## Kansas City Ballot Boxes Stolen

### Courthouse Vault Burglarized After Charge Of Fraud

KANSAS CITY — (AP) — Primary election ballots checked by a county grand jury in its investigation of alleged vote frauds Wednesday were reported missing from the vault of the Kansas City board of election commissions.

Ludwick Graves, chairman of the board, said both doors of the large storage vault in the county courthouse had been pried open and "three ballot boxes containing ballots checked by the grand jury have been opened."

"One of the boxes," he added, "is definitely empty."

### Britain's Labor Party Gives Full Policy Support

MARGATE, ENGLAND — (AP) — Foreign Secretary Ernest Bevin Wednesday won a vote of confidence from Britain's ruling Labor Party by more than two to one in a preliminary skirmish on foreign affairs at the party's annual conference.

The delegates voted 2,357,000 to 1,109,000 for rejection of a composite resolution calling for a "review of our military commitments and the distribution and organization of the armed forces, in order that they may be reduced considerably below the government's target for March, 1948."

The government also won a victory on its proposals for economic planning and manpower distribution for coping with the country's current economic crisis.

Resolutions supported by the party's national executive were given almost unanimous approval, while others disapproved by the executive were defeated or withdrawn.

Graves said the theft of the ballots apparently was "the work of professionals."

Exact Cause Of Texas City Disaster Is Not Determined By Board

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The Coast Guard reported its investigation of the Texas City explosions failed to disclose any specific cause for the disaster.

Samples of nitrate like that carried by the French vessel Grandcamp when it blew up April 16 did not explode when tested with rifle bullets, fire, oil, and contact with heated metal, the report said.

The report did say, however, "hardly without exception" the persons who were concerned with the handling of the nitrate cargo "displayed a lack of knowledge of the provisions of regulations governing the safety of the operations either by land or water."

Prohibitions against smoking were printed in the French language on various parts of the exterior of the ship," it added. "No such signs in English were posted. Control of smoking on deck and in the holds was lax. Smoking on the main deck near No. 4 hatch was committed."

Although no specific cause of the explosions was brought to light, the report pointed out that fire had been discovered on the ship an hour before the initial blast occurred at 9:15 a.m.

Creation of a special committee to study and "determine every aspect of the characteristics of ammonium nitrate, develop additional information relative to its hazards in transportation, handling and storage" was recommended in the report.

Taber Declares U. S. Should Follow Hoover

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Chairman Taber (R-NY) of the House Appropriations Committee declared the Administration should accept "immediately" Herbert Hoover's suggestion this country write its own peace treaties with Germany and Japan.

"It is perfectly apparent the Administration has let things get out of hand," Taber told reporters after observing that American financial commitments abroad between now and July 1, 1948, will amount to close to \$5,000,000,000 if pending legislation is passed in its present form.

Declining to suggest a deadline for getting Russia's agreement to speed big-power treaty making, the New York lawmaker contended: "the more we fool around with it, the more we get involved in international handouts."

Taber's opinion was advanced against the background of a two-year private huddle between Hoover and an appropriations subcommittee. At Tuesday's meeting, the former Republican chief executive expressed his approval of a \$725,000,000 Army appropriation request for civilian relief in Germany, Austria, Korea and Japan.

Appeals Court To Hear Thomas For Third Time

AUSTIN — (AP) — The state's third attempt to convict 51-year-old Jim Thomas for murder in the slaying of Dr. Roy Hunt of Littlefield came before the court of criminal appeals on oral argument Wednesday.

On Oct. 19, 1946, Thomas was found guilty and given a life term on charges of murdering the Littlefield physician. Thomas appealed.

It was the third time since 1943 that he had been convicted. Two previous convictions, both assessing the death penalty, were reversed. The first was sent back for new trial because of jury irregularities, the second because the court held the circumstantial evidence in that trial was not sufficient.

Thomas was originally arrested in October, 1943, a day after the bodies of Dr. and Mrs. Hunt were found mutilated and bound in bed at their Littlefield home. Thomas was tried only in the slaying of Dr. Hunt.

Rodeo Grounds To Be Given DDT Treatment

Preparing for the 12th Annual Midland Rodeo, workers who are spraying the city with DDT will move out to the rodeo grounds Thursday afternoon and treat the entire grounds, corals, concession booths and grandstand with the insecticide.

W. M. Howard, sanitarian for the Midland-Ector-Howard County Health Unit, is supervising the city-wide campaign, which is sponsored by the Midland Jaycees.

By spraying the rodeo grounds now, Howard said Wednesday, spectators and workers at the rodeo will be assured minimum discomfort from insects during the show.

Last Of Slaughterers Of 700,000 Are Hanged

LANDSBERG, GERMANY — (AP) — U. S. Army executioners hanged 26 more elite guard administrators of infamous Mauthausen concentration camp Wednesday, completing the execution of 48 of the camp's guards and foremen for war crimes.

