

Britain May Default Obligations

British-French Form Alliance

Agreement Will Be Signed Tuesday At Dunkerque By Foreign Ministers

LONDON—(P)—Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin announced agreement on a British-French treaty of alliance in the House of Commons Friday.

Bevin said he and French Foreign Minister Georges Bidault would sign the treaty next Tuesday at Dunkerque.

"It is evidence of the bonds of friendship" between the two countries, he said.

Dunkerque has special significance to the two countries as a scene of horror and defeat resulting from attempted wartime cooperation that fell short of its goal of stopping the Germans in 1940.

Anthony Eden, conservative former foreign minister, congratulated Bevin for concluding the new alliance.

"Close and enduring friendship between the two nations is a contribution to world peace," Eden said, adding that members of the House "would all be with Bevin in spirit at Dunkerque."

The House members cheered. Bevin's announcement did not include a delineation of the terms of the treaty, which was agreed upon in principle last month while Leon Blum, then French premier, was here for talks with Bevin and Prime Minister Attlee.

Industry-Wide Bargaining Opposed By Union Official

WASHINGTON—(P)—Walter W. Generalo of Waltham, Mass., head of the Independent American Watch Workers Union, Friday told the Senate Labor Committee he favors legislation to restrict industry-wide bargaining, outlaw jurisdictional strikes and require a 30-day cooling-off period before walk-outs or lockouts.

In his prepared statement he proposed banning Communists from unions and laws requiring Democratic procedure in union elections. He opposed other labor bills before Congress.

WEST PALM BEACH, FLA. — (AP) — The Army Friday sent a rescue squadron of four flying boats speeding toward the town of Trinidad, in Northern Bolivia, where upward of 3,000 persons were reported clinging to treetops, roofs and debris in imminent danger of drowning in a flood.

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The Senate Appropriations Committee voted 8 to 5 Friday to allow the Office of Price Administration \$17,991,315 to continue rent, rice and sugar controls until June 30.

ABILENE — (AP) — Dr. W. R. White, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Austin and former president of Hardin-Simmons University, in a statement issued here Friday protested the action of the House State Affairs Committee in approving a bill to legalize parimutuel betting.

WASHINGTON — (AP) — President Truman Friday nominated Eugene R. Black, Jr., vice-president of Chase National Bank in New York, as United States executive director of the World Bank.

Senate Committee Rejects Clapp As TVA Head

WASHINGTON — (P)—The Senate Public Works Committee voted 7 to 5 Friday to reject the nomination of Gordon Clapp as a director of the Tennessee Valley Authority.

Chairman Revercomb (R-W. Va.) announced the committee's action but declined to say how individual members voted in the closed meeting.

Clapp was named to succeed David E. Lilienthal, who has been nominated for chairmanship of the Atomic Energy Commission. The nomination was opposed in prolonged hearings by Senator McKellar (D-Tenn.) on grounds that Clapp permitted communistic activities among TVA employees.

Clapp denied any connection whatever with the Communist Party or any sympathies with its principles.

Revercomb said the committee's "unfavorable report" on President Truman's nomination of Clapp would go to the Senate "promptly."

House Crushes Attempt To Modify Pay Measure

WASHINGTON — (P)—By one-sided votes, the House crushed Friday two attempts to modify a measure banning virtually all portal-to-portal pay suits — now amounting to \$5,785,000,000.

Beaten back were two motions to increase the statute of limitations fixing the time which suits may be brought against employers under the nation's minimum wage and hour laws.

Committee Closes Hearing On Nomination Of Arnold

WASHINGTON — (P)—The Senate Finance Committee closed its second hearing on the nomination of Herbert Arnold, Dallas, Texas, to be internal revenue collector for Northern Texas and announced it would vote on its recommendation to the Senate at the first opportunity.

The announcement said it would hold a closed session when all members could be present.

License Plates May Be Put On Cars

Car owners Saturday may legally attach their 1947 auto license plates to their vehicles. Many car owners "jumped the gun," but officials obligingly overlooked the matter.

BIG SPRING — (P)—Virgil Dodson, 21, of Westbrook died here Friday morning of injuries suffered from an automobile collision near here Thursday night. Three others were injured in the crash but are expected to recover.

