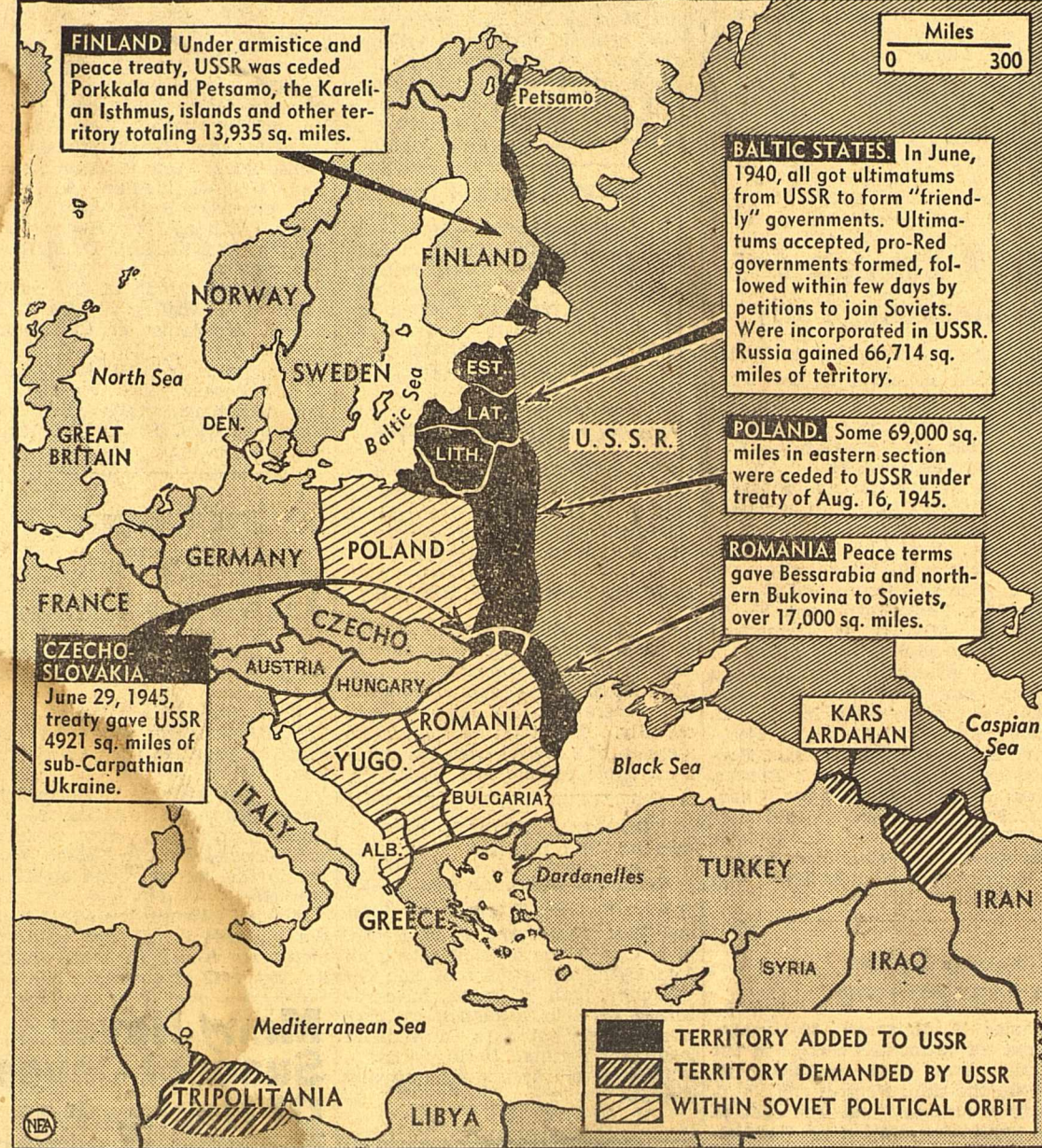

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Fourth American Expedition To South Pole Labeled Success

ABCARD THE U. S. S. MOUNT OLYMPUS —(P)—The fourth American expedition exploring the mysteries of the Antarctic has been "very much a success" both in discovery and in polar training for the Navy, Rear Adm. Richard H. Cruzen said Thursday as this flagship began her long journey home over a fog-veiled sea.

The Mount Olympus and the Burton Island are steaming toward New Zealand with their work finished, and Cruzen declared "the time is getting short" for further flights by the Eastern or Western wing groups.

Got 'Real Insight'
Cruzen, the task force chief, said naval personnel on the expedition got a "real insight into the type of problems you have to risk in polar regions, and that was the primary objective—to find out what our problems are."

In aviation exploration, Cruzen said, "one of the most surprising things was the ability of seaplanes to operate in the open sea from seaplane tenders which had been built only to service seaplanes inside sheltered harbors."

Rear Adm. Richard E. Byrd's flight over the South Pole obtained good photographic coverage of new areas, especially in penetration beyond the pole, where a plateau was found to extend flat and featureless, Cruzen continued.