One man received a last-minute reprieve. He was Otto Striegel, 32, the Mauthausen mess sergeant. A final decision is expected from U. S. Army headquarters within 24 hours.

When informed of the reprieve, Striegel defiantly demanded to know why he was not being hanged with his comrades.

An American military court convicted the 48 men of slaughtering more than 700,000 persons of many nationalities at Mauthausen.

SEVEN WHITE MEN ARE ARRESTED IN LYNCH CASE

JACKSON, N. C. — (AP) — The state of North Carolina, following up fast breaking developments in attempted mob action against a young negro here last Friday, Wednesday prepared to bring seven white men to trial on charges of kidnaping in the affair.

Names of the seven, arrested late Tuesday night, were withheld by authorities who hinted there might be additional arrests and disclosures of the names would interfere with the continuing investigation. The men, however, were released on bonds of \$2,500 each.

MAVERICK APPARENTLY LOSES MAYOR'S RACE

SAN ANTONIO — (AP) — City Tax Commissioner Alfred Callaghan apparently was mayor of San Antonio on the basis of complete, but unofficial, returns in the city election held Tuesday.

Returns gave Callaghan 25,392 votes against 22,434 polled by former mayor and congressman, Maury Maverick.

AGRICULTURE RESEARCH FUND TENTATIVELY RAISED

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The House tentatively boosted funds for agricultural marketing research by more than 50 per cent after hearing a cry that Russia is outstripping this nation in that field.

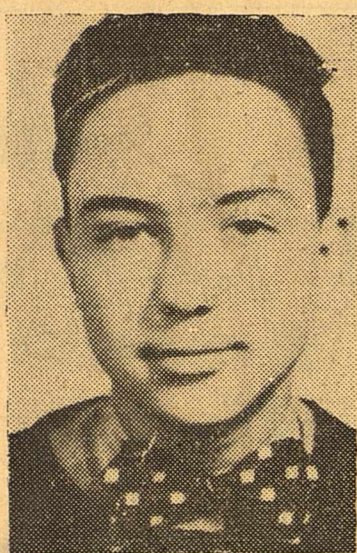

Rowan Gets Good Well From Devonian at TXL

Rowan Drilling Company No. 5 Parker, 660 feet from south and west lines of section 40, block 45, TP survey, T-1-S, and on the south side of the TXL field, in West Ector County, took a five and one-half hour drillstem test in the Devonian at 7,799-7,860 feet. Gas showed at the surface in four minutes. Oil started flowing from surface in 70 minutes. It was flowed to pits for 30 minutes, and then flowed to tanks for three hours and 45 minutes. During that time it made 63.43 barrels of oil.

Superior To Dig Three More Deep Tests in TXL

Superior Oil Company has filed applications with the Railroad Commission to drill three new Ellenburger tests on the east side of the southeast end of the TXL field, in West Ector County, in the near future.

Those projects will be: Superior No. 2-E J. E. Parker, 660 feet from north and 3,323 feet from west lines of section 40, block 45, TP survey, T-1-S.

Superior No. 3-E Parker will be 3,323 feet from west and 1,996 feet from north lines of the same section as above.

Superior No. 6-E Parker will be 3,326 feet from north and 3,323 feet from west lines of the same section, as above. Each of the prospectors will drill to around 9,600 feet to test the deep pay. They are each one located east of the nearest Ellenburger wells.

Shallow Crockett Wildcat To Make Pumping Tests

V. E. Phillips No. 1 Shannon-Magnolia, Crockett County wildcat, three miles northeast of the Shannon field, and 660 feet from north and west lines of section 24, block Q, GC&SF survey, was bottomed at 2,372 feet in lime, and was to make pumping tests.

The section at 2,356-65 feet carried oil. The lime at 2,365-72 feet was dry. Operator bailed the hole down, and then installed a pump.

In the first one hour of pumping, after the well had been shuttin for a considerable time, it made 24.5 barrels of oil. It continued to pump for the next two days, and averaged about nine barrels of oil each 24 hours during that period.

The tubing and rods were pulled to last. They were being re-run, to clean report, to make further production tests.

Honolulu 1 W & S Starts Making Production Tests

Honolulu Oil Corporation No. 1 White and Shelton, West Gaines County wildcat, about 12 miles west of Seminole, drilled out cement in 7-inch casing, which had been set at 6,930 feet, over total depth of 6,973 feet.

Crane Discovery Flows At Rate Of 3,343 BOPD

Gulf Oil Corporation No. 1-E-HH University, East Crane County discovery for production from several zones, and now testing in the Ellenburger between 10,615-875 feet, treated with 1,000 gallons of mud acid, to clear the formation.

In a six and one-half hour flowing test, through a one-half inch tubing choke, after the acid load had been recovered, the well produced 632 barrels of oil, which was cut one-tenth of one per cent sediment. Gravity of the oil was 46.1 degrees.

