COKE STEPOUT STILL IN PAY AT 6,260 FEET
Sun Oil Company No. 1 Fred Jameson second well in the Silver area of Northwest Coke County, and 660 feet from north and 1,980 feet from west lines of section 315, block A-1, H&TC survey, continues to show for production.

After cutting a core at 6,230-40 feet, and recovering two and one-half feet of lime and one foot of shale, a drillstem test was taken for one-hour at 6,220-40 feet. Recovery was 60 feet of oil and 150 feet of oil cut drilling mud. An ungauged amount of gas showed at the surface in 17 minutes.

A core was then taken at 6,240-50 feet. Recovery was two feet of black shale and one foot of lime. A core at 6,250-58 feet, recovered one foot of lime. The section at 6,253-60 feet was drilled.

A drillstem test was taken at 6,240-50 feet. Recovery was 180 feet of oil cut drilling mud—estimated to have been 10 per cent oil. Gas showed at surface in 23 minutes. Bottom hole flowing pressure was 500 pounds. Closed bottom hole pressure was 2,500 pounds.

At last report operator was conditioning hole, preparatory to coring ahead for 6,260 feet.
The shale section was apparently only three feet thick, and it carried no water. Interested observers had feared that when the first core showed the one foot of shale, that the Strawn pay section had been gone through—but it now appears that such is not the case. The well is credited with having logged 124 feet of pay—and to be still in it.

MIDLAND WILDCAT HAS GAS SHOWS

Humble Oil & Refining Company No. 1 Floyd, wildcat in East Midland County, about 15 miles southwest of Midland, and two and one-half miles southeast of nearest producer in the Midland field, was making hole below 9,242 feet in sandy lime and shale—possibly Pennsylvanian.

There was a show of gas on the mud pits while drilling at 9,155 feet. A drillstem test was taken for 63 minutes at 8,966-9,178 feet.

A slight head of gas reached the surface during the period. Recovery, when the drill pipe was broken, down was 420 feet of gas cut mud. No shows of oil or water were reported from the test.

The project is 660 feet from north and 1,980 feet from east lines of section 16, block 37, TP survey, T-2-S.

MORE ELLENBURGER OIL

Humble No. 2-E R. B. Cowden, stepout from Ellenburger production in the Andetator field, in Northwest Ector County, and 660 feet from west and 1,980 feet from north lines of section 12, block 45, TP survey, T-2-N, flowed 72.90 barrels of pipe line oil in two hours, natural, from perforated zones in the deep pay between 8,425 feet and 8,625 feet. The well was still flowing to test and complete.

LOWER PAY PRODUCES

The Ohio Oil Company No. 1-A Butler, stepout from the Drinkard field, in East Lea County, New Mexico, and 1,980 feet from south and 660 feet from west lines of section 18-22-38e, was flowing at the rate of 8.25 barrels of 40.5 gravity oil per hour, with gas-oil ratio of 2,450-1.

The production is coming from open hole at 6,874-7,000 feet, in the lower Permian, which had been treated with 2,000 gallons and with 6,000 gallons of acid. The flow was through a 5/8-inch tubing choke.

This well missed production in the regular Drinkard pay section, above 6,500 feet. The nearest production from a similar zone is about one and one-half miles southwest of Ohio's Muncy lease. The oil being produced was cut with one per cent sediment and acid water. No formation water had been reported.

SWABBING SULPHUR WATER

The Texas Company No. 1 Garrett, wildcat about eight miles northeast of the Lovington field, in East-Central Lea County, New Mexico, and 660 feet from east and 1,980 feet from south lines of section 22-16s-38e, was swabbing four barrels of sulphur water per hour from open hole at 5,540-5,760 feet, in the middle Permian. No shows of oil or gas have been reported since the swabbing started.

