

May, Garssons Convicted Of Fraud

Ex-Congressman And Munitions Combine Owners Will Appeal

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Ex-Congressman Andrew J. May Thursday was convicted of selling his influence while wartime chairman of the House Military Committee.

A federal court jury also convicted munitions makers Henry and Murray Garsson of paying the 72-year-old former Kentucky congressman more than \$50,000 in bribes for favors during the war years.

Thomas Released On \$5,000 Bond

SWEETWATER—(AP)—Jim Thomas, whose third conviction and life sentence on a charge of murder in the death of Dr. Roy Hunt of Littlefield was assessed by a Nolan County district court jury last October and was recently reversed, was free on \$5,000 bond Thursday.

Thomas has been in the Nolan County jail since his third conviction. He was released Wednesday night after bond was set by District Judge A. S. Mauzey and approved by Sheriff Bill Adams of Potter County and District Attorney Charles L. Nunn of Sweetwater.

The bodies of Dr. and Mrs. Hunt were found mutilated and bound in their bed at their home on Oct. 26, 1943.

Thomas was convicted at Plainview in August, 1944, and given a death sentence. The decision was reversed. Thomas was tried again at Lamesa in January, 1945. Again the decision was reversed by the court of criminal appeals and the third trial held here.

Two Men Burn To Death In Truck-Train Wreck

DUMAS—(AP)—Two men were burned to death and three railroad tank cars were derailed in a train-truck collision at a Rock Island Railway crossing 12 miles north of here at 3 a. m. Thursday.

The men, Blant B. Mills of Amarillo and H. R. McMillan of Pueblo, Colo., died in the flames of their truck and trailer.

Five departments from Dumas, Dalhart and the Cactus Ordnance Works fought the blaze which threatened the tank cars. Motor fuel in the tanks boiled from the heat of the flaming truck jammed opposite them.

Traffic was blocked for hours. Mills was driving from Amarillo to Denver in a transport truck owned by Delbert Dalby of Amarillo. McMillan, a truck line employee, was en route to his home in Pueblo. A mixed cargo in the truck trailer was destroyed in the flames.

The bodies have been brought to a funeral home here.

Lewis On Way To Getting Best Miners' Contract In History

WASHINGTON—(AP)—John L. Lewis was well on the way Thursday toward getting the best wage contract in the history of his United Mine Workers—who otherwise would extend their current vacation into a full-blown strike next Tuesday.

The way some operators figure the tentative settlement reached late Wednesday by Lewis and top executives of "Big Steel" mine owners and Northern commercial producers, the soft coal diggers will get a 4 1/2-cent boost in their basic hourly pay rate.

The "pattern" increases negotiated by rival CIO unions in other basic industries earlier this year have been around 15 cents an hour. The big question remaining, however, is:

How many mining companies will accept the agreement? Some Staggered By Terms

It is no secret a big segment of the industry was staggered by the concessions made to Lewis by the Eastern producers.

The Midwest, Far West and Southern mine owners—left out of the secret, top-level settlement negotiations—went into hurried huddles to map their strategy before the UMW policy committee assembles here Saturday.

Some of these operators described the proposed contract as "highly inflationary." They contend it would boost not only the price of coal but of steel and dozens of other items essential to the national economy.

The fact remained, however, that if the tentative settlement is signed and sealed by a major chunk of the industry, the other producers will have to capitulate or face an extended shutdown.

The government last Monday turned back to private ownership the mines it seized 13 months ago, thus forcing the operators and union to come to terms themselves for opening the pits after the 10-day vacation period runs out July 8.

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Without Russia—European States Invited To New Economic Meeting

PARIS—(AP)—The French Foreign Office Thursday announced 22 nations will be invited to a meeting in Paris July 12 to discuss European economic cooperation as outlined in the Marshall proposal.

The countries invited will include Austria, Turkey, Albania, Ireland and all former enemy states except Germany, it was announced. A foreign office spokesman said the invitations would be sent to Paris embassies Thursday night.

The French foreign ministry announced earlier a British-French decision to invite all European states, "with the provisional exception of Spain," to take part in drafting a reply to the proposal advanced by U. S. Secretary of State Marshall for European economic recovery.

A foreign office spokesman said a letter had been sent to Russian Ambassador Alexandre Bogomolov expressing the hope the Soviet Union, which has denounced the Marshall plan, would reconsider her refusal to join in economic cooperation. However, he said no invitation would be sent to Russia for the July 12 meeting.

Record Highway Travel Predicted For Holidays

By The Associated Press. A near record high travel on a peacetime holiday was indicated for the three-day Fourth of July holiday as millions of Americans finished plans Thursday for trips by auto, bus, plane and railroad.

Spokesmen for many railroads, airlines and bus companies reported record reservations and many were adding all available extra equipment to meet the heavy demand.

In addition, millions of motorists will hit the highways to parks, beaches and outing places. The National Safety Council estimated 30 million cars will be on the highways over the three days, causing the biggest traffic jam in history. The council also predicted 275 persons will be killed in traffic accidents over the holiday period.