In a subsequent six and one-half hour test, flowing through open two-inch tubing, the well made 864 barrels of oil, with a shakout of two barrels of sediment. Gas volume was 2,220,000 cubic feet per day.

Ford Co. Offers Fifteen-Cent Raise To Unions

DETROIT — (AP) — The Ford Motor Co. Wednesday offered 130,000 CIO production workers the equivalent of a 15 cent an hour wage increase and simultaneously boosted 20,000 salaried employees 10 per cent.

The boost in salaries was limited to those making less than \$1,000 monthly and becomes effective June 1, the company said.

The offer was worded in such a way as to exclude 3,800 striking foremen as long as they were not covered by a contract.

The proposal to the CIO United Auto Workers, which has threatened strike action after three weeks of negotiations, was conditioned on their acceptance of their old contract virtually intact except for wage issues.

It provided an 11 1/2 cent hourly wage boost plus six paid annual holidays, identical with the pattern established in settlements with General Motors Corp. and Chrysler Corp.

There was no immediate union comment.

Acceptance by the UAW-CIO of the proposed increase would boost the average Ford production wage to \$1.50 1/2 an hour compared to \$1.42 1/2 at General Motors and \$1.44 1/2 at Chrysler.

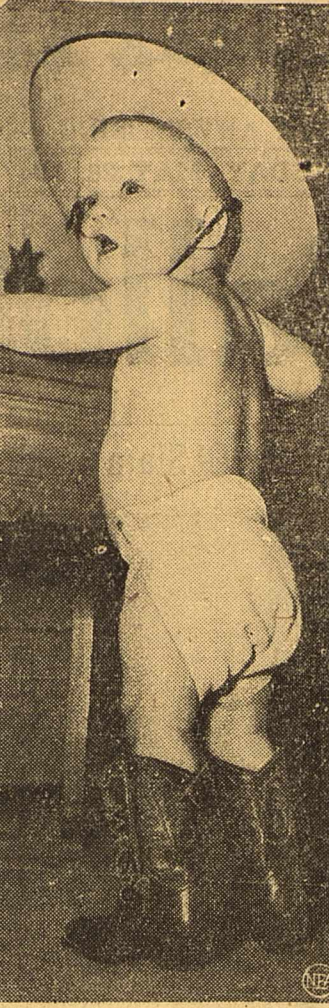

### Usurper Tells People Of Nicaragua's Plans

**MANAGUA, NICARAGUA**—(AP)—Gen. Anastasio Somoza, head of the army and former president, has promised the Nicaraguan people a new election will be held soon to choose a successor to President Leonardo Arguello, who was forced out of office Monday in a bloodless early morning coup.

Somoza acknowledged his leadership of the stroke in an interview and blamed the coup d'etat on a plot to oust him from his post as jefe director (director-in-chief) of the National Guard. He said he had been marked for death.

Arguello, who has been given diplomatic asylum in the Mexican embassy, was elected—with Somoza's blessing—in balloting on Feb. 2 and had held his office only 26 days. He succeeded Somoza, who had been chief of state for 10 years.

**ALBANY, N. Y.**—(AP)—Plenty of Flapjacks will be glorified by the 684,000 gallons of maple syrup tapped this spring by New York farmers.

The State Agriculture Department, describing production as "fairly good" and comparing with 411,000 gallons last year, added that "prices of maple products were higher than in any previous year."

Maple sugar production continued to follow a downward trend, totaling only 52,000 pounds against 67,000 pounds in 1946.

New York is second to Vermont in maple sirup output.

