In winning baseball's most coveted prize for the second time in his brief four-year major league career, the Donora, Pa., clouter who only Thursday celebrated his 26th birthday, received the highest total of points ever accorded any player since the present rating was adopt-

Musial, who also was voted the most valuable in 1943 with 267 points, polled a total of 319 points in the balloting by a 20-man committee of the Baseball Writers' Association of America. Three writers

from each league city voted. Second place went to Brooklyn's Dixie Walker, whose 159 points made him the poorest runner-up

in the last nine years. Outfielder Enos Slaughter and southpaw pitcher Howie Pollet, both members of the Cards, were third and fourth respectively.

Rounding out the first 10 were Ed Stanky, Dodgers; Del Ennis, Philadelphia Phils; Harold (Pistol Pete) Reiser, Brooklyn; and Phil Cavaretta, Chicago Cubs.
