Humble's Wildcat In Reagan Takes Drillstem Test

Humble Oil & Refining Company No. 1-C Sawyer, East-Central Reagan County wildcat, about 10 miles northeast of Big Lake, and 660 feet from south and 1,980 feet from west lines of section 130, block 1, TP survey, was on a total depth of 9,960 feet in a lime formation, which has not been officially identified.





Russia's Change Of Heart

Molotov's about-face on the question of a veto power er armament inspection had an inevitably dissimilar ception. Some held it to be the clinching proof of the oviets' amiable co-operativeness and ardent desire for eace. Others, not only professional cynics but usually usting souls who have come to suspect Russian policy, usily searched Molotov's speech for what is inelegantly nown as the "gimmick".

At present, however, one thing is certain. No amount misgivings can outweigh the hopefulness inspired by Russian change of heart. This does not mean an end difficulties, of course. Russia will not abandon the to until she can agree to the control and inspection stem. There will be disagreement and argument over e framework of that system. But all this is unavoidable.

The heartening thing is that one of the biggest disgreements between Russia, this country and Britain has ade great progress toward settlement. The small day--day differences can be borne. Even though Russia nsists on her Security Council veto in all other matters, here is more hope for peace now than at any time in the UN's short history.

But there are still some formidable obstacles to be cleared. One is the creation of a disarmament program nd of an inspection system that can really enforce it. ny international inspection system will require some sacrifice of sovereignty. And the making of that sacrifice vill demand an entirely new and courageous sort of dipomatic thinking.

Then there is the matter of removing some of the on-military causes of the international friction which roduces armaments and war. Here the outlook is far om encouraging.

Russia has not participated in the UNESCO meetings r taken part in the international trade discussions. Her bsence has been obscured by her presence in the Asembly and Security Council sessions.

Her disavowal of the UNESCO program because it did not take into account the Marxist materialistic philsophy has not caused much general concern. Yet until Russia sees fit to participate in a world program of inormation, education and cultural co-operation and joins n drafting world trade agreements, we have not come very far on the road to peace.

Nevertheless, Molotov's concession is tremendously encouraging. It looks like the break that was bound to come if the UN was to survive.

Russia may continue to veto discussions and actions. But if the world can be sure that Russia and the other nations are actually and sincerely disarming, a great and present threat of peril will be lifted.

Primary coverage, engineers claim, will be to Littlefield to the north, Sweetwater, east, and Marfa, southwest, McDonald said.