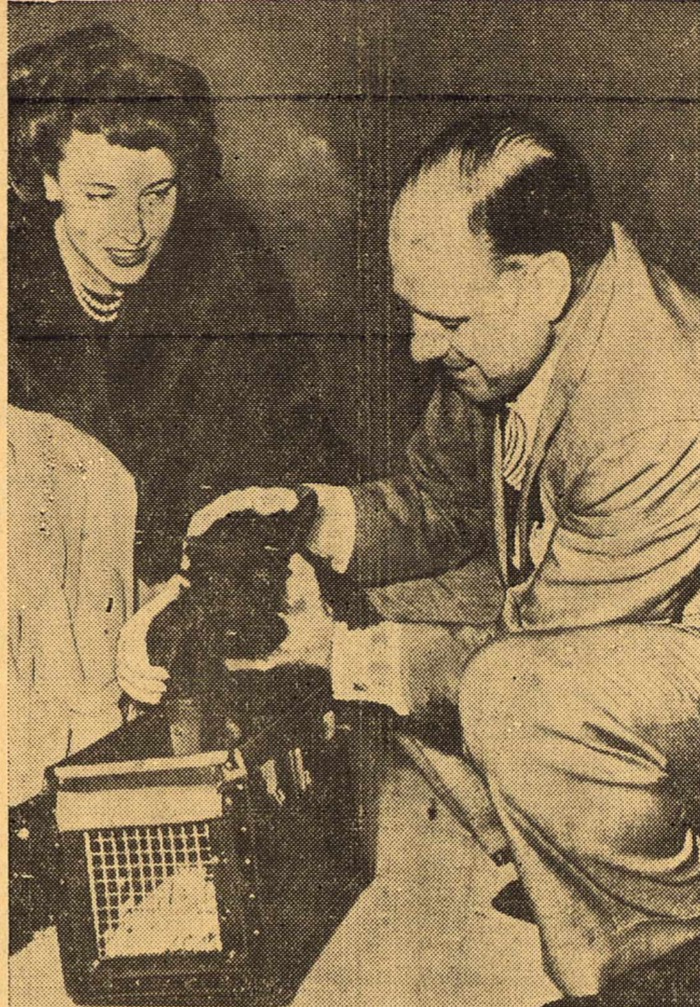

## Bars To European Union

Back in the early Thirties Winston Churchill put forward the idea of a united Europe. It was an idea foreign to the thinking of its time—a time of going fascism, dawning Hitlerism, Maginot mentality, ultra-nationalism, insincerity, and appeasement. Churchill, a Tory with a vision, saw the evils and their remedy. But no one of comparable vision and authority in all Europe answered and supported him.

It took a second World War—which a strong, united Europe almost surely could have prevented—to show the true value of Churchill's remedy. Europe of 15 years ago had all the necessary ingredients of that remedy except one—wisdom. Today such important ingredients as stability, prosperity, health, and strength are gone. And there is some question whether wisdom has been gained.

Churchill again has appealed to Europe to unite. It was an eloquent, intelligent plea which took into account all the grim realities of the present.

Churchill urged a European federation as one of the "four pillars of the temple of peace." The others, he said, are the United States, the Soviet Union, and the British Commonwealth. They would support a United Nations expanded into a world super-government to prevent war. "Are the states of Europe," Churchill asked, "to continue forever to squander the first fruits of their toil upon the erection of new barriers, military fortifications and tariff walls and passport networks against one another?"

For the most part, Europe's answer was silence. France, which with Britain would be the backbone of any European union, showed slight reaction. Her statesmen were too busy for comment. Most French newspapers ignored his speech.

Instead there came from France the voice of Charles DeGaulle, wartime hero, interim president, and now head of a new and somewhat disturbing political movement. Following Churchill by a day, DeGaulle made a speech in which he called for a "strong state" in France.

The former general said he meant by a strong state "what others mean in reference to themselves—for example, in Moscow and Washington—a state whose chief is a chief and in which no confusion of powers hampers or dilutes responsibility."

It is odd that DeGaulle should mention Washington and Moscow in the same breath—especially since he must know that in the U. S. the powers of government are delegated, though not confused, and that responsibility is divided, though not diluted.

Substitute the word "authority" for "responsibility" in the quotation above and you have a statement that might have been made by Hitler or Mussolini in the days when Churchill first proposed a united Europe.

If DeGaulle expresses a growing sentiment in France today, then the difficulties of adopting Churchill's plan are increased enormously. For the same reason the plan becomes even more urgently necessary.

## Real Democracy

South American revolutions, according to our observation, have always been conducted on a rigid military caste system. If you weren't at least a colonel you didn't organize and lead a revolt. It just wasn't done.

So we were happy to note that in the recent abortive revolutionary attempt in Brazil, the only military conspirators arrested were sergeants. Perhaps the American move to democratize the armed forces is catching on in the southern hemisphere before it is up here.