Court Renders Decision In Favor Of Upton County Man

AUSTIN —(P)—The Third Court of Civil Appeals has reversed a Travis County District Court judgment and rendered judgment in favor of Joseph H. Shirk for overpayment of inheritance taxes in Upton County.

The court ruled that as executor of an estate, Shirk paid inheritance taxes on property in Indiana and Illinois totaling \$7,635.78. This amount absorbed all of the 80 per cent deduction on federal inheritance taxes except \$60.81 or the \$628.24 collected by Upton County for the Texas inheritance taxes.

The remainder of the payment on Texas taxes was ordered returned.

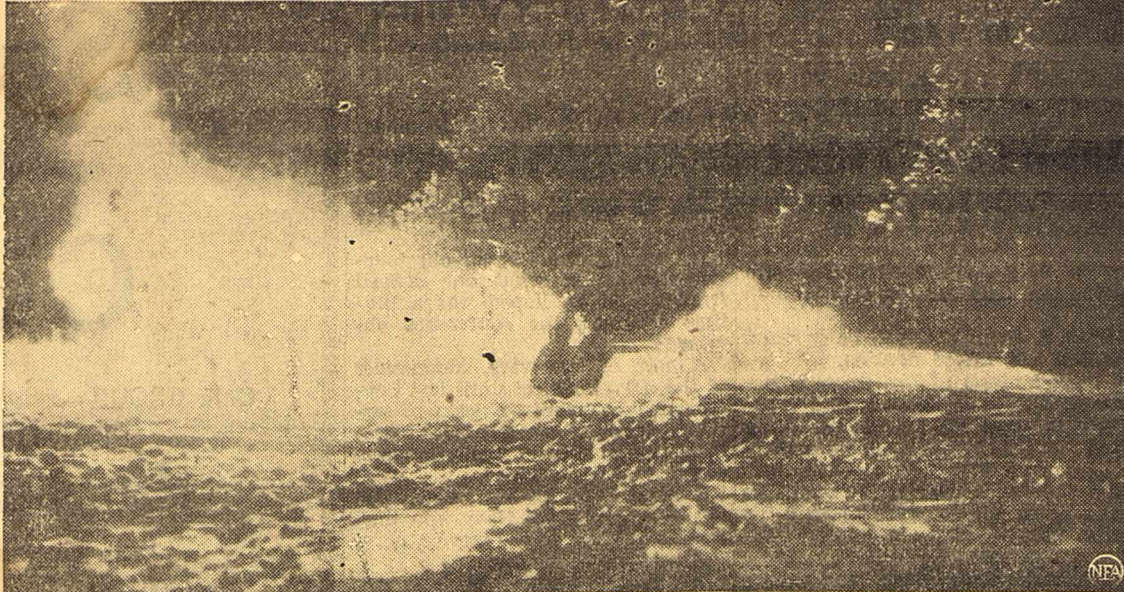

Second Presentation Of Pennsylvania Dutch Comedy To Be Staged Thursday

The most hated man in Midland Wednesday night was "Papa" Aukamp, the tyrannical father whom Leon Valdes portrayed so well in the Community Theater's first presentation of "Papa Is All".

The student audience seemed to fear him as if he were a Frankenstein monster, and hissed and booed him as though he were a Simon Legree.

If it could be said that one portrayal stood out more than the others, the honors would go to Valdes.

But the others played their parts well before what is considered a difficult audience for a play based on a religious theme—an audience of students, which almost filled the City-County Auditorium.

The play will be presented for the general public at 8:15 p. m. Thursday and Friday.

The play is in the peculiar Dutch dialect of the Pennsylvania Dutch, containing an odd placement of prepositions and an odd placement of the words in the sentence.

The interest of the audience lagged at the beginning, but once the plot got well underway, the characters held the students on the edge of their seats until the final curtain.

The plot was based on the rebellion of the members of the Aukamp family against the father, who used the belief of the Pennsylvania Dutch Mennonites to further his own selfish ends rather than in the spirit of the religion.

It was written and staged as a comedy and provided the audience many laughs, but from another point of view it was a tragedy—involving miserable lives under the brutal father, a shooting, and a penitentiary sentence.

Mary Fern Bray did an excellent job playing the part of "Emma," the daughter, who defied the tyrannical rule of her father to "go to a worldly picture show with a boy." Mrs. William Y. Penn, the "Mamma," handled the Pennsylvania Dutch dialect superbly, as she joined with her children against Papa.

The neighborhood gossip, whose slip of the tongue (intentional or otherwise), informed the father of "Emma's" secret love, added spice to the story. The part was well portrayed by Cornelia Patton as "Mrs. Yoder."