Recognition Of Union Of Foremen Withdrawn By Ford Motor Company

DETROIT—(AP)—The Ford Motor Co., which signed the nation's first contract with the Foreman's Association of America three years ago, Thursday withdrew recognition of the independent union whose 3,800 Ford supervisory employees have been on strike more than six weeks.

The company said its three-year "experiment" with the independent union had "failed hopelessly."

Strikers were urged to return to work immediately without fear of "discrimination of any kind."

The FAA immediately replied Ford was "reiterating in public what they told us when the strike began."

President Robert H. Keys of the FAA, said Ford's attitude toward the "experiment" with the foremen "is the same as the company has taken toward all unions—however, ours is a small one and they can get away with it."

He said the union would meet Sunday to discuss the company's action.

Appropriations Committee In House Hits Foreign Aid Fund

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The House Appropriations Committee turned a critical eye Thursday toward President Truman's foreign-aid money requests, including funds for the \$400,000,000 stem-communism program already underway in Greece and Turkey.

Members indicated the committee, in its present frame of mind, might slice in half the \$1,500,000,000 total now being considered.

The tip-off to committee sentiment came from Chairman Taber (R-NY) who told reporters "there has been no justification at all for an appropriation to finance the \$400,000,000 loan to Greece and Turkey."

At most, Taber declared, only \$100,000 of the proposed total has been justified by State Department witnesses.

Nor is the committee satisfied, Taber said, with testimony it has heard in support of the \$350,000,000 program for relief in liberated nations.

Other members said present indications are there may be no money in a pending deficiency bill for the Greek-Turkish program and little or none for the six-nation relief undertaking.

Congress gave its approval to both of those ventures in May after weeks of debate, although the authorizing legislation carried no actual money beyond a stipulation that the Reconstruction Finance Corporation could advance up to \$100,000,000 to get the Greek-Turkish program into operation.

VFW Will Open MAT Swimming Pool To The Public Soon

Plans for opening the Midland Air Terminal swimming pool to the public as soon as repairs to the pool and its equipment can be made were mapped Wednesday night at a called meeting of the Midland post of Veterans of Foreign Wars.

The City Council Tuesday night leased the pool and the former NCO club building to the VFW unit.

Due to the extensive repairs anticipated and the shortage of post funds, members of the veterans group will attempt to make all repairs and to handle all cleanup assignments. A continuous meeting of the post will be held Saturday and Sunday at the pool, with all members attending to work on the detail. The session will get underway at 9 a. m. Saturday.

Heads Work Group. A committee including J. D. Henderson, Charles Hedges, Jack Daniel and M. H. Newnam was appointed to head the work group. A painting contractor here has volunteered to furnish labor and equipment to paint the pool.

Comdr. Leonard Miller said this is the largest project of its kind ever attempted by a West Texas VFW post.

"We can make this into a community center for our growing city, and can repay many times over the confidence vested in us by the City Council," Miller said. "Although we do not want to stage an active fund raising drive, we do need the moral and financial support of all citizens."

Armed Forces, Tax Reduction To Get GOP Priority

WASHINGTON—(AP)—Senate Republican leaders agreed Thursday to give top priority to legislation for unification of the Armed Forces and tax reduction.

Chairman Taft (Ohio) of the Senate Republican Policy Committee said this was agreed upon in a closed-door strategy session.

"We'll take up unification first and taxes next," he told reporters. "That should keep us busy all next week."

Taft said the steering group also decided to:

1. "Proceed a little further upon the West Virginia election contest" in which the place of Senator Kilgore (D-W.Va) is challenged by Tom Sweeney, Republican candidate in the last election.

2. "Go ahead with cloture legislation" which seeks to tighten up the present Senate rules on unlimited debate which produces filibusters.

3. Name a seven-member labor advisory committee from the Senate to sit with a similar House group for a study of labor disputes. This is provided under the new Taft-Hartley labor law.

Taft was asked if this program means the "death of the housing bill?" This is the long range housing program sponsored by Taft and Senators Ellender (D-La) and Wagner (D-NY).

Taft replied no other legislative matters were decided upon.

Knutson said Doughton told the committee he would like to write into the bill a provision applying the community property principle of tax computation to all states.

Knutson commented "time would not permit us to study the proposition with the care it should have."

Minor Wave Of Wheat Thefts Is Reported

AMARILLO—(AP)—A minor wave of wheat thefts is reported in the South Plains where the harvest is nearing its end.

Deputy Sheriff H. E. Whittaker of Floyd County blamed "irresponsible truckers" who, he said, contact farmers and agree to haul the wheat to elevators. The trucks are loaded, and then do not report at the proper destinations, Whittaker said.

The official said between 1,500 and 2,000 bushels have been stolen from farmers in this manner.

"So far, we have had no report of grain being stolen from the many piles of wheat stored unprotected on the ground," Whittaker said.

