

NELSON FIELD FLANKER FLOWS PIPE LINE OIL

Shell Oil Company, Inc., No. McCrea, flanker to the initial Ellenburger producer in the Nelson field in extreme Central-West Andrews County, and 1,985 feet from south and 661 feet from west lines of section 9, block A-40, psl survey, kicked off and flowed 323 barrels of pipe line oil in 24 hours from pay at 10,460-494 feet, which had been treated with a total of 3,500 gallons of acid.

Operator was continuing to flow the new well to cleanout. Potential test will be taken shortly.

COKE PROSPECTOR GOES OUT OF STRAWN PAY

Sun Oil Company No. 1 Fred Jameson, one-quarter of a mile south extender to the Silver field, in Northwest Coke County, and 660 feet from north and 1,980 feet from west lines of section 315, block A-1, H&TC survey, went out of the Strawn-Pennsylvanian pay at 6,352 feet.

That section was entered at 6,139 feet and informed sources reveal that all of the zone from that point to 6,352 feet was saturated with petroleum except about seven feet of scattered, thin, shale streaks.

After coring at 6,340-50 feet, and recovering five feet, with the top three feet and six inches be-ing lime showing signs of production; the next four inches being gray shale, and the last one foot and two inches being dry lime, operator went in with the bit. The samples carried signs of porosity and stain to 6,352 feet. None have been shown below that level. At last report the project had drilled to 6,418 feet in dry lime, and was going ahead. It is due to continue until the Ellenburger is en-

countered. Informed observers think the well can be completed for extra good production from the Strawn zone, should it fail to get petroleum in the Ellenburger—if and when, that formation is encountered.

ROWAN GETS OIL IN PROJECT ON SOUTH SIDE OF TXL

Rowan Drilling Company No. Parker, on the south side of the TXL area in West Ector County, and 660 feet from south and 1,980 feet from west lines of section 40, block 45, TP survey, T-1-S, was taking a drillstem test in the Devonian at 7,756-7,800 feet.

The tool was open two hours. Gas showed at surface in 20 minutes. There was no gauge on the gas. Recovery was 180 feet of heavily oil and gas cut drilling mud; 540 feet of oil and gas cut mud, and said they were confident 180 feet of clean oil. There was no water.

Flowing pressure varied from 300 pounds to 425 pounds. Shutin bot-tom hole pressure was 2,700 pounds.

Incident Of The Occupation

One of the latest incidents of American occupation troubles in Germany, if a minor one, is reported by a New York Times correspondent and concerns a fourth-grade reader used in Munich schools. The book, presumably approved by our military government, contains pictures of battle-bloody German soldiers marching, references to "Holy German Soil", and the following quotation, attributed to Jesus:

'When outrageous wantonness seeks to enslave you and destroy what you have inherited from your fathers and ruled as something God has lent you, then shall your plows become swords until the Holy Mother Earth is clean."

Protests against this book, the correspondent says, came not from American authorities but from Germans-

a school superintendent and a group of writers. As such incidents multiply it becomes more apparent that perhaps an investigation of our whole occupation is needed. Congressmen who have suggested it have been told from on high that it might damage our foreign policy. Yet it would seem that it would be worth the risk of embarrassment to try to kill the sprouts of second-growth nazism, and to kill them quickly.

Dear Diary

We should like to present a brief outline of the Morgenthau diary controversy, and offer a compromise solution.

Henry Morgenthau, as secretary of the Treasury, kept a diary. It ran into 900 volumes. When he resigned he took it home. His successor, Secretary John Snyder, wants it back. Says it's public property. Henry says, 'It's mine"

Now you don't compile 900 volumes of diary in a dozen years by any 15-minutes-a-day arrangement. It takes time. In Morgenthau's case, it also took a good deal of his secretaries' time.

That time is company time, and in this case the company is the American people. Morgenthau was a public servant. If he hadn't been he wouldn't have had a chance to meet all those interesting people and hear all those interesting things that fill his diary. His secretaries were also public servants, paid with public money.

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