DAWSON WILDCAT TO P & A

John Pringle and King, Warren and Dye No. 1 F. J. Steward, Central-West Dawson County wildcat, 13 miles west of Lamesa, and in southwest corner of section 105, block M, EL survey, drilled to 5,270 feet, in dry lime. It found no shows of petroleum, and according to interested operators was low, geologically. It is being plugged and abandoned.

Tax Cut Consideration Postponed

Coal Official Urges Breakup Of Lewis' UMW

WASHINGTON —(P)—Rolla D. Campbell, a coal industry official urged Congress Monday to break up John L. Lewis' United Mine Workers and other big unions into small units.

Campbell, of Huntington, W. Va., general counsel for the Island Creek Coal Co. and the Pold Creek Coal Co., testified before the House Labor Committee.

Like other coal spokesmen, Campbell said in his prepared testimony that if Congress doesn't curb big unions "it is not unreasonable to anticipate further coal strikers" when the government returns the bituminous coal mines to private ownership. Under present law, the government must do this before July 1.

Campbell urged two things especially:

1. Prohibit industry-wide bargaining and break up industry-wide unions, except as advisory groups with the same general functions as trade associations.
2. Make it illegal for a union to have any part in administering a health and welfare fund to which the employer contributes money.

Campbell also asked the House group to outlaw closed shop contracts; to remove federal recognition for any union which admits foremen to membership or which uses physical force against employers or workers; to forbid secondary boycotts; and to make "many other changes" in laws which he said lack of time prevented him from discussing.

Search Pressed For 53 Bodies In Airliner Crash

BOGOTA, COLOMBIA —(P)—Search parties labored in mountain country to the northwest Monday.

The Midland District office of The Texas Company received information Monday that two of the victims of the Colombia airliner crash were former residents of Midland.

C. M. Volpe, former district civil engineer of the West Texas-New Mexico area for The Texas Company, left Midland last October to become chief general transportation foreman for the Texas Petroleum Company in South America. Volpe was a member of the Midland Rotary Club.

J. K. Hufendick, former assistant superintendent of The Texas Company for the West Texas-New Mexico area, was a resident of Midland from 1935-36.

Carl Hubman, another oilman killed in the crash, was formerly connected with The Texas Company in West Texas.

The plane struck near the top of a 1,000-foot precipice climaxing an elevation of about 9,000 feet above sea level. The wreckage blew up, scattering bodies and debris of the plane over the cliff face and a steep ravine below.

Seven Americans were aboard.

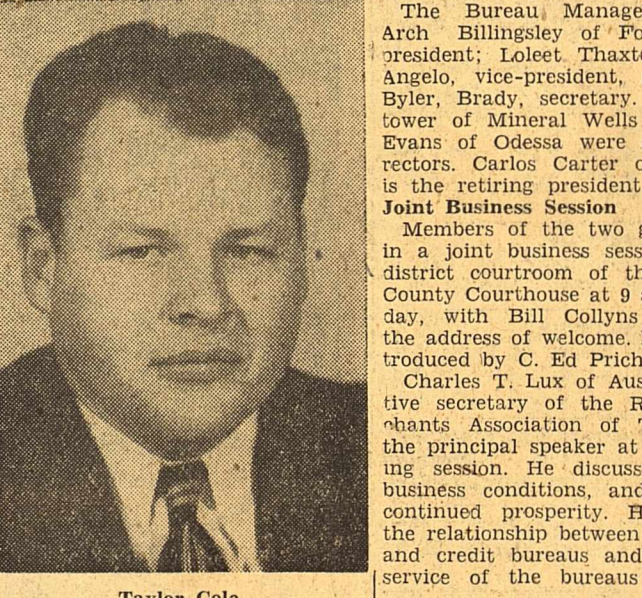

DALLAS —(P)—JayCees from a score of nations will see a bit of the old west Monday in a prelude to their world congress of Junior Chamber of Commerce International.

A whooping western parade, featuring horses, cowboys and all the trimmings, tops the opening day program of the week-long conference.