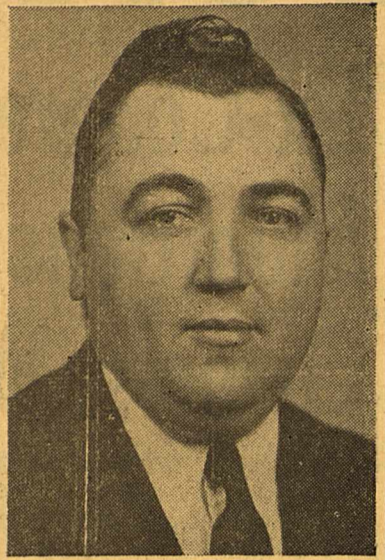

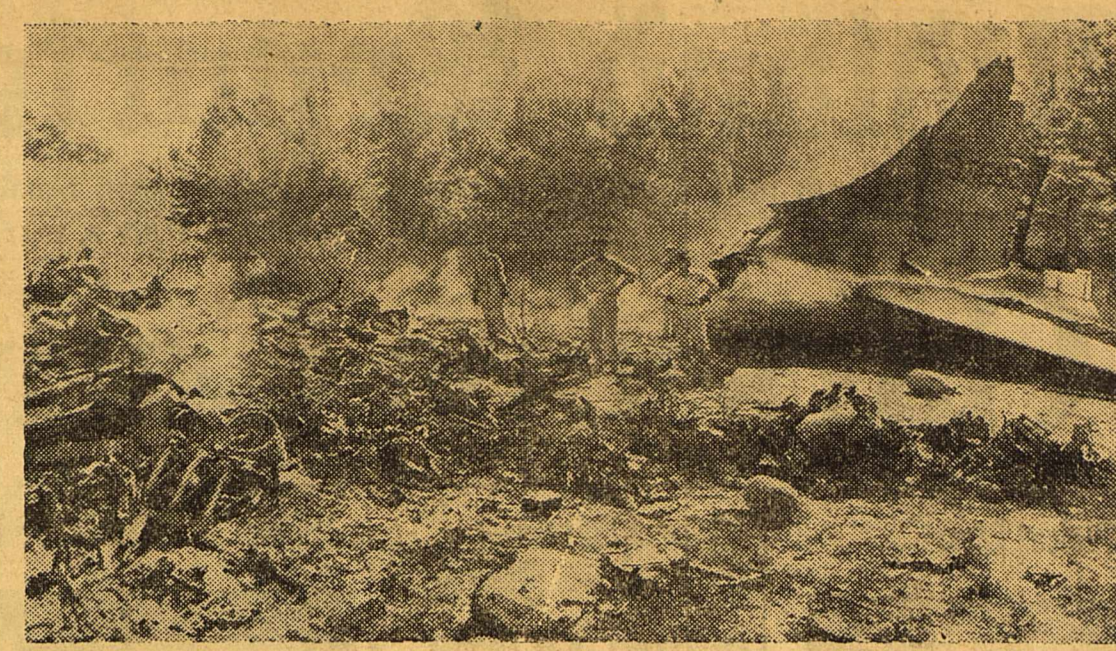
Lions Officers Are Installed At Outdoor Meeting

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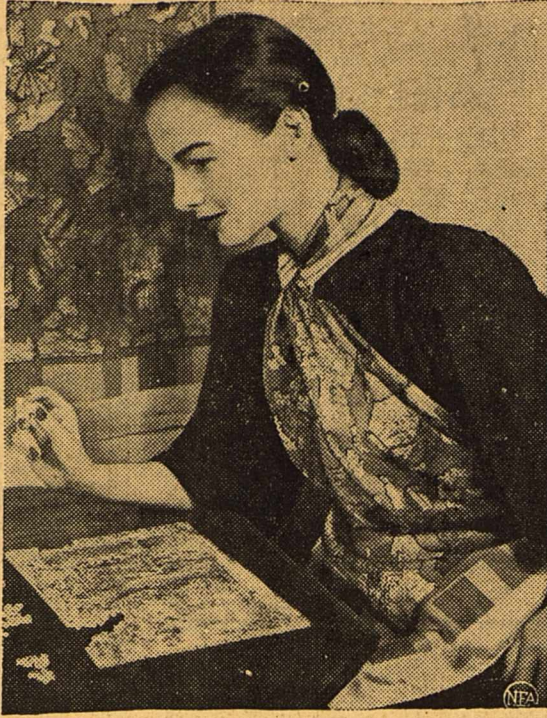

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**Vets Administration
Plan Research Center**

DALLAS — (AP) — The Veterans Administration has announced plans for a medical research and laboratory center for the Southwest.

The project will be directed by Dr. Jacob Furth, one of the nation's leading research scientists. Dr. Furth, professor of pathology at Cornell University for the past 15 years, has already assumed his new position. He will also be associated with Southwestern Medical College here.

The Dallas laboratory will provide technical service to VA hospitals in Texas, Louisiana and Mississippi. Dr. Lee D. Gady, VA's medical director in the Dallas branch office, said the new installation also will provide training and instruction for the professional personnel in specialized fields.

