persons were killed in Texas during weekend accidents. Six of the victims lost their lives in traffic collisions and two others died in a plane crash. There were three homicides.

Latest victim was Ruth Reber, 19, of El Campo who died Sunday night in a head-on collision of two automobiles four miles west of Sealy on the Houston-San Antonio Highway.

Also at Houston, Miss Evelyn Herzik, 19, formerly of Schulenburg, died early Sunday of injuries received when struck by a hit-and-run driver Saturday night.

Two Dallas residents, Homer H. Maset, Jr., and Mrs. Zella Fae Jacobs, were killed Saturday night when their light plane crashed in a lake near Paris.

Paul Halle, 39, died in an Austin hospital early Saturday of injuries he had received in a hit-and-run accident last Tuesday.

Jess L. Lambert of Smackover, Ark., died Saturday when his car hit an underpass near Bryan.

At Dublin, Lawrence Elliott, Jr., 29, of San Angelo was fatally injured Saturday in an automobile accident.

A man tentatively identified as John P. Hudgens of Grandview, Johnson County, was killed early Saturday when struck by an automobile two miles east of Addicks.

Murder charges have been filed against L. L. Newland, 41, of Nacoma in connection with the fatal shooting Saturday of Arch Grapman, 53, former Fort Worth city fireman.

Late Friday at Austin, Daryl Pogue, 24, was shot to death with a .38 calibre pistol. A charge of murder has been filed against Tom Stephens, night club operator.

Austin police are also investigating the death of Henry L. Ford, former Austin city employee, who died there Friday night.

Sun's Wildcat In Coke Shows For New Discovery

Sun Oil Company No. 1 Jameson, Northwest Coke County wildcat, about 23 miles northwest of Robert Lee, has apparently discovered a new oil field from the crinoidal section of the Pennsylvanian.

After topping the lime at 6,200 feet, on an elevation of 2,080 feet, the project had traces of porosity, oil stain and fluorescence at 6,200-10 feet.

A core at 6,210-30 feet recovered five feet of lime. The last two feet of the recovery was very porous and saturated with high-gravity oil.

Sweet Gas And Oil A 45-mile, drillstem test was taken at 6,206-30 feet. Sweet gas showed at the surface in 29 minutes and there was a strong blow of gas the remainder of the period. Flowing pressure was 150 pounds and the gas volume was estimated at 2,000,000 cubic feet per day.

Recovery was 500 feet of sweet, green oil, of 47 gravity at 78 degrees—which would correct to about 44 degrees. Operator was taking a Schumberger survey Monday morning and was to follow that with running casing and making production tests.

Informed sources report that the wildcat likely can be completed as a producer, and a discovery.

Central Andrews Wildcat Anderson-Prichard Oil Corporation No. 1 H. M. Ford, six miles southwest of Andrews is to be a 4,600-foot wildcat to the middle Permian in Central Andrews County.

It is 467 feet from south and west lines of section 23, block A-43, psi survey. That puts it about one mile east of the nearest production on the east side of the Fuhrman-Mascho field and approximately three quarters of a mile north of nearest oil well in the southeast extension to that field. Drilling is to start at once.

Turner Taking DST Humble Oil & Refining Company No. 1 Mary Turner, East Midland County wildcat, about 12 miles south of Midland and in north-west quarter of section 43, block 37, W. T. Holcombe survey, T-2-S, was bottomed at 11,377 feet in the top of the Devonian lime, according to unofficial sources, and was taking a drillstem test.

Top of the formation has not been reported, and no information has been released as to whether or not any signs of production have been logged in the horizon. The Devonian is the producing zone in the discovery well of the Midland field, Humble's No. 1 Buchanan, two miles north of the No. 1 Turner.

L. W. Elliott, trustee, No. 1 Tisdale, Central Schleicher County wildcat, three and one-half miles east of Eldorado, and 600 feet out of northwest corner of section 16, block A, HE&WT survey, had treated at 2,654-92 feet, through casing, with 2,000 gallons of acid.