Army P-52 Fighter Makes 4,978-Mile Non-Stop Record Flight From Honolulu To New York

NEW YORK — (P)—The Army P-52 fighter Betty Jo, its fuel nearly exhausted, roared into LaGuardia field at 10:06 a. m. (CST) Friday, establishing a record non-stop 4,978-mile flight from Honolulu in approximately 14 1/2 hours.

The pilot of the twin-engine fighter, Lt. Col. Robert E. Thacker of El Centro, Calif., won a daring bid to reach his New York objective by pushing his plane against 65-mile headwinds and low fuel tanks that threatened to bring the Betty Jo down in Pennsylvania.

Emergency equipment lined the field as the plane roared out of a blue sky to the field and landed safely.

The official landing time was listed as 10:08:44 a. m. (CST). Unofficial estimates gave the elapsed flying time from Hickman Field, Honolulu, as 14 hours and 32 minutes.

Russia Believed To Have Airborne Army Of 100,000 Men

WASHINGTON — (P)—Russia is believed to have an airborne army in being or in training far surpassing that of any other power.

Information filtering out of Russia indicates, it was learned Friday, that the Soviet Union's strength in troops trained for lightning strikes from the air may number as high as 100,000 men.

This force compares with the single airborne division which the United States possesses. That division—the 82nd at Fort Bragg, N. C.—has an authorized strength of 13,000 men but presumably is below that figure.

Some strategists note that the reported 100,000-man strength of the Russian airborne force may be misleading because of a possible Soviet deficiency in the important matter of air transportation.

Russia's primary aviation interest during the war was in fighter type planes. She virtually ignored heavy bomber aircraft and, either because of policy or production difficulties, did little transport plane building.

What her strength in transport is today is uncertain.

One of Pioneers

Although Russia was one of the pioneers in prewar paratroop experiments, she made little use of airborne forces during the conflict with Germany, presumably because of her own peculiar military problem.

It is assumed that Russia's planning may have changed since then. Because she now finds herself with only a negligible naval fleet and an insufficient merchant marine capable of handling large troop movements, airborne units may have taken on an enhanced value in her eyes.

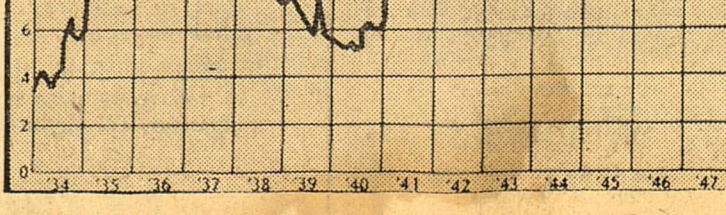

U.S. May Take Over English Commitments In War-Torn Greece

WASHINGTON — (P)—Britain, her domestic economy near the breaking point, was reported in congressional and diplomatic quarters Friday to have proposed that the United States take over her commitments in Greece on a large scale.

Although there was no White House confirmation, this was understood to have been the subject—at least in part—of a highly secretive White House conference Thursday among President Truman, his diplomatic advisers, and key legislators.

One source said that the United States would issue a statement soon on what part, if any, it would assume in helping bolster the shaky Greek government.

(In London, a foreign spokesman said British and United States discussions were under way in Washington on the problem of continuing the economic and military obligations in strife-torn Greece now borne by Britain.

The spokesman implied one aspect of the talks was the continued provision of foreign currency with which Greece could purchase arms and military equipment.

No U. S. Troops To Greece

(The discussions, he added, arose out of a meeting, ending March 31, on Britain's commitment to maintain the Greek armed forces. The same spokesman said he saw no prospects of U. S. military forces being sent to the country after Britain's forces get out.

Other government sources said Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin was planning to withdraw Britain's remaining 10,000 troops from Greece within the next three months.

It was learned from diplomats in Washington that the whole problem of Greece, together with a report on Britain's waning resources, was laid before Secretary of State Marshall by Lord Inverchapel, British ambassador to this country, at a recent conference.

Should the United States decide to take over a large share of British commitments in Greece, and perhaps elsewhere, to help restore Europe's stability, it could well force a complete redrafting of this nation's plans for foreign relief expenditures.

