Ex-Congressman May Gets 'Prison'

Garssons Also Are Sentenced

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Ex-Congressman Andrew J. May Friday was sentenced to a term of from eight months to two years in prison on charges of accepting \$53,634.07 in bribes while he was wartime chairman of the House Military Affairs Committee.

The two men accused of paying May the bribes—munitions makers Murray and Henry Garsson—also were given prison terms with a minimum of eight months and a maximum of two years.

The maximum penalty that could have been imposed on each by Judge Henry A. Schweinhart was six years in prison and a fine of \$30,000.

The sentencing was delayed for more than two hours while the defendant's lawyers pleaded for a new trial and May beseeched the court for mercy.

"Clear Conscience"
The 72-year-old former Kentucky Democratic Congressman insisted he had never taken "a single dime" dishonestly during his long service in Congress.

He told Schweinhart: "I stand before the court today with a clear, clean conscience. I never violated a law as far as I know in the 72 years of my life. I never received a dollar directly or indirectly that was not honestly earned or justly due."

May was convicted July 3 after an 11-week-long trial of accepting \$53,634.07 in bribes from munitions makers Murray and Henry Garsson. The Garsson brothers were found guilty of giving the bribes for favors and, like May, came into court to hear their penalty.

Defense attorneys, who have said they will carry the case to the Supreme Court if necessary, pleaded for a new trial and praised May and the Garssons before May addressed the court.

Among the reasons cited by the lawyers for a new trial was the contention that the jurors had listened to radio descriptions of the trial and read newspapers before reaching their verdict.

Charles J. Margiotti, head of the Garsson defense counsel declared this had prejudiced his clients' case because the press and radio reports had been prejudicial.

None of the defendants had anything to say to newsmen after hearing their sentences. All were released on \$2,000 bail each pending appeals.

Mystery Of Missing Marine Plane Solved On Icy Mt. Rainier

LONGMIRE, MT. RAINIER NATIONAL PARK — (AP) — A tattered fragment of a Marine's uniform, a weathered piece of a serviceman's health record and a few bits of wreckage ended Thursday night the seven-month mystery over the fate of a Marine transport plane which disappeared with 32 men aboard.

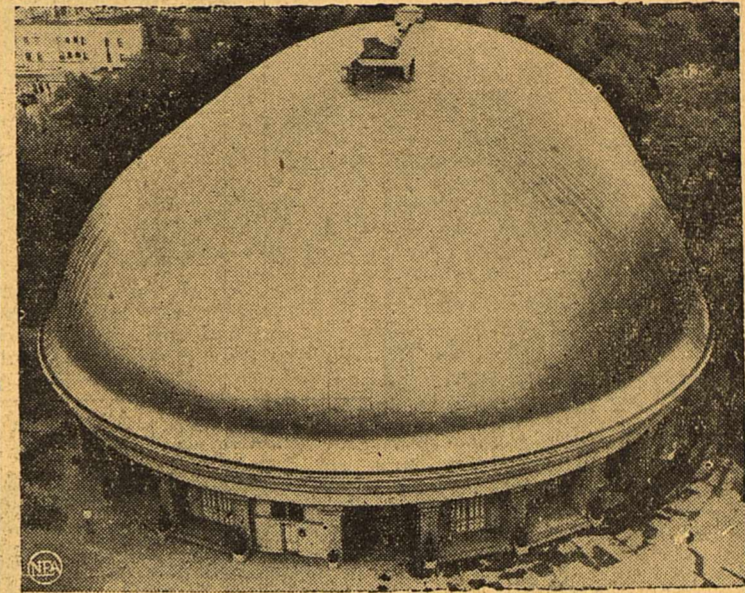

Bodies Of 27 Miners Killed In Illinois Blast Are Recovered

WEST FRANKFORT, ILL. — (AP) — Twenty-seven miners lost their lives in an explosion Thursday in one of the State's largest mines. Twenty-six of the approximately 200 miners at work in the diggings 500 feet underground were found dead at the bottom of the shaft at the main entrance to the Old Bear Coal Company's No. 8 mine. One of the five seriously burned and injured in the blast died Friday in a hospital.

The bodies of all 26 had been brought to the surface early Friday by rescue squads and were placed in an emergency morgue.