20,000 Miners Have Quit Work

PITTSBURGH—(AP)—About 20,000 miners quit work in four states Monday 72 hours ahead of the suspension deadline threatened in the nation's soft coal fields.

The idle included 6,500 in Pennsylvania, 6,000 in West Virginia, 5,800 in Illinois and 2,000 in Alabama. Heavy absenteeism from some working mines also was reported in some sections.

There are about 400,000 miners in the bituminous coal industry. Industry spokesmen said absenteeism in mines still operating was "running high" in some sections of the Pittsburgh area and "not too serious" in others.

Hardest hit was the Pittsburgh Coal Co., with five of its 14 mines closed and about 3,000 workers idle.

Western Pennsylvania has approximately 100,000 bituminous miners.

WASHINGTON (AP)—The Justice Department announced Monday Federal Judge Allen Goldsborough has signed a temporary order designed to restrain a walkout by John L. Lewis' 400,000 soft coal miners.

NANKING—(AP)—Sun Fo, American-educated son of Dr. Sun Yat-sen, founder of the Chinese Republic, was elected by acclamation Monday as temporary chairman of the National Assembly, convoked to draw up a new representative constitution for China.

Laborites Demand Free Socialist Foreign Policy

LONDON—(AP)—The United States Labor Monday in the line of fire of Secretary Ernest Bevin's policies, challenging the British Labor government's foreign policy in House of Commons debate.

Slated for an airing was a demand of 58 Laborite legislators for an "independent socialist foreign policy," tied neither to the United States nor to Russia, to prevent "another inevitable conflict" between American capitalism and Soviet communism.

This demand, a slap at Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin's policies, was in the form of an amendment which the 58 offered to the Labor Party's legislative program as presented by King George VI in an address opening Parliament last Tuesday.

The dissent was not regarded as a threat to Prime Minister Attlee's government. Most observers said in event of sharp criticism, Attlee probably would demand a vote of confidence, and they predicted he would win in such a case by a wide majority, since few, if any, insurgents would go so far as to vote against the government.

T. A. Moore Former Rancher Here, Dies

T. A. (Figger) Moore, 71, former Midland County rancher, died early Sunday at Eastland after an extended illness. Funeral services and interment were scheduled at that city Monday afternoon.

Moore came to Midland County in 1887 and ranched until eight years ago when his health broke. He then moved to Eastland.

Survivors include Mrs. John M. Cowden of Abilene and Mrs. A. Q. Cooper of Odessa, sisters. Other survivors include Mrs. Robert E. Estes, a niece; J. O. Cochran, nephew; R. B. and Dick Cowden, nephews; all of Midland.

Supreme Court Rules In Pipeline Case

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The Supreme Court split 5 to 4 Monday in its first formal opinion of the new term.

It upheld a ruling that an interstate pipe line built by the Champion Refining Company of Enid, Okla., makes the firm a common carrier under Interstate Commerce Commission jurisdiction.

Texans Urge Landlord Strike Against OPA

OKLAHOMA CITY—(AP)—A militant group of Texans, who declared a landlord's strike against the OPA already is sweeping the Lone Star State "like wildfire," urged the National Apartment Owners Association Monday to join in the move.

As the Texas group swung into action, other state representatives at the convention were busy. Some of them were urging that OPA be petitioned to grant a 15 per cent general increase in rentals while others were plumping for decontrol.

Russians Arrest Five U. S. Army Personnel

BERLIN—(AP)—An American lieutenant and four enlisted men were arrested Sunday by a Russian patrol for allegedly entering the Russian occupation zone without authorization, but prompt intervention by American authorities obtained their release after several hours. The U. S. provost marshal's office disclosed Monday.

French Communists Seek United Front

PARIS—(AP)—French communists weighed Monday a Communist proposal for a Leftist, united front which would give the New Fourth Republic the first Communist president in France's history.

They agreed to give the idea a hearing after a meeting of the Socialist National Council, just a week after the party took heavy losses in the election of the powerful national assembly.