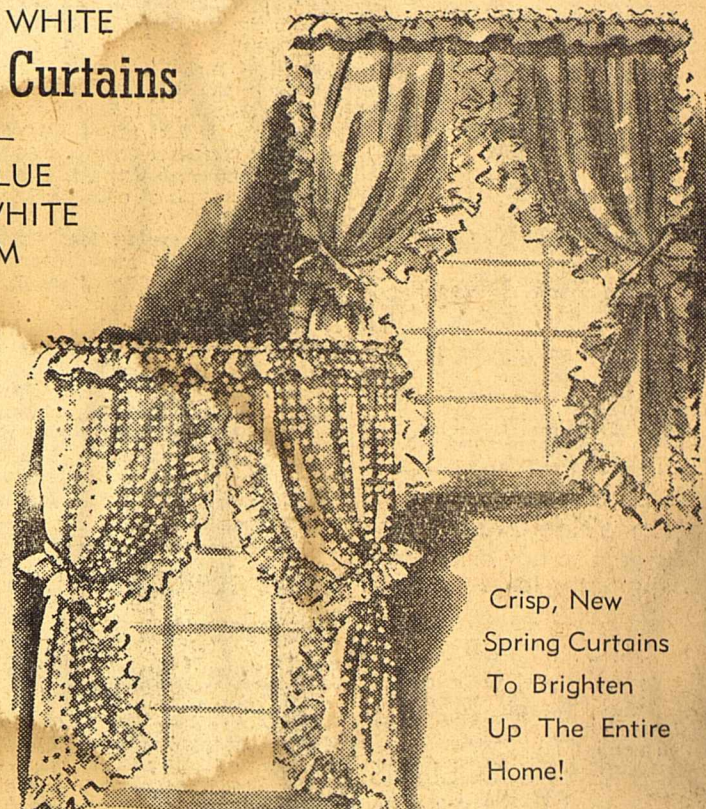
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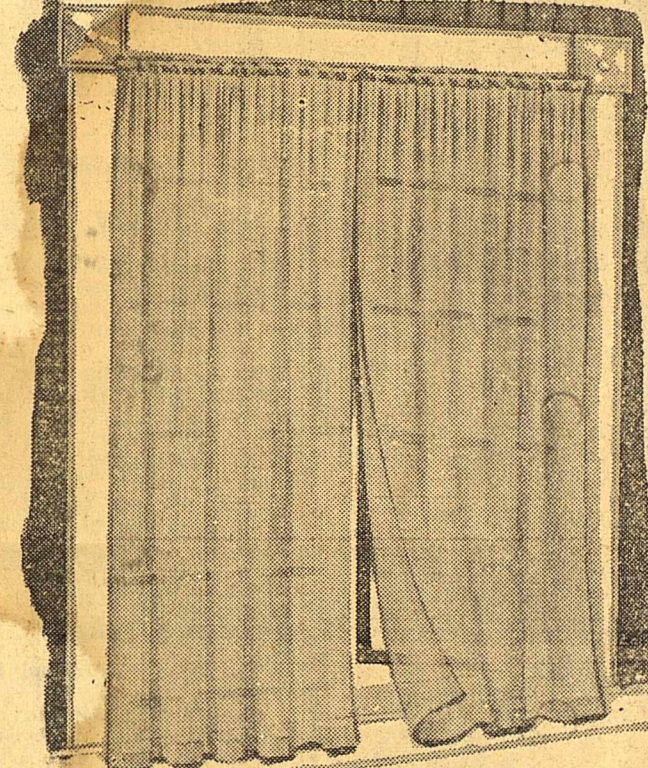

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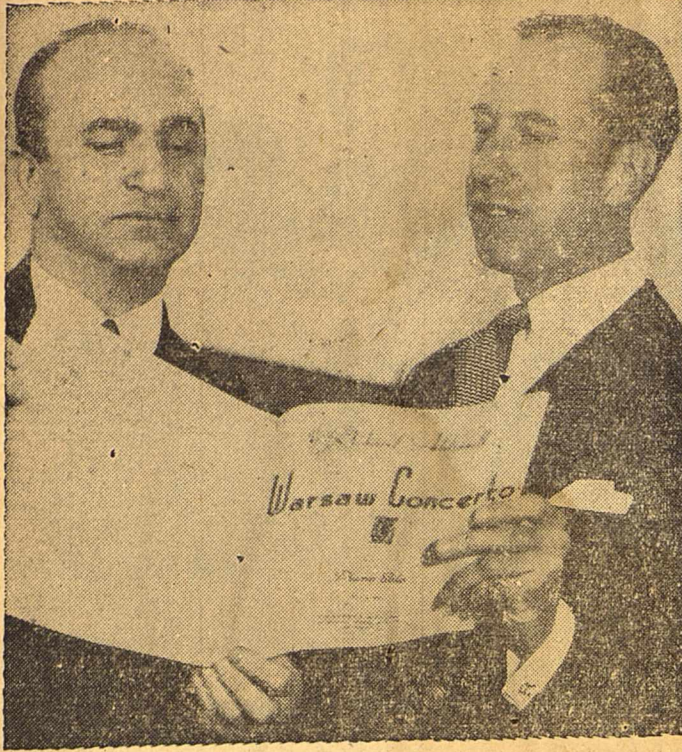

WASHINGTON —(AP)— Whisky, wine and beer accounted for more than seven cents of each \$1 in federal taxes collected during 1946. Internal Revenue figures released recently show that the govern-

ment took in \$2,690,982,000 from levies on alcoholic beverages — an amount equivalent to about \$19 for each man, woman and child.