Work was hampered by carbon monoxide gas and the last three bodies found were buried beneath coal and debris.

One of the miners at first believed among those trapped but who later was reported safe was Howard Lewis, underground superintendent and a brother of John L. Lewis, president of the AFL United Mine Workers.

The blast occurred within one day of four months from the explosion last March 25 at the Centralia (Ill.) Coal Company's mine which cost the lives of 111 miners.

Howard Hughes Denies Charges His Firm Did Not Deliver Planes

LOS ANGELES — (AP) — Howard Hughes, movie maker and industrialist, central figure in a congressional probe of his wartime plane-building contracts, denied Friday "the charge, stated or implied" that he had failed to fulfill his government contracts.

Hughes, in a statement, declared: "About the many charges reported to have been leveled at me, I will have plenty to say when the proper time comes. As yet I have not been officially informed of what those charges may be."

"But there is one allegation which has appeared so frequently in the news that I feel I must deny it emphatically right now. This is the charge, stated or implied, that my company has spent \$40,000,000 of government funds without completing or delivering an airplane. This statement is absolutely untrue."

"The Army formally accepted delivery of an XP-11 photo reconnaissance airplane, first of three to be delivered under a \$13,000,000 contract, at Wright Field in September, 1945. The Army formally accepted delivery of another, that in which I crashed and was nearly killed last year, after Army reports showed that the propeller, not the airplane, was at fault."

"The government formally accepted delivery of the completed Hughes flying boat, largest airplane in the world, in February, 1947, five months ago. The obligation specified in the contract was completely fulfilled on that date and all work done since has been done because I voluntarily elected to do so."

"I have invested, at this date, \$7,000,000 of my company's money in this airplane and intend to expend considerably more before testing of the airplane is completed."

Other veterans will be affected as follows:
1. Education and job-training—courses must be started not later than four years after the date of the signing.
2. Unemployment allowances—will cease two years after T-Day.
3. Loan guarantees—will be made any time within 10 years after T-Day.

It is therefore T-Day—termination-of-war day—for about 16,000,000 war veterans and servicemen. It marks the beginning of the end of the educational, unemployment and loan-guarantee benefits of the GI Bill of Rights. Veterans' benefits will no longer be available to new enlistees.

Report Java's Rice Areas Are Isolated

BATAVIA — (AP) — A fully qualified Dutch source said Friday the first phase of Dutch operations against the Indonesian Republican army — aimed at isolating Central Java from the rice-producing East and West — had been completed.

Reporting from the Republic of Jogjakarta, deep in the interior, Associated Press Correspondent Harris Jackson said official Republicans obviously foresaw the possibility the Dutch would capture the main part of Java, but insisted the Indonesians would render the Dutch position continuously precarious with guerrilla warfare.

The Dutch informant here said the next step for Dutch troops would be to mop up zones of resistance in the Eastern and Western parts of the island and install new administrations.

An Indonesian army communiqué reported Republican forces in Central Java had penetrated Dutch defenses at Semarang on the North coast, jump-off point for a Dutch drive on Jogjakarta.

A Dutch communiqué said Dutch forces which swept past six more Western Java towns, including an important former Republican army headquarters, found much evidence of Indonesian scorched earth tactics.

The communiqué said two rubber estates captured in West Java suffered badly and there was much destruction and burning at Juliangka and Marjalaja. Air reconnaissance showed the important West Java radio station at Malabar was ablaze, the bulletin added.

House Group In Unanimous OK Of Training Bill

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The House Armed Services Committee Friday approved a universal training bill by a vote of 20 to 0.

Chairman Walter G. Andrews (R-NY) told reporters there is no intention of bringing the bill to a House vote this year. He said the committee action is intended solely to get a bill before Congress. The bill, drafted by a subcommittee, goes on the House calendar and will be ready for consideration early next year.

Eight Republicans and 12 Democrats, with three of the Democrats represented by proxies, voted to send the bill to the House floor. There are 33 on the committee.

Follows Recommendations
Closely following the recommendations of President Truman's special commission on universal training, the legislation calls for six months of basic training in an Army or Navy establishment for all qualified American males after they reach the age of 18.

Youths still in high school when they become 18 could obtain a deferment, but in no event could they avoid training before they become 20.

