'Words' Fly In Kaiser-Hughes Probe

All Rationing Of Sugar Is Over Monday

WASHINGTON — (AP) — The Agriculture Department announced the complete end of sugar rationing Monday because of a lack of funds to finance the program.

The action ends rationing to industrial and institutional users. Rationing to housewives was ended two months ago.

However, price controls are being kept. And controls on the amount of supplies which industrial users may have on hand were instituted.

In announcing this action, the Department said Congress failed to provide funds necessary to continue the sugar rationing administration. The office is being closed immediately, and all employees were being dismissed Monday.

The Department said all orders suspending sugar rationing to alleged violators of rationing rules are revoked. Likewise, all suspension order proceedings now pending were ordered ended.

China, Russia Clash In U.N. Council Talks

LAKE SUCCESS — (AP) — China and Soviet Russia clashed Monday in the United Nations Security Council membership committee over admitting Outer Mongolia, with Russia charging some circles in Asia would like to see the Greek situation duplicated in the Far East.

China's delegate, Dr. Shuhshi Hsu, told the membership committee which is considering applications of nine countries his government will send a China veto of the application on Outer Mongolia.

Alexei N. Krasnikov, Russian delegate who figured in an exchange of frank talk with the other delegates at a committee meeting last week, promptly charged the Chinese allegations are "absurd" "ill-founded," and in reality Chinese troops violated outer Mongolia territory.

Krasnikov said the whole border incident made him think there might be parties in China who would like to see a U. N. commission set up to investigate the affair. He said also they might be trying to detract from the civil war in China.

Set To Test World's Heaviest Bomb

Official Denies Pressure

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Merrill Meigs, wartime War Production Board official, said Monday the board feared Henry J. Kaiser would take his case "to the man in the street" if it failed to give "every consideration" to his plans for an enormous flying boat not yet completed.

But Meigs, who headed the WPB aircraft division, told the Senate War Investigating Committee he knew of no "political pressure" which forced the letting of a contract to Kaiser and Howard Hughes, millionaire manufacturer, for the ship, despite opposition of the aircraft industry and practically every government agency concerned.

The project, proposed in 1942 when submarine sinkings were causing great concern, "sounded good to the man in the street," the witness said.

HUMBLE 1 MITCHAM FLOWS OIL FROM ELLENBURGER

Another Ellenburger oil field has apparently been discovered in East Crockett County at Humble Oil & Refining Company No. 1 Mrs. Grady Mitcham, 14 miles northeast of Ozona, and 610 feet from north and 660 feet from east lines of section 12, block AB, D&SE survey.

That prospector took a drillstem test for 92 minutes at 4,097-8,120 feet. A five-eighth inch bottom hole and a one inch top choke were used.

Gas showed at the surface in three minutes. The volume was estimated at approximately 500,000 cubic feet per day. Oil started flowing in 29 minutes.

In one hour of flowing to tanks the section produced 41.7 barrels of 41 gravity oil, with gas-oil ratio of 974-1.

Operator was to take a 20-foot core, and then run another drillstem test.

Top of the Ellenburger was at 8,025 feet, on a derrick floor elevation of 2,461 feet. The top of the formation showed gas and condensate.

CONOCO TO DRILL DEEP TEST IN NE CROCKETT

Continental Oil Company has filed an application with the Railroad Commission of Texas for a permit to start drilling on its No. 1 University, as a wildcat to 9,000 feet, to test into the Ellenburger.

It will be 1,980 feet south and 660 feet from east lines of section 13, block 47, University survey. Drilling with rotary is to start by July 30.

The drillsite is six miles south of the east end of the Barnhart-Ellenburger field and 14 miles southeast of Big Lake.

SIGNAL SPOTS 3,000-FOOT WILDCAT IN N-C SCURRY

Signal Oil & Gas Company of Los Angeles, Calif., has made location for a 3,000-foot wildcat in North-Central Scurry County, on which it proposes to start drilling, with cable tools by August 1.

