Wreckage Of Crashed Army Transport Believed Sighted In Alps; Supplies Dropped

PARIS—(P)—The wreckage of a C-53 transport sought since it crashlanded Tuesday with 11 Americans is believed to have been sighted in the Swiss Alps 13 miles Southeast of Interlaken and relief supplies have been dropped, U. S. Airforce headquarters in Frankfurt announced Friday.

The location announced indicated that the transport came down in the icy wastes of the Bernese Oberland which is marked by three great peaks, the Jungfrau, the Finsteraarhorn and the Aletschhorn.

American and Italian paratroopers and trained mountaineers stood by for renewed efforts to save the passengers and crewmen— Brig. Gen. Loyal M. Haynes, his wife, the wives of three other Army officers and an 11-year-old girl among them.

Foul weather blocked off the searchers temporarily Friday morning after a new radio "fix" on the transport swung the hunt to the area below Interlaken from a zone in the French Alps approximately 33 miles to the Southwest, where ground and air rescue efforts had proved fruitless.

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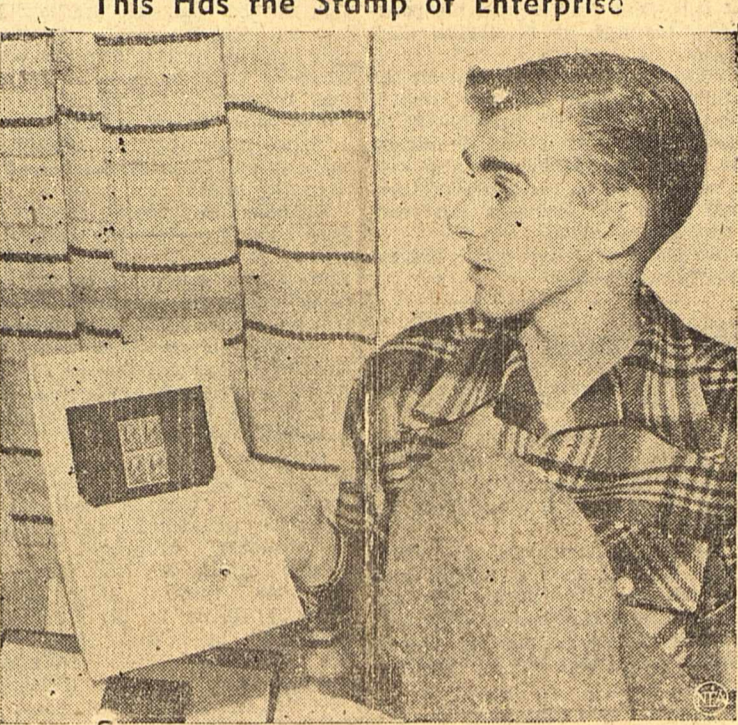
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Young Midland Businessman—although only 18, and a Midland High School student, William Lathrop is doing pretty well financially.

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Compromise Seen In Trieste Issue Of Foreign Ministers

NEW YORK—(P)—A proposal by Secretary of State Byrnes to limit the size of allied military forces in the Trieste area provided a possible basis of compromise Friday, on Russian demand that all troops should be withdrawn by a predetermined deadline after Trieste becomes an international territory.

The troops issue is one of two outstanding controversies remaining in a settlement of the Trieste question, which is the main obstacle to early completion of an Italian peace treaty.

The second issue involved in a final working out of plans for establishment of Trieste as a free territory under the United Nations is that of the economic relationship between Trieste and Yugoslavia. At a meeting of the Council Thursday night, according to some of those present, Russian Foreign Minister Molotov renewed his demand for a customs union between the two states and also for joint administration of the railways in Trieste.

Under British and American opposition, Molotov finally indicated he might drop the customs union proposal and go along with a French compromise suggestion that Trieste's neighbors, Yugoslavia and Italy, be assured special docking and other facilities in the free port area.

The Big Four deferred the economic questions for a later session as, in fact, they also did with the troop withdrawal issue. When Molotov renewed his insistence Thursday night on fixing a deadline of three months after the signing of the Italian treaty, he declared that to leave the military forces in Trieste when the people there were trying to organize a government would provide means of pressure on the elections.