Following the six months of basic training, the legislation provides for the equivalent of six more months of training, which a youth could acquire in various ways, such as through enrollment in the National Guard, the ROTC, or some other reserve unit.

A special commission would supervise the entire program under a system of discipline less rigid than that applicable to the regular Armed Forces.

CANADIAN OFFICIAL SAYS FREEDOM OF PRESS NEEDED
LAKE SUCCESS — (AP) — Paul Martin, Canadian minister of national health and welfare, declared Friday the principles of freedom of information and of the press are essential to the maintenance of international peace and other objectives of the United Nations.

In a prepared address to the United Nations Economic and Social Council on the report of the UN sub-commission on freedom of information and of the press, Martin said his government supported the sub-commission's recommendation that a projected world conference on freedom of information be held early next year. He said Canada attached great importance to this conference.

LABOR LEADER DIES
BOSTON — (AP) — Robert J. Watt, noted American labor leader, died at sea on the liner Saturnia while returning to the United States from Geneva, where he had been American delegate to the international labor organization conference, according to advices received here Friday.

Russia Refuses To Permit Trio Of Congressmen To Visit Soviets

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Moscow's "no" to a Russian visit by three American lawmakers rubbed raw Friday a new point of irritation between Congress and the Soviet Union.

The turn down produced:
1. A proposal that hundreds, maybe thousands, of Russians be expelled from the United States.
2. A curt letter to Soviet Ambassador Nikolai V. Novikov about "diplomatic deterrents."
3. Complete junking of plans for the trip.

4. A rise in congressional temperatures, especially that of Rep. Kersten (R-Wis).
Kersten is chairman of a three-man House labor subcommittee which was supposed to go to Russia in September to study education and labor to determine the amount of freedom allowed students, teachers and workers.

U. S. Issues Passports
The State Department issued passports to Kersten and to Rep. Owens (R-Ill) and Kennedy (D-Mass).

But Moscow refused visas.
"Lack of hotel accommodations and some other shortages, both in Moscow and in the big educational and industrial centers, caused by the war," the Soviet embassy wrote.

As a result, the letter said, "trips of foreign tourists are not yet possible for the time being."
Kersten got off a letter to Secretary of State Marshall.
He told Marshall:
"When a congressional subcommittee is refused visas by the Russian embassy because of 'lack of hotel accommodations, I submit it is entirely in order for you to request the immediate removal of all excess Russian nationals, registered and unregistered, residing in our country, because of the acute housing shortage in the United States."

Shortages Of \$20,000 In Nurse Fund

AUSTIN — (AP) — "Unsupported withdrawals" of \$21,552.36 from the bank account of the state board of nurse examiners were reported Friday by State Auditor C. H. Cavness to the governor, the board, and the legislature.

Cavness' formal report said these withdrawals "were checks made payable to Eloween Mesch, to 'cash', to various 'ladies' ready-to-wear stores, garages, utility companies, etc., and to individuals not connected in any way with the board's affairs, and appeared to have been issued for the personal benefit of the secretary-treasurer, who signed all checks."

Mrs. Mesch, a former member of the board, was secretary-treasurer until her recent commitment to the San Antonio State Hospital for the insane.

Cavness told the governor "it is our opinion nothing of real value to the board would be gained by further investigation of this case."

"Mrs. Eloween Mesch of San Antonio, the secretary-treasurer, was ill at the time we started our work, and was confined to the San Antonio hospital on July 3. We did not get to meet or talk with her."

"The 'last authentic' audit of the board's books was made as of Aug. 31, 1939, Cavness said.

"We found 'audit reports' for the intervening years up to Aug. 31, 1946, which were evidently not prepared by the accountants whose names are on them."

Hint Jesse Jones May Be Witness In Kaiser Case

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Senatorial investigators hinted Friday at Jesse Jones as an ace witness in their efforts to prove that White House pressure forced award of a \$400,000 wartime plane contract to Howard Hughes and Henry J. Kaiser.

The former cabinet member's possible appearance hinges, one Senator said, on whether any documentary evidence is found in the files of the late President Roosevelt.

A Senate war investigating subcommittee will open a hearing Monday into the contract for planes never delivered.

Senator Ferguson (R-Mich), who heads the inquiry group told a reporter he "doesn't know yet" whether Jones will be asked to testify.