It will be Signal's No. 1 J. G. Whately and is 660 feet from north and east lines of section 548, block 97, H&TC survey. That puts it about four miles northeast of the town of Dermott.

E-C CULBERSON AREA TO GET 4,000-FOOT PROJECT

Location for a wildcat to around 4,000 feet in East-Central Culberston County has been reported by unofficial sources. It will be C. & B. Oil Company No. 1 Sherrod, and is 330 feet from west and 990 feet from south lines of section 31, block 45, psi survey.

That puts it about 28 miles northeast of Toyah and near a dry hole drilled several years ago by The Plymouth Oil Company.

The prospector will drill with cable tools, and operations are due to start at once.

MCALISTER GETS WATER IN SAN ANDRES IN FISHER

McAlister Fuel Company No. 1 Fisher, North-Central Andrews County wildcat, about one mile north of nearest production from the San Andres-Permian in the Shafter Lake field, and 660 feet from south and west lines of section 4, block A-36, psi survey, was drilling ahead below 4,630 feet in lime, and was going on down to around 7,500 feet — if necessary — in order to explore into the Clear Fork.

This development ran a one-hour drillstem test in the San Andres at 4,512-36 feet. Recovery was five feet of oil cut drilling mud and 90 feet of black, salty, sulphur water. This eliminated the San Andres as a possible source of production.

SMC 1 HENDERSON DRILLS AHEAD IN SOUTH CONCHO

Southern Minerals Corporation No. 1 Henderson, South Concho County exploration, 467 feet from south and east lines of section 63, block 8, H&TC survey, three miles southwest of Ruth, was drilling ahead after running a drillstem test at 3,925-51 feet.

Recovery was drilling mud, with no shows of oil or gas.

Details of the test had not been received in Midland at the time this report was prepared.

The wildcat topped the Bend lime at 3,795 feet, on a derrick floor elevation of 2,325 feet.

R-P&G 1 SMITH IN SOUTH CONCHO IS TO BE PLUGGED

Richards, Patton and Greer No. 1 Smith, five and one-half miles southwest of Paint Rock, in West Concho County, and 330 feet from north and 2,310 feet from west lines of section 309, GEC survey, has been plugged and abandoned as a dry hole on total depth of 4,035 feet in the Ellenburger lime.

That formation was topped at 7,300 feet, about 12 miles south of Colorado City, and 660 feet from north and west lines of section 10, block 13, H&TC survey, had reached 4,840 feet in an unidentified lime, and was making more hole.

Humble No. 1 A. C. Pratt, four miles northwest of Lorraine, in North Mitchell County, and 780 feet from north and 660 feet from west lines of section 28, block 25, TP survey, had progressed under 2,710 feet in shale and lime, and was continuing. It is contracted to around 3,000 feet to explore into the Ellenburger.

U. S. Congressmen To Go On Investigation Trips All Over World

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Call the roll of Congress in the months to come, and "here" will re-echo from London, Berlin, Paris, Palestine, Cairo, New Delhi, Shanghai, Pearl Harbor and Alaska.

Never before in the nation's peacetime history has there been such an international minded assembly of lawmakers, nor a group with the determination and the means to collect first hand information on "what goes" abroad.

Just a year ago, the Republican Party was campaigning with the slogan that Congress would open each day's session "with a prayer and close with a probe."

More than a score of House and Senate committees, and better than a majority of Congress itself will be heading overseas, to inquire into foreign policy and military affairs or be bound for various sections of this country to study domestic problems at their source.

The inquiries will cost more than \$2,000,000.

House Democratic Leader Rayburn of Texas has called many of them "junkies" and told the Republicans their economy record in that direction "isn't so hot."

Trial Of Ross Gets Underway

NEW BRAUNFELS — (AP) — Two months and three days after four prominent San Antonians were ambushed and shot dead on a lonely country road near here, an equally prominent young surgeon Monday went on trial for the murders.