Midland Internal Revenue Collector Offers Advice On Filing Income Taxes

With the March deadline for filing 1946 income taxes just a little more than two weeks off, William H. Harrison, deputy collector in Midland, has issued a report entitled "Income Tax Misconceptions" designed to aid citizens in figuring their income taxes.

Beginning Monday, Harrison will devote all his time to aiding persons who need personal assistance in working out their tax report. His office is on the second floor of the courthouse.

Harrison's observations on tax misconceptions follow: "The U. S. income tax laws and regulations are most intricate. It is always difficult and some times impossible to determine just what is the law. Even learned judges differ. However, there is quite a body of non-existent 'law'. That is to say, misconceptions as to what the law does say. And it is my intention to clear up some of the misconceptions.

"First of all, I want to mention penalties. There are two kinds, civil and criminal. The ordinary citizen utterly fails to distinguish between them. If he has to pay additional money to the collector of internal revenue, he looks upon it as a fine. Just as long as he does not go to prison, he has committed no crime, he reasons. Such a misconception is quite natural. The additional money he is sometimes called upon to pay is divided into four elements.

Additional Payments "The first and most common is additional taxes. A person may make some innocent error in making a return, and must pay the tax which should have been paid in the first place. He has indeed committed no crime.

"Next, he must pay interest on that tax from the date it was due to the date he pays it. He had the use of the money, and Uncle Sam demands six per cent for it. "Third are civil penalties. The payer has committed no crime, but he may have been negligent in the punctual filing of his return or estimating the tax.

"Finally comes the outright criminal penalties. I have never seen an official pronouncement on these, but the attitude appears to favor fines instead of imprisonment, though both are provided for by law. The function of the Internal Revenue Bureau is to produce revenue. Taxes can't be collected from a man in jail; and the government has to pay to support him. Also, criminal trials are by juries, which are not always friendly to the prosecution on tax cases, except in flagrant cases.

"I am frequently asked what are penalties for certain things. This feature is difficult to answer. My advice is: Don't worry about what the penalties are. There are plenty of them and Uncle Sam will see that you pay them if you should. Make your return accurately and promptly, and your conscience won't need think about penalties. Medical Expense

"Another point is medical expenses. No item in individual tax returns is more misunderstood. Some six or eight years ago some of the states provided for medical cost in their deductions for state income tax returns. Such a demand developed for congressional action that the Federal Income Law was revised to permit such deduction to a limited degree. So now nearly everybody is going around complacently, deluded by the thought that all medical cost are deductible. Nothing could be further from the truth.

NEW INSECTICIDE BETTER THAN DDT

CHICAGO—(AP)—Development of a new insecticide reported capable of killing some important insect pests unaffected by DDT was announced recently by Dr. Leo R. Tehon, acting chief of the Illinois History Survey.

The new insecticide, tetraethyl pyrophosphate, was found unusually effective in laboratory tests against aphids and mites, destructive crop pests described as difficult or impossible to control by DDT.

More than 700 species of mush rooms have been proved edible.

Executive Yuan Approves Ambassador Appointment

NANKING —(AP)— The Executive Yuan has approved appointment of Dr. Lo Chia-lun, member of the Control Yuan, as first Chinese ambassador to India.

U. S. Government Holds Interest In 400 Businesses

WASHINGTON—(AP)— The Government holds controlling interest in approximately 400 businesses seized during the war, Director Donald C. Cook of the Alien Property Office reported. He told the Senate Civil Service Committee the largest of the firms is the General Aniline and Film Corporation with approximately 7,000 employees.

The Government acquired its interest by taking over the property of enemy aliens. Such assets, Cook said, total \$228,000,000 on which the Government earns about \$10,000,000 annually. The Civil Service Committee is making an inquiry into the number of Government employees. Cook said his office has 705 employees but needs more to handle its work.

The 7,000 tons of tung oil produced in the United States in 1946 is estimated to be about one-third of the amount the American paint industry could use.