This in turn might force an upward revision of both President Truman's budget estimates, a problem which in turn would affect the current congressional drive for trimming his \$37,500,000,000 figure, tax cuts and debt reduction.

Co-Operative Hospital For Midland County Proposed By Rural Group

Twenty-five Midland County citizens, mostly from the rural areas, met in the Midland County courthouse Thursday night, heard Judge E. F. White of Stanton discuss the operation of the Martin County Memorial Hospital in Stanton, and appointed a committee of three to investigate further the feasibility of establishing a co-operative hospital in Midland County.

Judge White, who is president of the board of the Stanton hospital, spoke at the invitation of several Midland County Home Demonstration Club women. A delegation of interested persons had visited the Martin County hospital, which celebrated its first anniversary February 15.

Elected to the investigating committee were J. Howard, Sherwood O'Neal and Mrs. Jim Baker. Second Meeting March 13

The committee was instructed to investigate possible costs and the chances to obtain surplus Army buildings and medical supplies from Midland Army Air Field. It was also instructed to visit the Martin County hospital and possibly the co-operative hospital at Amherst, near Lubbock.

The committee is to report its findings to another meeting of interested parties at 8 p. m. Thursday, March 13.

County Judge Clifford C. Keith called the meeting to order. He said, as he understood it, the meeting was called under the citizens' democratic right to assemble, to discuss the possibility of building a co-operative hospital in the county. He then introduced C. C. Thomas, manager of the Midland

Production, Credit Association, who served as chairman of the meeting. Thomas introduced Judge White. Judge White discussed the problems and benefits of a co-operative hospital. He spoke of possible opposition, and said the co-operative hospital was designed especially for low-income families.

Co-operative hospitals are not socialized government, but rather are a democratic means the people have to ward off government doctors. "If the people can't get medical care in regular hospitals or co-operative hospitals, the government will be forced to provide doctors. That will be socialized government," he said.

He defined a co-operative hospital as one to which memberships are sold and a yearly fee is charged. He said the fee usually covers only the doctor's bills, and that the member pays the room, medicine and other costs.

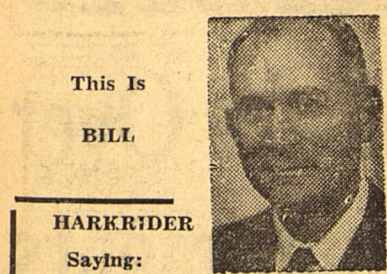
For Midland Memorial Hospital

An open discussion followed the talk. During the discussion Thomas pointed out that it was not the purpose of those who called the meeting to oppose the erection of the proposed Midland Memorial Hospital. Various persons present said Midland needed the Midland Memorial Hospital. They said the co-operative hospital would be designed to help the low income and rural groups who ordinarily cannot afford regular hospital treatment.

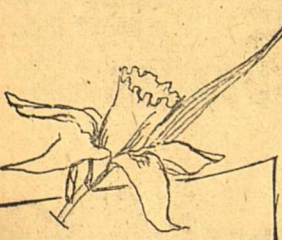

Let's Co-Operate

On its first anniversary the Air Force Association, an organization of former Army fliers, endorsed the proposed armed forces unification as "a definite step in the right direction". But it also expressed the hope that a separate air force might eventually include the Navy's landbased aircraft, and that unification might be extended down from the present top level.

Lt. Gen. James Doolittle, the AFA's president, urged these developments in the interest of efficiency, effectiveness and economy. His arguments have since been bolstered by two articles in Collier's magazine by W. B. Courtney, called "Will Russia Rule the Air?" These contrast the development of new air weapons by Russia and Britain, both of which have independent air forces under a unified command, with our own efforts.

General Doolittle revealed that until recently American research in the field of guided missiles was being carried on independently by the Army Air Forces, the Army Ordnance Department, and the Navy Bureau of Aeronautics and Ordnance. Army research has now been coordinated, he said, but it is still separate from Navy research in the same field.

Obviously, such methods are a waste of money, time and skills. They would be bad enough if we had a comfortable lead in the development of new air devices. They are rather frightening when one reads Courtney's account of how far our wartime allies have gone in the same direction.

All the Courtney facts are not new. But gathered together they form an impressive argument for putting our air research on a more realistic basis.