Although Ferguson declined further comment, another committee member said it is likely the former Secretary of Commerce and head of the Reconstruction Finance Corporation will be asked to tell what he knows about the matter if a search of the Roosevelt files proves fruitless.

DOLLAR HIDE EXTENDER IS STILL IN HARD FORMATION
The Pure Oil Company and Humble No. 1 Cowden, north extender to the Dollar Hide field, in extreme Southwest Andrews County, and which is now going ahead to test into the Ellenburger, had reached 8,033 feet in hard lime and chert, in the upper Ordovician, and was continuing.

Operators' reports show that the prospector made only 15 feet of hole in the last 24 hour period.

SE HALE PROSPECTOR WILL BE PLUGGED AND ABANDONED
Southern Minerals Corporation No. 1 Heard, Central-Southeast Hale County wildcat, about three miles north and one mile west of the discovery well of the Petersburg field, and 660 feet from south and west lines of section 13, block R-1 survey, has been plugged and abandoned as a dry hole on total depth of 7,210 feet in dry lime.

This exploration encountered no shows of oil or gas. It checked low geologically.

Southern Minerals No. 1 Henderson South Cordonia County prospector, 467 feet from south and east lines of section 63, block 8, H&TC survey, and three miles southwest of Ruth, had penetrated past 3.

VA ANNOUNCES 79 NEW OFFICES FOR DISABLED
WASHINGTON — (AP) — The Veterans Administration said Friday it will set up 79 unit offices throughout the United States, within the next 30 days, to help physically-handicapped war veterans.

Primarily, the agency said in a statement, the new system will "eliminate much red tape" and simplify the purchase of such devices as artificial arms, legs, hands and ears, plastic eyes and hearing aids.

Trained employees will be established in each of the 13 branch offices and 66 regional offices, to give technical advice to disabled veterans and to remain in touch with dealers of prosthetic appliances.

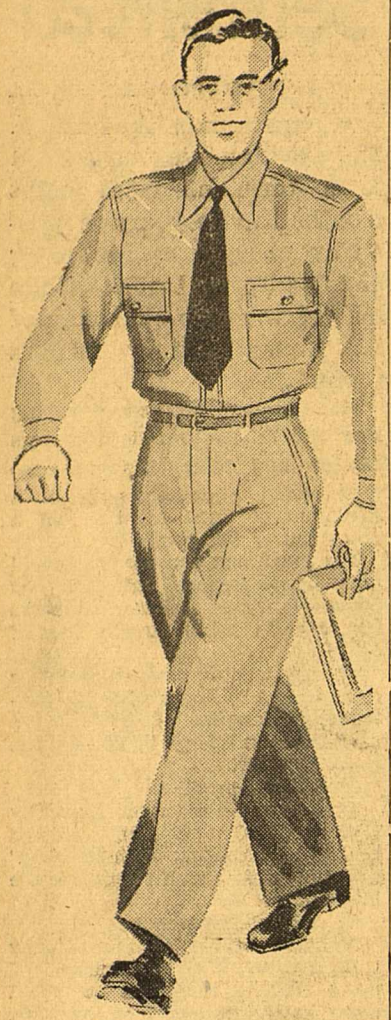
Sunrise Finish Finds Senate Unable To Get Action On Clark Probe

WASHINGTON—(AP)—A hectic 18 hour and 12 minute Senate session ended at sunrise Friday with Republican leaders conceding defeat in their demands for an investigation into Attorney General Clark's handling of Kansas City vote fraud charges.

Determined to carry out their plans to adjourn Congress for the year Saturday night, GOP chiefs bowed before unbending Democratic opposition.

738 feet in shale and lime and was drilling ahead. It is expected to enter the Bend at about 3,300 feet—and it might encounter some shows for oil and gas production when that formation is reached.

OIL RECOVERY INCREASES AT NW CRANE WILDCAT

The Texas Company No. 31 Connell, Northwest Crane County wildcat, about two miles west of the shallow Jordan field, and 1,977 feet from south and 662 feet from west lines of section 29, block B-16, psi survey, swabbed 110 barrels of oil in 24 hours, out with two per cent water and two and one half per cent sediment from perforated section at 6,920-55 feet, which had been treated with 500 gallons of mud acid and 1,000 gallons of regular acid.

