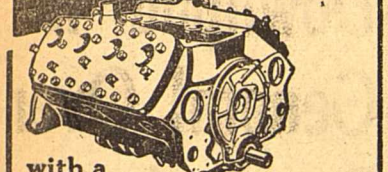

Company, and others No. 1-B Owens, West Crockett County wildcat, which flowed oil from the vertical section of the Pennsylvania, above total depth at 5,670 feet. The project is now being operated as a "tight" well.

TEXACO HAD GAS ODOR AT YOAKUM PROSPECTOR
The Texas Company No. 1 Samuels, Northwest Yoakum County wildcat, about 11 miles northwest of Plains, and northwest quarter of section 24, block D, John H. Gibson survey, logged a gas odor in drilling samples at 5,146-50 feet. It is now drilling ahead below 5,155 feet in lime.

DOLLAR HIDE STEP-OUT SETS STRING OF PIPE
Magnolia Petroleum Company No. 1-C E. P. Cowden, northwest step-out from Devonian in the Dollar Hide field in Southwest Andrews County, and 660 feet from north and 1,980 feet from east lines of section 7, block A-55, ps1 survey, was bottomed at 7,952 feet, in Devonian lime and chert, and had set 7-inch casing at 7,920 feet, with 350 sacks of cement. Operator will drill out and test the hole, which had flowed 28 barrels of fluid, mostly oil, in 30 minutes in a recent drillstem test.

Telephone Decision Will Be Subject Of Legislative Message

AUSTIN — (AP) — Recommendation of the governor's fact-finding commission in the Odessa telephone stoppage will be the subject of a message to the Legislature, Gov. Beauford H. Jester revealed Monday.

The governor said the commission will meet as quickly as possible, study the transcript of evidence taken at Odessa, and make its report to him and to the legislature.

The commission is not empowered by law to enforce its recommendations, the governor declared. In the Odessa case both sides agreed to abide by its decision, however. If a new situation arose it would have no arbitration status unless both parties agreed to abide by its findings.

Jester said that the public's interest should come first in any legislation seeking to bring management and labor together.

"With its recent experience in dealing at first hand with a controversy of far-reaching effect, the commission is in a particularly favorable position to give us most practical suggestions for strengthening our laws to protect the public interest in such situations," the governor said.