During the war, says Courtney, we gave Russian engineers unlimited opportunity to study our aircraft production methods. We gave British designers sufficient leisure to go ahead with advanced research while we built most of the aircraft and parts used in the Western European theater.

Today Courtney gives us the edge in such things as production experience, airline equipment, airports, private flying and backlog of trained military fliers. He puts Russia in front on all points of foresight, research and future war potentials. England leads us in organized national research, electronics, jet engine development, and possession of bases.

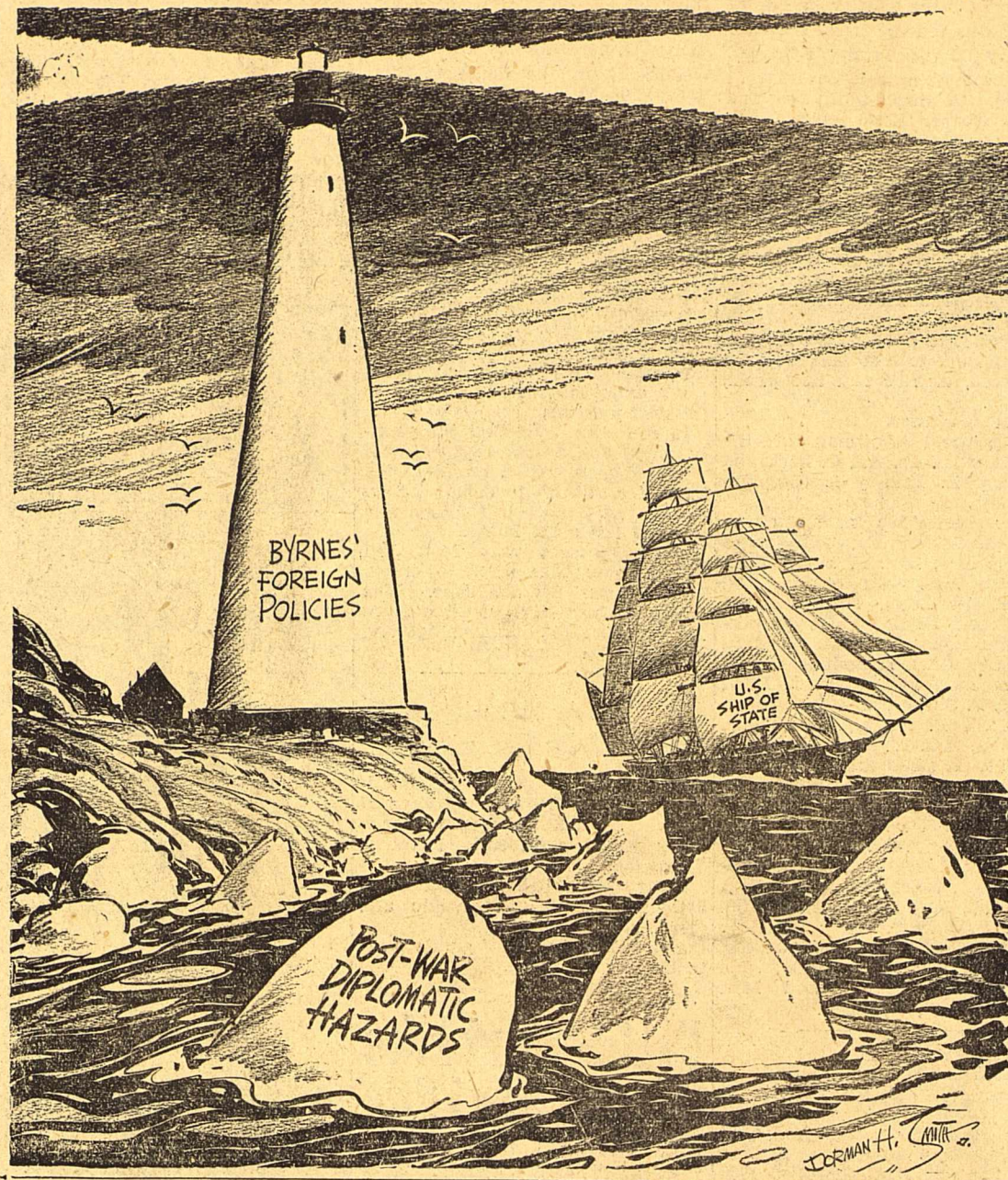
England is building a \$100,000,000 National Aeronautical Establishment, planning a National Gas Turbine Establishment, and training leaders for both the RAF and the aviation industry at a national air college.

