

WHEN THE task force kicked off its campaign Monday, 178 farmers had signed up for \$1.4 million worth of corn contracts. The goal is a minimum of \$2 million worth and a maximum of \$21/2 million.





2. Size II Library. A free telephone will be placed in each size II Library (one serving less than 25,000 persons), which will have the privilege of calling a designated Size II library collect for requested material not held in the smaller library.

IF THE material cannot be obtained in the Size II library, the request will be automatically re ferred to the major resource center.

Each major library will be equipped with a teletype machine. They will be able to contact Texas State Library for any materials that cannot be obtained through the above channels.

The cost of this service will be borne by funds under Title III of the Library Construction Act (P.L. 90-132), which is administered in Texas by the Texas State Library

WHAT WILL this mean specifically to the residents of our county who use the library? Any book, reference material, or answers to any question not obtainable in our own library, can be received in the shortest possible time through the system. It is my understanding that we will probably be dealing directly with Amarillo, which is our Major Re source Center.

It is hoped the system will be in effect in a very short time and that each library will be notified when it will be allowed to participate.

This will be of tremendous benefit to all participating libraries. In effect, we will have access to practically any library materials available within our state on an interlibrary loan basis.

I have material in the library explaining more fully the Texas State Library network and will be happy to have anyone come in and look at it or I will answer, i possible, any questions you may have. STARTING Wednesday April 3

# **Stockmen Urged:** Make Hay in '68

Livestock owners should start planning now to make high-quality hay this year, says Neal Pratt, Extension agronomist at Texas A&M University.

WITH adequate soil moisture in most areas of the state, opportunities for efficiently using fertilizer are extremely good, he says. Fertilizer helps improve hay quality and at the same time it increases production. More important in some areas of the state, however, is the improved water efficiency of adequately fertilized hay crops, says the agronomist.


Start with a soil test to deterfertilizer and limestone needs, suggests Pratt. Then apply fertilizer early in the spring when pasture grasses start to grow. This is approximately the last frost-free date in the area. Then plan to harvest hay at an inmature stage.

Harvesting before the plant matures is one of the most important factors in making good-quality hay, reminds the specialist. Rainfall is less harmful to forage which has been cut at an early stage than forage which is overmature. Small stems and leaves can withstand rainfall easier and will dry faster than large stems and coarse leaves.

The two secrets for making good-quality hay are (1) fertilize for rapid growth, and (2) harvest before it reaches the mature stage, emphasizes Pratt.

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## **A Good Producing Cotton** With A High Turnout

If there is any one thing that has been on farmer's minds for the past 50 years it is a cotton with a good turnout, and this is certainly emphasized when a farmer has to take 3,000 lbs. of stripped cotton to the gin to make a bale in the fall of the year. Likewise, he also wants a high production cotton along with that good turnout, But where will you find such a cotton?
