

PURE AND HUMBLE WILDCAT GETS FREE OIL IN DST

The Pure Oil Company and Humble Oil & Refining Company No. 1 Cowden, wildcat in extreme Southwest Andrews County, three-quar-ters of a mile north and one-half mile east of the Devonian producers in the Dollar Hide field, was drilling ahead below 6.780 feet, in lower Permian lime, after taking a drillstem at 6,700-80 feet.

The tool was reported to have been open two hours. An ungauged amount of gas showed at the surface in 20 minutes after the tool was opened.

Recovery was the 1,000-foot wa-ter blanket and 1,860 feet of 41gravity oil. The bottom 100 feet of the oil was slightly cut with drilling mud.

Open flowing bottom hole pressure was 850 pounds. After taking little more section operator likely will try another drillstem test.

This wildcat, located 1,980 fee from west and 660 feet from north lines of section 24, block A-52, ps survey, was originally started to drill to around 10,500 feet to explore the Ellenburger.

Operator representatives have not revealed whether the project will be continued to the deeper zone if it develops enough oil to make commercial producer from the zone

now being investigated. Some of the wells in the Dollar Hide field, which have been finished from the Devonian, have shown possibilities of production from the section which is producing the oil in the Pure and Humble wildcat.


WEINER HAD NO OIL SHOWS IN DST AT NO. 1 VAUGHN

Ted Weiner No. 1 Vaughn, East Crockett County prospector, located 660 feet from south and 1,980 feet In from east lines of section 86, block OP, GC&SF survey, and seven miles east of the Todd field, was drilling ahead below 6,596 feet in a sandy lime section.

This project logged at least 16 feet of sand, saturated with oil, and showing some gas, above 6,586 feet. It drilled to 6,596 House Approves feet, and took a 20-minute drillstem test. July 1 Starting

There was a slight blow of air throughout the period. Recovery was 20 feet of drilling mud, with no shows of oil or gas. Informed sources reveal that the sand is extra tight, and is likely too dense to give up any fluid natural. The section now being drilled is said to possibly be lower Permian. The wildcat is scheduled to go to the Ellenburger, unless it gets commercial production in a higher formation.







Credit ToHungary NewRed Regime Rlamed

WASHINGTON -(AP)-Secretary of State Marshall Monday ordered suspension of an unused half of a \$30,-000,000 credit to Hungary, where a pro-Communist regime has just been set up with Russian support.

In a statement Marshall also said the United States 'wishes every success' for the new non-Communist Italian regime formed by Prime Minister Alcide de Gasperi. He said:

"We shall continue to give aid to the Italian people who have demonstrated their sincere and abiding faith in Democratic processes for the preservation of their individual liberties and basic hu-

man rights. The \$30,000,000 credit was granted Hungary Feb. 15, and about \$15.000,000 has not yet been utilized.

The Hungarian credit was granted for the purpose of buying American surplus property.

. The suspension of the unused half was announced as a tentative step, pending clarification of developments in Hungary, where Pre-mier Ferenc Nagy and other non-Communist government officials were ousted last week.

Honolulu Oil Corporation No. 1 White and Shelton, prospective wildcat from the lower Permian in West Gaines County, about 12 miles west of Seminole, and 660 feet from north and east lines of section 404, block G, CCSD&RGNG survey, is reported by unofficial sources to have washed the open hole at 6,930-73 feet, with 500 gallons of acid. After the load and residue from

the acid had been swabbed out, the well kicked off and started flowing by heads. The heads started coming about 15 minutes apart. Those flows had increased by the end of eight hours, to where they were coming each five minutes.

Informed sources reveal that the well flowed a total of 56 barrels of 31-gravity oil during the first eight hours, after it kicked off. It was said to have still been flowing at the end of that time. No water had developed. Apparently operator had eliminated the water which showed on a drillstem test, before casing had been cemented at 6,930 feet.

Clouding The Issue

The long argument over unification of the armed forces has brought to light some rather odd thinking about the functions of a U.S. Cabinet officer. Some opponents of unification seem to feel that a secretary of national defense would be a sort of fuehrer who could dispose of any branch of the service on mere whim or prejudice.

A proposed bill by Senator Robertson of Wyoming, for example, would do away with this suggested Cabinet post, retain the present War and Navy secretaries, and add a co-ordinator of national defense at the head of a national security council. This might readily have the effect of adding bureaucratic complications to a proposal which aims at greater simplification and efficiency through unification.

Under our system of government Cabinet officers are assistants to the President. They concentrate their work in particular fields of the President's manifold duties. There is a certain amount of independence connected with each office. But the officers are responsible to Congress for the funds to operate their departments, and to the President on major policy.

It is a rare occasion when a Cabinet member goes over the President's head to act in opposition to his superior's wishes. When he does he usually finds himself out of a job, as Henry Wallace did after his Madison Square Garden speech.

In the light of these well-defined duties it seems odd that the idea of a secretary of national defense should fill so many level heads with alarming visions. The chief of a single defense department would co-ordinate the functions of the War and Navy Departments. He would also supervise the neglected matter of surveying military and industrial resources.

His duties would cover a larger field than embraced by either of the present Cabinet posts now concerned with our defense. They would be comparable to the broad area of the State Department's activities. But the present War and Navy Departments would still exist in a separate, though subordinate, capacity. And the new secretary would be delegated only a part of the power that has-



Government Will Pay Market For Wheat

ernment has decided to buck the Kansas. grain market for future supplies of wheat needed for export rather than try to fix a top price it is willing to pay.

In reporting this decision, re-sponsible Agriculture Department officials said privately Monday they had concluded the only way the government could be sure of getting supplies for needy areas abroad is to pay whatever the market demands

Hopeful of keeping wheat prices from jumping back to the \$3-abushel level reached last winter, the government had considered setting a price at which it would buy wheat, on the theory such an offer would pretty well fix the market price

This idea finally was tossed aside. however, because of the urgent needs of many foreign areas between now and their own fall harvests.


