Official call on the top of the Ellenburger had not been released. Some geologists kicked the top of that formation at 7,386 feet. Elevation is 2,680 feet.

No signs of porosity or oil stain had been logged in the samples from the section of the Ellenburger so far penetrated.

After completing the test currently being run, the project will be drilled deeper.

Strike Threat Is Held Before S. P. Railroad

SAN FRANCISCO-(AP)-The Brotherhood of Locomotive Engineers Thursday provisionally called a strike for 6 p. m. Monday against the Southern Pacific, one of the West's key railroads.

Brotherhood officials said the union's 3,500 members would keep the trains rolling only if the railroad grants 19 of 74 demands for changes in working rules before the strike deadline. The strike announcement was made by Harrison C. Hobart, assistant grand chief of the brotherhood.

The strike call, issued by Harrison C. Hobart, assistant grand chief of the brotherhood, and P. P. Peterson, the union's general chair man, came as the shipping rush of the Western harvest approached its seasonal peak.

The strike would affect also the Northwestern Pacific and the San Diego and Arizona Railroads, Southern Pacific subsidiaries. The three lines carry 150 passenger and 1,000 freight trains daily. Operations in-volved would be from San Francisco North to Portland, Ore.; East to Ogden, Utah, and South to Los Angeles, Tucson, Ariz., and El Paso, Texas.

WASHINGTON-(AP)-The CIO contended Thursday the present Congress has adopted a "pennywise and pound foolish" attitude toward appropriations for agriculture.

Kermit Eby, CIC director of research and education, said "organized workers" have a strong belief "the need for giving adequate federal assistance to the working farmers of America.

We deplore reductions in funds for soil conservation, loans for rehabilitation and farm ownership reforestation projects, and the distribution of minerals needed to rebuild our soil," he said in a statement prepared for the House Agriculture Committee.

"We especially protest the cuts in the school lunch program, which penalize our school children and our farmers.



Pay-As-You-See Television

Several possibilities and problems come to mind with E. F. McDonald's proposal of pay-as-you-see home enter-tainment, which is a sort of Ruml plan for television. Mc-Donald, president of the Zenith Radio, would connect your receiver to the telephone and charge your entertainment on the phone bill.

This, of course, would do away with sponsored television. Incidentally, it would knock the television end of the huckstering industry right out of existence. You'd nav for your television show as you do for any public entertainment, except that you'd pay for it the first of the next month.

First, the new idea must get FCC and probably ICC approval. Un to now, radio and television have been licensed according to the quaint notion that the air is free. That doesn't hold with McDonald's plan. You get a hlurred image free with your television set. But you have to call the telephone operator and get some key frequen- ers from Wayne County Circuit cies niped in before you can see what's going on. The key frequencies are what your pay for.

There is also a federal ruling that you can't attach "foreign devices" to Bell's invention. But even if these telling Judge Theodore J. It can be imagined that, once the marketing problems are solved, a flock of new movie studios might spring up to make television films exclusively. But these would have to match the technical excellence of the present mo-vie product. That would take time and money. To profit on the investment it might well be necessary to restrict television's range in the free air and set up telecasting on a first-run and "neighborhood theater" basis, as movie distribution is set up now.

And how much television would the public get? Much less than radio, we should gness. Rehearsals would be more elaborate than for broadcasting. Costuming, makeup and lighting would slow up the output. Furthermore, it takes time to look at television. A housewife can listen to the radio all day if she wants to, and still do her work. But if she took time out for a couple of home movies, there might be unprepared dinners and protests from the men folles Those are some of the obvious unsolved problems. But we don't say that they can't be solved, or that the solution will be disastrous. The player plane was supposed to end private study and performance. The movies were sunposed to kill the theater. Radio, in turn, was going to kill both of these, and such things as phonograph records and haseball to boot. But they all seem to be going strong. So there's probably room for television.




"The great fault lies with our prosperous educated women. They graduate from college by the milions-the theoretical leaders. But ollege surveys show that only a few have utilized outside their homes the knowledge they acquired. Most of them take what they receive from the municipal council, the state legislature and Congress — and do nothing about it, unless it is to grumble. They think that when they have done their duty as homemaker within their own four walls they have done their job. They are

wrong. "If they want to keep those walls intact, they will have to take an active part in the life outside it. We hear a lot of talk lately to the effect that the world is going to the dogs, because women are doing too much outside the home. That's a fallacious argument. The trouble is not that they have done too much, but that they have done too little. Hindu Woman Fights For Human Rights In Mother Country

LAKE SUCCESS, N Y .-- Career women of the West might learn a lesson in getting things done from Mrs. Hansa Mehta of India, one of the foremost women of the Far East.

She works with distinction in five fields-the United Nations India's Constituent Assembly, the Bombay provincial government, education and women's rights. She also is wife and mother. How does she do it all?

First, by doing only one thing at a time and concentrating on it. Second, by not scheduling more than she can accomplish in one day. Third by not getting disturbed if plans go awry. Dressed in her native sari of rich-hued silk, Mehta moves through a Mrs. crowded schedule with seemingly unruffed calm and a quiet, unassuming manner. She looks surprisingly young to be the mother of two college students now studying in the United States.

Mrs. Mehta is now in New York as India's delegate to the United Nations Commission on Human Rights.

"Human rights are the crux of the whole question of peace," she says. "It was a violation of these principles which we regard as human rights that really provoked the war and until we make it impossible to violate these rights; we have no hope of perpetuating world peace.'


When she returns to India she will sit in April as a member of the Constituent Assembly, which seeks to frame a constitution for a free India. She also is the only wo-man member of the Legislative Council (upper house) of Bombay Province.

Mrs. Mehta—a college graduate and a Hindu-worked years to raise educational standards in India, where 13 per cent of an estimated 400,000,000 people (and only two per cent of the women) can read and write. For a time she served on the School's Committee of Bombay (city). From 1937 to 1939 she was Parliamentary Secretary of Education of Bombay Province. When she began, 12,000 of its 21,000 villages had no schools. While she held office schools were started in 4,000 more villages. Mrs. Mehta also authorized a number of children's books.

For a time she served on, the senate and syndicate of the University of Bombay. Today much of her educational effort is bent on women. Among other thing, she serves as vice chancellor (of the Indian Women's University, which has an enrollment of 400. "The whole educational system

in India is archaic and not suited to the people," she said. "It was imposed on us by British rule. There has been a demand all over the country for a more suitable system of education, and the provisional national government is planning to reorganize the whole