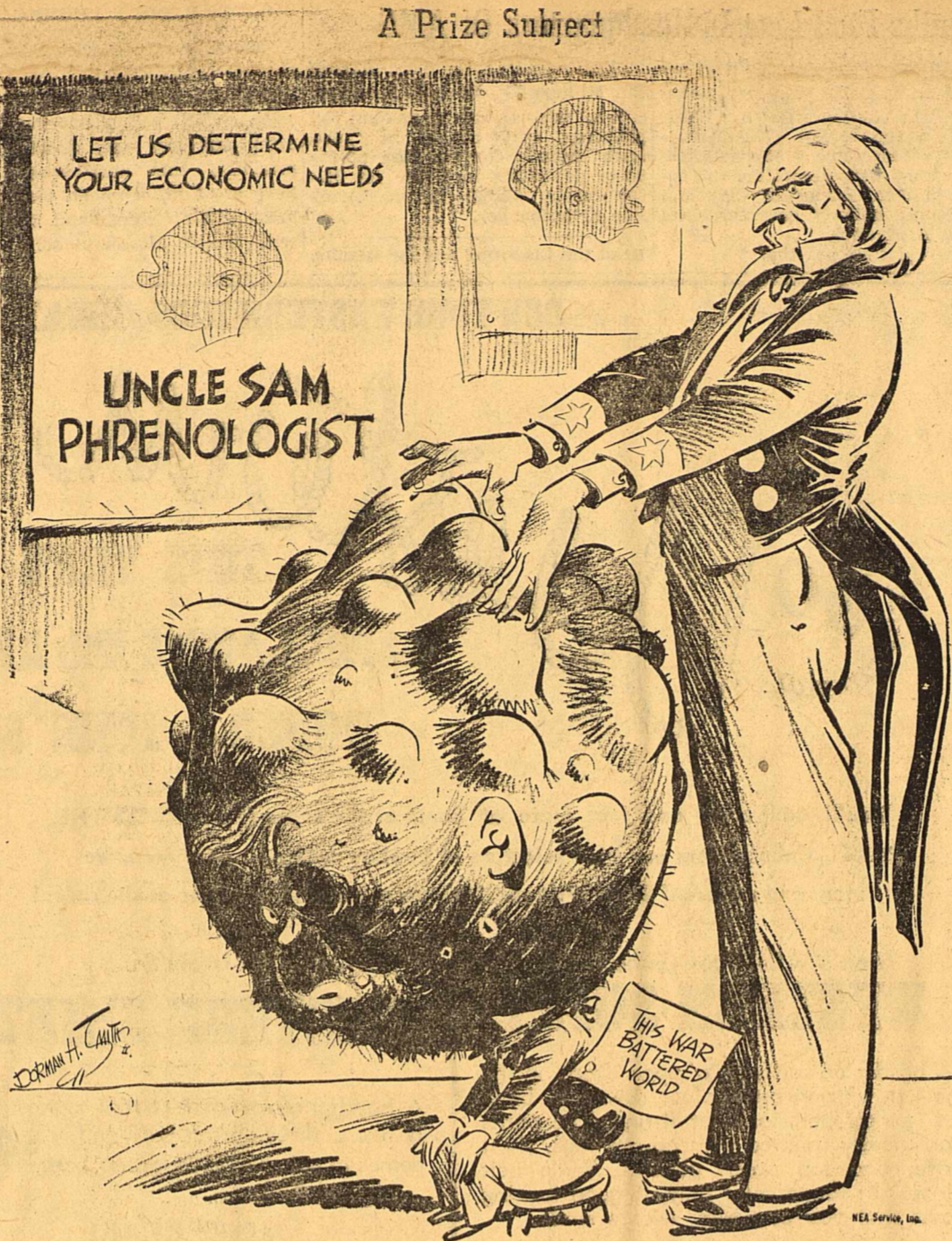

## American-Owned Oil In Lebanon Is Life Saver

BEIRUT, LEBANON —(P)—Oil from rich American-owned concessions in Saudi Arabia may provide a hard currency guarantee for inflation-ridden Lebanon, Finance Minister Camille Chamoun says.

Lebanon has granted transit and terminal rights to the Transarabian Pipeline Company, which plans to build one of the world's largest pipelines—30 inches wide or more—from the Saudi Arabian fields to the Mediterranean.

Company officials, meeting in San Francisco, are reported to be considering where to locate the Mediterranean terminus of the pipeline, where a refinery is expected to be built to process 300,000 barrels a day.

"Construction of the line and refinery in Lebanon would enable us to have all the dollars we need for capital goods and also a reserve to guarantee our currency," Chamoun said in an interview.

He estimated that Lebanon would gain a balance of \$70,000,000 to \$80,000,000 in the next five or six years.

## Committee Makes Plea For Migrant Workers

WASHINGTON—(P)—A government committee recently urged more protection for "America's Forgotten People of 1947"—millions of migrants who roam from place to place for seasonal work.

The Federal Interagency Committee on migrant labor issued a report asking for new federal, state and local laws and for more community understanding of migrants and their problems.

"A sizeable segment of our population, through community and state negligence has been robbed of so many normal American and human rights that it is almost unbelievable," he declared.

He said "child labor, substandard living and a padlock against education have destroyed the rights of children." The migrants are "unorganized, unprotected by workmen's compensation laws in most states, ineligible for educational, health, or welfare benefits."

The report says 200,000 foreign laborers who were imported during the wartime labor shortage, enjoyed guarantees "far more liberal" than American migrants.

Yet—according to the report—migrant labor is necessary to the nation's economy. Many industries cannot operate successfully without seasonal labor. Migrants create wealth for the communities they serve. Without them, crops would be lost and food prices would rise.