Russia, of course, has the ultimate in integrated national planning. The Soviet government is not accountable to its citizens for expenditures. Nor is it telling anyone what's being done in air and atomic research.

Nearly 40 years ago Alexander Graham Bell said that whoever ruled the air would rule the world. That prediction's fulfillment may be close at hand. We don't want to rule the world, but we don't want any other one country to do it, either. It is time that we get co-ordinated and get going toward the future. One way to start would be to follow General Doolittle's suggestion of integration, all down the line.

THE WORLD IN CHAINS

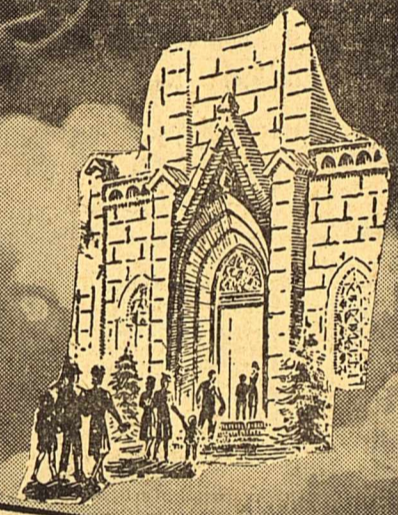

McKENNEY ON BRIDGE

Eight or 10 years ago psychic bidding was employed by everyone, but today the expert seldom will deliberately throw in a psychic bid. There are so many people now who play a good game of contract that psychic bidding does not throw them off the track.

However, the very fact that it is not employed promiscuously shows that there still is a place for it in contract. In a recent duplicate game, Jack Cushing of New York and his partner were using the ace-showing responses to two-bids, so that North's response of three diamonds

over two spades showed the ace of diamonds. Cushing (South) immediately knew that, at worst, he had a club finesse for six-odd in spades.

When North bid four spades, Cushing felt not only that six-odd was safe, but that he might be able to make seven. He was not going to bid seven, but in duplicate the extra trick is what counts. That is why he cue-bid the heart suit. His five-heart bid in reality said to his partner, "I have no losing hearts." His purpose was to make it difficult for West to open the heart suit—and the bid did have a decided psychological effect.

There was West with the king and one heart. Should he lead his partner's suit, or try a different opening lead? West should have led the king of hearts. He should have felt safer in doing so because South had indicated no heart losers. But this is the story of a psychic bid that worked. West opened his fourth best club. Cushing won, pulled the trumps, cashed his other high club, went over to dummy with the diamond ace and discarded his losing heart on the king of clubs, making seven.

Crozier Tech of Dallas, defending class AA champion, beat Paschal of Fort Worth 39-36 Thursday night to make it two straight.

Finalists have been determined in one region of class A, four regional tournaments start Friday night and three others will be played Saturday night.

Bobby Feller Leads Big League Money Makers

NEW YORK —(P)— Bobby Feller, the golden boy of baseball's second golden era—even as Babe Ruth was the salaries colossus of the first—leads a total of 26 big league players who will earn from \$20,000 to \$30,000 plus in 1947, a survey shows Friday.

When brilliant Bobby inked a Cleveland contract which will bring him from \$30,000 to \$100,000 for his work on the hill this year, he became the first player with a chance to better the eighty grand a year the New York Yankees paid the Babe back in '30 and '31.

Although the matter of payment is incidental, it should be pointed out that the home run king got his dough in straight salary while Bob is to be paid part of his in bonuses based on home attendance. Approximately \$55,000 of his money will be in straight salary.

Greenberg To Get \$75,000

Although Hank Greenberg's salary has never been disclosed by Pittsburgh officials, it has been learned from a pretty authoritative source that it calls for a flat \$75,000 contract with no bonus arrangements, as previously reported.