A special venire of 72 persons has been called, and efforts are to be made to select a 12-man jury from the list. Officials freely predict this will be difficult, and may result in a change of venue.

Dr. Lloyd I. Ross, 42, San Antonio surgeon, is charged with murder in the May 25 deaths by gunshot of Willard H. York, 36, investment company head; his wife, Mrs. Gertrude O. York, 43; their son, John, 9, and York's mother, Mrs. Mary York, 67.

The tragedy followed financial difficulties between York and Dr. Ross, his family physician and close friend for 10 years.

A defense plea of temporary insanity is indicated. Two San Antonio psychiatrists made five visits recently to see Ross in jail.

Two Ship Loads Of Jews Intercepted

HAIFA — (AP) — British Naval forces Monday escorted into Haifa harbor two small wooden vessels jammed with approximately 1,100 uncertified Jewish immigrants and immediately transferred most of them to waiting British ships for deportation to Cyprus.

Both refugee ships were sponsored by Haganah, Jewish underground organization, in a new campaign to smash the British blockade barring Jewish immigration to the Holy Land.

Most of the passengers, said to be chiefly Oriental Jews, were young and most were in rags. Many were barefooted.

Mrs. Truman Funeral Rites On Monday

GRANDVIEW, MO. — (AP) — Mrs. Martha Ellen Truman, daughter of a Missouri pioneer farmer and mother of the nation's President, was due to be buried Monday afternoon on a shaded knoll in Kansas City — the town where she was born 94 years ago.

The ceremony was to be simple and private, as the mother and her devoted son, Harry S. Truman, had previously agreed. The funeral services in Mrs. Truman's plainly furnished living room were for the family alone.

Truman wrote his own brief obituary of his mother. White House spokesmen revealed. It was penned from memory last May 17, while the President was anxiously flying to her side. He did it to help the newspapermen if she died.

Every child, every death, every move in Mrs. Truman's long life was set forth with exact dates and places. It began: "Martha Ellen Truman, born Martha Ellen Young, November 25, 1852, on Parrish farm, now 36th and Prospect, Kansas City, Mo., and went on to tell the story in less than 250 words.

Vote On Balkans May Come During Week

LAKE SUCCESS — (AP) — A consensus of delegates indicates a far-reaching decision may come Tuesday in the Balkan problem, and with it a test of the United Nations' powers for effective action in the peaceful settlement of disputes.

As the U. N. Security Council prepared to convene delegates said they anticipated a vote Tuesday, or not later than Thursday, on an American proposal to set up an international "watch-dog" commission over the Balkans.

The vote on the plan will climax a week-long fight between Russia and the United States over the Balkan problem, which was brought to the council by Greece and resulted initially in an inquiry into Balkan border incidents.

VERNON MAN KILLED

VERNON — (AP) — B. F. Waller, 83, of Vernon, died Sunday from injuries received in an automobile accident near here Saturday night. Two other persons, Charlie Neel of Lubbock and Garry Girard of Dallas, were seriously injured.

British-Russian Trade Talks Break Down Over Soviets' Credit Demand

LONDON — (AP) — Sir Stafford Cripps Monday told parliament British-Russian trade treaty negotiations broke down in Moscow last week because of Soviet demands for revision of the 1941 loan agreement.

Russia owes Great Britain 65,000,000 pounds (\$220,000,000) under terms of the credit agreement.

Cripps, president of the board of trade, said British negotiators offered a number of concessions, but "we could not go the whole way the Soviet government demanded as a condition of an agreement."

The British had hoped for wheat, timber and canned fish. The Russians wanted heavy machinery, rails and pipes. The Moscow radio asserted the talks broke down because Britain would not guarantee some deliveries and because credit terms could not be reconciled.

The British delegation headed by J. Harold Wilson returned Friday from Moscow after five weeks of intensive and detailed negotiations. Cripps indicated success had been almost in sight when the talks collapsed on Soviet credit demands.

