AMERADA'S DISCOVERY IN TERRY SHOWS MORE OIL

Amerada Petroleum Corporation No. 1 Adair, wildcat 15 miles south Brownfield in South Terry County, and in southwest corner of section 4, block C-37, psl survey, which has indicated discovery of a new producing area from the San per cent at the top. Andres-Permian, eight miles northwest of the Cedar Lake field, the nearest oil pool-was drilling ahead from 4,930 feet, and will go to about 4,950 feet and take a drillstem test

In a four-hour drillstem test at 4,908-30 feet, recovery was 125 feet of oil and gas cut drilling mud, 1,586 feet of clean oil, of 31.4 gravity, corrected, and 140 feet of drilling water.

Informed sources report that no indication for formation water has been encountered. Operator expects the San Andres water table at around 4,975 feet. This prospect showed first signs of possible pro-duction in the zone below 4,814 feet.

Snyder Urges Senate Not To **Reduce Taxes**

WASHINGTON - (AP)- Secretary of the Treasury Snyder urged the Senate Tuesday to kill the billpassed overwhelmingly by the House-to cut income taxes from 30 per cent at the bottom to 10.5

Snyder renewed the Truman administration's opposition to any tax cut for at least another 14 months, but suggested that Congress, with help from the treasury, "review the whole tax system in anticipation of later tax reductions.'

Declaring that a general cut now is "neither necessary nor appropri-ate," he was first witness before the Senate Finance Committee hearing on the House-passed bill. As an example of his contention that the measure is inequitable,

Snyder said it would eliminate 22 per cent of the difference between present taxes and 1939 taxes for a married person with no dependents and a \$5,000 net income, but would wipe out 69 per cent of the tax increase since 1939 for a man with a





JERUSALEM - (AP) - Terrorists blew up a British troop train south-east of Tel Aviv Tuesday, killing at least eight persons, and then nachine-gunned the wreckage. The attack was made two hours after two condemned Jews committed suicide with explosives just before they were to be committed to the gallows.

Army sources said they believed the "Egypt Express," bringing soldiers from that country, had been attacked by members of the Jewish inderground group, Irgun Zvai Leumi.

Troops and guards were reported to have exchanged fire with the attackers, but no one was captured. News of the wrecking of the train juickly spread through the Holy Land, adding to the nervous tension created a short time earlier by the disclosure of the suicides.



It does not apply, as the proposed law would, to baseball players, movie and stage actors and others who work every year, are paid at once, but have great variations in income from year to year.

As suggested, the plan would provide a "moving average." That is, the taxpayer each year could average in the past four years if that would reduce his tax, however he may have filed the previous year. Or, if he chose, he could ignore the average and consider only his curent income

If the taxpayer's income should drop materially, by averaging in the past four years he could get a refund.

John C. Williamson, a VFW spokesman who presented the plan to the Ways and Means Committee, explained its purpose like this:

"Veterans, as a group, will experience wide fluctuations in their incomes for the next few years of readjustment. The present income tax system is designed for persons whose income is fairly steady from year to year. This averaging plan will make it possible for persons to balance lean years with good years. "Under the present system a person whose net income alternates between nothing and \$10,000 will pay about 50 per cent more taxes, in the long run, than a person whose net income remains constant at \$5,000, even though they both end up earning the same amount of money.


A recent poll of leading tax experts revealed that 86 per cent favor some system of averaging yearly earnings. But previously suggested plans have been rejected for one reason or other.

Some experts believe that the VFW plan is more workable because of its optional nature, because it provides "a moving average," in-cludes refund, and permits use of simple short form return. They say that the present pay-as-you-go (Ruml) plan, with refunds, would care for most of the administrative troubles that previously have been stumbling blocks to an averaging plan.

J. C. Dockery of the Department of Commerce's Office of Small Business, in an article on "The Finance and Tax Program for Small Busi-ness," has urged the desirability of an averaging plan for businesses whose incomes fluctuate greatly from time to time.

Author of the VFW's plan is Richard A. Mullens, tax attorney and former Army captain who served in the Pacific in World War II. He is special tax consultant to the VFW's National Legislative Committee.

Slight Setback For Mr. Lewis

The country saw a strange sight recently. John L Lewis backed away from an established position of his own accord, without court order, threat of government action, or any other dramatic outside pressure. And strangest of all was the slightly balky behavior of his United Mine Workers.

Usually Lewis' slightest request gets unquestioning obedience from the miners. But thousands of them ignored his order to stay out of all but two of the country's soft coal mines, allegedly for reasons of safety.


This was one apparent reason for Lewis' withdrawal of the order. The other was Federal Judge T. Alan Goldsborough's refusal to refund \$2,800,000 of the \$3,500,000 fine which he imposed on the UMW for contempt. The judge questioned the mine union president's good faith in issuing the stay-away order, and expressed doubt that safety was his first concern.

The dollar sign loomed large in the miners' decision to go back to work. Some returned to mines which apparently had failed to pass inspection on technicalities which involved no great hazard. Others went back to pits where real danger undoubtedly exists.

It is a sad thing that miners must often risk their lives needlessly in order to provide a living for their families. It is no less sad because they have been doing it for years. The hazards of their work are a challenge to the operators, state mine inspectors, the federal Bureau of Mines, and to the law which permit dangerous conditions to go uncorrected.

Lewis could help greatly in lessening these hazards. But he has consistently overplayed his hand. For all his shrewdness as a tactician, his self-seeking methods and dictatorial manner have become increasingly apparent. He has brought things to a pass where most of the country now looks with suspicion on his activities in the worthiest of causes.

So today there is a fear that Lewis may use his power to force through a law which would give him the deciding voice on questions of mine safety. With a different leader some such law might be acceptable. But if Lewis were given that power it is highly probable that he might use it to punish a stubborn operator or further his own am-
