

**Dr. Ida Vernon, Hardin-Simmons University Professor Of History, Speaks To Women's Clubs**

"Women have a definite contribution to make to the legislature and I think they should be elected," Dr. Ida Vernon, assistant professor of history at Hardin-Simmons University, Abilene, said when she spoke to the City-County Federation of Women's Clubs Thursday afternoon. The meeting was held in the home of Mrs. John P. Butler, 1633 Holloway Street.

Speaking on "Woman's Responsibility in Legislative Problems," Mrs. Vernon stressed the important part which women's clubs of America could play in placing more women in the law making bodies.

She said that women are responsible in government by the people they place in office and by the influence they wield.

**Balanced Bills Introduced**

"With women in the legislature there would be better and more balanced bills introduced," Mrs. Vernon said. She listed as reasons why women would play an important part in the legislature: they are more liberal than men; they can handle a problem in a more impersonal manner; they do not have the competitive attitude toward their fellow man as men; they are not as possessive as men; they are not as provincial in their attitude as men and are not as inclined to be guided by tradition; they are more time-conscious than men; and they are, at present, less subject to lobbying.

Mrs. Vernon, who was introduced by Mrs. J. Howard Hodge, first vice-president of the State Federation of Women's Clubs, was accompanied by Mrs. L. E. Dudley, president of the sixth district of the federation.

Mrs. Dudley spoke briefly on "The Federation" pointing out that this year is the fiftieth anniversary of the federated clubs in Texas.

Mrs. P. R. Schenck, vice-president of the Midland Federation, directed the meeting when reports of officers and committees were made. It was decided by the group to contribute \$5 to the Junior Canteen.

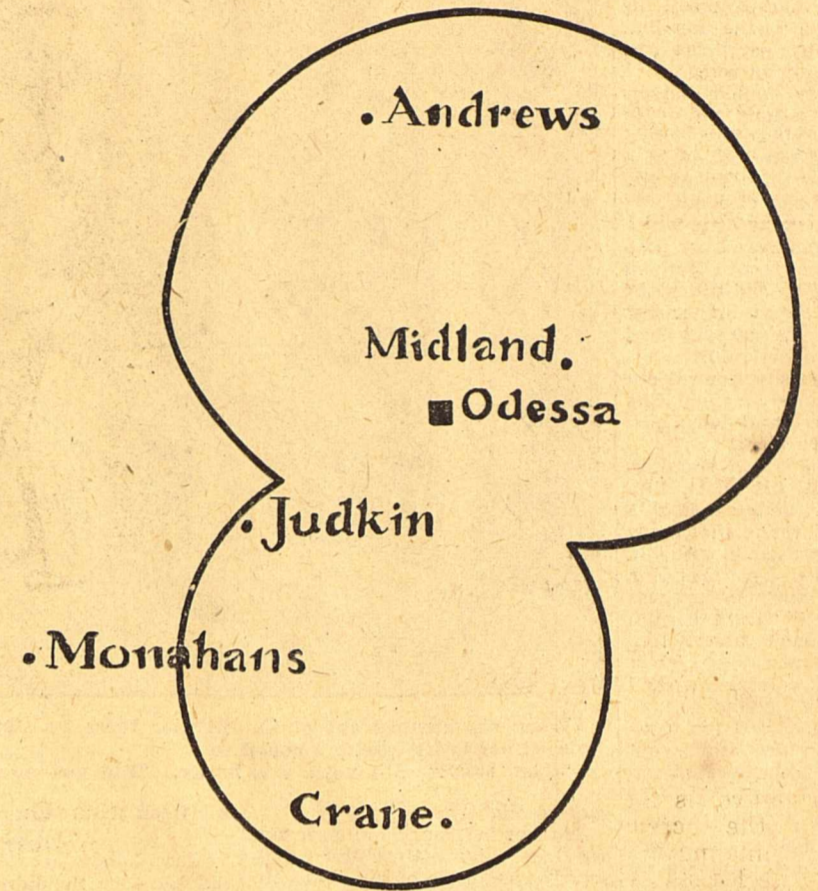
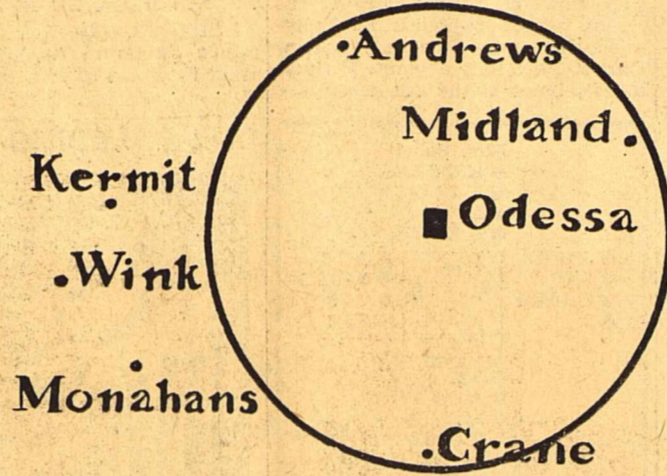

**Former Tennis Star  
Is Found Guilty  
On Morals Charge**

LOS ANGELES (AP)—Nine months at hard labor stretched out Friday before William T. (Big Bill) Tilden, former monarch of the tennis court following sentence on a morals charge involving a 14-year-old boy.

Routine county jail procedure, fingerprinting, form-filing and the like, occupied Tilden's new life—beginning at 53—as he awaited assignment to a road gang where tennis will be so much dream stuff.

Graying, stoop-shouldered Tilden, the net wizard who blazed a triumphant trail through the golden '20s, swayed and almost fell Thursday when Superior Judge A. A. Scott passed sentence.

Court Denied Request  
The court denied Tilden's request for probation and stay of execution, directing that the former net star be placed on probation for five years after his jail term. Tilden was told that after his liberation he "must never be in the company of either male or female juveniles unaccompanied by their parents."