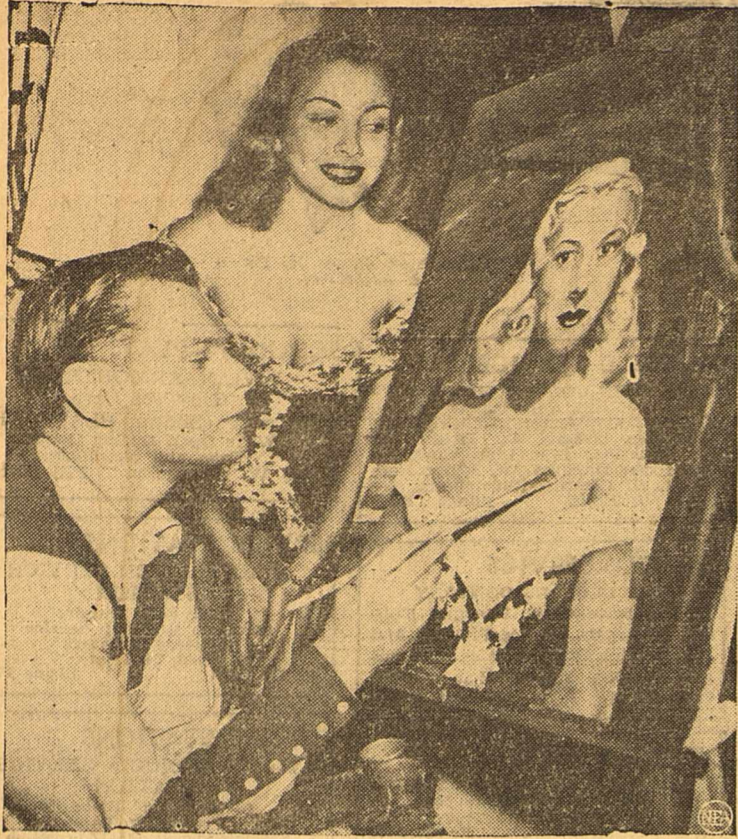

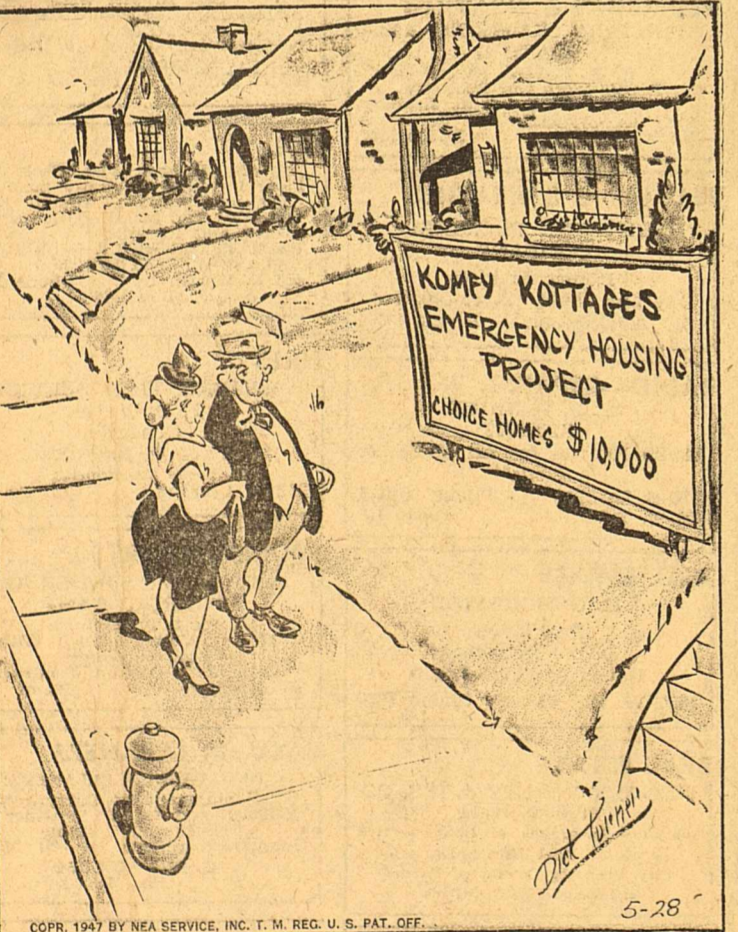

### McKENNEY ON BRIDGE

There are a lot of little tricks in the play of cards that the average player either misses through carelessness or just does not bother to remember. Lee Hazen of New York brought today's hand to my attention, and with the South cards, six hearts certainly is not a bad contract. Most declarers in a duplicate game at the New York Bridge Whist Club made the contract, but only because of careless defense.

The opening lead was won by South with the king. Two rounds of trumps were led, West showing out on the second round.

Now declarer led the ten of spades, West played the seven and dummy the queen. This is where most of the East players went

wrong. They won the trick with the ace. If East had stopped to think, he would have realized that the three of spades was missing and that his partner was starting an echo, attempting to show that he had only two spades. Or his partner might have a singleton spade, but as he had shown out of trumps, there was no use in winning the first spade trick to give his partner a ruff.

