## Coke Discovery Flows Natural At 200 BOPD Rate

Sun Oil Company No. 1 Jameson, Northwest Coke County wildcat discovery for flowing natural petroleum production from the crinoidal lime section of the Pennsylvanian flowed 15 hours at the rate of 200 barrels of oil per day, and was continuing to flow to take a full 24-hour official Railroad Commission potential gauge.

The test started at 4:15 p. m. Thursday and at the end of 15 hours it had gauged 124.5 barrels of 45.2 gravity oil, flowing through a one-quarter inch tubing choke. The full 24 hours will end at 4:15 p. m. Friday.

**Flows 8.34 BOPH**

That was an average of 8.34 barrels of oil per hour, which, if continued for the full length of the test would total 200.16 barrels per day.

Flowing casing pressure was 910 pounds, and flowing tubing was 610 pounds. Shut-in bottom hole pressure at the depth of 6,225 feet was 2,783 pounds.

Operator will put the discovery on production when the potential test is finished. Storage to handle the oil field has been erected on the lease.

The producing formation is at 6,225-45 feet.

The new well is 1,980 feet from west and 660 feet from south lines of section 253, block 1-A H&TC survey, and about 19 miles northwest of Robert Lee.

Humble Oil & Refining Company No. 1 Turner, about 12 miles southeast of Midland, in East Midland County, and 660 feet from west and 1,380 feet from north lines of section 43, block 37, W. T. Holcombe survey, T-2-S, ran a 22-hour drill-stem test at 11,397 feet, in the Devonian.

**Recovered Considerable Water**

During the period the drill pipe flowed out the water blanket and then flowed drilling mud several hours. At the time the tester was closed it was flowing 8.8-pound per gallon mud filtrate at the rate of two barrels per hour. No signs of oil or gas were reported in any of the fluid recovered.

When all the drill pipe had been pulled, recovery was 11,380 feet of muddy water, rather heavily cut with quebracho—an element of the drilling mud.

Operator was to run a gamma ray survey, and then decide the future course of action at the exploration.

Humble No. 1 Floyd, about two and one-half miles southeast of the No. 1 Turner, and also in East Midland County, had reached 3,870 feet in line and anhydrite, and was drilling ahead.

**Flows Oil Natural**

Humble No. 1 Sims, extreme West Andrews County discovery for 21 Andrews County production, in northeast corner of section 25, block A-39, psi survey, and about three and one-half miles northwest of the initial producer in the Nelson field, flowed 30 barrels of oil natural in six hours from perforated section at 10,466-531 feet.

Operator was due to treat with an initial injection of acid at once.

The Texas Company No. 2-D Fraser, 660 feet from west and 1,980 feet from south lines of section 27, block 45, TP survey, T-1-S, is a new prospector to 10,900 feet to explore for production in the Ellenburger, on the southeast side of the TXL field. It is a quarter of a mile south of a producer from the deep pay. Drilling will start at once.

**Still No Shows**

Gulf Oil Corporation No. 1-E-A University-Fogelson, Southwest Ector County wildcat, in northwest quarter of section 7, block 35, University Lands, was making hole below 7,239 feet in line.

A drillstem test at 7,120-7,220 feet, open for one hour, recovered 90 feet of drilling fluid, with no shows of oil or gas.

Phillips Petroleum Company No. 1-B University, extra deep wildcat in North-Central Ward County, adjacent to the Proteo Army Air Field, was reported by operator to be making hole past 11,590 feet in an unidentified formation.

**Stanolind Plugs Two**

Stanolind Oil & Gas Company has abandoned, and will plug two explorations in Southeast Winkler County. Both tested the Gorieta section of the middle Permian, and failed to find any indications of production.

Stanolind No. 12-A Sealy-Smith, 660 feet from north and west lines of section 72, block A, G&MMB&A survey, reached 5,366 feet in line, and is now recorded as a dry hole.

Stanolind No. 13-A Sealy-Smith, 660 feet from north and west lines of section 72, block A, G&MMB&A survey, bottomed at 5,324 feet in line—and it also is abandoned.

## 21 Bodies Are Recovered From Tenement Wreckage

**NEW YORK —(P)—**Weary workers who dug the bodies of 21 persons from the wreckage of a collapsed tenement house in a slow, grim procession of death gave up hope Friday for the lives of 15 others believed buried under tons of rubble.

Police planned to set three steam shovels to work on the ruins of the building in which more than 30 were injured.

The building in upper Manhattan, which housed 22 families, was smashed Thursday by a two-foot thick wall of an adjoining ice house which toppled on it after a five-alarm fire in the ice house.

**Youths Arrested**

Timothy P. Guineen, assistant fire chief in charge of the rescue operations, said he doubted there was anyone left alive in the wreckage.

