





2. Allow no income tax cut at all This seems unlikely.

3. A compromise, putting principal emphasis on relieving the tax burden of low income groups. Some Democrats and Republicans are pushing this idea, and there seems to be a somewhat general feeling there will be some personal income tax revisions this year.

Some members privately interpreted Truman's speech Monday as a determined stand against any tax cuts, and some actually discussed the possibility of a veto battle if congressional tax cutting goes too far in the President's opinion.


The annual report of the House Committee on Un-American Activities raises again the question as to this group's usefulness, or even its desirability.