No Trace Is Found Of Monahans' Doctor Who Disappeared Weeks Ago

MONAHANS — (AP) — No trace has been found of Dr. R. N. North, retired osteopath and son of Judge Walter North, justice of the Michigan Supreme Court, who has been missing seven weeks.

North, who came here with his wife a year ago from Michigan, left Monahans on June 8 on a vacation trip to the rugged Texas Big Bend area along the Rio Grande, now a national park.

He was last seen three days later when he left a camp in the park with the intention of getting meat for his dog. No trace has been found of the doctor, his dog or car since.

Ranchers and others have searched the area.

Placards announcing a \$500 reward have been posted along the Texas-Mexican border. They are printed in both Spanish and English.

North's hobby was photography and a large amount of photographic equipment was found in his cabin. Recently he had been working for the Pickerton Studios here.

Mrs. North, who did not accompany her husband on the trip, has asked the aid of the FBI because North disappeared on federal land.

Meteor Fragments Sought In Texas

Oscar Monnig, an amateur astronomer at Fort Worth, would like to get his hands on the fragments of a meteor he said flashed across Central Texas skies and disintegrated somewhere between Little River and Belton.

After several reports "a ball of fire" was sighted in the sky late Saturday night, Monnig got on the telephone and talked with residents of the area in which the phenomenon was reportedly seen.

He said he believed the meteor originated about 10 miles east of Austin at a height of about 47 miles and exploded at a height of 22 miles after traveling through the sky for approximately 53 miles.

The remains of the meteor, he said, would differ from native rock in the region where he said it probably landed. The pieces will look black and crusted and heavy for their size, he said.

Reports of the meteor were made in Austin, Temple, Georgetown, Antidote and other places.

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Dutch Announce Sweeping Success In East Sumatra Among Vital Oil And Coal Areas

BATAVIA, JAVA — (AP) — Dutch military headquarters Monday announced sweeping new successes in Eastern Sumatra, reporting the capture virtually intact of vital coal and oil regions more than 100 miles from the jumping off point of Dutch troops at Palembang.

The advances were announced as the Netherlands Navy ordered the Java ports of Cheribon, Probolinggo and Banjoewangi opened immediately to normal trade in an effort to get great stores of captured raw materials moving to world markets.

In two separate communiques, the Dutch announced they had captured the rich Sumatra oilfield town of Batoeraja, 80 miles southwest of Palembang, and the important Boekit Assam coal mines, 20 miles further to the southwest.

Batoeraja was seized intact without resistance, the announcement said, and asserted the occupation of the Shell and Standard Vacuum oil holdings there was being consolidated.

Monday's Dutch communique indicated the Netherlands were continuing to follow the strategy of trying to isolate East and West Java — the richest rubber, coffee, tea and rice producing areas on the island, and to cut off the great oilfields of South Sumatra in similar fashion.

New threats of a sweeping scorched earth policy came from the Indonesian radio Sunday night.

The broadcast said the Dutch would have to import more than a half million workers from the Netherlands and work for 10 years to repair the damage if the threats were carried out.

Eight Die In Uprising In Shanghai Sunday

SHANGHAI — (AP) — The toll in a pitched gun battle between municipal police and gendarmes before the Golden Castle theater Sunday was raised to eight dead and 15 wounded Monday.

Police began to report back to their posts after a short-lived strike called in the wake of the battle. The police were ordered back under provisions of China's new total mobilization order, but it took the personal urging of Mayor K. C. Wu to start the return to work.

The cinema exhibitors guild threatened to close down all their movie houses unless a party of police who smashed the entrance of the Golden Castle theater in an unexplained attack were apprehended and punished.

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LATE NEWS FLASHES

BERLIN — (AP) — U. S. authorities Monday informed the Russians the five German minister-presidents in the Soviet occupation zone will be unacceptable as candidates for any future central government of Germany.