Two boys, Joseph McCabe, 13, and Joseph Elio, 10, were arrested Thursday night and held as juvenile delinquents on arson charges in connection with the fire. They, along with two other boys, had been questioned by Assistant District Attorney Jacob Grumet.

Fire Marshal Thomas P. Brophy, in a report to Mayor William O'Dwyer, said the fire was caused by "mischievous boys."

## Texas Cities And Counties To Get Airport Properties

**DALLAS —(P)—**The War Assets Administration has announced that airport properties valued at \$15,000,000 are in the immediate process of transfer to nine Texas cities and two counties.

The facilities include hangars, operations buildings, runways and essential operating equipment which the cities and counties have agreed to maintain in the same state of repair as when they were transferred.

The airports are now being operated by these cities and counties on an interim arrangement pending final transfer of title.

The installations and governments soon to receive title are: Avenger Field, Sweetwater; Dahlart Army Air Field, Dalhart; Terrell Aviation School, Terrell; Brady Aviation School, Brady; Bonham Aviation School, Bonham; Harmon Flying School, Ballinger; Waco Auxiliary No. 3, Valley Mills; Coleman Flying School, Coleman; Waco Auxiliary No. 1, McGregor; Marfa Air Field Auxiliary No. 4 at Marfa, Presidio County; and Pacific Air School at Fort Stockton, Pecos County.

## Hope Wanes For Lost Marine Corps Plane

**SEATTLE —(P)—**Hopes waned Friday for the 32 Marines aboard a Marine Corps transport plane when it disappeared Tuesday afternoon en route here from San Diego, Calif.

While official sources were silent, searchers, chafing under inactivity enforced by some of the worst storm conditions in a decade, expressed fears there can be no survivors of the missing plane.

They were based on Mount Rainier, to begin a search of its slopes, particularly on Nisqually glacier, above 8,000-foot altitude as soon as the weather permits.

## Wichita Falls Team Arrives In Midland

The Wichita Falls Coyote football team arrived in Midland Friday, where it will stay before and after the quarter-final state schoolboy football game in Odessa Saturday.

The big and bulky Coyotes will work out in Odessa Friday afternoon and return to Midland Friday night. The team will stay in Midland Saturday night after the game.

The squad includes 50 men. Coyote supporters also began arriving in Midland early Friday, and by noon hotel lobbies and eating places were crowded with Wichita Falls citizens who will witness the Odessa-Wichita Falls quarter-final battle.

Hotels and tourist courts of Midland reported they are crowded with Wichitans.

## College Students Strike Against Business Manager

**CANYON —(P)—**West Texas State College students demanding the resignation of Virgil Henson, college business manager, voted to strike Friday and immediately began picketing the administration building, when Henson failed to resign by an 8 a. m. deadline.

War veterans led the protest because of housing conditions which they claim are entirely inadequate.

Members of the Board of Regents are meeting here Friday to discuss two new dormitories, and President J. A. Hill has arranged for the regents to hear the protest of the veterans.

Leader for the group was Leo Steinkoenig of Wichita Falls, a disabled veteran who was formerly a football player at West Texas and who is president of the College Veterans Association.

## Car, Bus Operators Quit In Oklahoma City

**OKLAHOMA CITY —(P)—**Street car and bus service was tied up early Friday in this city of 250,000 after operators failed to report for work.

The service ended shortly after the Amalgamated Union of Street Car Operators (AFL) met to hear a report by a three-man arbitration board which had been considering demands for a wage increase.

The board awarded a five cents an hour increase. The union had asked for 20 cents an hour hike.

The union voted to stay in continuous session but declared the stoppage was not officially a strike.

## Freedom Of The College Press

In abolishing faculty censorship of the student newspaper, President Everett Case of Colgate University may not have struck a great and telling blow for press freedom. Yet his action deserves a passing glance as a fitting celebration of the hundredth anniversary of the university's first newspaper—whose editor, incidentally, was expelled because of one of his early editorials.

College journalists have often been guilty of sophomore extravagance and bad taste. But on occasion their offenses have been nothing worse than legitimate complaints which might embarrass the college or its teachers. And it must be admitted that "faculty supervision" has meant wise guidance less often than it has illustrated the worst sort of censorial power in the world—that which can suppress without public explanation or right of public appeal, and which can enforce suppression with punishment.

It may be hoped that President Case's idea may succeed and be tried elsewhere. It may inspire embryo newspapermen to match new freedom with greater responsibility. And it may serve to clear up a possible confusion in young journalistic minds resulting from a discrepancy between general preaching and campus practice.

