Striking Buffalo, N. Y., Teachers Vow 'Finish Fight'; Await Official Reaction

BUFFALO, N. Y.—(AP)—More than 2,000 striking Buffalo school teachers, vowing a fight "to the finish," Tuesday awaited official reaction to their claim that the city is able to meet demands for a \$1,025 annual pay raise "now".

The strikers, members of the Buffalo Federation of Teachers (Independent), said they were confident that many of the 534 teachers who failed to participate, would join in the walkout now entering its second day.

Bevin Blames Truman For Palestine Problem

200 Are Injured Two Killed As Stands Fall

LAFAYETTE, IND.—(AP)—A section of new wooden bleachers in the Purdue University fieldhouse, jammed with 3,500 fans in the crowd of 11,000 at the Purdue-Wisconsin basket ball game, collapsed Monday night, killing two students and injuring about 200 persons.

The splintering of huge supporting beams gave out sharp cracking noises and crashed to the dirt floor brought an ominous silence over the 11,000 cheering, howling fans.

There was no panic. The hundreds of the occupants of the bleachers, some of whom had tumbled as high as 30 feet, limped or crawled through the crowd to seek medical attention.

Senate Committee Approves Bill To Increase Rent

WASHINGTON — (AP)—A Senate Banking Subcommittee Tuesday approved a bill authorizing a 10 per cent increase in present ceilings on rents.

The bill would end federal rent controls next December 31 and remove the administration of controls from the Office of Price Administration.

Truman Modifies Reciprocal Trade Agreement To Guard U. S. Interests

WASHINGTON—(AP)—President Truman Tuesday sharply modified the Reciprocal Trade Agreements program to make "doubly sure that American interests will be properly safeguarded".

Truman said in a statement that an executive order providing for procedural changes followed conversations he held with Senators Vandenberg (R-Mich.) and Millikin (R-Colo.), and Undersecretaries of State Dean Acheson and William L. Clayton.

Russia Considers U. S. Trusteeship 'Entirely Fair'

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Secretary of State Marshall said Tuesday Russia has advised the United States that the Soviet government feels an American trusteeship over the Japanese-mandated islands in the Pacific would be "entirely fair".

Marshall told a news conference that the Soviet note said Russia took into account that the islands were won chiefly by American armed forces which bore "incomparably greater sacrifices" than others in the Pacific advance.

Ex-Convict Charged With Knife Slaying

GALVESTON—(AP)—CHIEF of Police Fred M. Ford said Joseph Lee Sautler, 32, self-admitted escaped convict, was charged with the knife slaying of Thelma Leslie Cook, 33, Monday night.

Ford said the woman's throat was cut with a small pocketknife in an attack in a tavern. She died a few minutes later in a hospital.

Newsprint Shortage Will Get House And Senate Attention

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The House, spurred by reports that newsprint supplies in cities over the nation have dropped to levels called "critical" and "desperate," will vote Wednesday on a resolution to create a special committee to look into the paper situation.

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Charges President's Call For Admittance 100,000 Jews Wrecked Negotiations

LONDON—(AP)—Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin charged Tuesday that President Truman wrecked negotiations for a peaceful settlement of the Palestine problem by calling for immediate admission of 100,000 Jews to the Holy Land during the U. S. congressional election campaign last fall.

Opening a House of Commons debate on the Holy Land question, Bevin declared there was still a chance of settling it outside the United Nations.

Two Candidates File For School Board Positions

George T. Abell, independent oil operator, and R. W. Hamilton, attorney, Tuesday filed as candidates for election as trustees of the Midland Independent School District in the school election April 5, Mrs. W. H. Gilmore, secretary of the school board, announced.

Abell, who was appointed to the board in January, 1946, replacing E. R. Osborne, who resigned, is seeking his first elective term.

Hamilton is seeking the place held the last six years by Hamilton E. McRae, attorney, who will not seek reelection.

Rescue Plane Lands At Westover Field With 11 Army Fliers

NEW YORK—(AP)—The plane bringing 11 Army fliers, who were marooned for three days 1,000 miles north of the Arctic Circle in Greenland, arrived at Westover Field, Chicopee Falls, Mass., Tuesday, the Air Transport Command announced.