Preliminary business was cleared Sunday, with a Texan chosen acting president of the world congress. Taylor Cole, 33 year-old Midland oilman, was named acting

The meeting opened Saturday night with a dinner-dance at the Log Cabin Inn.

William Amis of Fort Worth was elected president of the Credit Executives, succeeding F. D. Woodruff of El Paso, and Jim Wallace of El Paso was named vice-president. Pauline Sullivan of Big Spring was reelected secretary. Directors named were Irene Meier, Big Spring; June Woodrum, Lubbock; Henry Murphey, Midland; Paul Carter, Mineral Wells, and J. C. Duncan, Arlington.

The Bureau Managers elected Arch Billingsley of Fort Worth president; Loret Thaxton of San Angelo, vice-president, and Daisy Byler, Brady, secretary. Ed Highower of Mineral Wells and John Evans of Odessa were elected directors. Carlos Carter of El Paso is the retiring president.

Jews Go On Strike Against Deportation Of 800 Uncertified Immigrants To Cyprus

JERUSALEM —(P)—Hundreds of Jews went on strike for an hour Monday to protest against the deportation of 800 uncertified immigrants from Haifa to Cyprus.

Traffic was halted for the first 10 minutes in most Jewish communities. No incident was reported.

Meanwhile, Jewish lawyers were reported by a usually reliable source to be planning a plea for a writ of habeas corpus in the Palestine high court to keep the British from sending the immigrants to detention camps. Six of the group were said to be wounded.

The intercepted Jews, numbering nearly 800 refugees, were transferred early Monday from their ship, the San Miguel, to the British deportation vessels, Ocean Vigor and Empire Haywood, in Haifa Harbor.

Deferment Is Made Until Congress Can Determine Slash In Spending Budget

WASHINGTON —(P)—Postponement of any consideration of tax cuts until Congress determines how much to slash the 1947 spending budget was announced Monday by Chairman Knutson (R-Minn.) of the House Ways and Means Committee.

Hearings previously had been set to begin Wednesday on Knutson's House Bill No. 1 calling for a 20 per cent "across the board" cut in individual income levies.

Knutson announced that the controversy over how much to trim President Truman's \$37,500,000,000 budget also will cause delay in hearings on reciprocal tariff operations. These hearings had been set tentatively to begin February 24.

No new definite dates for tax or trade hearings were set immediately.

In a statement, Knutson said that when February 19 was selected to open tax consideration "it was anticipated that final action would be had by that date" on fixing a congressional budget ceiling.

Thirteen Texans Die Of Violence During Weekend

Eleven persons died of violence in Texas over the weekend and two others were killed outside the state.

An accident during the air show at Mineral Wells took the life of F. B. Estes, Fort Worth stunt flyer. Seven died in automobile accidents, two of shootings and one by drowning.

Automobile accidents in Louisiana and New Mexico were fatal to two Texans.

Estes was demonstrating an Immelman maneuver at less than 200 feet during the air show Sunday when the small plane stalled, went into a spin and exploded.

K. C. Kennedy, Odessa, was killed when his truck rammed into another near Shreveport.

A. J. Penny, 28, El Paso, was killed when the motorcycle he was riding and an automobile collided near Lordsburg, N. M.

Dies Of Bullet Wounds
Aubrey B. Hammond died instantly of bullet wounds Saturday on a farm near Chilton, Falls County. Police are holding a farmer for investigation.

The body of Calvin Voss, 32, was found near Hawkins, Saturday. He had been shot in the chest and beaten about the head. Police Lt. Louis L. Dumaine of New Orleans, said a young man who identified himself as Curtis Ray Lloyd said he had slain Voss after hitchhiking a ride with him.

Mrs. Marietta Starks, 77, of Old Ocean, Texas, died in a Baytown hospital Saturday from injuries received in an auto accident Friday night.

Mrs. Minerva Chastain Burns, 19, of Fort Worth, drowned in Lake Worth Saturday when a boat capsized.