Dr. Furth will direct a large staff of bacteriologists, bio-chemists and other medical technicians when plans for the laboratory have been carried out. Several months will be required to assemble necessary equipment and personnel before the laboratory can function as planned.

Immune Globulin Will Counter-Act Measles

AUSTIN — (AP) — Use of immune globulin to protect frail children from measles has been suggested by state health officer George W. Cox.

Dr. Cox said if administered within eight days from the time of exposure, immune globulin would prevent the disease. Its use was seen as mainly beneficial for infants and children whose health makes it inadvisable for them to suffer an attack of the measles.

While protection is ordinarily of about three weeks duration only, there is no limit to the number of times it can be used, he said. Repeated use can go on shielding the child against measles until he is old enough and strong enough to stand an attack without serious consequences.

Immune globulin can be obtained free by physicians to be used as they think advisable, Dr. Cox said.

Agreement to reach a vote on Dooley's nomination—subject of bitter debate between Texas Senators W. Lee O'Daniel and Tom Connally since Jan. 8—was reached Wednesday. It came after O'Daniel had completed his second day of denunciation of Dooley's nomination by President Truman.

The Job In Greece

American political policy, as well as American financial aid, seems to be making some impression in Greece. Reports from Athens state that government leaders are taking pains to squelch the extreme rightists among their supporters and to create the notion that those at the governmental helm are actually middle-of-the-roads.

Then, too, there is the agreement by which American experts, stationed in the Greek Cabinet department, will keep track of the use to which every dollar of the American loan is spent. If the stories of the way some of the British aid to Greece was used are true, this agreement is highly important.

One of the worst things that could happen, as the Truman Doctrine gets its first practical application, would be for the funds to be used for political purposes in supporting a government which is neither wholly representative of the Greek people nor a model of democratic monarchy.

It remains to be seen whether the Greek government has undertaken a suppression of its far-right extremists. But at any rate the government's obvious desire to look its most democratic indicates that the arrival of American dollars and American representatives has produced a slight change of heart. And that is encouraging.

Much more encouraging would be the news that Greece is to hold new elections. This is not an immediate possibility. But even the promise of elections might help to quiet unrest and restore civil order.

Evidently Greek affairs are in as much of a mess as ever. The civil war goes on. The Communists control the EAM, which, politically, is the only place for anti-government Greeks to go unless they want to stay at home. Even the discussion of admittedly needed administrative reforms in the government has been put off until Autumn.

Economically, American aid can help Greece to her feet. Politically, there doesn't seem much hope until the civil war is ended, its foreign instigators driven out, and a representative government elected. This also seems to be a part of America's job in Greece.

The announcement of new elections should come from the Greek government alone. The American government should take some responsibility for the honesty of those elections.

This would not be interference or imperialism. Rather, it would be an effort to assure those "free and unfettered elections" which the Potsdam Declaration decreed for Poland, but which didn't come off.

