Garner has turned down all offers to write his memoirs and has burned all letters and other data bearing on his nearly 40 years in the nation's capital, Bascom N. Timmons says in a dispatch to the Washington Star. Timmons, an old friend of Garner's, wrote the story from Uvalde, Texas, Garner's hometown.

## Holiday Death Toll 366 With Sunday To Go

By The Associated Press At least 366 persons had been killed in holiday accidents by Saturday night as the final day of the three-day Fourth of July weekend approached.

Since 6 p. m. (local time) Thursday, 167 persons had been killed in traffic accidents over the nation, 130 had been drowned, five had lost their lives in fireworks mishaps and 64 had died from other accidental causes.

California led the nation in traffic fatalities with 19. Florida had 14, New York 11 and Michigan and Pennsylvania 10 cach. In the last 20 years, the highest Independence Day violent death

By The Associated Press Gunfire has killed seven Texans in the July Fourth holiday weekend, accounting for more than one-third of the state's 20 deaths by violent causes since Thursday

Drowning ranked second as a cause of death, with six persons the victims of water accidents. Highway crashes, usually the leading cause of holiday fatalities, claimed five lives. One man was killed by a train and one in a plane crash.

For security reasons, the balloons were kept secret. Not until May 22, 1945, months after they had started drifting over this country, did the office of censorship allow any word of their existence to be published or broadcast. In the meantime, they were greatly talked about and intelligence officers were even about them before luncheon groups. Newspapers fretted about this sort of thing. The theory seemed to be that although every man, woman and child in the country knew about the balloons, the enemy could obtain no information unless the

story was printed in a newspaper. The balloons consisted of a bag of five layers of silk paper, about 35 feet in diameter. They were inflated with inflammable hydrogen gas. A natural phenomenon brought them across the Pacific. At a high altitude, between 25,000 and 35,000 feet and higher, a steady air current blows eastward across the Pacific. It is a fast current, hitting up to 100 miles per hour. Trip In 120 Hours

It brought the balloons to our shores in about 120 hours.

They carried sandbags, incendiary bombs and a single high-explosive charge. A control box was connected with an altimeter. When a balloon was released, it rose to about 35,000 feet and was carried off by the current. Gas leakage made it sink slowly and when it descended to 25,000 feet, on the verge of dropping out of the current, the control box dropped a bag of ballast. The balloon rose again,







But at the present rate of use, that territory can not be supplied with all the fuel it wants all summer, so the companies are trying to stretch the supply and see that automobiles are not laid up for lack of gasoline during the late summer months.

The West Coast, experts say, always has been self-sufficient in a petroleum sense, and faces no troubles. And the Gulf area will have all it can use.

Operate At Capacity
The greatest war-time demand for petroleum products was in May, 1945, when 5,632,700 barrels a day were needed to keep war and essential civilian activities moving. There was a drop-off through October, followed by a pickup so unexpectedly rapid that in December of 1946 demand passed its war peak and reached a rate of 5,980,500 barrels

This exceeds even the rated capacity of American refineries. When the war began, in 1940, the rated refining capacity of the country was 4,721,213 barrels a day. Now it

is 5,600,000 barrels a day.

In a desperate attempt to satisfy demand, many refineries have been operating at capacity. One company reports that one of its plants has been running 35 per cent above capacity. But no refinery can ever hold at 100 per cent over a long

Overall, during the first quarter of 1947, the industry processed an average of 4,796,100 barrels a day, which is 86 per cent of capacity.

The figure would have been

somewhat greater if it had not been for lack of sufficient transportation facilities to get crude from oil fields to some refineries.

Robert E. Wilson, chairman of

the board of Standard Oil Company of Indiana, admits frankly that the industry did not anticipate such a huge demand as has come. There were millions fewer cars on the road when the war ended. many homes had new insulation and heat-saving devices, and serious reconversion unemployment

There is an ample supply of crude petroleum in proven reserves, experts say—more than had been located before the war. There still is additional producing capacity in West Texas and Wyoming which is not being used because there is no transportation to get it to refineries. Meanwhile, there are refineries in Oklahoma, Kansas, Illinois and Michigan that cannot work to capacity because enough crude eannot be brought to them.

Also, more than 12 million barrels of products were lost during the first five months of 1947 because of strikes.

Shortages of steel during and since the war have made it impossible to build refineries or enough pipe lines to handle the needs. Tank cars, always very expensive, were worn out during the war. The Maritime Commission had 558 war-built tankers as of March It had requests for 337 this month, by U. S. companies for donestic and foreign use. But only 169 are in service.