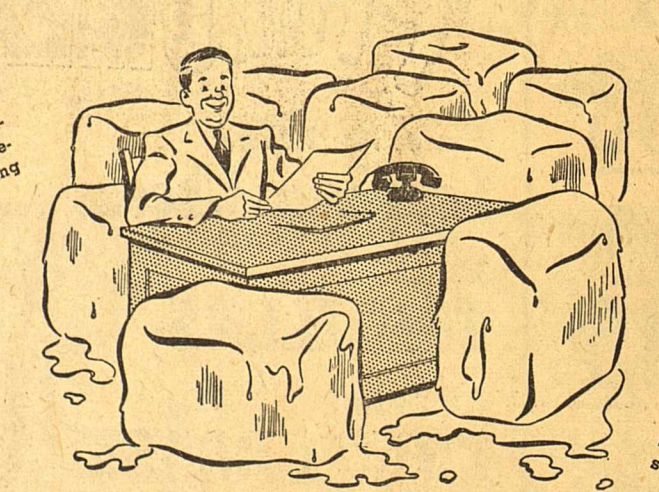

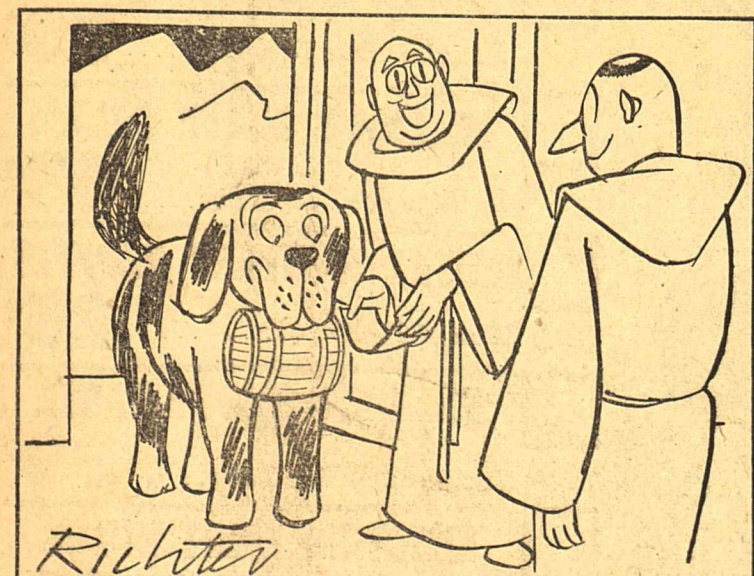

American Consulate In Italy Discovers Mummy Of Former Vice-Consul In Monastery Catacombs

By MICHAEL GOLDSMITH
PALERMO, SICILY —(P)— The American consulate was in a dither. The mummified body of a former vice-consul was discovered on exhibition in the catacombs of the local Capuchin monastery.

For centuries the Capuchins had made a business of embalming Palermo folk and stashing their bodies in the catacombs, so they might be better remembered.

Well over 18,000 Palermitans paid for the privilege of mummification. The vice-consul was one of the last, the practice having been forbidden for sanitary reasons after 1889.

It all began in 1624, when one of the monks came back from Egypt with an idea for replenishing monastery funds.

He posted a proclamation: "My dear brothers and sisters:

Governments May Keep Trade Control

WASHINGTON —(P)— Most governments are likely to continue controls over their foreign trade for some time, a Commerce Department consultant said.

Henry Chalmers, a commercial policy consultant, writing in the department publication, "Foreign Commerce Weekly," noted some relaxation of restrictive controls in 1946, but added:

"Return of many countries to more normal international trade relations depends on various political settlements yet to be worked out and upon how soon these countries recover from internal economic disorganization."

The war-caused conditions which led to imposition of the restrictions in most countries "are likely to continue well into 1947," he said, adding that these restrictions did less to limit 1946's huge potential volume of trade than:

1. General world shortages of transport facilities and of many commodities, especially foodstuffs and coal.
2. Limited ability of many countries to finance the purchase of available foreign goods.

He indicated belief these factors would continue of major importance on trade in the near future, although long-range prospects for expanding world commerce probably will be determined by how much important trading countries can agree on "a concerted program for liberal trade policies."

Chicago Gunman Gets Hot Seat After Robbery

CHICAGO —(P)— Police are looking for a gunman who robbed and bound two victims and fled with pants affire.

Carly Whiddon and Guy Mooney said they surrendered \$40 and a pistol to the intruder who tied them with a rope and shoved them into a closet. Whiddon added:

"Then, through a crack in the door, we saw him back into the oil stove, scream, and run out the door with his trousers smoking."

"The day will come when you die. Your body will be buried and your relatives will not be able to see you any more in the years to come. And think of the worms!

"No, no, my dear brothers and sisters! I will starve the worms by keeping your body upon the earth, visible at any time.

"Mummification! That is the great art I have learned in Egypt. And I am going to mummify you all, if you graciously allow me to do it."

Immediate Response

There was an immediate and heavy response, and, what with deacons and visiting GI's of World War II, the friars of Palermo have never since been in need.

This correspondent, like thousands of other Americans before him, went to see the mummies. A heavily bearded monk pointed his weak light to a coffin in a far corner.

"There," he announced, "lies the American vice-consul, draped in the American flag."

This was news to the American consulate. A special consular mission investigated. There, in the dark corner, screwed to a coffin lid, was a white enamel plaque, which read:

"Giovanni Paterniti, vice console degli Stati Uniti.
"31 Maggio 1910."

Why had the vice-consul been mummified 21 years after the practice was forbidden by the government? The monk did not know.

Consul Albert W. Scott turned up his own records. Yes, there had been a vice-consul of that name. He had died in 1910. Giovanni Paterniti was "honorary" vice-consul, and an Italian citizen.

Agriculture Department Discounts Pork Price Rise

WASHINGTON — (P) — The Agriculture Department discounted talk of \$1-a-pound pork chops with an assertion that housewives won't stand for it.