Government officials said Friday the Japanese government collected the huge treasure from the Japanese people as a desperate war financing measure. Apparently the intention was to sell the gems for foreign exchange and purchase munitions and raw materials.

A War Department announcement Thursday night said the gems are valued at between \$20,000,000 and \$25,000,000. But gem experts with knowledge of the hoard said the army undoubtedly was speaking conservatively and of the New York wholesale price.

"They represent the entire diamond resources of the whole nation," Edward Henderson of the Smithsonian Institution told a reporter. "This undoubtedly is a situation unique in history. I know of no other time when virtually every diamond owned by every individual in a nation was assembled at one place."

The gems now are in vaults of the Bank of Japan in Tokyo. American Army Intelligence uncovered hiding places which yielded gallons of diamonds, often in fishy containers such as shoe boxes.

Henderson and Dr. William H. Foshag, curator of minerals at the Smithsonian, were called to Tokyo to classify and appraise the "collection."

"If they had been piled in one heap, on a desk, I don't suppose you could have stretched your arms around the bottom of the pile," Henderson said.

ABILENE VOTERS TURN DOWN SCHOOL TAX HIKE

ABILENE — Abilene taxpayers Thursday refused to authorize a school tax rate of \$150 per \$100 valuation for Abilene public schools.

The vote was 442 for and 757 against. The Abilene schools now operate on a \$1.19 tax rate.

Mine Chief Required To Appear In Federal District Court Monday

WASHINGTON—(P)—Two federal marshals served John L. Lewis with a summons Friday requiring his appearance in Federal District Court Monday morning to answer a contempt citation resulting from the soft coal strike.

Lewis accepted the summons in his private office "without comment", an aide reported.

Federal Judge T. Alan Goldsborough Thursday night ordered Lewis to show why he should not be held in contempt for refusing to withdraw his contract termination notice—the signal which led to the walk-out of his 400,000 bituminous coal miners.

The two federal deputies went to Lewis' office a few minutes after he arrived at union headquarters from his home in nearby Alexandria, Va., where he had been in seclusion for the last 36 hours.

The writ is another step toward possible clanging of jail doors in the UMW chieftain's face. It directs him to appear before U. S. District Judge T. Alan Goldsborough on Monday and tell why he did not honor an order to recall his contract "termination" of Wednesday night.

Next Step Wednesday

If Lewis fails then to clear himself of the contempt charge—possibly by calling off his "termination" notice or by showing that his stand is lawful—the next step will come Wednesday. On that day, Judge Goldsborough "with an advisory jury" will decide Lewis' guilt or innocence.

If convicted, the union might be fined and Lewis sent to jail, until he obeys the court.

Neither Lewis nor his lieutenants gave any inkling what he intends to do when he goes before Judge Goldsborough.

Picture Over Country

Over the country, this was the picture in brief: The official industry organ "Steel" estimated lack of coal would drive production down to 50 per cent of capacity within two weeks.

Some 10,000 of the 80,000 hard-coal miners, whose contract is not involved in the Lewis-government fight, walked off the job in Eastern Pennsylvania. A union official blamed it on a false report that Lewis had been jailed.

Stocks of industries most affected by the mine walkout led a slump in the New York market which brought prices near the lowest level since early 1945.

States and communities began working out plans to conserve electrical power produced by coal-burning steam plants. Washington led the way with restrictions on such lighting as theater marquee.

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Lewis has some fuel insurance, however. There's a woodpile in his back yard.

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CIO Calls For World Disarmament

ATLANTIC CITY, N. J. —(P)—The CIO convention Friday adopted its foreign policy resolution, calling for world disarmament and opposing further stockpiling of atomic bombs.

In contrast to other convention resolutions the recommendation on foreign policy brought a considerable number of "no" votes.

Jack Altman, vice-president of the Wholesale and Retail Employees Union, declared in a fiery speech seeking to amend the resolution that "dictatorship" should be condemned as a disease instead of mere "fascism."

He maintained the resolution should urge the entire United Nations—not merely the United States—to break relations with Spain and Argentina.