Paula Antunez, 35, was killed Sunday night at Brownsville when she was struck by an automobile.

Walter Jarrett, Oil Man, Dies In Midland Hospital

Walter R. Jarrett, 60, prominent Midland oil man, died at 9:30 p. m. Sunday, in Western Clinic Hospital after an illness of several months.

Born March 7, 1886, in Hickory, N. C., Jarrett resided in Oklahoma City 24 years before moving to Midland as district land man for the Anderson-Prichard Oil Corporation in 1927. The family resides at 906 West Storey Street here.

He formerly was an independent oil operator, and headed the Jarrett Petroleum Company until 1937. Burial in Oklahoma.

Jarrett was president of the National Board of Pharmacy in 1918, and served as secretary of the Oklahoma Board of Pharmacy a number of years. He was a 32nd Degree Mason.

Funeral services will be held at 10 a. m., Wednesday, in Oklahoma City. Burial will be there.

The body will lie in state at the Ellis Chapel here from 4 to 7 p. m. Monday.

Survivors include his widow, a son, Ronald Jarrett of Midland; two brothers, A. J. Jarrett of El Paso and C. E. Jarrett of Wetumka, Okla.; and a sister, Mrs. Maud Chowins of San Antonio.

Bill To Ease Labor, Management Relations Introduced In House

AUSTIN —(P)—A bill designed to ease labor-management relationships in Texas was introduced in the House Monday by Rep. George Nokes of Corsicana.

Also introduced was a proposed constitutional amendment which would allow legislators to set their own salaries.

Nokes' bill patterned after the Minnesota Labor Conciliation Act, is based on the principle that both labor and management owe first responsibility to the public interest, he theorized.

The House passed to final reading a measure by Rep. S. J. Isaacks of El Paso which exempts veterans from taking bar exams on subjects they successfully completed before entering service. Two amendments—including ex-members of the Merchant Marine and another limiting the exemption to students of the University of Texas, Baylor and Southern Methodist University—were adopted.

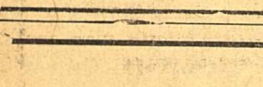

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U. S. Informs World Of Intentions To Keep Pacific Isles

LAKE SUCCESS — (AP) — The United States informed the world Monday that she intends to keep the strategic chains of Japanese-mandate islands in the Pacific to insure American security.

In a draft agreement submitted to Secretary-General Trygve Lie and circulated to members of the UN Security Council, the U. S. government asked the United Nations to designate these islands, including most of the Marshalls, Marianas and Carolines, as a "strategic area" under American administration.

Indications were that the plan would meet immediate opposition in the council from Russia, Great Britain, Australia and perhaps others. Moscow, London and Canberra were reported to have advised the U. S. State Department that they were opposed to acceptance of any agreement until the peace treaty with Japan was signed.

But whether the United Nations approves the agreement or not, the U. S. made it clear that she has no intention of giving up the islands that she considers so essential to American defense.

Due to council occupation with the pressing problem of atomic energy, the U. S. proposal may not reach the floor for several days.

Chiang Revamps China's Government

NANKING — (AP) — Generalissimo Chiang Kai-Shek's government, in a desperate fight for national survival, revamped China's tottering business structure Monday and promised to reorganize the government itself.

- The drastic decrees:
1. Ordered home all fortunes abroad.
 2. Provided for government withdrawal from industry.
 3. Restricted wages and prices to January levels, and prohibited strikes and lockouts.
 4. Fixed the official exchange rate at 12,000 Chinese dollars to one U. S. dollar and banned any use of foreign currency or any trading in gold in China.
 5. Provided for a curtailed government budget and stricter tax collections.
 6. Pledged a campaign against hoarding and speculation, and said "severe penalties" would be imposed for violation of any decrees.

A reader who gives her age as 27 writes: "I have more crows' feet and wrinkles around my eyes than does my 45-year-old sister. Creams don't seem to help any. Make-up only accentuates the lines. My skin is very dry."