Operator was preparing to retreat that zone with 6,000 gallons of acid, and then test further.

This project drilled to total depth of 9,964 feet in the Ellenburger. It failed to produce there and was plugged back to the horizon now being investigated, which is in the lower Permian.

DEEP TEST IN GOLDSMITH FILED IS DRILLING AHEAD

Gulf Oil Corporation No. 430-E Goldsmith, Ellenburger exploration in the Goldsmith shallow field of Northwest Ector County, and 1,992 feet from north and 2,001 feet from west lines of section 15, block 44, TP survey, T-1-S, was drilling ahead below 9,327 feet in the Wadwell section of the Simpson, middle Cretaceous, after a drillstem test was taken at 9,280-9,310 feet, for one hour.

An unreported amount of gas showed at the surface after 15 minutes. Recovery was 30 feet of drilling mud, with no shows of oil reported.

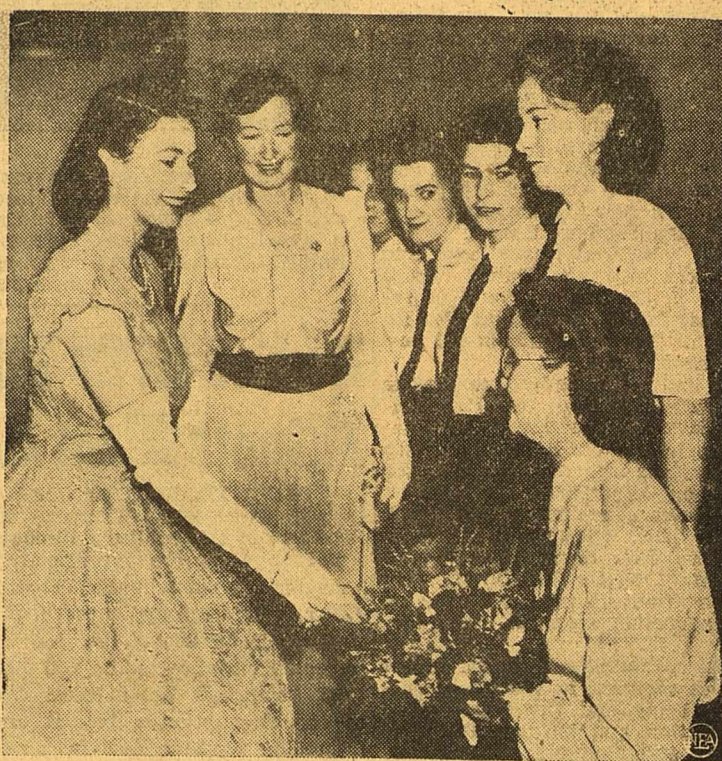

FRANCE RESTORES RIVER TRANSPORT

PARIS—(AP)—France has restored 99 per cent of her inland waterway transport since the war, J. Dubreuil, chairman of a French transport committee, has announced.

Of 12,000 boats on inland streams, 2,000 were destroyed and 5,000 damaged during the war, he said. He pointed out that the inland system's 3,700,000 tons was 900,000 tons more than the seagoing merchant marine and that Paris's port traffic of 14,000,000 tons surpassed even Marseille's 8,000,000 tons of goods handled.

Decision On The DPs

President Truman once again has appealed to Congress for legislation which would permit some of Europe's displaced persons to come to this country. There are, according to Truman, almost a million homeless people existing in European camps. They survived the persecutions of one type of totalitarianism, and now refuse to go home and live under another type.

There are many members of Congress who share these displaced persons' dislike of communism. Yet, oddly enough, much of the opposition to the DPs' admittance is found among the strongest congressional anti-Communists.

The argument is that the United States today is overcrowded and underemployed. European refugees, it is said, would take the homes and jobs that rightly belong to veterans. It is also said that there might be subversive elements among them—though it is hard to understand why European opponents of nazism and communism should be feared in this country.

Let us look at these arguments again. There are a million European DPs, or about 2.5 per cent of our population. But this country is not asked to take all of them. The bill most likely to be considered calls for admitting 100,000 a year for four years. A hundred thousand persons are about seven-hundredths of one per cent of our population. Can anyone seriously think that such an increase would work a hardship upon the American people?

