IN GOLDSMITH WILDCAT

Gulf Oil Corporation No. 421-E Goldsmith, wildcat in the Goldsmith shallow field of Northwest Ector County, ran a drillstem test in the top of the Ellenburger at 9,685-9,730 feet. Recovery was 1,890 feet of sulphur water. Operator re-ported there were signs of oil or gas.

This prospector, located 666 feet from east and 1,992 feet from south lines of section 15, block 44, TF survey, has shown for commercial production from the Devonian and possibly from the Silurian. It is expected that operator will plug back and make production tests in the Devonian.

For Trial Period Gulf No. 1-E-A University-Fogelson, Ellenburger discovery in South-west Ector, and 680 feet from west and 662 feet from north lines of section 7, block 35, University survey, swabbed two hours on perforations at 8,925-35 feet.

STANOLIND TAKES LEASE OF BIG SUGG SPREAD

Stanolind Oil & Gas Company has acquired the 10-year commer-cial lease on the Sugg ranch in Irion, Reagan, Sterling and Tom Green Counties, which was report-ed Sunday as having been leased to Henderson and McMillian, Midland independent oil operators. Announcement of the Stanolind purchase of the big spread was released Monday by representatives of that concern in Midland.

It was also announced that Stanolind would shortly start making a seismograph survey of the acreage. No information has been given out regarding terms of the deal between Henderson and McMillian and Stanolind. It has been reported in San Angelo that the land owners were paid a cash bonus of \$1.00 per acre for the lease, and that the contract calls for an annual rental of fifty cents per acre during the ten-year life of the deal.

The two deaths from the fire brought to three the total number of Midlanders killed in fires in recent months. A negro child perished several weeks ago.

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

The alarmed opponents of a big cut in national defense appropriations have been using polite and general terms. They have said that a drastic reduction would weaken our delegates' position at the coming Moscow conference, that we would lose prestige before the world, that we would not be able to fulfill our international commitments, and so on.

All this isn't the whole truth. A little more frankness would be helpful. For it might keep this country from repeating the costly mistake of what Senator Van-denberg calls "disarming alone".

Why do we need a military budget of \$11,000,000,-000? We have no aggressive intentions. We don't fear attack from Britain or France or Mexico. We are not going to fight Germany or Japan again. Why, then, this enormous sum?

Everyone knows the answer, of course. But nobody in official circles will come out and say it. The President TUESDAY has asked for this record peacetime sum for the Army and Navy because, with good reason, this government is distrustful of the Soviet government's intentions.

These are known facts: The Soviet government still has a large force of men under arms. It has appropriated the services of the bulk of Germany's best military scientists for a vast research program. It is trying to produce an atomic weapon.

The British government takes a realistic view of the situation. With a military budget vastly larger than ours, in proportion to wealth and population, it has geared up and integrated a research, development and industrial program, especially as regards aircraft and air weapons. Meanwhile there is real danger that America's military machine may be allowed to grow weak to the point of falling apart.

We are embarrassed and depressed to see the world's three major powers preparing for war while they talk of