Very dry skin invites premature wrinkles and especially if its owner has facial habits that etch lines. Those that will need in crows' feet are habits of squinting, close-peering, crinkling the eyes or beetling the brows.

Any woman who indulges in such habits should discipline the behavior of her face. She can do so by cultivating repose in front of a mirror. She should also find out whether or not eye-area grimaces are caused by eye-strain. Wrinkling can often be traced to habitual muscular contractions which could be corrected with eye-glasses.

At least four bills appropriating federal money to the states for aid to education will be considered by Congress. Principal sponsors of the four measures are Senators Aiken of Vermont, Green of Rhode Island, Taft of Ohio and Murray of Montana.

Senator Taft's Committee on Labor and Public Welfare will get first whack at them. That won't be for two or three months, however, till this committee gets its program for regulating the labor unions out of the way. Though help for the bogged-down school systems and their underpaid teachers should come first, it doesn't.

Aiken and Green have their bills in. Taft's and Murray's are still to come. All four will call for federal subsidies to the states. The states would spend the money, subject to federal audit perhaps, but without federal supervision or dictation of any educational program. Each state would teach what it chose, and how.

Fundamentally, there are only two concepts on how the federal money shall be dished out. First is a grant-in-aid to every state on a per capita basis—so many dollars per year for every child in school. Second is a grant on the basis of need. The poorer a state is—the less it has to spend on education and the more children it has to educate—the more federal aid it would get.

A Boost For Universal Training

Department has announced that, because of in-entiments, it may not ask Congress for an extension of the Selective Service Act beyond the present expiration date of March 31. This possibility should increase support for universal military training.

Universal training and the draft would be difficult to administer side by side. There would be a recurrent question of whether to draft a young man for service or assign him to the training course. And there would certainly be a good deal of dissatisfaction resulting from the dilemma.

An Army of volunteers, much preferable, makes the training program more probable. We should then have a force adequate to our present needs and a larger potential force which might well offer the nation a greater security on two counts—by serving to discourage attack and, if back should come, by marshaling added strength to repel it.

The Show Goes On

Secretary of War Patterson has reminded the country that our peacetime soldiers overseas become lonely and homesick, too, and that they shouldn't be forgotten.

"The canteens are closed," said Patterson in a speech before the Women's Patriotic Conference in Washington. "The recreation centers are dark. The civic groups and churches turn to other activities."

The secretary overlooked one bright spot, however. The USO Camp Shows haven't forgotten the peacetime soldier, nor have they ceased their activity. They have only now ended their five years' work in Europe because of a drop in public contributions, the revival of the European entertainment business, and the smaller number of troops in Europe.

With the funds on hand 22 companies of entertainers continue to bring cheer to patients in the 187 Army and Navy hospitals in this country, while other troupes bring a touch of home to the men in the Pacific areas. That's the Camp Shows' 1947 program. We think it deserves a hand and some generous support.

Gigantic Windmills Would Harness Free Electric Power In Skies

By ROBERT E. GEIGER

WASHINGTON—(P)—Engineers of the Federal Power Commission say it is possible to harness wind on winds and tame them into producing \$50,000,000 worth of cheap electricity each year.

Thus one of the oldest sources of energy, the wind, appears destined to be harnessed alongside the newest, the atom.

Plans for wind generators have been discussed for several years, and Percy H. Thomas, staff member in the office of the commission's chief engineer, says he now is convinced they will work on a gigantic scale.

On 575-Foot Tower
Huge windmills would be constructed on towers 575 feet high, 20 feet higher than the Washington monument.

Thomas has plans for a generator for each tower that would have a capacity of 6,500 kilowatts or around 8,670 horsepower. Connected into the existing power circuits of the nation, between 600 and 1,000 of these gigantic aerogenerators would produce about 20 per cent of the nation's electricity, engineers estimated.

Already, Thomas says, studies have shown that there is sufficient wind in virtually all parts of the nation to operate such huge windmills.