Skyrocketing hog prices merely reflects a seasonal decline in marketable animals, said Charles L. Harlan, department livestock price specialist.

And he told a reporter he expects consumer resistance—which means housewives with their dander up—to force a downturn in those prices soon.

BRAKE FAILURE BLAMED

YOKOHAMA — (P) — The disastrous train wreck near Komjawa which killed 178 persons and injured 350 Tuesday was caused by the failure of air brakes on one of the four coaches that were derailed, the Military Railway Service reported.

If Mrs. O'Leary's Cow Caused Fire, She Gave Uncle Sam Headache

WASHINGTON — (P) — Mrs. O'Leary's cow caused Uncle Sam no end of bookkeeping trouble if she actually set off the great Chicago fire in 1871 by kicking over a lantern.

The Treasury, in reporting the value of paper currency in circulation this month at \$28,927,777, disclosed that for 76 years it has carried on the books an even \$1,000,000 in bills of unstated denomination, marked up as "unknown, destroyed."

The Department believes bills in that amount were destroyed in the Chicago fire when a Treasury substation burned. But since it is not definitely known, the amount still is carried on the books.

what adjusted gross income is. If you don't you should find out promptly. Your medical deduction is limited to the excess over five per cent of that adjusted gross income. Suppose that is \$2,000 and your medical costs \$100. That is exactly five per cent so you may take no deduction. However, no individual may deduct more than \$1,250. On a joint return a married couple is limited to \$2,500.

"Funeral costs are not deductible. If you get a receipt for every dime you spend for medical care you may have them as a deduction within the limitations set forth above. But you must have positive proof of your payments and attach an itemized list of them to your return. Do not attach the receipts. Keep them carefully until the deputy collector or revenue agent calls for them. A check is evidence of some payment made to your druggist but it might be for cash so a receipt is proof.

Dependent Exemptions

"The next most common fallacy concerns excise taxes. None of the excise tax are deductible. Some of the state gasoline tax is deductible depending upon the state. Texas happens to be one of the states allowing deduction.

"Another misconception has to do with the exemption for dependents. More questions asked that point than any other. The definition of dependents was altered at the same time that adjusted gross income was written into the law. Too many people are unaware of those changes although most of them favor the taxpayer. Briefly a dependent is a person within certain prescribed degree of relationship who has a gross income of less than \$500 and derives his or her chief support from you. The age has nothing to do with it. If you have a son, 17 years old and earns \$500 from a grocery store working on Saturdays he is not a dependent. If you have a son in medical school 23 years old and you furnish his support then he is a dependent.

Calendar Year Misconception

"Probably the worst misconception that exist among business men is that they must report their business on a calendar year basis. Better than four out of five businesses would be better off on a natural fiscal year. A fiscal year is defined as a year ending on the last day of any month excepting December.

"By adopting such a year to suit your business you would inventory when your stock is the lowest and your accounts receivable and payable are the least. In short, your business accounting would be made during the slack season and thus give you more time and enable you to secure expert advice from a recognized accountant or lawyer. There is a small catch to it. One, you must secure permission from the commissioner to change. I have never known the commissioner to refuse when such a request was given in plain language with the reasons. The initial trouble is repaid 10 fold."

Czechoslovakia Wants To Export Shoes To US

NEW YORK — (P) — Czechoslovakia is anxious to export between 2,000,000 and 3,000,000 pairs of luxury quality shoes to the United States in 1947 in exchange for badly needed chemicals and machinery, Dr. Jiri Kubelik, general manager of Czechoslovakia's nationalized rubber and leather industries said at a press conference here.

The shoes to be exported would not compete with average-grade American shoes on the market, he said.

Kubelik's talk followed conversations with U. S. Department of Commerce representatives and with leading American shoe manufacturers.

"The only way Czechoslovakia can pay for imports is with her own manufactured products," he said. "We are buying large quantities of hides from Iran and paying for them with Swoda-built locomotives," he added.

Discussing Czechoslovakia's production goal for the year, Kubelik said his country would manufacture 7,000,000 pairs of shoes of all types in 1947.

The United States has more than 33,000,000 homes wired for electric service.

Balloon Soloist Plans Future Ascensions

MINNEAPOLIS, MINN. — (P) — His first solo balloon ascension accomplished, Don Piccard planned future flights to help his stratosphere exploring father, Dr. Jean Piccard, who is preparing for a high-altitude ascension.

Young Piccard, a physics student at the University of Minnesota, ascended with a 30-foot mulberry paper Japanese bomb balloon recently from a Minneapolis playground and drifted about 25 miles. He rose to about 2,000 feet.

Young Piccard tested a new type aluminum gondola designed by himself and also a new type gas outlet valve developed by his father.

Size Limits Of British Newspaper To Continue

LONDON — (P) — British newspapers, cut back to wartime size by the current coal crisis, will have to continue size limits throughout this year, Lord Layton, chairman of the Newspaper Supply Company's Rationing Committee, announced.

Sizable Air Force

MANILA — (P) — The Philippine Army has only 22 planes in flying condition, and only one is a fighter, Secretary of National Defense Rupert Kangelon told a congressional budgetary committee.

