Howard Hughes To Testify Friday

Original Kaiser Plan Refused By Military

WASHINGTON —(AP)—Howard Hughes and his globe-trotting publicity man, John Meyer, will take the stand side by side Friday in the senatorial investigation of Hughes' wartime plane contracts.

Pepper To Tour States To Keep Party 'Liberal'

WASHINGTON —(AP)—Senator Pepper (Fla.) said Thursday he will make his own cross-country speaking tour this fall in an effort to "keep our Democratic Party liberal."

The Florida Senator told a reporter he has not been asked to speak for the Democratic national committee but will follow in the wake of "such Republican presidential candidates as Senator Taft (Ohio) and Governor Dewey of New York."

As for his own trip, which he has not yet mapped in detail, Pepper said he intends to "straighten out anybody who might be misled by Republican propaganda that this was a good Congress."

"Any hope or idea that the Republican Party might become the people's party, or liberal, disappeared with this Congress," the Florida Democrat said. "Its principal concern was with big business. It was not interested in farmers or small business, and it has done nothing to further the interests of women, the aged or the ill."

Highway Commission Studies Oklahoma's Big Bend Road Ideas

AUSTIN —(AP)—It was up to the Texas Highway Commission Thursday to decide whether it wants to match Oklahoma's aid in building a straight-line artery from the Midwest to the Big Bend National Park on the Rio Grande.

J. O. Salmon of Woodward, Okla., a member of the Oklahoma Commission told both policy-making bodies and Gov. Beauford H. Jester of Texas "we are in a position to do it, and you are in a position to help us."

The highway already has been designated from Tulsa, through Oklahoma City to the Texas line. From there it would touch Quanah, Paducah, Dickens, Post, Lamesa, Kermit, Pecos, Balmorhea, Toyahvale, and Alpine. The Texas Highway Commission has not committed itself on the project.

K. B. Corbin of Lamesa, president of the Big Bend Highway Association, presided at a dinner here Wednesday night honoring the two highway commissions of Oklahoma and Texas and Gov. Jester.

Among those introduced by Corbin was Fred Wemple of Midland, a member of the Texas commission.

New Complaints Filed Against 900 Railroads

WASHINGTON —(AP)—Attorney General Clark in a new complaint Thursday accused more than 900 railroads of collecting "unjust and unreasonable" rates on wartime shipments of steel airplane landing mats.

The action was filed with the Interstate Commerce Commission. The government is asking reparation for alleged overcharges on the landing mats moved from Eastern shipping points to Pacific coast ports between Jan. 1, 1942 and June 30, 1946.

The Justice Department announcement said "thousands of carloads" of landing mats were involved.

Midland Exceeds Savings Bond Quota

Midland County exceeded by more than \$100,000 its \$80,000 quota in the U. S. Treasury's June-July Savings Bond campaign, John P. Butler, chairman, said Thursday. The drive, which featured the Bond-A-Month program, started June 1 and closed July 15. Midland County sales during the period totaled \$186,946.25.

The sale of Series E bonds totaled \$62,106.25, and Series F and G amounted to \$124,840.

Butler expressed appreciation to citizens for their usual cooperation during the campaign.

Greeks Likely To Ask Drastic UN Action

LAKE SUCCESS —(AP)—The Greek government Thursday reported by informed sources to be considering the possibility of bringing charges against Russia's Balkan satellites under the most drastic provisions of the United Nations Charter.

The sources said the Greeks were studying closely Chapter VII of the Charter, which provides for United Nations action in cases of aggression and breaches of peace.

That chapter was invoked for the first time in UN history Wednesday by Australia in bringing the Indonesian case to the Security Council. Both the Indonesian and Balkan issues were on the council's agenda for the meeting Thursday.

It was said the Greeks have been told by the United States the Truman aid plan remained definitely in force despite the Russia veto of an American proposal to set up a Balkan commission. Furthermore, it was said the United States told the Greeks this country was firmly behind them in their efforts to establish a stable government and stop the disorders in the Balkans.

Chapter VII includes strong measures from breaking off relations with the aggressor up to actual military operations by the United Nations against any country the Security Council decides has committed an act of aggression.

However, the United Nations police force which would carry out any such military orders still is in the discussion stages. Not one soldier has yet been committed to the U. N. force.

N.Y. Workers Refuse To Handle Nitrate Cargo

NEW YORK —(AP)—Refusal of Brooklyn longshoremen to load a ship carrying ammonium nitrate, the fertilizer that was carried by ships that exploded in the Brest, France, and Texas City disasters, Thursday raised the possibility ships with ammonium nitrate abroad may be barred from the port of New York.

Eighty longshoremen, who were to put general cargo aboard the SS Molda, walked off Wednesday. They demanded they be given double, or "ammunition" pay, that special safety precautions be taken, and the ship be moved to the harbor zone for dangerous ships.

Fire Commissioner Frank J. Quaye said unless ships loaded with ammonium nitrate can be "completely controlled" he might "go so far as to bar from the port of New York vessels laden with this highly explosive commodity."

Joseph P. Ryan, president of the AFL International Longshoremen's Association, said "we're more concerned about the proper precautions than about the pay."