What it takes, he says, is a steady wind of around 20 miles per hour. Wind force increases with elevation. That is why he proposes to build each windmill on a tower 575 feet high. Each tower would be placed on a carefully selected site where studies show winds prevail.

Cost \$150,000 Each
Each windmill, Thomas estimates, could be constructed for around \$500,000.

Compared with hydroelectric and steam plant costs, the wind generators are cheapest, Thomas says. He estimates the cost of production at around 1 1/3 mills per kilowatt hour. Average steam and hydroelectric prices range from around two mills to 7 or 8 mills, Thomas estimates.

If the savings are applied to America's bill for 230,000,000 kilowatt hours annually, and if the windmills produce a full 20 percent of the total, the savings would be around \$50,000,000. But this probably couldn't all be applied as a

savings on power bills because the aerogenerators would have to supplement steam and hydro plants.

This is because the wind is not a "stable" source of power, and the steam and water power plants would be needed to produce current when the aerogenerators are becalmed.

Three Groups Interested
The wind has been used to produce electric energy in Russia as well as in the United States but not on the scale Thomas proposes. He says three "groups" are interested in taking over the aerogenerator plan and constructing experimental projects to prove the feasibility of wide-scale operations.

Tremendous engineering problems are involved:
Each tower, with twin "windmills" and generator house platform, would weigh 1,400 tons. The windmills, generator and platform elevated to 575 feet, alone would weigh about 700 tons, each blade 11 tons.

The length of each blade in the "mill" would be around 100 feet. This is longer than the wing of a superfortress, 65 feet.

Each generator would produce around 8,670 horsepower at capacity. This is almost three times the power of each engine in the new 920-ton Constitution airplane, carrying 180 passengers.

Engineers estimate this 8,670 horsepower would provide for the home needs of a town of 20,000 people.