San Angelo Singer Entertains Kiwanis

Arthur Herd, San Angelo singer, entertained the Midland Kiwanis Club at its meeting Monday in the Scharbauer Hotel. He was accompanied by Mrs. C. B. Beall of San Angelo.

President H. A. Ireland read Kiwanis committee assignments at the meeting and named Riley Parr as program chairman for the meeting next week. Parr is leader of the public affairs committee.

All charter members of the Midland club signed a paper which will be framed with the club's charter, which was received last week.

A short directors meeting was held following the luncheon.

Truman To Have Trouble Getting Party Support

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Signs multiplied Monday that President Truman will have difficulty getting united Democratic support for whatever legislative program he submits to the new Republican-dominated Congress in January. If he hopes to win it he may have to drop many past proposals.

Democratic leaders, still groggy from the Republican election landslide, have delayed any move to organize their forces for their new role in the minority.

They apparently are agreed, however, that Truman will write the official party program in his state of the union message. They seemingly have no intention of attempting to fix objectives, as the Republicans of both House and Senate already have done.

Truman has given no concrete indication yet of the direction he intends to pursue in his recommendations except to urge that the legislative and executive branches cooperate for the welfare of the nation.

State Department Frowns On Inquiry

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The State Department was reported Monday to frown on a proposed Senate investigation of the American military governments in Germany and Austria.

Senator Brewster (R-Maine) told reporters he understood that is the department's attitude. He predicted the Senate War Investigating Committee nevertheless will approve hearings in Europe although he said some Democratic members "have lost their enthusiasm."

West Coast Maritime Strike May End Soon

A tentative agreement halting the long West Coast maritime strike was reported Monday. Terms of the agreement were not made public pending union ratification meetings scheduled Monday.

If the terms are accepted by the workers, the 48-day tieup would end Wednesday morning. The dispute involved the CIO Marine Engineers Beneficial Association and the International Longshoremen's and Warehousemen's Association.

Officer Shoots Man To Death In Dallas

DALLAS—(AP)—City Detective Jack Dorris early Monday shot and killed a man he identified as Daniel Herbert Culpepper, 25, of Dallas, on a downtown street.

Dorris and Detective C. J. Sansone said Culpepper was sought for questioning in a series of armed robberies and drew a pistol when the officers encountered him and a 19-year old youth.

The detectives said Dorris seized Culpepper's shoulder with his left hand, spun him, drew his own gun and opened fire.

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Stabilization Director John R. Steelman Monday authorized government loans to producers of the 1946 corn crop at 90 per cent of the October 1 parity price.

Bevin To Urge Big Five For 'Conduct Code' In Veto Use

NEW YORK—(AP)—British Foreign Secretary Bevin intends to urge the big-five powers of the United Nations Monday to draft a new "code of conduct" restraining use of their veto power in the UN Security Council.

By such action Bevin and Secretary of State Byrnes were reported hopeful they could meet the anti-veto criticisms of small nations and simultaneously preserve cooperation with Russia. Soviet Foreign Minister Molotov agreed to talk things over. The formula of big-five private talks was used when the charter was written at San Francisco.

The United Nations itself was asked in a sense to sanction the procedure. France proposed that the assembly's political and security committee drop all veto discussions Monday until the foreign ministers have acted.

Byrnes called in Warren R. Austin, chief of the United States delegation to the United Nations, Senator Connally (D-Texas), an adviser, and Herschel Johnson, deputy delegation chief. They met behind closed doors an hour and a half before the scheduled opening of the big five meeting at 11 a. m. EST.

While the foreign ministers thus added to their problems, diplomats held high hope that one peace issue—Trieste—might be near settlement at last. They reported it probable that a break in the Trieste deadlock of the Italian peace treaty was at hand, though it could be upset by Russian insistence on setting a deadline for Britain and the United States to pull their troops out of Trieste.

If the deadlock is broken as quickly as some expect, it should allow the ministers to begin about midweek—as scheduled—their preliminary talks on the future of Germany.