Others who will receive more than \$50,000 in 1947 include Ted Williams, who will be paid \$65,000 by the Boston Red Sox, and Hal Newhouser who will draw \$60,000 from the Detroit Tigers.

Honors for being the highest salaried club go to the American League champion Boston Red Sox, who, according to General Manager Eddie Collins, will shell out close to a half million dollars this year. Besides Williams, Dave Ferriss, Tex Hughson, Rudy York, Bobby Doerr, Dom DiMaggio and Johnny Pesky are reported to be in the \$20,000 class.

Bill To Legalize Horse Racing Passes Committee; No Opposition At Hearing

AUSTIN —(P)— Supporters of a bill to legalize horse racing and parimutuel betting wonder if the measure can hold the fast break it got out of the legislative starting gate.

The House State Affairs Committee gave the legislation unanimous approval Thursday after no opposition appeared at a public hearing.

The committee allotted an hour to opponents of the bill at the beginning of the hearing. Near the

close Vice-Chairman John L. Crosthwait asked twice if anyone wished to speak against the bill. Not a word was spoken in dissent.

Speakers Included

Speakers for the bill included Gen. Jonathan Wainwright, adopted Texan and commander of the Fourth Army; Robert J. Kleberg, of the King Ranch; Fred Wyse, Houston horse breeder and owner of a stable of race horses, and G. Rolfe White, president of the Texas A&M board of directors and vice-president of the Texas Cattleman's Association.

The bill would legalize four major tracks for thoroughbreds and any number of minor tracks for quarterbreds under the supervision of a state racing commission. Major tracks would be limited to two 30-day meets each year.

After the committee meeting Kleberg said he felt there would be no trouble in getting Texas capital to finance construction and operation of new tracks.

Kleberg said it was possible that three of the major tracks would be located at the former racing plants of Epsom Downs at Houston, Alamo Downs at San Antonio, and Arlington Downs between Fort Worth and Dallas.

"There might be a fourth track set up for other sections of the state," he commented. "Anywhere the people want it. Maybe in the El Paso area."

The bill carries a local option provision. Twenty per cent of the voters of a county could call an election to approve or disapprove a track location.

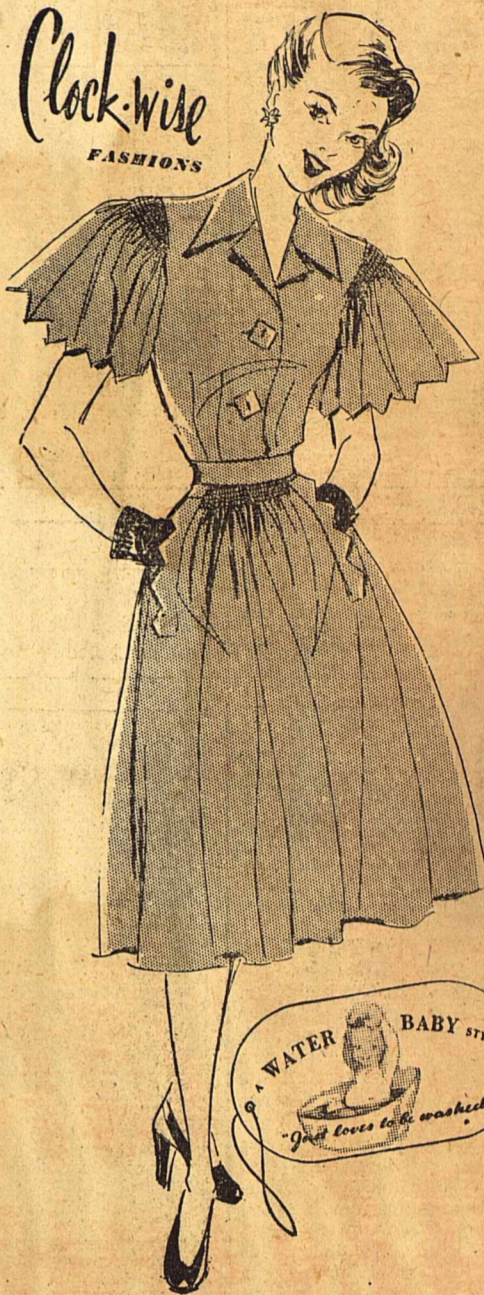