If Congress should decide to allow their admittance, the displaced persons would have to pass the regular immigration examinations, as Truman pointed out. They would be screened to eliminate those who had criminal records, those who were likely to become public charges, and other undesirable, including—let the fearful legislators take heart—those with records of subversive activities or sympathies.

Many of these Europeans who want to come here have relatives or friends in America. All have fellow-countrymen. They are people, as the President said, with a wide variety of professions, crafts and skills. On the basis of our past history, they would be more likely to enhance than to injure our national life.

Congress' decision, however, will be much more important and far-reaching than the question of whether some of these persons are to be permitted to come here and live among us. The decision will reveal to the world some answers to questions which must puzzle many, both here and abroad.

Will the government of the American people raise a hand to help all those who stand for democracy and individual freedom, or are those blessings to be reserved for American citizens? Are the basic issues of a war in which a quarter-million Americans gave their lives to be so quickly forgotten?

Will a prosperous America, untouched by war, refuse to risk the shock of increasing its population by .07 per cent in a year?

The displaced persons survived nazism and outlived it. Today they prefer the restrictions of a concentration camp to the restrictions of communism. They were on our side in the war and they are still on our side. Are we on theirs? That is the real question that Congress must answer before the world.

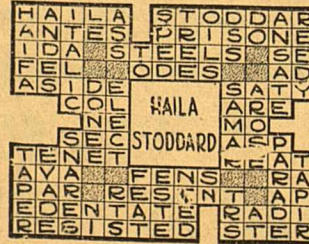

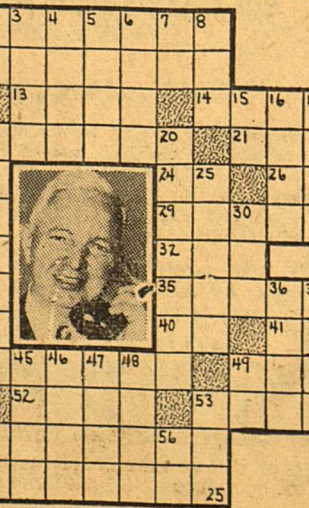

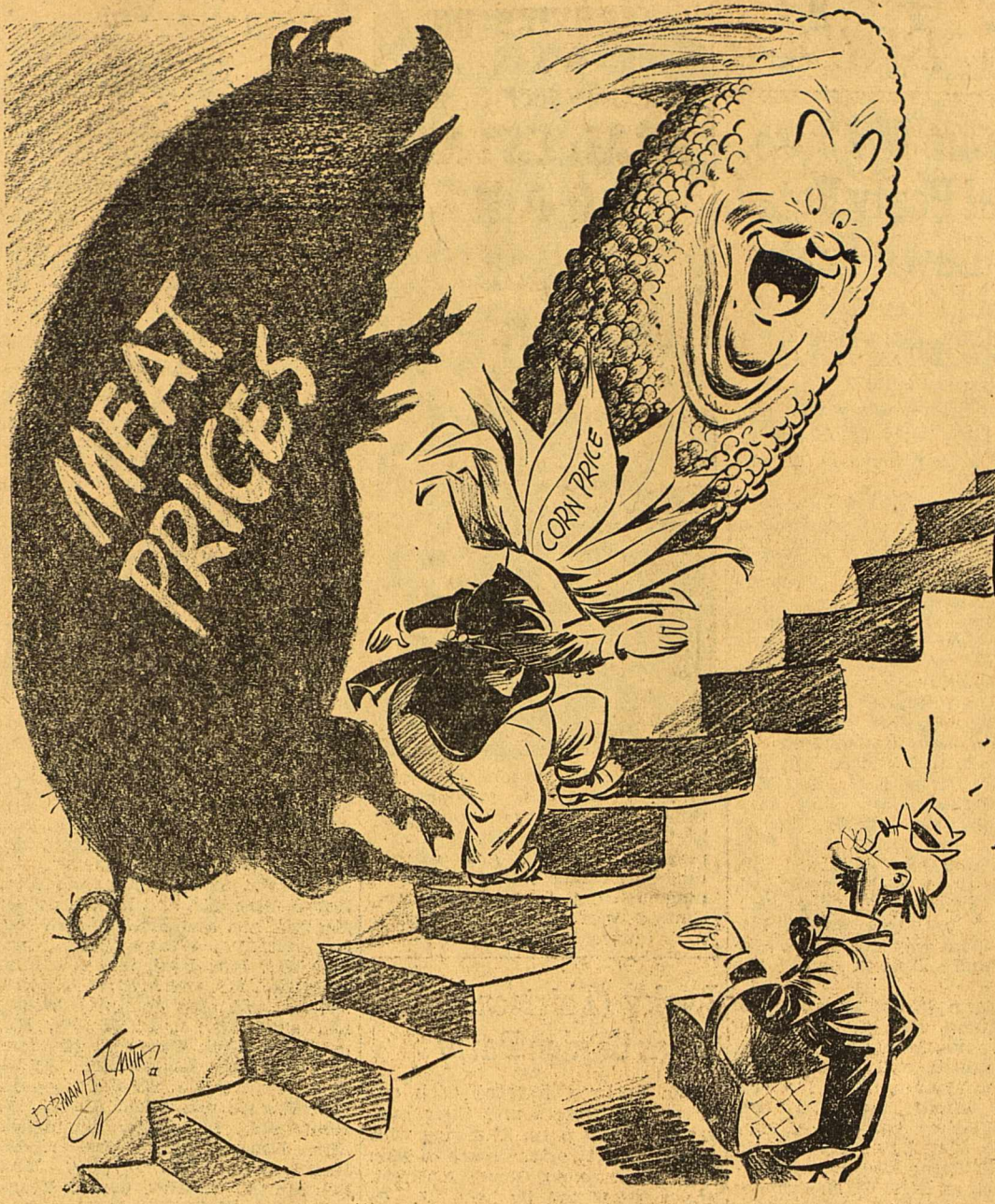

Congress Knows It Is Quitting, And Acts Part

WASHINGTON (AP)—The first session of the 80th Congress is winding to a close with the usual oratorical fanfare—but it isn't much of a show from the galleries.

Congressional leaders are trying to finish their legislative chores to meet a Saturday night deadline. But if you have a mental picture of a tense room packed with eager statesmen bent on saving the "people," you should attend one of the final sessions now underway in the House of Representatives.

It isn't like that at all. It is more like a classroom the last day of school, with everybody eager to get away on his vacation.