At the controls for the 2,310-mile non-stop flight from Thule, Greenland, was Lt. Bobbie Joe Cavnar of Okmulgee, Okla., the ATC flier who landed his big C-54 on a frozen lake Monday to rescue the marooned men.

178 Japs Killed In Train Wreck

KOMAGAWA, JAPAN—(AP)—At least 178 Japanese were reported killed and 350 injured Tuesday when four cars of a six-car train jumped the track here and plunged down a 50-foot embankment. It was one of the worst railway disasters in Japan's history.

Unofficial reports said the coupling between the second and third cars gave way as the steam train rounded a downhill curve. The last four cars tumbled down the bank into a wheat field.

Hog Prices Soar To All Time High; Attributed To Small Run Of Hogs

CHICAGO—(AP)—A pork chop good consumer demand for meat and an unusually small run of hogs, May Face Low Receipt.

Marvin Henning, Agriculture Department reporter in the hog market, said "only about 20 per cent of last Spring's pig crop still remains to be marketed and we face low receipts until last Autumn's crop starts moving around May or June."

Livestock experts explained, however, that even last Autumn's crop was not large. Pigs farrowed were estimated at 30,627,000 head, 11 per cent lower than the preceding year and 5 per cent below the 1935-44 average. It was the smallest pig crop since 1940.

As a result, the amount of pork available this Spring and Summer also will be the smallest in seven years, traders stated.

LATE NEWS FLASHES

ORANGE — (AP) — Approximately 17,700 striking workers Tuesday were pouring back into the \$100,000,000 Dupont plant, idle since January 22, but about 400 members of a union representing common labor issued a statement at noon that they would not return to their jobs.

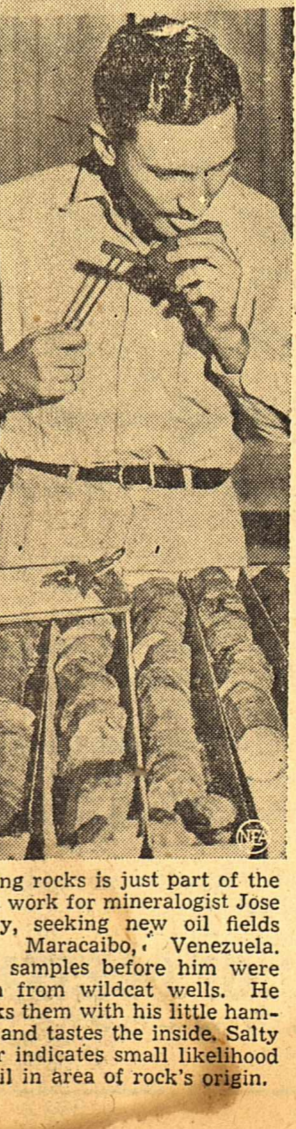
Washington — (AP) — Senator Taft (R-Ohio), put the Army and Navy on notice Tuesday that while they may escape severe budget cuts this year the next Congress session very likely will trim their combined funds to \$7,500,000,000.

AUSTIN — (AP) — The House Tuesday passed and sent to the Senate a bill raising the per capita school apportionment to \$55 intended to make possible a \$2,000 minimum annual salary for teachers. The vote was 140 to 4.

ROME — (AP) — Dispatches from Palermo, Sicily, said Tuesday that 21 trunks of cigarettes, valued at 20,000,000 lire (\$92,000 at the current free market rate) and brought to the port aboard the American ship Marine Shark, had been seized by customs officers.

LONDON — (AP) — Britain has sent an "interim reply" to a U. S. State Department request for clarification of her decision to refer the Palestine case to the United Nations, a foreign office spokesman said Tuesday. Details were not made public.