BUFFALO, N. Y. — Approximately 400 grain processors Monday struck at three more of Buffalo's six principal flour mills in walkouts which will reduce production in this milling center to one tenth of its 10,000,000 pound daily capacity.

MARSEILLE — (AP) — French authorities declared Monday nearly 1,000 of 4,500 Jews, cruising offshore in three British deportation ships were ill and needed medical care immediately.

HOUSTON — (AP) — The Texas City Terminal Railway Company Monday filed a \$2,300,000 damage suit against two insurance companies at Galveston to recover loss suffered by the company in the April 16-17 disaster at Texas City.

Hot Political Issues For 1948 Are Left In Wake Of Congress' Closing

WASHINGTON — (AP) — Sign posts pointing toward teamwork with the White House on world affairs, slugging matches on domestic problems and hot 1948 election issues stand out along the rough road the 80th Congress traveled to its own half-way mark.

McKENNEY ON BRIDGE

My friend Sam Holt of Asheville, N. C., has reminded me that the Southern Appalachian Contract Bridge Championships will be held at the George Vanderbilt Hotel in Asheville Aug. 22, 23, and 24. This tournament is actively sponsored by the Asheville Junior Chamber of Commerce.

It always provides good competition, as it attracts not only the finest players of the south, but also many of the Life Masters of New York and Philadelphia. During the buffet given after last year's tournament, today's hand came in for a good deal of discussion. At most of the tables North and South arrived at a six spade contract, which was defeated with a heart opening. At one table, after East doubled six spades, South went to six no trump even though he was void in diamonds; and that contract could not be defeated. Very often a player makes the mistake of doubling a contract that he feels sure he can defeat, and by his double he drives the opponents into a better spot. East should have known that

West did not have many hearts. Not vulnerable, West had offered no support when East bid two hearts, and then four hearts. From the bidding, the missing king of hearts undoubtedly was in the South hand.

Therefore, the double of six spades was very unwise, and the double of six no trump was an indication of anger on the part of East, rather than ability to beat the contract.



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
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Colts Defeat Slaton, 15-10



Brooklyn And Red Sox Go On Winning Spurts

The pennant picture in the Major Leagues has taken on a new aspect in recent days all because of a couple of real professionals—Ted Williams and Dixie Walker.

Only a week ago experts were predicting a New York Yankee rout in the American League flag race while forecasting another nerve-rattling down-to-the-wire finish in the National.

But now, the Red Sox, led by Ted Williams, once again the "terrible Teddy" of the 1941 and '42 seasons, have cut three full games off the Yankees' lead and now trail by nine and a half games. Dodgers Win Two.

The Dodgers, with Walker hitting with the same old gusto that established him as the "people's chereh" in flatbush, have opened up a seven game bulge over the second place St. Louis Cardinals.

Dixie drove in three runs Sunday to help the Dodgers sweep both ends of a double header from the Pirates in Pittsburgh, 8-4 and 11-4, and extend their latest winning streak to nine. Hank Behrman, recently returned by Pittsburgh, won his third straight for the Brooks in the opener, but needed a masterful relief exhibition by Hugh Casey to escape with the win.

The Red Sox took two from the St. Louis Browns in Boston, 4-3 and 12-2.

The Yankees lost a full game from their lead when they were held to a split in their double header with the Chicago White Sox 7-4 and 5-4.

The Cardinals lost a game and a half to the Dodgers when the Braves, behind the seven-hit pitching of Johnny Sain, handed them a 10-3 lacing.

The Giants staged a 15-hit attack, including Bobby Thomson's 19th home run, to defeat the Chicago Cubs 12-6.

Oscar Judd won his first game of the season as the Philadelphia Phillies divided a double header with the Reds in Cincinnati 5-1 and 6-4.

Third place Detroit lost an opportunity to gain on the Yankees when they were held to a split by the Athletics in Philadelphia, 5-0 and 5-1.

Manager Lou Boudreau drove in both Cleveland runs to give the Indians a 2-1 victory over the Senators in Washington.