Silver Lining

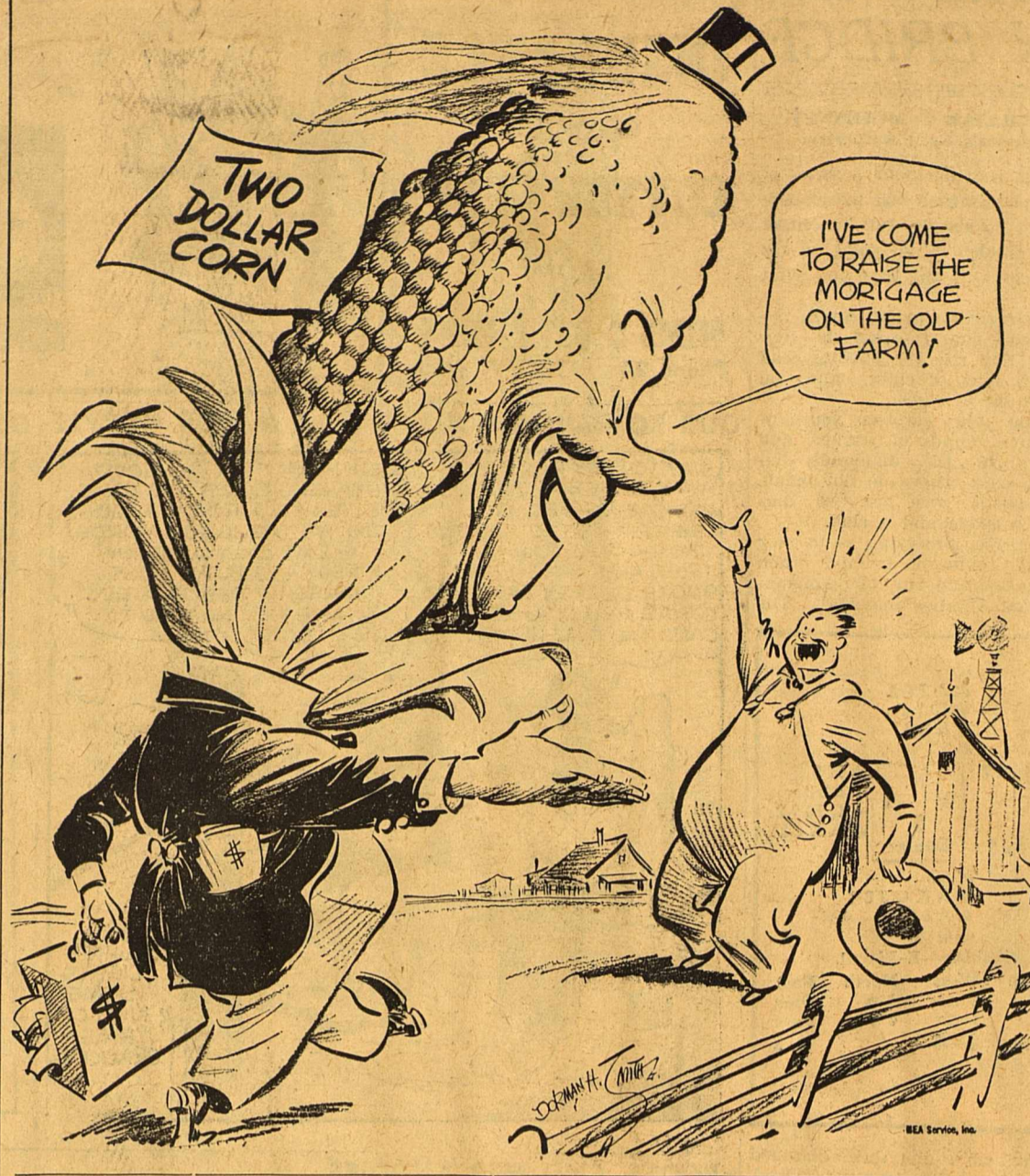

Housing Expediter's Office Here To Close

The housing expeditor's office in Midland will terminate its activities effective July 25, according to Jimmie Wilson, housing expeditor for Midland and vicinity. The closure results from congressional enactment of the recent rent-control measure, which abolishes all housing-construction controls and virtually all controls over nonhousing construction, Wilson said.

The Midland office has been in operation since March 26, 1946, under the Veterans' Emergency Housing Act of 1946, whose major provisions seeking to provide housing for returned servicemen are now rescinded. Its services, Wilson pointed out, have included assistance of every character locally, to

builders striving to produce homes for veterans. Additionally, at the national level, the Office of the Housing Expediter has allocated scarce materials in the building field, increased building-materials production by premium payments for volume in excess of normal, added builders to secure surplus equipment and materials from the government, and more recently exercised jurisdiction over limitation of non-housing construction.

The group adopted a constitution, by-laws, and made plans for organizing a Navy electronics unit here. The meeting planned for August was canceled.

Ewel H. Stone, president, was in charge. The next meeting will be Wednesday, Sept. 3.

New Rocket Developed Which Outdates V-2

BALTIMORE, MD. —(AP)—A rocket capable of soaring 235 miles into the earth's outer atmosphere has been partially unveiled by the Glen L. Martin Aircraft Company here.

Developed by military and civilian natural scientists, the projectile will be capable of speeds up to 8,500 feet a second. The Martin plant will construct 10 of them for the Navy at a cost of \$1,850,000.

The first full-size rocket, 45 feet long and less than a yard in diameter, will be ready for firing from White Sands, N. M., sometime this Summer, the Navy reported.

The five-ton "Neptune" will replace fast-disappearing stores of the less efficient German V-2.

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County Treasurers' Pay Raise Ruled Out By Attorney General

AUSTIN —(AP)—An attorney general's opinion has held unconstitutional the 50th Legislature's bill which would have increased county treasurers' salaries to \$3,800 in four Texas counties.

The bill was written to apply to counties in population brackets between 90,000 and 112,000. Populations of Travis, Hidalgo, McLennan and Nueces counties fall within the brackets.

The attorney general's opinion said the population bracket classification, however, is "unreasonable and not real," making the law a local or special one, which is not constitutional.

Travis County Attorney Perry L. Jones requested the legal ruling.

McKENNEY ON BRIDGE

This is the fourth of a series of simple plays which too many people miss. To get the full benefit of today's problem I am going to ask you to cover up the East and West hands.

You are sitting in the South position and your contract is four hearts. You lose the opening lead of East's king of clubs, and you ruff the ace of clubs.

If you are careless, you now take three rounds of trumps, and then try out the diamonds, discovering that they do not break. As a result, you lose two diamonds, a spade and a club.

The correct procedure is to play only one round of trumps, then cash the ace and king of diamonds, and lead another diamond. The

side that wins the third diamond may have another trump to lead, but you can win it and still have a trump in dummy to ruff out your losing diamond.

If you take even two rounds of trumps, the player who wins the third round of diamonds may have the one remaining adverse trump and lead it. Then you cannot ruff the losing diamond in dummy.

