

Contagious Diseases Showed Decrease In Texas During 1946

AUSTIN—(AP)—The State Department of Health recently reported a significant decrease in nost of the reportable communicaole diseases during 1946 as compared with the previous year.

A lesser incidence was reported for diptheria, dysentery, influenza, malaria, scarlet fever, typhoid fever, typhus fever and whooping

Diphtheria dropped from 2,471 reported cases in 1945 to 1,543 cass in 1946, and scarlet fever from 4.605 to 2.194 cases.

Marked Rise In Smallpox A slight decrease in poliomylitis was described as non-significant. There were 979 cases reported, only 17 less than the 1945 total. Health officials noted a very

marked rise in one important disease during the past year. Smallpox cases were tripled, 28 cases being reported as compared with only nine cases in 1945. Undulant fever also showed significant increase with 750 cases recorded as compared with 616 the previous year, said the health

The UN General Assembly has sometimes been called, and rather contemptuously, a "debating society". And though the tone may be unkind, the title is accurate. The Assembly has its own powers, to be sure, but essentially it is a large body created for discussion, in contrast to the Security Council, a compact group whose principle function is decision and action.

There is much to be said, however, for this function of debate, as a brief backward look at the recently concluded session in Flushing reveals. The Assembly gathered for this session in an atmosphere of considerable tension and unpleasantness. Eight weeks and some 20,000,000 words later, its delegates departed for their homes in the four corners of what was certainly a less apprehensive world.

What did the delegates accomplish with their 20,000,-000 words (not counting translations)? They voted for an arms reduction and atomic energy control plan with no veto power for anyone. They recommended that each UN government withdraw its chief envoy from Spain. They set up a Trusteeship Council.

The delegates also formed the International Refugee Organization and decided that relief should now be left to individual countries, with a UN Commission reporting of the extermination of the English Channel to structed of grass but of sand. They defined genocide (the extermination of racial groups) as an international crime, and condemned whip the Spanish Armada, left for that reason that the British racial and religious discriminatiton.

More practically, they admitted Sweden, Iceland, Afghanistan and Siam to their midst, agreed upon a budget, and decided on a permanent site for the UN's home.

Little Fellows' Return To Business Noted

NEW YORK — (P) — The return of "the little fellow" to business in large numbers since the end of the war was noted by the National Industrial Conference Board.

In an analysis of business integration and concentration the board predicted "the number of firms may exceed the prewar high by as many as 300,000 to 500,000."
This will reverse the wartime trend. The board said that before the war small firms with fewer than 100 workers employed 40 per cent of the labor force at 38 per cent of the total taxable wage. By the end of 1943, small firms ac-counted for only a third of all em-ployees and a quarter of the total

Analyzing tax proposals, the board said that "retained earnings," on which small enterprise usually relies for expansion, may be increased by either exemption from taxation for a percentage of re-tained earnings, or by exemption from taxation for a certain period