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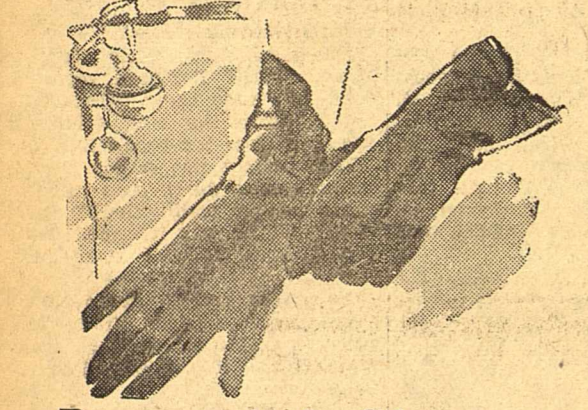
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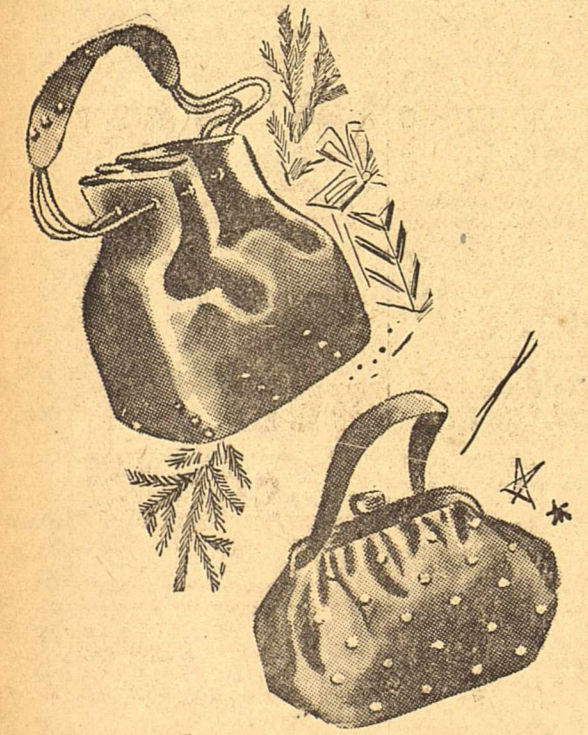
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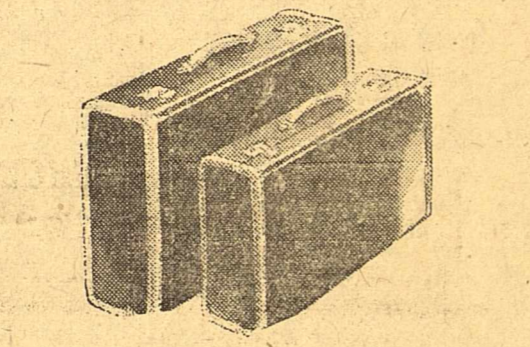
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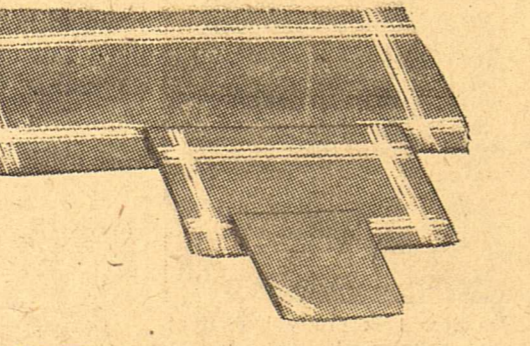
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**4-H Clubs To Have Christmas Party**

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**MCKENNEY ON BRIDGE**

Bridge writers often impress the importance of drawing adverse trumps before they can be used to defeat a contract. It is a good rule and should be followed unless the declarer has something more important to do, as he did on today's hand.

Perhaps South was a little strong in the bidding, but with his fine hand he felt that he was justified in showing his spades after any response by North. In any event he decided to make one more effort to reach a game contract, and when North gave him the chance, he took it.

The opening lead helped a little, as it made the diamond king a sure trick and indicated the possibility of a second trick in the suit by means of a finesse.

When East played the deuce of diamonds on the ace, West shifted to a club. The ace in dummy won the trick, then the ace and king of hearts were won, and the third round of hearts was ruffed in dummy, leaving declarer with the only remaining hearts.

South had now won four tricks and needed six more. He led a diamond from dummy and finessed the ten, and when it held, he laid down the king. When this held, his trick total had risen to six, all without leading a single trump.

His next play was a heart, and when West discarded, declarer ruffed in dummy, getting his seventh trick. A club return was ruffed by declarer, and when he led his last heart, West could win no more than the queen of trumps. Thus South actually made 11 tricks.

No doubt, had West chosen a club for an opening lead, the play of the hand would have been more difficult.



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
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**Monahans Ldhoes Travel To Game**