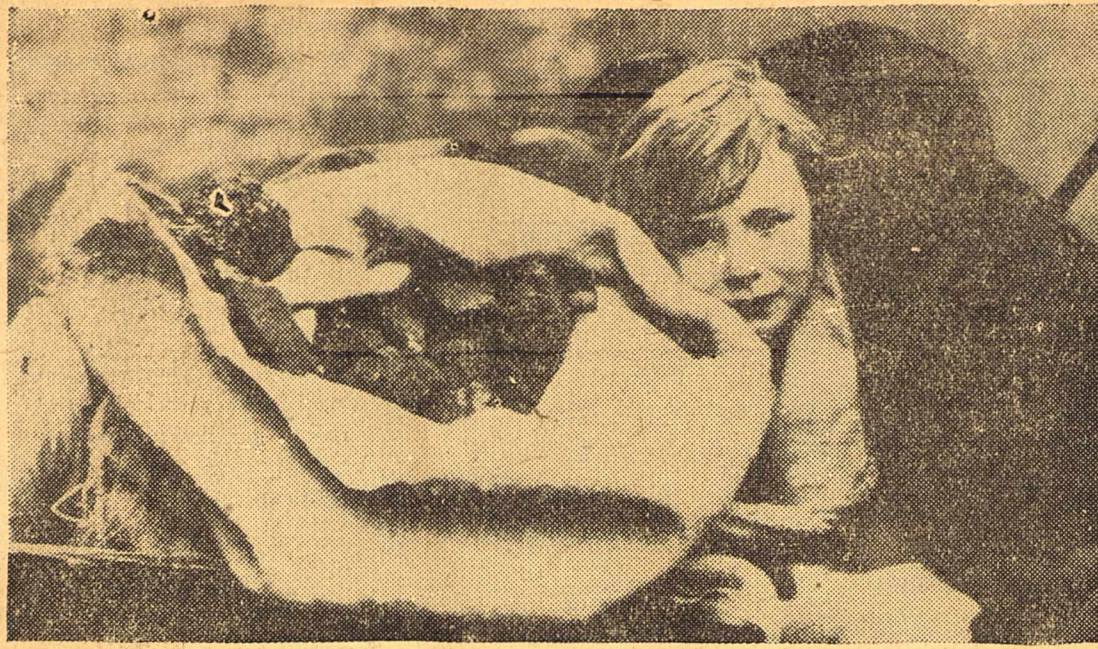

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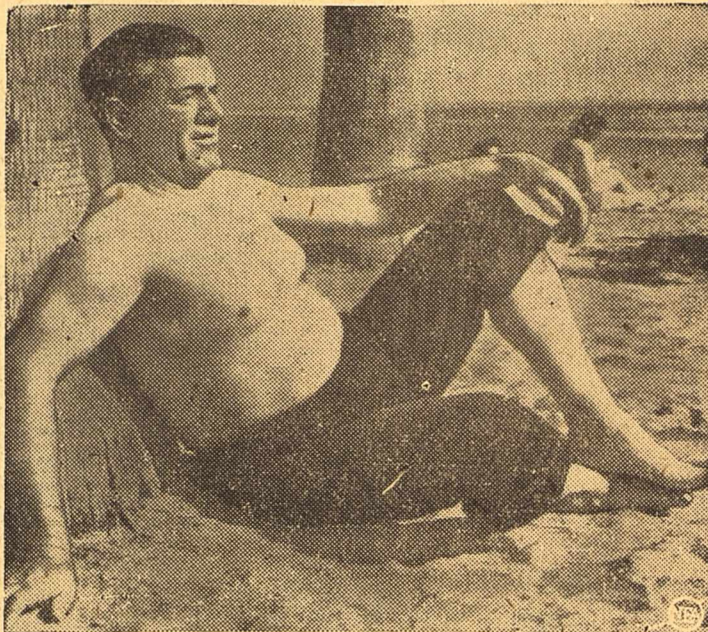

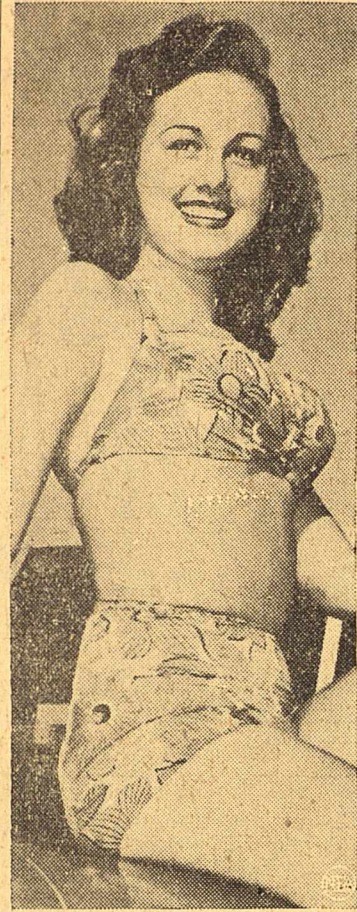

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Credit Associations Repay Government

HOUSTON—Eleven of the 36 production credit associations in Texas have practically completed the job of returning their government capital to the U. S. Treasury, President Virgil P. Lee of the Production Credit Corporation of Houston said.

The government now has only a \$5,000 investment in these associations, which formerly had from \$200,000 to \$600,000 of government capital. Over a period of 13 years these government funds have been replaced by capital and surplus owned by farmers and ranchmen who are members of the association, he said.

Definite plans have been made by the remainder of the production credit associations in Texas to finish paying out by the end of 1947. Nearly 30,000 Texas farmers and ranchmen now own \$9,245,105 of capital and surplus in the 36 associations, which made loans for more than \$85,000,000 during 1946.

The Midland Production Credit Association, which serves Andrews, Martin, Howard, Loving, Winkler, Ector, Midland, Glascock, Ward, Crane Upton and Reagan Counties, is one of the 11 which are no longer dependent upon government capital.