While it is generally true that it pays to pick up the opponents' trumps, here is a case where your side suit must be led first.

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Russia's Stand On Plan For Europe At Least Clears Up Atmosphere

If your columnist could be given two wishes in connection with the British-French-Russian conference in Paris regarding the Marshall economic program, with the assurance that one of them would come true, they would be these:

1. That the Soviet Union and the Western Allies might compose their grave differences and join hands not only in the Marshall plan but in rehabilitation of the whole war-plagued world.

2. That they quit shadow-boxing, agree to disagree and go their respective ways. This would mean

consolidating the division of Europe into Eastern and Western blocs, but it would at least enable the Western Allies to get ahead with rehabilitation in as wide a sphere as they could reach, not excluding even the so-called Soviet sphere of influence.

Now, of course, he would be a super-optimist who expected wish No. one to be granted. Moscow already has turned thumbs down on the Marshall project, and charges America with having ulterior purposes in making the suggestion—an accusation which Marshall termed "fantastic" and "malicious".

However, that should clear the way for the granting of wish No. Two. Russia has given her answer—in effect she doesn't want to participate in a unified effort. She has her own row of beans to hoe, which is to bring Europe under Moscow's domination.

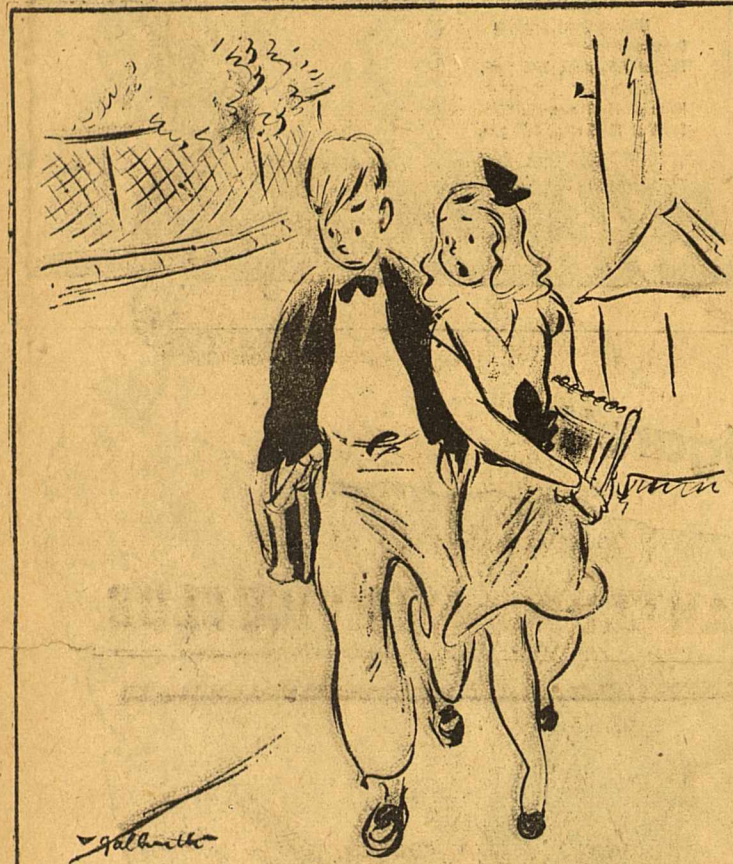
The Western Allies long had feared this was the situation, but they had hesitated to force the issue with their World War Ally. They hoped against hope something would happen to make things come right.

Then out of the blue came General Marshall's proposal for European rehabilitation. It was a proposition which called for a direct response—cooperation or non-cooperation.

The world's observers recognized this answer would apply not only to European recovery but would reflect the Soviet policy for general cooperation with the Western Allies.

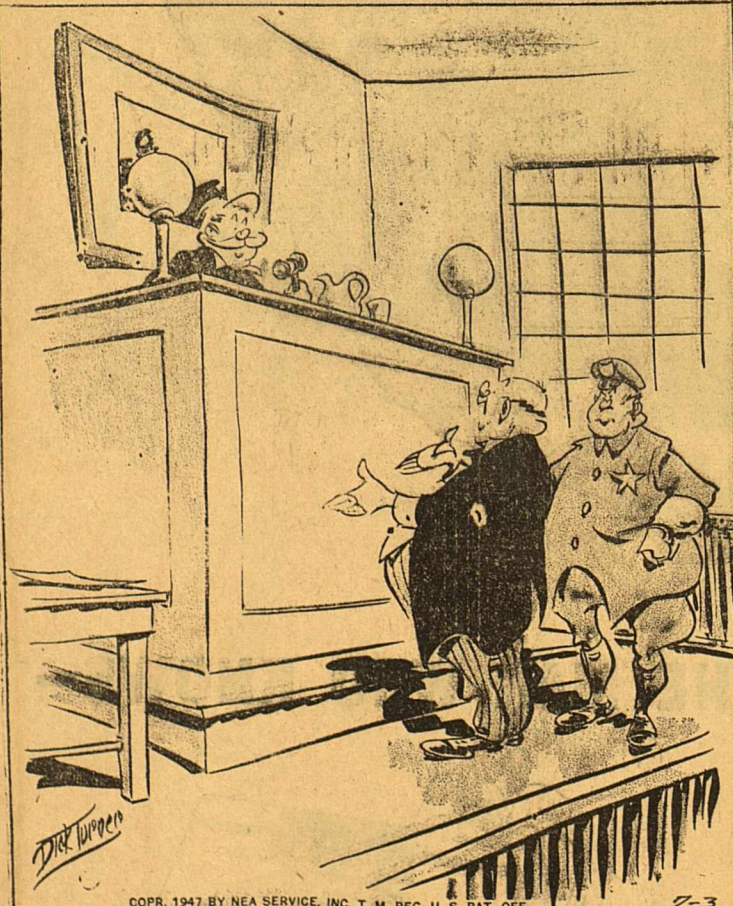
As was widely anticipated, Russia has come through with a blunt refusal to cooperate. Thus it only remains for the Western Democracies to act accordingly—to start energetically to take their own line in dealing with world affairs.

