US, Britain Ask Atomic Plan Approval

CSOC Is To Drill 7,500- Foot Test In West Gaines

Cities Service Oil Company has filed application with the Railroad Commission to drill No. 1 Riley as a 7,500-foot wildcat to explore the Clear Fork of the Permian, 15 miles west of Seminole, in West Gaines County.

The location is 660 feet from north and east lines of section 361, block G, CCSD&RGNG survey. It is approximately four and one half miles northwest of the Doss field, and about 14 miles southeast of the Russell pool.

The plat, filed with the drilling application, shows that Tide Water Associated Oil Company owns the north offset to the wildcat. Magnolia Petroleum Company and The Atlantic Refining Company have the northeast offset acreage, and Amerada Petroleum Corporation have the east offset. Drilling is to start by December 26. 35-A Hendrick To Plug

Stanolind Oil & Gas Company and Westbrook-Thompson Holding Corporation have filed an application with the Railroad Commission to plug and abandon No. 35-A Hendrick, deep wildcat in the Hendrick field, about four miles west

of Kermit in West-Central Winkler County This project, located 710 feet from south and 1,530 feet from east lines of section 33, block 26, psl survey, drilled to total depth of 13,815 feet in Ellenburger.