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

The grant brought total U. S. credits to Hungary to \$30,000,000.

Arthur Schoenfeld, said the step was taken "to the end that the Hungarian people under the leadership of their freely elected government might attain political and economic stability and thus be in a position to participate fully within the family of independent nations."

A Hungarian political leader said the phrase "freely elected government" in the announcement was its keynote. He said Communist leader Tyas Rakosi in Parliament had received the report of the grant "in cold silence."

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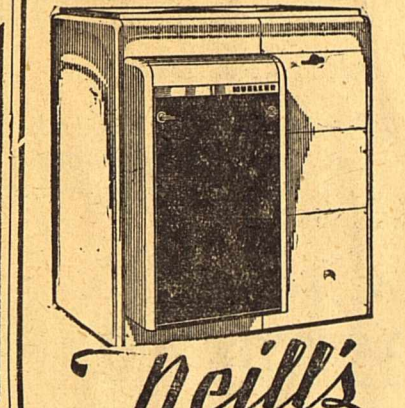

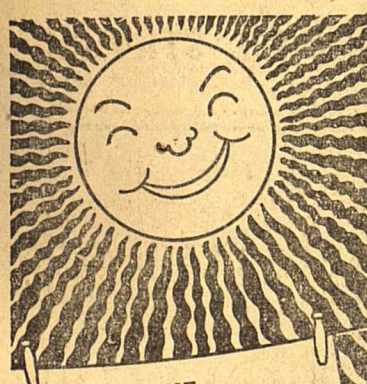
Eve Curie, Publisher And Daughter Of Radium Discoverers, Is Touring America

NEW YORK —(AP)— Eve Curie, chic, dark-haired daughter of the co-discoverers of radium, has arrived in America for her first post-war visit with a new feather in her cap.
She has become a newspaper publisher in Paris.
Miss Curie, in partnership with Philippe Barres, son of the French author Maurice Barres, has been serving as publisher, editor and

sometimes special writer for Paris-Press, an afternoon paper with a circulation of 400,000—second largest in France.
In doing so, she enters a new phase of a career that has seen her in the guises of concert pianist, music critic, play adapter, lecturer on French problems, war correspondent, member of the Fighting French forces and author of a biography of her famous mother.
"Paris-Press is completely independent," she explained in an interview. "We are not tied to any political party. We have no big banker behind us."

The French press, she said, started from zero after the liberation. The old newspapers had been destroyed through collaboration. It was possible to establish a newspaper without needing "an enormous amount of capital." By a cooperative arrangement, publishers became "clients" of the printers' cooperative. They were able to use the old newspaper plants without great initial outlay.

Although there still is governmental licensing and control of newsprint, Miss Curie said this is due to scarcity. She believes the controls will vanish with increased supply.

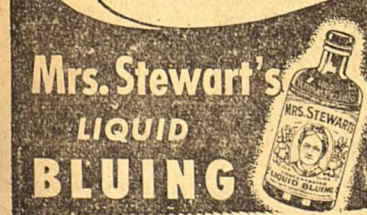

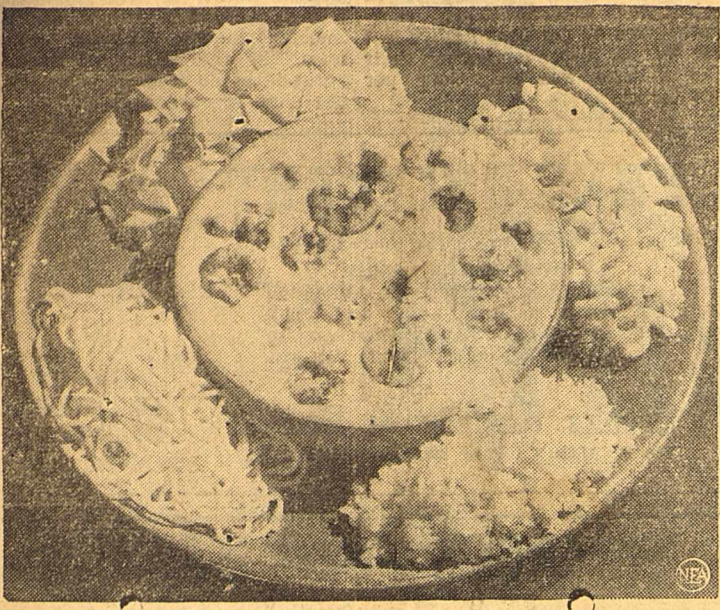

Add Shrimp To Lenten Menus



Serve tangy shrimp in sauce with rice or noodles or spaghetti.