"We don't want a repetition of Texas City in the port of New York," Ryan said.

Sun Oil Raises Prices Of Several Products

PHILADELPHIA —(AP)—Sun Oil Company Thursday announced price increases in several products and said the action was taken to protect the fuel oil supply of its customers against the added competition of those who might be tempted to convert from coal to oil on the basis of sheer economics.

The petroleum industry cannot handle at this time any sharply increased demand for fuel oils, the company said.

Increases effective immediately were 21 cents per barrel on heavy fuel oil delivered on the Atlantic seaboard, and three-tenths to one-half cent per gallon for furnace oils, kerosene and industrial distillates in New Jersey and Maryland.

Beauty Shop Demolished

Bodies Of Two British Soldiers Blasted To Bits By Booby Trap

JERUSALEM —(AP)—The bodies of two young British sergeants, kidnaped as hostages by Irgun, Zvai Lemni Thursday were found hanging from two eucalyptus trees and were blasted to bits by a booby trap when British soldiers started to cut them down.

The area was cordoned off and dogs were turned loose in an attempt to pick up the trail of the killers.

In Jerusalem, top Palestine government officials met to map a rigid campaign against underground violence. One official said plans under consideration included a demand upon the Jewish agency to cooperate actively in stamping out underground attacks.

Blast Echoes in Sharon

When soldiers started to cut the bodies down after an hour-long probe for mines, the booby trap exploded behind the body of Sgt. Clifford Martin. It blasted to bits his body and that of Sgt. Martin Paice and scattered the pieces over a wide area.

The blast wounded one Grenadier Guardsman in the face and threw several bystanders to the ground, including photographer James Pringle and correspondent Carter L. Davidson, both of The Associated Press.

The booby trap exploded as Grenadier Guardsmen attempted to cut down Martin's body. The blast echoed throughout the historic forest preserve in the Plains of Sharon, scene of many battles of Biblical times.

Wine announced he had written the Missouri, Kansas and Oklahoma state regulatory bodies proposing that joint hearings be held if an application is made for higher rates. CAPTURE ESCAPEE

Midland police Wednesday captured an escapee from a Big Spring hospital.

SANTA ANA, CALIF.—(AP)—Passionate love letters exchanged between 18-year-old Louise Overall and her college sweetheart, George (Bud) Gollum, during their jail confinement on charges of slaying her parents were under the scrutiny of defense counsel Thursday as the 10th week of the bizarre Overall yacht blast murder trial neared its conclusion.

Prosecutor Eugene Williams claims Gollum and his fiancée bludgeoned to death her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Walter E. Overall, and then dynamited the Overall power cruiser. The bodies of the Overalls were found on the yacht, the Mary E.

J. Clark Sellers, Los Angeles handwriting expert, Wednesday testified handwriting on the jail admission card of the 21-year-old Gollum was identical with that on a customer's receipt for 50 pounds of dynamite and 50 electric detonator caps.

Wichita Falls Oilman Dies; Rites Friday

WICHITA FALLS —(AP)—Final rites for C. W. Snider, 64-year-old North Texas banker, oil man and civic leader, who died here Wednesday night, will be held here Friday.

Texas was not included in the development of the oil business in North Texas fields, Snider was more widely known as a builder in Wichita Falls. He played a leading role in the construction of four of the city's largest buildings.

Shipbound Jews Pose Problem For French

PARIS —(AP)—The French Cabinet weighed Thursday a National Assembly resolution urging it to press Britain for a speedy and humane solution to the vexing problem posed by 4,500 Jewish refugees who are staging a sitdown on three British transports anchored off France's Mediterranean coast.

The resolution was adopted late by unanimous vote of the assembly, which also congratulated the French government for not attempting to impose a course of action upon the Jews.

Dispatches from Port-de-Bouc on France's Southern coast reported meanwhile signs of growing restlessness among the shipbound Jews, who have refused to disembark in protest against being shipped back to France after a fruitless attempt to crash the gates of Palestine.

The discomforts of life aboard the crowded ships, which left Palestine almost three weeks ago, were increased by extremely hot weather and by a shortage of rations.

Fired-City Captured By Dutch; Republicans Claim Jap Troops Used

BATAVIA, JAVA —(AP)—The Dutch Army announced Thursday night the capture of fire-scarred Malang, former resort city which is the key to East Central Java.

A broadcast Indonesian communiqué said another column of the Dutch Army, equipped largely with U. S. lend-lease and surplus war supplies, had cut nearly halfway across the waist of Java in a drive from Tegay, on the North coast, to the Bobotsari area, 35 miles to the Southeast. The Republicans asserted the Dutch were using a company of Japanese in the attack.

Church Leader Declares Decline Must Be Halted

BUFFALO, N. Y.—(AP)—The international convention of the Disciples of Christ was warned Thursday continued decline in church enrollment could mean "curtains for the Protestant Church in America," but was told the decline could be halted through church school enlargement.

Charles Marion Ross, Indianapolis, Ind., national director of educational administration of the United Christian Missionary Society, said in a prepared speech the decline during the past quarter century "during a 'great population increase in our country'."