The rest are laid up. Oil companies say they would be glad to ouy them-but only if they can be protected against a cut in the government's present asking price, which is 80 per cent of book value. Exports have not cut much figure in the situation. While we ent out 414,200 barrels last year, we imported 370,000 barrels.

#### Orderly Processes

After Congress passed the new labor law over the President's veto, it might have been hoped that the bitter and emotional debate which the bill occasioned would not be continued by labor leaders. But their angry reaction was immediate, although they should know that demonstrations, threats and general vituperation would only stir the already muddy waters and accomplish nothing con-





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

NEW YORK-(P)-The new Communist custodians of ancient Hungary took over a country rescued from financial chaos by a \$35,000,000 train ride with Uncle Sam at the throttle.

The followers of the hammer and sickle, now in power, have conveniently overlooked that little detail, but some among the Hungarian masses must remember.

It was right out of a Hollywood. script—that train ride last August which saved Hungary from total col-lapse by the timely return of its entire gold reserve - 22 tons of the precious metal.

I was the only reporter aboard the train, and I'd like to tell a few angles about the trip which weren't pointed out at the time.

The Hungarian government's store of gold had been captured by the American Third Army in Austria. and removed to Frankfurt for safe-When the Hungarian pengo soared to fantastic inflationlevels, it became evident only solid money could save the coun The American government agreed to return the Hungarian gold reserve to back a new currency-

#### Garden City Men To Begin Cattle-Spraying Service In This Area

A. R. Cox and J. H. Crouch of Garden City plan to begin a commercial livestock spraying service in Midland this week.

They will use a Bean sprayer and one manufactured in the shop of the J. D. Hudgins Cattle Coma man's game. Mules and polite pany near Houston. They have sprayed cattle in the Garden City vicinity for some time, and Crouch reported here last week that several ranchmen down that way have been so impressed with the value of spraying cattle with DDT that they have purchased their own ma-

> The partners use a 50 per cent wettable DDT powder. Speed at which they can treat a herd of cattle depends on whether the owner wants to control lice as well as flies, or whether he merely wants to keep off flies. Also, facilities for handling cattle on the ranch has some bearing on how long it takes to do a job. However, charges for spray-

ing are on a per-head basis. Usually, if rain doesn't wash off the powder, a DDT treatment will keep flies off cattle at least three weeks, Crouch said. The period of effectiveness increases in length after each spraying, he reported. As an example, he cited the case of some cattle near Garden City which, after two sprayings 14 days Banks' saloon. apart, have remained fly-free for two months.



This is the sixth of a series of simple plays which are often missed. Looking at all four hands it appears that declarer has to lose a spade, a heart and two diamonds-down one. But we also can see that declarer can establish the club suit in dummy, on which one of his diamonds can be discarded.

The tricks are all there, but unless declarer times the play of every card he will find it surprisingly easy to misplay this hand Declarer must refuse to win the opening heart lead. When he wins the second heart trick, he must

If East elects to ruff this club instead of dicarding a heart South discards one of his losing diamonds. But in all probability East will be smart enough not to

Now South leads the third heart which provides the needed entry into dummy. He ruffs the heart and leads dummy's fourth clubs, trumping it. Then the ace of diamonds provides an entry into dummy, so that declarer can dis-card a losing diamond or the ten of clubs. Thus he holds his losers to a spade, a heart and a diamond.







## Madam Peron Lifts Franco's Morale Switzerland's Rigid Military Program Responsible For 132 Peace Years

first nation that adopted universal military training and service in modern times has enjoyed uninterrupted peace for 132 years.

The President's Advisory Com-mission on Universal Training credits that system for Switzerland's wars, that surrounded her on all sides and reduced most of continental Europe to a political and eco-

Notwithstanding the little nation's unusually strong natural defenses, the commission's report says that Switzerland would have been invaded on many occasions if she had not possessed an army out of all proportion to her population and wealth in size, training and equipment.

Checking on other foreign sys tems of military preparedness, the little known information which it believes should help Americans defrom universal training and service For instance:

Sweden fought her last battle in 1812, the year she adopted universal military training and service. Of the 44 members of the United Nations that have organized mili-

tary establishments, 38 have compulsory military training or service Ten countries now have compulsory military service which did not have it before World War II. Practically every nation such a program has discovered that compulsory military training reduces

illiteracy and improves the health of its male citizens. The Swiss system probably is the most rigid of all universal military training and service programs, the commission finds. But it is exremely popular with the Swiss peo-

ole because it preserves peace. Every physically fit male Swiss itizen between 20 and 60 is subect to military service unless he is clergyman, peace officer or doc-There is a special tax on exempt men. School boys from five to 15 get three hours a week of gymnasium drill, without weapons out in accordance with army reguations. From 15 to 19, a program
