

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



An Untraditional Appointment

The President's appointment of Gen. George C. Marshall to succeed Byrnes as secretary of state must have astounded a large segment of the American public. It just isn't traditional to name professional soldiers to high civilian posts in government. It's as uncommon a practice here as it is usual with our Latin-American neighbors. There are sound reasons for this prejudice, even though it is probably more instinctive than reasonable with most people. The professional soldier's life is shut

off from that of his civilian fellows. His knowledge, while highly specialized, may be limited. He is not active in politics. As a result, his whole pattern of thought tends to be geared differently than a civilian's.


These are some of the common objections to the military professional as a non-military public servant. Yet they do not exactly fit General Marshall's case. His brilliant job in the recent war could not be divorced from consideration of civilian needs and problems. And his wide-ranging activities were far removed from those of a garrison officer in peacetime.

The general is no stranger to international conferences. He knows many of the world's statesmen. And certainly his postwar mission to China, though unsuccessful and hopelessly difficult, has been valuable diplomatic training.

One cannot predict how this experience will serve him as the No. 1 cabinet officer. There is no background which is a required necessity for the State Department's chief. The secretaries have come from many walks of life, and their past experiences have never served as an accurate guide to their future diplomatic performances.

There are, however, many known qualities which General Marshall brings to his new post. He has proved himself a man of distinguished ability in organizing our history's greatest war. His integrity and selfless devotion to duty are unquestioned. The prestige which he brings to the State Department is certain to contain the brings to the State Department is certain to command respect. And, it might be added, after his experience with the intransigents of the extreme right and left in China, he may find Molotov to be, by comparison, an amiable and pliable collaborator.

As for Byrnes, we can only repeat the President's and Washington, and smaller col-"Well done". The retiring secretary has been a handy man to have around. Extremely able, though perhaps not brilliant, he has made an excellent record in all three branches of the government. He is certain to be remembered best as the secretary of state who steered us through some extremely rough weather and unsteady sailing. Pulp-Timber Work To Begin In Alaska Soon

WASHINGTON-(P)-Alaska appears to be on the long-awaited verge of pulp timber development. "Conversations have been under way for many months with several interests who are actively seeking to develop the pulp and paper industry in the territory. Secretary of Interior J. A. Krug told a reporter. Krug estimates that Alaska can produce 1,000,000 tons of newsprint

paper a year-a quarter of the nation's needs.

From Senator Carl Hayden (D) of Arizona, chairman of the Joint Committee on Printing, came an intimation that if private industry continues to be slow about Alaskan development, the government

may have to take a hand. "Nobody wants the government to build a paper mill up there if private industry will do so," the senator told a reporter. "But we have to print the Congressional Record-and we have to

have the paper to do it." Development Signs Other signs of likely future development: 1. The Interior Department has

completed a study of Alaskan power prospects. 2. The Forest Service has sur-

veyed half a dozen blocks of pulp timber which could be made available for public advertisement upon short notice. 3. Three large industrial groups

investigated the major Alaskan pulp-timber stands last summer, the first to interest themselves seriously since the ambitious development plans of the late 20's were nullified by the depression. Definite Action Soon

On an annual visit to Washing ton last week, Dr. C. Earl Albrecht of Juneau, Alaska's commissioner of health, said in an interview that "scads of people, including some big operators" have been looking into the situation recently. He and other observers predicted definite action within a few months.