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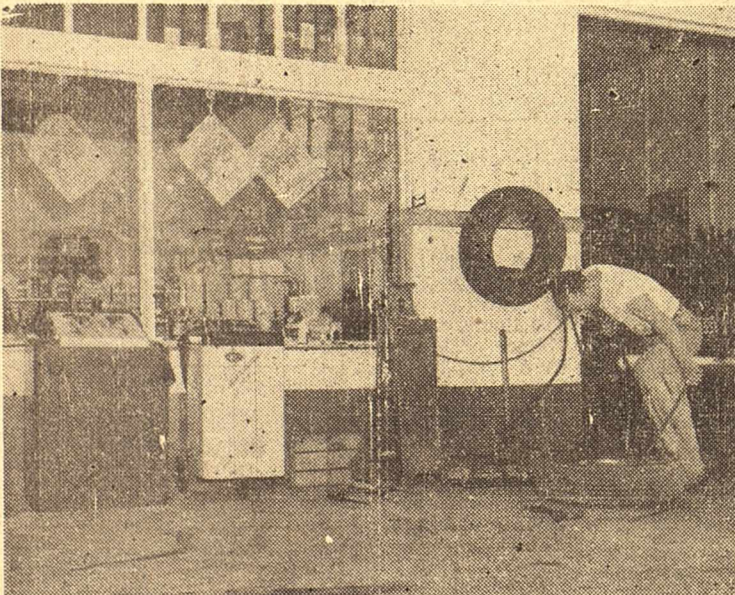

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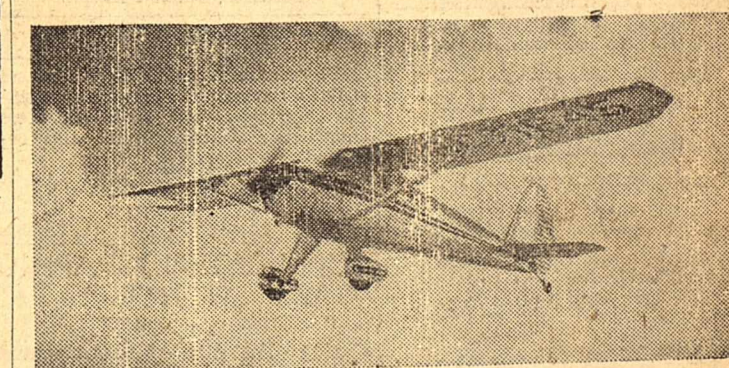

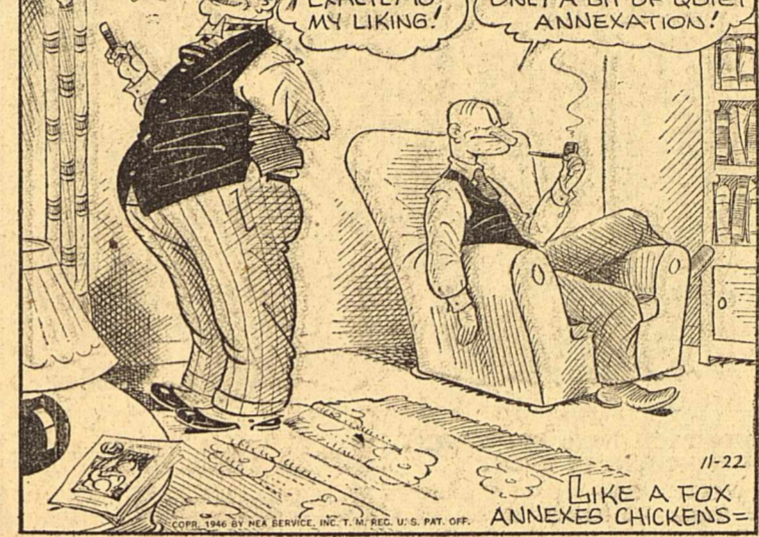

NEWMAN felt justified in making the try for this hand, as he probably would not get many points for going down one at four spades. He was inclined to feel that his partner should have passed his three-spade bid. At a three-spade contract he would not have dared to make the heart play, while at rubber bridge the heart play would be absolutely the correct one.