Walkout Starts Three Days Before Deadline Set By John L. Lewis

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Defying the prospect of a government crack down on John L. Lewis, thousands of soft coal miners Monday laid down their tools three days ahead of a deadline set by the United Mine Workers chief.

As the walkouts spread, President Truman called for a showdown fight with Lewis and Attorney General Tom Clark summoned aides to another emergency session to explore possible court action against the UMW boss. It was the second such conference in as many days.

Truman was vacationing in Florida but intimates said he had left orders for subordinates in the capital to either smash Lewis' leadership of the miners or bring him to terms on a deal to keep mines going.

Lewis, rejecting a government proposal for a truce, has "terminated" the miners' wage contract effective Wednesday midnight—a signal for a complete shutdown in the mine fields. The government insists the contract still is effective.

In an effort to avert complete paralysis of industry, the government already has taken these two steps:

1. Posted notices at all mines appealing to the miners to stick to their jobs, despite Lewis, and pledging to "keep the mines open regardless of any action" by the union boss.

2. "Froze" coal stocks in dealers' hands and instituted rationing of deliveries. The regulations permit deliveries to public utilities, railroads, laundries, hospitals, food processing plants and refrigeration plants, tubs and domestic consumers having less than 10 days supply.

In addition, Justice Department attorneys were reported to be exploring possible legal action against Lewis and his United Mine Workers (AFL) in event of a strike.

The Smith-Connally Act makes it a criminal offense to incite or encourage a strike in government-seized mines or plants.

Truman is Determined President Truman was saying nothing publicly. But at Key West, Fla., intimates of the vacationing Chief Executive reported he is determined to "fight this one out to the finish."

He was said to have delegated strategy to Secretary of the Interior J. A. Krug before leaving Washington.

Lewis withheld comment. The 66-year-old mine union chief has declared his union's contract with the government "terminated" effective at midnight Wednesday, despite Clark's ruling that the pact is binding so long as the government holds the 3,300 soft coal mines it seized last May to end a strike.

The notices posted at the mines and handbills the government directed mine managers to distribute to miners said in bold black letters over the signature of Krug:

"Notice: to all members of the United Mine Workers of America—'This mine is in government possession and will remain open. Your contract with the government remains effective, as it very plainly says, for the period of government possession.' The government and all the people of the country expect the miners to honor their contract and to mine the coal which the nation needs."

500 Reported Missing After Philippine Storm

MANILA—(AP)—The Manila Bulletin reported Monday at least 500 residents missing and feared dead in the wake of a November 12 typhoon and subsequent floods on Negros Island. Presidential Secretary Emilio Abello said 290 had died in the town of Isabella alone.

There were no reports of American deaths or injuries. Several villages were demolished.

One Vote For Wallace

The venerable and bumptious George Bernard Shaw, like the younger and equally bumptious Kremlin propagandists, seems to have taken a definite stand on American politics. But the two approaches are radically different.

The Kremlin propagandists, who endorsed the entire PAC slate in the 1946 elections, embarrassed most of the candidates who received their forthright blessing. Maybe Shaw embarrassed Henry Wallace by proposing him for President in 1948. But he may have embarrassed Wallace's opponents, too. For there is some doubt as to the meaning and sincerity of the Shavian acclaim.

The endorsement came, as you may have read, at the diamond jubilee dinner in London of the Fabian Society, that famous group of British Socialist intellectuals of which Shaw is one of three surviving co-founders. GBS was unable to attend the dinner, but sent this message:

"The only message I have for the moment is that the Fabian Society, having made Russia a great Fabian state, has now to make Wallace succeed Franklin Roosevelt as President of the United States."

It is quite possible that Shaw wrote that with tongue in cheek and chuckle in beard, knowing that his reputation is such that the message would be read with almost reverential seriousness—which it apparently was. But there are a couple of amusing discrepancies beyond the exclusion of Truman in the line of presidential succession.