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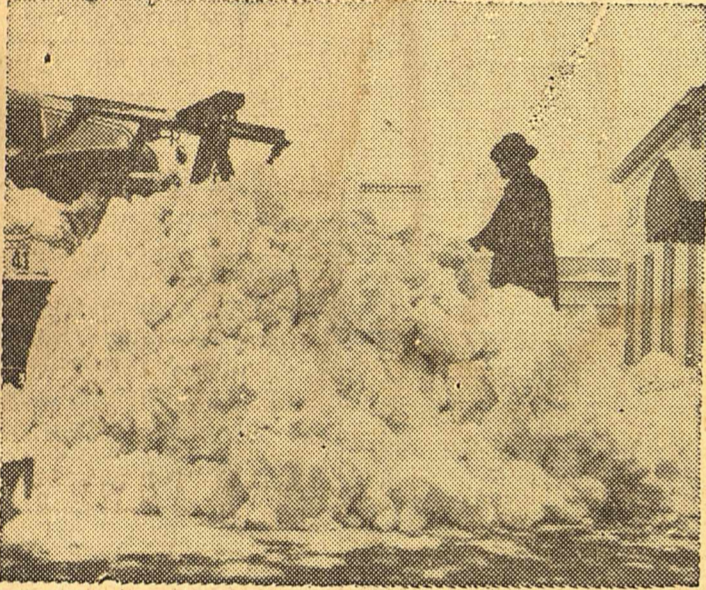

West Texas was coldest, and it was below freezing in much of East Texas. Temperatures ranged between 40 and 50 in South Texas. Tuesday's lows included Wichita Falls 24, Lubbock and San Angelo 25, Big Spring 26, Dallas and Abilene 27.

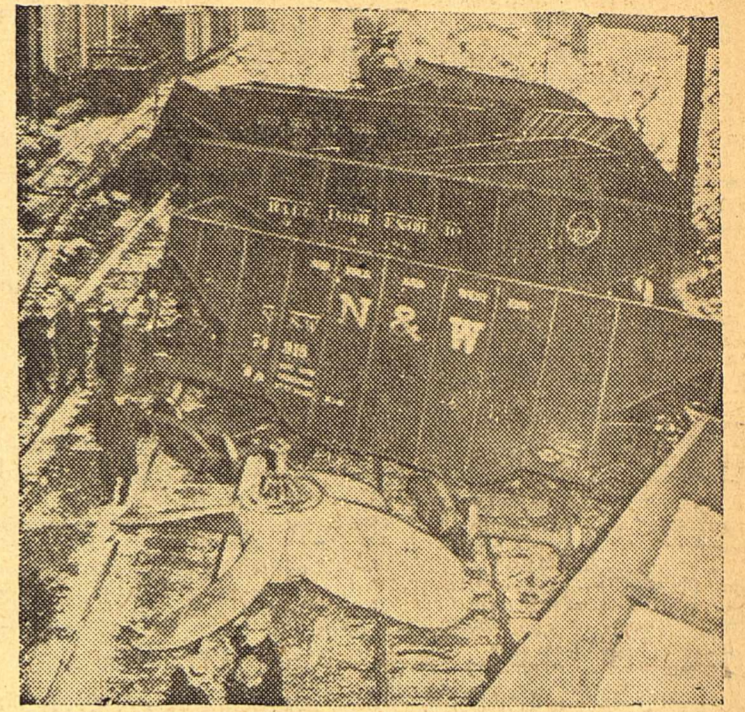
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Ship's Propeller Causes Train Wreck

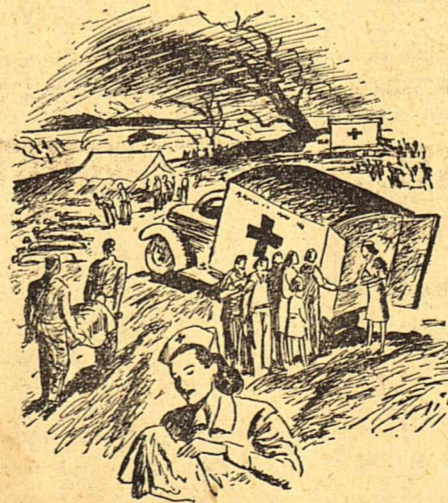
