### PROSPECTIVE DISCOVERY GAINES TO RUN CASING

Cities Service Oil Company No. 1 Riley, prospective discovery for a new oil producing area in West Gaines County, about 15 miles west and slightly south of Seminole, is to run casing to make production

Located at center of Northeast quarter of northeast quarter of section 361, block G, CCSD&RGNG survey, and four and one half miles north of the Doss field, this wildcat ran a drillstem test at 7,196-7,252 feet.

The tester was opened one hour and 15 minutes. Recovery was 90 feet of drilling mud, with no shows of oil, gas or water.

## Let's Co-Operate

On its first anniversary the Air Force Association, an organization of former Army fliers, endorsed the proposed armed forces unification as "a definite step in the right direction". But it also expressed the hope that a separate air force might eventually include the Navy's landbased aircraft, and that unification might be extended down

from the present top level. Lt. Gen. James Doolittle, the AFA's president, urged these developments in the interest of efficiency, effectiveness and economy. His arguments have since been bol-stered by two articles in Collier's magazine by W. B. Courtney, called "Will Russia Rule the Air?" These contrast the development of new air weapons by Russia and Britain, both of which have independent air forces under a unified command, with our own efforts.


General Doolittle revealed that until recently American research in the field of guided missiles was being carried on independently by the Army Air Forces, the Army Ordnance Department, and the Navy Bureaus of Aerosearch in the same field.

future war potentials. England leads us in organized national research, electronics, jet engine development, and possession of bases.

England is building a \$100,000,000 National Aeronautical Establishment, planning a National Gas Turbine Establishment, and training leaders for both the RAF and the aviation industry at a national air college.

Russia, of course, has the ultimate in integrated na-tional planning. The Soviet government is not accountable to its citizens for expenditures. Nor is it telling anyone what's being done in air and atomic research.

Nearly 40 years ago Alexander Graham Bell said that whoever ruled the air would rule the world. That prediction's fulfillment may be close at hand. We don't want to rule the world, but we don't want any other one country to do it, either. It is time that we got co-ordinated and got going toward the future. One way to start would be to follow General Doolittle's suggestion of inintegration, all down the line.