I watched the House proceedings for two hours one afternoon from a gallery seat. Some 75 congressmen were present, and I remarked this seemed a small number for a closing session.

"Why this is big crowd today," said a press veteran.

The chamber looked small and dingy. A framework of steel girders has been erected beneath the old ceiling to keep it from crumbling down on the heads of the legislators. Over the whole room hung an air of tired boredom and languor. Most congressmen already had their minds on their coming vacations. Many ambled restlessly about the chamber, visiting with one another. Others sat and read newspapers.

Appeals For Attention

One old-timer climbed to his feet and took the microphone to oppose the House bill to lift all remaining restrictions on installment buying.

"When a country is as prosperous as our country is at this time," he began, and then halted as he realized hardly anyone could hear him.

"Mr. Speaker," he said appealingly.

The Hon. Joseph W. Martin, Jr., banged heavily with his gavel and cried:

"Members will please take their seats. The House is in order."

But the drone again grew louder. I went over to the Senate chamber. Things were livelier there. But the senators talked as if they were tired, too.

This dying session has just been a rehearsal for the main show.

Atom Experiment Is One Of Big Jobs Of History

By JAMES MARLOW
WASHINGTON—(P)—Here's an outline of what this country is doing at this time in American history with atomic energy.

You, an ordinary citizen, can't imagine it all. Few people can, unless they're high in the government or are scientists. The work is too huge, too scattered, too complicated, too scientific.

The outline given here is pretty sketchy because there still is so much secrecy surrounding the development of atomic energy. It is pieced together from the report which the government's Atomic Energy Commission recently made to Congress.

This commission, which makes such a report twice a year, is the boss of atomic energy and everything connected with it in this country.

And the commission isn't telling everything, by a long sight. But first of all: new bigger and better (or worse) atomic bombs are being made.

The government will continue to do this until it reaches—if it reaches—agreement with other nations on controlling atomic bomb-making.

Somewhere in the Pacific it is setting up "proving grounds" for testing atomic weapons and experimenting with them.

