The main point at issue appeared to be how to define the scope of work of the proposed 11-nation commission which will draft a general arms reduction plan.

The United States took the position that the council should meet as a committee of the whole to consider the terms of reference of the commission, while Russia argued that this would mean a delap of possibly three months.



#### Ford's Experiment

Young Henry Ford's cut in the price of his company's automobiles is, as Mr. Hoover described prohibition, an experiment noble in purpose. It also promises to be a successful accomplishment if he can get some co-operation from fellow industrialists and organized labor.

Ford referred to the price cut as a "shock treatment". But the shock is undoubtedly one that affects other businessmen rather than the national economy. Food prices already are coming down. Other items, particularly textiles, seem to be past their price peak. But in many durable goods, such as automobiles, demand still exceeds

It may be that Ford has decided that if demand is allowed to push auto prices still higher, the consequent and inevitable drop will be more severe. So his price reduction is a cushioning rather than a shock treatment.

The Ford company announced that some of its 3,000 suppliers have followed suit and promised to reduce their prices to Ford, or at least hold them at present levels. But word also comes that the UAW-CIO, while congratulating Ford on his decision, is still determined to press its drive for an hourly wage increase of 23 1/2 cents at Ford.

Even less heartening, at the moment, is the outlook for contract negotiations in the steel industry, which are now under way. Philip Murray has let it be known that he is interested in getting his United Steelworkers not only a wage rise but also portal-to-portal pay, a guaranteed annual wage, a welfare fund, and other benefits.

All these are desirable, but right now they're likely to bring up the price of steel. Steel prices rose with the new contracts last year, and took another rise last month which reflected the higher cost of scrap. If steel prices go up again, the country can probably say goodby to any is one of the nation's greatest writ- church. 





America's Card Authority Returning from an air trip around the country, I dropped in at the Mayfair Bridge Club in New York to see Harry Fishbein. Harry said he had a couple of good hands for me, and when he says a hand is good, you can count on it.

Here is one that he claims was the outstanding hand of 1946. Looking at all four hands, how would you play the contract?

Declarer must play low from dummy on the first heart and East wins with the queen. If East



makes the mistake of returning tne jack of clubs, the contract is easy. East must return a diamond, ten spot preferred. South must win with the ace, trump a diamond with the king of spades lead a small spade back to his hand and ruff the other diamond with the queen of spades.

As declarer's only hope is to find West with the king of hearts and king of clubs, he now cashes the ace of clubs, comes back to his hand with a spade, and runs the balance of the trumps.

West cannot hold three hearts and the king of clubs, because de-clarer will have only three cards left, the nine of hearts and queennine of clubs.

This unusual squeeze play is the Vienna Coup. When declarer cashes the ace of clubs, he deliberately establishes a trick for the opponent and then squeezes him out of it—that is the play known







Last April his car was wrecked by the tidal wave. Its replacement was destroyed by the storm waves of January 4.



#### Utah Town For Sale

DRAGERTOWN, UTAH -(NEA) -This town is for sale-lock, stock and barrel, and one electric clock Credit can be arranged.

Dragertown is the latest government asset being offered to private buyers by the War Assets Administration. It can't be bought piecemeal. The buyer takes all, which would make him one of the most complete landlords in the country. The town was built to provide living quarters for the miners who worked the nearby Geneva Coal Mine, and about 2500 people live here. The war ended before Dragertown got completely finished. One of the assets that go with the town is a commercial laundry, still crated, some of it still undelivered by the manufacturer.

The WAA described the town officially as a "self-sufficient settle-ment," 23 miles east of Price, Utah, in Carbon County near Desolation Canyon. It is on the Denver and Rio Grande railroad; a state high-way runs nearby. The project cost the government \$4,530,000.

The 604 one-story houses are of four, five and six room size and, with the accompanying business district, sprawl over a 377-acre area. Every house is furnished, even to rugs, draperies and linen; and the new landlord will' get 500 refrigerators, electric ranges, 705 heating stoves and 20

There is a 16-bed hospital with perating room, delivery room, and diet kitchen. The school contains the town's one electric clock. It also has a playground. The theater seats 600 and has candy display case that is included in the price. The general store has a meat case but the WAA nasn't said whether any meat on hand goes with the town. Own Water Reservoir

For maintenance of 9000 yards of concrete highway that runs through the business district, and the gravel roads on which the neat redwood homes front, there are five dump trucks and a road

The town has its own 500,000gallon water reservoir and purifying plant and its own sewage disposal plant. There is a guest house that can be converted to a hotel. As a final note of customer appeal, the WAA says the highest bidder can have the town's one official passenger sedan-presumably for his personal use if he likes