Rent Provisions Of New Housing Act Same As Under Former Law

Rent provisions of the New Housing and Rent Act of 1947, signed by President Truman Monday, continue maximum rents just as they were under the old law, according to Jim Kelly, director of the rent office at 203 North Fort Worth Street here. "There is no provision in the new act which changes rents automatically," Kelly said. "A tenant pays the same rent in July he did in June, unless there has been an order issued subsequently, or he has voluntarily entered into a lease with the landlord as provided by the new act. This act provides when a landlord and tenant voluntarily enter into a valid written lease on or before December 31, 1947, and expiring on or after December 31, 1948, an increase of up to but not more than 15 per cent of the maximum rent in effect immediately before the effective date of the new lease is permissible. "Before any rent increase becomes effective under such a new lease," the rent director continued, "a copy of the lease must be filed with the rent office within 15 days of its signing, together with a simple registration of lease form which landlords can obtain at the rent office. It will be the duty of the rent office to examine the lease carefully to determine whether it is valid. The lease cannot contain any trick termination or penalty clauses. It cannot decrease the essential services, furniture, furnishings and equipment. The rent office will forward copies of the registration of lease form both to the landlord and tenant for their records." Kelly said it is up to the tenant to decide whether he wishes to sign such a lease. If a tenant does not wish to enter into such a lease, refusal does not constitute grounds for eviction.

B. W. Recer Attending El Paso Army School

EL PASO—Col. B. W. Recer, 501 North Marienfield Street, Midland, is one of the 150 Organized Reserve Corps officers attending a two-weeks course at Fort Bliss. The refresher course, given under supervision of the Antiaircraft and Guided Missile Branch of The Artillery School, is intended to bring the Reserve officers up-to-date on recent War Department developments and plans. While at Fort Bliss they will receive instruction in antiaircraft artillery and in guided missiles. The Border Post at Fort Bliss is the nation's antiaircraft artillery and guided missile center where research is going forward in rockets and where Army personnel receive training in the latest military tactics and techniques.

Colonel Recer went on active duty with the Army in December, 1940, and served until November, 1945. He was overseas in Europe from March, 1944, to July, 1945. The Bronze Star with one Oak Leaf cluster was awarded him for his services, along with the ETO Ribbon with five battle stars for duty in Normandy, Northern France, the Bulge, the Rhineland and Central Germany; the Army of Occupation Ribbon and other decorations. As a Reserve Corps officer, he commands Detachment "B" of the 48th Composite Group at Midland.

Mass Migration From England To Canada Will Be Made By Air

OAKLAND, CALIF. —(AP)—Seven thousand residents of England, desirous of migrating to Canada, will be flown to Ontario by Transocean Air Lines starting about Aug. 1, the company has announced. Orvis Nelson, Transocean president, said contracts for the mass migration by air had been concluded with Premier George Drew of Ontario Province. British and Canadian lines also bid for the job. Drew had arranged for priorities to be granted men skilled in such industries as mining and forestry work. They will pay their own way. The airlift will be made on 175 round trips between England and Ontario, one trip a day at first and two a day starting about Aug. 15.

Youthful Iran Prince Plays Aerial Hookey

PARIS —(AP)— Prince Hamid-Reza Pahlavi of Iran, first school-boy in history to play hookey on a trans-Atlantic plane, reposed in his royal brother's legation here, awaiting return to school in the United States.

Officials of the Iranian legation, who surprised the 15-year-old youngster at Paris' Orly Airfield, maintained a close guard over him and said he would fly back to the United States soon. "His Royal Highness just doesn't like to go to school," said Iranian Consul Mahomoud Salehi.

Prince Hamid-Reza, who previously had been a truant from schools in Switzerland and Syria, left New York by plane June 24, when he was supposed to be en route to his school at Middletown, R. I.

