Cynical Contradiction

Six Months

Brig. Gen. Robert W. Johnson, former WPB vicechairman, has urged that new factories vital to the national defense or welfare be dispersed, and that at least some of them be built underground. It is difficult to argue with General Johnson's contention that we should be alert and prepared now rather than, as in the past, after catastrophe has struck.

At the same time there is an appalling air of pes simism and cynicism about this practical suggestion. Nor is it the only situation which today calls forth a depressing reaction. Bernard Baruch says that we should keep on manufacturing atomic bombs until an international agreement on control is reached. The government says, or implies, that the increasingly unpopular presence of our troops in China must continue lest that country be taken over by the Russian Communists. And so on.

All of this represents eminently logical thinking. We must remain strong, keep armed, guard our atomic secrets, prepare for emergency even as we talk of disarmamnt and the pooling of atomic information. Other governments are also sleeping with their weapons at their sides. It would be folly for our government to ignore it.

But what is all this doing to the prospects for peace How can statesmen resolve the cynical contradiction in their own minds? We don't know the answers. We can only hope and pray that they are high-minded and great-minded enough to pursue their world-saving tasks undisturbed by the clamorous distraction of mutual sus-

The Simple Life

How adversity simplifies our tastes and sharpens our desires! In 1928 America heard without noticeable excitement the promise of "two chickens in every pot and two cars in every garage," and accepted it as its just due. In 1947 that same America—or at least the adult male portion of it-was all agog at the promise that, sometime during the year, there would be two pairs of pants with every new suit.

Threat Of Retaliatory Strikes

An American Federation of Labor officer, in a speech delivered to the American Political Science Association, has warned that "fooling around with restrictive laws and practices" regarding labor will bring on a fresh wave of

It is precisely this attitude, we believe, that has helped to bring about the possibility of restrictive laws. The AFL executive, who obviously was addressing his remarks to Congress, seems to have forgotten that "fooling around with restrictive laws and practices" is well within the province of Congress.

The present labor laws are neither sacred nor immutable. If Congress, with the support of the majority of the people, sees fit to change those laws, it has a right to do so. And threats of retaliatory action against the

national economy are not likely to deter the legislators.

The people generally don't like such retaliatory action. Neither, we believe, are union members anxious to suffer again the economic losses of a strike undertaken for such reasons.

BERLIN, Jan. 7 -(A)-Food imports from the United States to feed Germany increased to 80,000 metric tons during December, more than double the monthly average for the previous three months, Lt. Gen. Lucius D. Clay reported in his weekly review on American Military Government. General Clay added that Janu-

ary shipments also were running at a high rate. The increase is expected to relieve the food shortage in the U.S. Zone, where for the past three months it had been necessary to draw upon reserve stocks to meet the official ration of 1,500 calories daily for the normal consumer.