This country is out in front now with the atomic bomb, and it's trying to stay there. The commission says:

"To rely on existing knowledge alone could be disastrous. After More Knowledge

So the government is pouring huge sums into trying to learn more about atomic energy and how to use it, for war and peace.

For the fiscal year starting July 1 and ending next June 30, the government will spend probably more than \$500,000,000 on atomic work.

Here's one quick example of something the government is trying to find out now: can atomic energy make planes fly or drive warships?

Scattered around the United States, the government has 41,500 people working on atomic projects, of one kind or another.

It is trying to get scientists, administrators and engineers of first rate ability but the commission says they're "relatively few in number."

Besides the job of keeping ahead with knowledge of making atomic weapons, the government is tackling this double job:

1. Trying to find a way of helping industry and communities with atomic power.

2. Seeking discoveries for medical use, such as in cancer treatment.

The commission has five main government laboratories: at Los Alamos, N. M.; Oak Ridge, Tenn.; Chicago; one being built at Patohogue, Long Island, N. Y., and one being built at Schenectady, N. Y.

But other work is being done at big private laboratories and by industrial firms.

He returned to his hand with the ace of clubs and cashed his high spade. Then all he had to do was to concede a spade trick.

Born In Texas, Reared In Oklahoma General Eaker Retires To Oregon WASHINGTON - (P) - Lt. Gen. Ira C. Eaker, who helped the Army Air Forces develop into the mightiest weapon in history, is retiring from the AAF to write and grow apples. Friends point out, however, that Eaker, native-born Texan, is not likely to be satisfied for long with this kind of activity at his orchard near Medford, Ore. His unexciting manner belies his spectacular flying career, and he is just 51. What he might do to further the cause of air preparedness probably will be decided after he has taken a long look at things from a vantage point outside the AAF. Eaker led the first all-American heavy bomber mission against the Germans while he was organizing the Eighth Air Force, which included all United States air power then based in the British Isles. After that he went to the Mediterranean as commander in chief of the Allied Air Force. When the Nazis were ready to collapse in April, 1945, he became deputy commander of the AAF, a post from which he is now retiring. Eaker made the first transcontinental flight on instruments (so-called "blind flying"), and the first transcontinental non-stop flight with refueling in flight. He was co-pilot of the "Question Mark" when it set an endurance record of seven days continuous flight in 1929. He has five decorations (some repeated) from the United States and eight from foreign countries. He has degrees in teaching and journalism, has studied law at three universities. With Gen. H. H. Arnold, he has written three books—"Army Flyer," "This Flying Game" and "Winged Warfare". Eaker doesn't drink, but he plays a whole of a poker game. He was born in Llano, Texas. However, Oklahoma is so proud of the fact Eaker grew up there its legislature recently adopted a resolution inviting him to return as a citizen "and make his great abilities available in the further development of his own state." The great monument to Eaker's over-all ability is the record of the Eighth Air Force. Eaker led that first raid—a dozen of the 20 B-17 Flying Fortresses then available—in person, although he was supposed to stay home. The daylight attack was made in the face of British admonitions it couldn't be done, but not a plane was lost. Eaker saw the missions grow and grow until more than 1,000 bombers swept the channel in a single day. The General has 30 years' service in the Army. He is married but has no children.

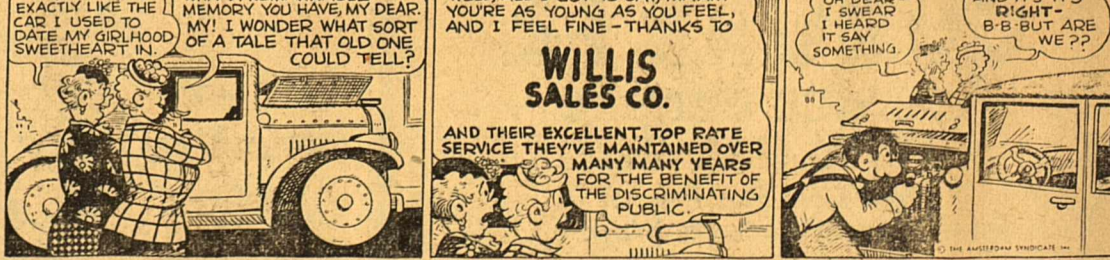