He carried \$1,000 for show and candy money and a student passport. Legation officials said he had played his international game of hookey without the permission of his brother, the Shah of Iran, and that they had received instructions from Teheran to send him back to school.

The President made the presentation in the White House rose garden in behalf of the "Ligue Internationale des Aviateurs." The league's citation called de Seversky "a bold missionary of the air power cause" who implemented his ideas "by actual design, manufacture and demonstration of equipment in flight."

Doctor Blames Many Diseases On Nicotine

SWAMPSCOTT, MASS. (P)—Dr. J. D. Varney, Dayton, Ohio, said he believed "nicotine is at the bottom not only of heart disease and cancer, but is indirectly responsible for a large per cent of other diseases."

He told the American Institute of Homeopathy in a prepared address, that natural scientists "are proving that nicotine is one of the most deadly poisons known to medicine."

He said constant inhaling of tobacco smoke "causes chronic irritation of the bronchial tubes and lungs, opening a fertile field for cancer."

Referring to various medical investigations, Dr. Varney said it had been determined that excessive smoking caused arteries to contract, calling on the heart "to force blood through them 50 times a minute faster than normal."

World Needs U. S. Editor Who Made Around-World-Trip Tells Of Impressions While Away

SAN FRANCISCO (P)—The world is filled with unsolved problems and its nations and people gravely need American aid.

But this help should not be limited to money, which in many ways is the most transient and valueless of aid. It should rather consist of technical know-how, of practical tutelage and example along the many lines in which we are proficient. We should make democracy-in-action as vigorous and revolutionary as Communism seems to be.

These are my chief conclusions after 12 days and some 20,000 miles of travel around the world as one of the newspapermen taken by Pan American-World Airways on their first regularly scheduled round-the-world flight.

During this time, we not only travelled many miles and caught swiftly changing glimpses of many lands. We also spent about nine of our 13 days on the ground, meeting and conferring with top leaders, observing social and economic conditions, and absorbing impressions which are all the more vivid because they were so fleeting.

Everywhere, nations and peoples face grave difficulties. Peace is not a reality in the world today. There is serious danger of chaotic collapse in at least two vast areas—India and China—which combine between them about one-third of all humanity on this planet. I am not forecasting this collapse as inevitable. But the National Government of China is certainly in severe difficulties, and the outcome on August 15 of India's division and the withdrawal of British rule is deeply uncertain.

Everywhere, governments and people look to America for help. Obviously, material aid on the scale desired is far beyond the capacity

of the United States. Nor would it be desirable, if poured out simply as manna from heaven. Rather, nations need to learn how to make Democracy work better. Not that we have learned all we need to know in this respect. But there is still much in the American experience which we could teach.

World Needs Spiritual Lift

In many respects, it is not a physical problem which faces the nations of the world but a question of morale—a spiritual problem. It is not necessary that India, facing the long-awaited historical plunge into self-government, should break down into internecine strife.

Similarly, there is no inevitable reason for Chinese collapse. If the selfishness of grafting and dishonesty in government and business could be replaced by the kind of cooperation which momentarily flowered in China in the early days of the Kuomintang revolution, many of the present difficulties would be solved.

These Utopian reflections point the need for a voice of leadership in the world. During the war, the United States provided that voice. Now, as ever, we represent the hope and light to much of the world. But we are not carrying out that mission very well. Rather, what America means has degenerated in many nations into a hope for dollars, which comes close to greed.

Basically, the need is to help nations solve their own problems. Many of them are making excellent progress in this direction. We were impressed by the "feel" in Turkey, in Siam, in the Philippines, in Japan. The indomitable pluck of the British was apparent as we talked to Clement Attlee, the prime minister, at 10 Downing Street, despite their eight years of shortages and sacrifice. But Britain has a long way to go.

Our flight again emphasized the narrowing lines of global interest. It should be "one world" and yet it is not. Great competitive forces are at work. Communism, which thrives on chaos, is a pervasive world influence to which an adequate reply is not yet being made.

That reply depends upon America's success in making Democracy a tangible, practical export in action more than in precept.

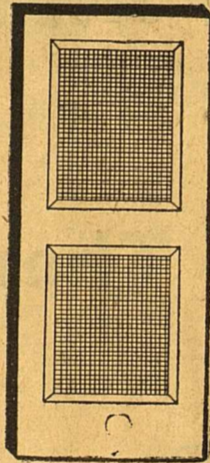

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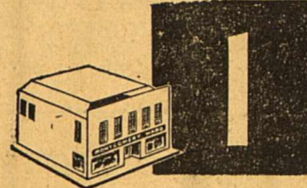
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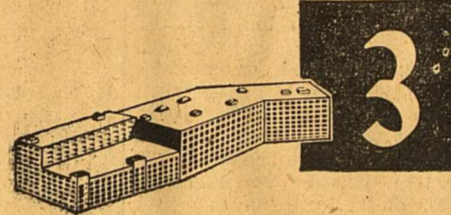