All East had to do was to refuse to win the first spade. When the king of spades was led, East should win that trick, as declarer, holding three spades to the jack-ten, would not have led the king.

This is a play that comes up quite often, and it is an excellent idea to form the habit of telling your partner whether you have two or three of a suit. If you play the small one, you have either a singleton or three. If you play the high one, you have either a singleton or two.

### Precautions Against Rabies Must Continue, Health Officer Warns

A black Persian cat which last week went berserk, attacking successfully several South Midland dogs, biting a calf and otherwise acting as no sane cat should, was found not to have rabies, it was reported Tuesday morning. The animal died after climbing a tree and trying to bite and scratch its bark, but when the head was sent to Austin for examination a "negative" report was returned.

So, Midland still was free of rabies as of Tuesday morning.

However, officers of the Midland-Ector-Howard County Health Unit are taking all possible precautions to prevent an outbreak of the dread disease in the city. The dog catcher is picking up all stray animals—last week he captured 31 stray dogs within three days—and pet owners are warned to keep animals confined.

Since it is about time for rabies to appear in Midland if the disease is to be communicated here from the Odessa outbreak, health authorities warn there should be no relaxation of safeguards, especially at this time.

And all the idea of progress went out of us, and all we could think of was the dead man who once gave us life and was better than all of us put together in a week of country Sundays. We all have a hunk of him—but he had us all beat, take us one at a time or together. That's what our sister says, and a girl's the best judge. Mom didn't get in the argument.

### Hatfield Kills McCoy And No Feud Starts!

MATWAN, W. VA.—(P)—Here in the Hatfield-McCoy feud country along the West Virginia-Kentucky border there was barely a flicker of interest in the word from the county seat up at Williamson that a Hatfield had been convicted of killing a McCoy.

Allen Hatfield, who admitted he shot Hubert (Bay) McCoy, is free on \$10,000 bond pending appeal of his recent conviction by a jury on a voluntary manslaughter charge.

The story of the original feud which raged in the '80's is belated, but it's safe to say the hills hereabouts wouldn't have been safe for either the families or interlopers had the killing taken place 60 years ago.

It would have meant barricaded cabins, sudden, violent ambushes and bloodshed.

Today it meant only casual consideration in street-corner conversation. The fact that one man killed another was important. That the principals happened to bear the names "Hatfield" and "McCoy" was only incidental.

The 51-year-old Hatfield, former Matewan police chief, was convicted of killing McCoy, 28-year-old war veteran and miner, in an altercation stemming from a routine arrest last February.

Both men are direct descendants of the original feud families.

But time has wrought changes in the attitude of the families toward each other. They have intermarried. They are living as neighbors.

**Wildlife Consolidation Bill Signed By Jester**

AUSTIN—(P)—A bill consolidating all the various special funds of the Game, Fish and Oyster Commission has been signed by Gov. Beauford H. Jester.

The measure becomes effective Sept. 1, the start of the new state fiscal year.

It was advocated as a means of aiding the game commission in using funds now restricted for certain purposes under the law, for more general game and fish conservation work.

**HE MIGHT JIG**

HASTINGS, NEB.—(P)—Jack Berggren, graduate student at the Hastings College conservatory of music, was scheduled for some piano solos during the college chapel period. When he arrived early to practice he discovered one of the piano keys was stuck. That couldn't stop Jack. When chapel time arrived Berggren calmly presented a program—of vocal solos.

Traffic deaths for April reached 127 while deaths during last April totaled 157. Total deaths to date are 527 while 622 deaths were reg-

### Radioactive Cloud Is Seen As Possible Atomic War Weapon

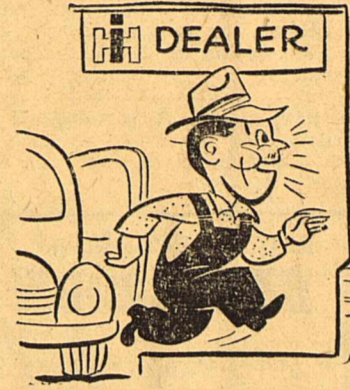
NEW YORK — (P) — The new atomic weapon, a radioactive cloud a mile in diameter which Glenn L. Martin mentioned briefly to the Senate Aviation Subcommittee, would be a product of atomic piles, or ovens.

It might be very much like the World War II gas shells which in tests did not explode but burst with enough force to release poison gases.

Some materials that would go into an atomic gas shell already are being produced at Oak Ridge, Tenn., for medical and natural scientific work. They are radio-active atoms of many kinds.

More kinds of these atoms than are in use are possible. At present these transmuted chemical elements, which emit dangerous rays, are too expensive and too scarce for effective military use.

But when the atomic power age arrives, any power plant could make such radioactive gases as by-products. One of these is radio-active iodine, which insists on being a gas rather than a solid.