For one thing, the Fabian Society took its name from a Roman general known, because of his caution, as Fabius the Delayer. The Fabians chose the name because their policy was to proceed with caution, slowly winning the British public's support by the logic of their beliefs, and shunning a shooting revolution as they would shun capitalism.

It took the Fabians 60 years to persuade Britons to elect a moderately socialistic government—assuming, of course, that the Fabians are to be given credit for the change. The 60th anniversary dinner was designed, in part, to honor the Fabians for their help, and Attlee and three other government ministers were on hand to lend their presence and speeches to the occasion.

But GBS never mentioned the domestic victory, which he might well have considered the Fabians' crowning achievement. Rather, he spoke of a triumph in Russia, where a government which gained power by means most repugnant to Fabian notions is the object of the socialistic British government's frank and outspoken dislike.

So Wallace and his supporters will doubtless think twice before they print the Shaw endorsement on banners for the 1948 convention. And Wallace's opponents will doubtless use caution in dismissing GBS with a laugh or condemning him as a foreign meddler. For the pro-Wallace group can't be sure that Shaw isn't laughing at their man. And the anti-Wallaceites can't be sure that the old gentleman isn't perfectly serious, if a little vague.

But both groups, and all British politicians with them, can give thanks that Shaw has confined most of his politics to the philosophical plane. Think how confusing it would have been if one of the most brilliant thinkers of our time (when he wants to be) had spent his career actively stumping the wards and precincts, with every candidate respecting him and clamoring for his praise, and none of them knowing for sure if GBS was for him or agin him.

On with the nationwide road repairs—so we'll have no excuse for finding ourselves in a rut.

 he said. "New pipelines are to be built soon by several major companies which will open a new phase of oil and gas developments in the area."  
 "I am glad to come to this area of Texas and thank the citizens for their support during the recent Democratic elections," Jester said. "I am indebted to them and want them to know I am grateful."  
 Jester said Fred Wemple of Midland is receiving strong support for appointment as a state highway commissioner. He has met Wemple on several occasions and praised him as a man "being given strong consideration" for the appointment. Again, he said, ability rather than politics are to be the deciding factor.

 In commenting on the Republican victory in Congress, Jester said the confusion in Washington will not hinder the progress of Texas in the next two years.





## Big Nine Champ, Army Appear Strongest Rose Bowl Possibles

NEW YORK—(AP)—Like a well-staged mystery play which saves its climax for the final act, a college football season that has kept everybody guessing since early September will reach a dramatic peak this weekend with most of the puzzles being solved on the same afternoon.

The Big Nine and Pacific Coast conferences will crown their champions before Saturday's sun goes down and by that time the officials of the two leagues probably will have decided whether to match the winners in the Rose Bowl or clear a path to Pasadena for Army's unbeaten team.

Title races in various other conferences also are likely to be cleared up and performances this week will go a long way toward determining which teams will appear in the remaining bowl games on New Year's Day.

Army, which followed its scoreless tie with Notre Dame by clipping Pennsylvania, 34-7, rests this week for its November 30 finale with Navy. The Cadets are itching for a Rose Bowl bid and, what's more important, academy officials appear willing to accept one this time if it comes.

But the Big Nine has voted to send its champ to the Rose Bowl and the Pacific Coast loop, now faced with the biggest assortment of choices in the history of the post-season classic, must decide who gets the nod.

The most team for the Rose Bowl will emerge from Saturday's important struggle between Southern California and UCLA. All-victorious UCLA, which swamped Montana, 61-7, for its eighth straight win, can grab both the Pacific Coast title and the Pasadena plum by beating the Trojans.

A victory for Southern Cal in this last conference outing for both clubs would give each a share of the title, however, and hand the conference the added headache of selecting one of them for the Rose Bowl.

As the season draws rapidly to a close, the Techs have to defeat the University of Arizona next week and the Cowboys the following week. If they can do both, they will have the crown.