Here are two canned shrimp recipes for your Lenten menus:
Tangy Shrimp in Sauce
(Serves 4)

Three tablespoons butter or fortified margarine, 4 tablespoons flour, 1 teaspoon salt, 1/4 teaspoon pepper, 1/2 teaspoon dry mustard, 1/2 teaspoon paprika, 1 7-ounce can shrimp (1 1/4 cups), milk.
Melt butter or margarine; blend in flour, salt, pepper, mustard and paprika. Drain shrimp, reserving liquor. Add enough milk to liquor to make two cups. Add milk gradu-

ally to flour mixture. Cook, stirring constantly, until thickened. Add shrimp; heat. Serve on rice, macaroni, noodles or spaghetti.
Floppy Shrimp Omelet With Curry
(Serves 4)

One 7-ounce can shrimp (1 1/4 cups), 4 egg yolks, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/4 cup warm water, 4 egg whites, 1 1/2 cups curry white sauce.
Drain shrimp; shred. Beat egg yolks in large bowl with salt and water until very foamy and almost stiff. Beat egg whites stiff, but not dry. Fold egg whites carefully into yolks; fold in shrimp. Pour egg mixture into oiled, heated skillet or omelet pan. Spread mixture evenly on top. Place over medium heat; cook until omelet has risen and is lightly browned on under side. Place in moderate oven (325 degrees F.); bake 30 minutes or until omelet is firm to the touch. Cut through center of omelet; fold over. Place on serving platter; top with curry sauce. Serve immediately.

Convoy To Escort Geese Across Iowa

COUNCIL BLUFFS, IOWA—(AP)—A 50-man convoy to escort an estimated 500,000 migrating geese northward across Iowa has been planned.
State and Federal wildlife officers will travel by foot, car and air to see that "trigger-happy" hunters don't disturb the birds as they travel up the Missouri River flyway to Canadian nesting grounds.
The migration usually is the nation's largest concentration of geese. It is illegal to shoot them in the spring.

It has been estimated that there will be 40,000,000 passenger automobiles in the United States by 1965.

Electronic Machine Used To Grade Eggs

IITHACA, N. Y.—(AP)—An electronic device, said to hold promise of revolutionizing the grading of eggs, has been developed at the Cornell University Agricultural Experiment Station.

Prof. Alexis L. Romanoff, creator of the device, says it is far more accurate than the usual method of grading eggs by candling.
In the new method, the egg is placed in a field of radio frequency. The egg absorbs the electric power and the result shows up on a meter.

Only drawback to the new method, Professor Romanoff reveals, is that it does not indicate blood spots if present, making one candling necessary. But it does

eliminate several subsequent candling operations. Nearly all market eggs (over 50,000,000,000 per year) are graded several times.

The Cornell poultry professor believes that another important feature of electronic grading is in selection of hatching eggs.

U.S.-Financed Road And Bridge Program To Begin

MANILA—(AP)—The \$40,000,000 American-financed roads and bridges rehabilitation program in the Philippines will get underway in March, Francis C. Turner, chief of the U. S. Public Roads Administration office here, said.

Community Uses Plane To Solve Smoke Problem

NINETY SIX, S. C.—(AP)—An old military plane, minus wings, has gone to work in a huge sawdust pile as the solution to this rural community's industrial smoke problem.

Smoke from a four-acre sawmill pile of wood dust that was constantly burning blanketed the town and nearby roads and became a hazard.

The answer seemed to be to get the pile burned faster, rather than leaving it to smoulder. The plane fuselage was set up at the pile, the propeller fanning the fire and blowing the smoke away from the mill and the town.

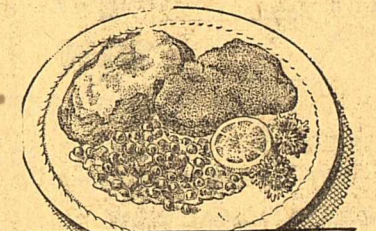

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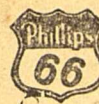
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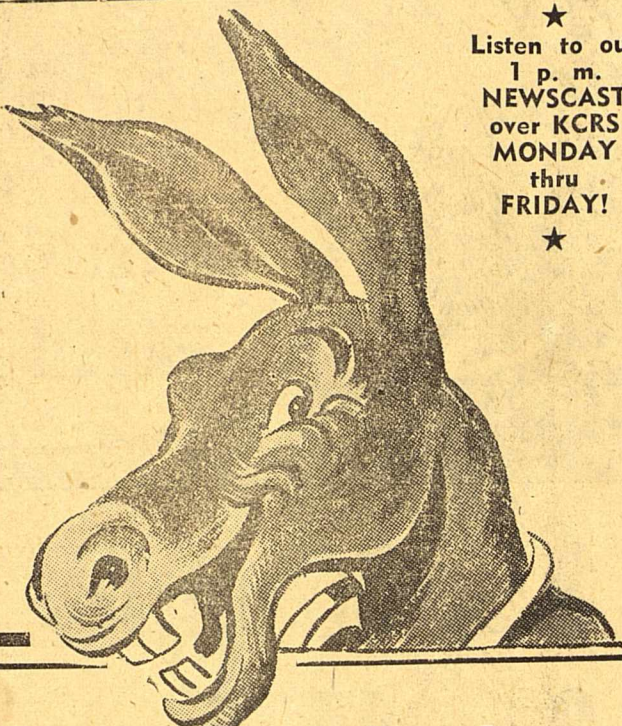