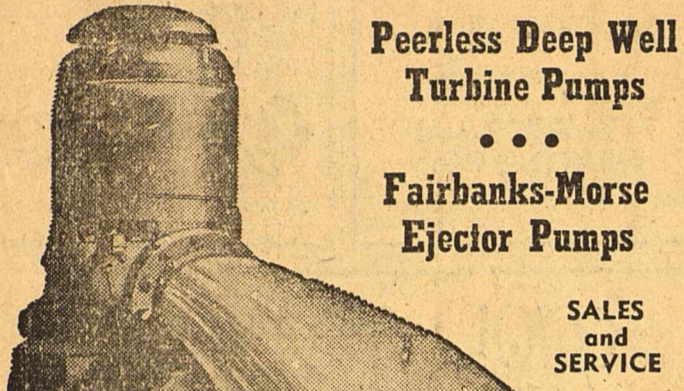

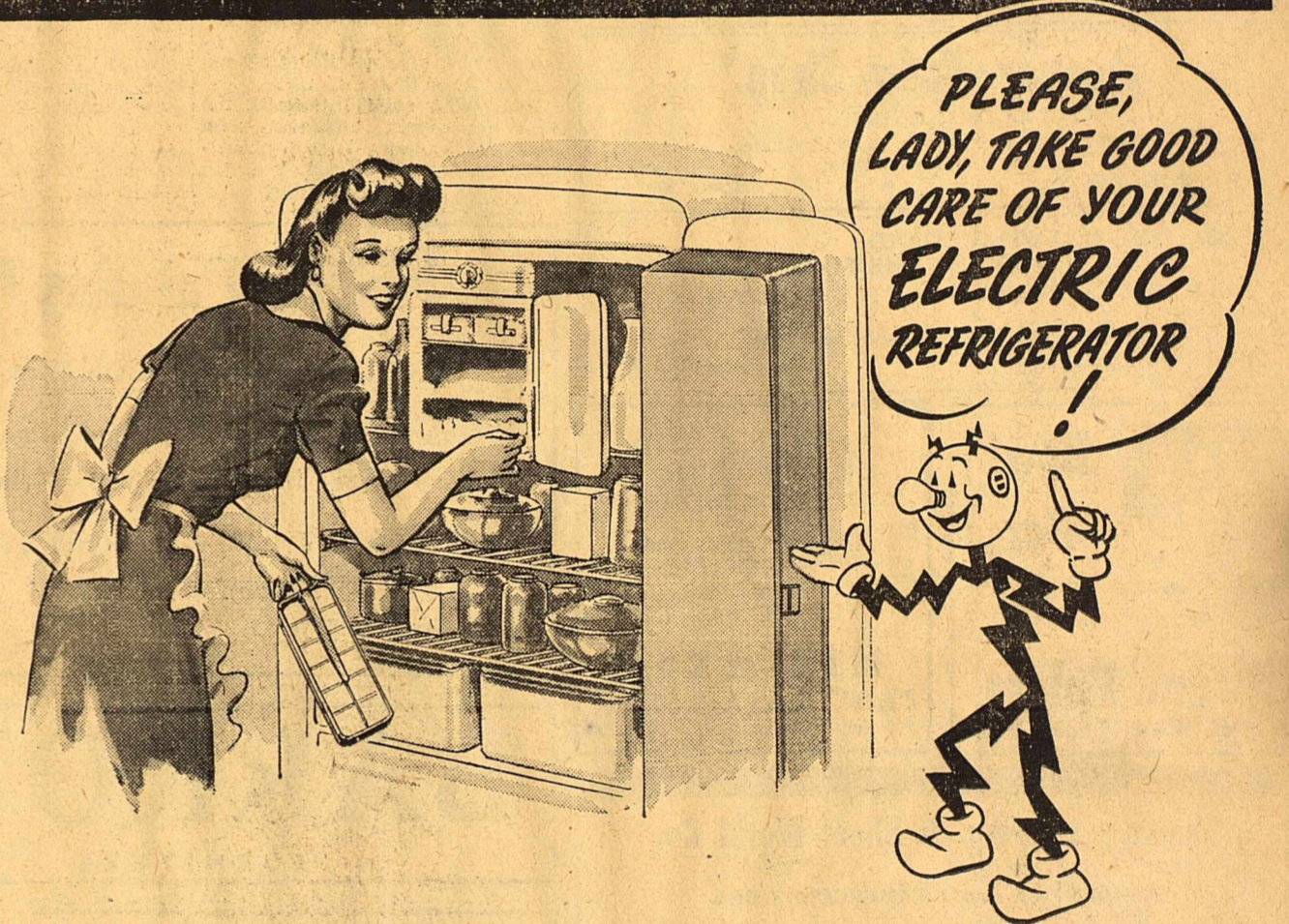