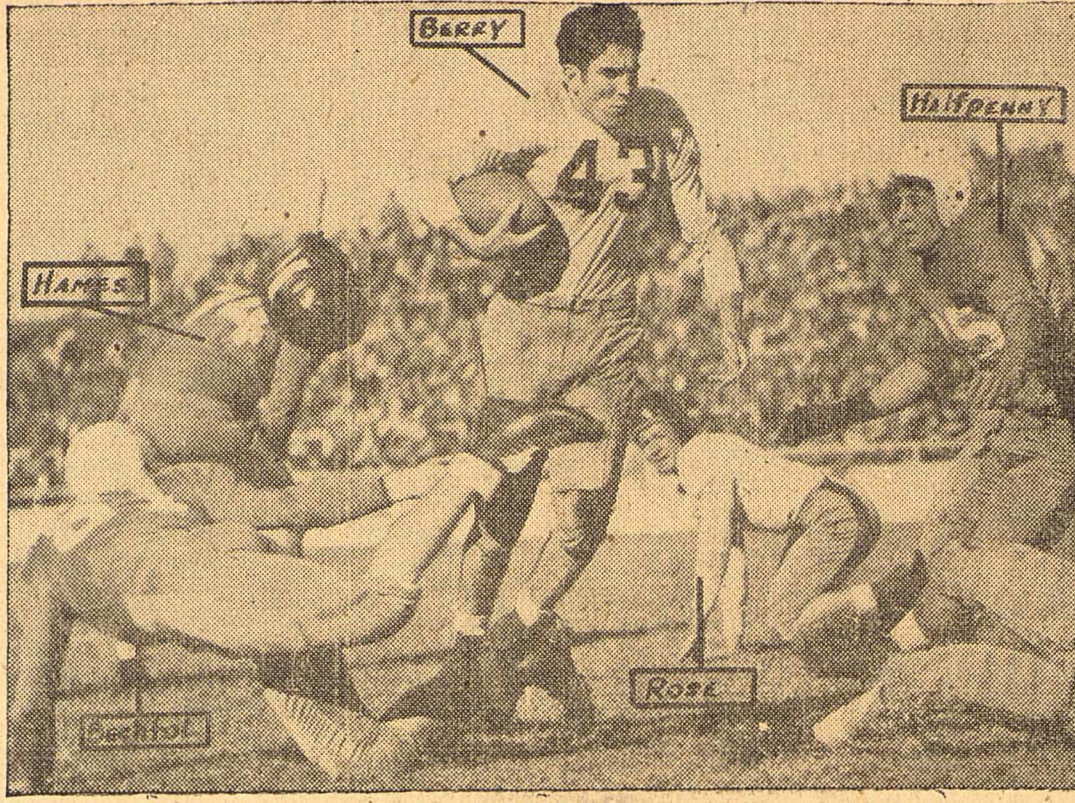

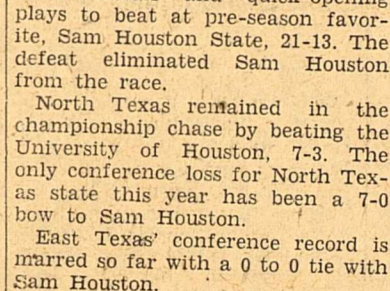
District 9 also determines its standard-bearer for the state play-off in December with unbeaten Breckenridge playing once-defeated Mineral Wells.

Only one conference game is included on the Friday and Saturday program of four contests.

The league game, pitting rejuvenated Southwestern against McMurry, will determine whether unpredictable Abilene Christian takes the conference championship or shares it with Southwestern.

ACC gained a temporary lead by lashing Austin College, 46-2, last week. That left the Wildcats with three victories and one tie in conference play. Southwestern will wind up its conference schedule with an identical record—if it beats McMurry. But if McMurry should defeat or even tie the Georgetown eleven, then A. M. Coleman's Christian team would be undisputed champion.

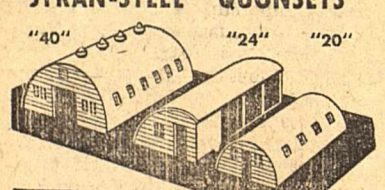