"We must face the fact that this decline could not continue without its meaning curtains for the Protestant Church of America," he said.

OSLO, NORWAY —(AP)—An American military plane carrying Josiah Marvel, Jr., U. S. Ambassador to Denmark, tipped and crashed Thursday after landing near OSLO. Marvel suffered a slight cut.

MANILA —(AP)—United States Army authorities Thursday identified the victim of a third mysterious attack on American Army personnel in central Luzon as T/Sgt. Donald R. McCullough of Amarillo, Texas.

TOKYO —(AP)—Eight Superfortresses took off Thursday on a one-stop flight to Washington in a display of long-distance U. S. aerial might for Army Air Force Day Friday.

LONDON —(AP)—The British government Thursday officially condemned what it called the "cold blooded and dastardly murder" of two British Army sergeants by the Palestine underground organization.

DENISON, TEXAS —(AP)—Tom Lyndon, 52-year-old Katy Railroad employe, was struck and killed by an automobile here Thursday while he was walking through an underpass.

FORT WORTH —(AP)—Fire starting in the Farmers Lumber Yard Thursday at Mansfield, South-east of here, destroyed three buildings in the business district and damaged four others.

SO&G STAKES STEP-OUT TO EAST CRANE DISCOVERY

Stanoid Oil & Gas Company has staked a southwest stepout to the recently completed discovery of the University-Waddell-Ellebenburger field, in East Crane County.

The new prospect will be Stanoid No. 1-AH University, and is 660 feet from north and east lines of southwest quarter of section 3, block 31, University survey. That puts it one location diagonally southwest of Gulf Oil Corporation No. 1-E-HH University, the initial producer in that area, which is about three and one-half miles north of the Block 31 field.

Drilling to around 11,200 feet, to test into the Ellebenburger, is to start immediately.

SW ECTOR PROSPECTOR MADE WATER IN ELLENBURGER

Gulf Oil Corporation No. 1-E-A University-Keweenaw, Southwest Ector County exploration, 1,389 feet from north and 2,087 feet from east lines of section 8, block 35, University survey, and a southeast stepout from the discovery well of the Jordan-Ellebenburger field, ran a one-hour drillstem test at 9,422-56 feet, in the Ellebenburger which was topped at 9,390 feet.

Recovery was 350 feet of drilling mud, cut with sulphur water, and 1,540 feet of sulphur water. No shows of oil or gas were reported.

On the top of the Ellebenburger, this project had a datum of minus 6,567 feet, which put it 487 feet low on that marker to the discovery of the Jordan-Ellebenburger field. It took a drillstem test at 9,380-9,431 feet, with the tool open one hour. Recovery was 30 feet of drilling mud with a rainbow show of oil.

DR. F. H. LAHEE VISITS SUN'S MIDLAND OFFICE

Dr. F. H. Lahee, of Dallas, advisor on geological and exploration activities for all divisions of Sun Oil Company and who also is in charge of research on reserves and exploratory drilling for that concern, visited the Sun district office in Midland Wednesday and Thursday. He was accompanied by his wife.

DAWSON EXPLORATION GETS MORE SHOWS OF OIL AND GAS

Seaboard Oil Company of Delaware No. 6-A Robinson, deep exploration in Southeast Dawson County, adjacent to the shallow Spraberry field, and 1,979 feet from south and 660 feet from west lines of section 37, block 34, TP survey, T-5-N, was coring below 6,539 feet in middle Permian sandy lime.

A drillstem test was run for one and one-half hours at 6,500-6,615 feet. There was a slight blow of gas at the surface during the last 30 minutes of the period.

Recovery was 550 feet of fluid—about 75 per cent oil and 25 per cent drilling mud. No water developed.

This project recovered 500 feet of oil, cut with drilling mud, and showed some gas, during a one hour and 30 minute drillstem test at 6,457-98 feet.

SE GAINES WILDCAT HAS BEEN ABANDONED

DeKalb Agricultural Association, Inc., No. 1 Reeves, Southeast Gaines County wildcat, 27 miles southeast of Seminole, and 660 feet from south and east lines of labor 6, league 285, Schleicher County School Land survey, has been plugged and abandoned on a total depth of 6,513 feet in dry lime.

It did not log any signs of oil and gas. Some water was encountered.

SOUTH CONCHO PROJECT HAD NO SHOWS IN ELLENBURGER

Southern Minerals Corporation, No. 1 Henderson, South Concho County wildcat, three miles southwest of Ruth, and 467 feet from south and east lines of section 63, block 8, H&TC survey, was bottomed at 4,063 feet in Ellenburger lime, which had been topped at 4,050 feet on a derrick floor elevation of 2,325 feet.

A drillstem test was taken, for an unreported period of time, at 4,055-93 feet. Recovery was 30 feet of drilling mud, with no shows of oil, gas or water.

Operator is running electric log survey to total depth, at last report.

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
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

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
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Oilfield Accident Victim Buried At Jal



New Air Mail Service Begins Here Friday

A Pioneer Air Lines flight leaving Midland daily at 3:45 p. m. will provide a new air mail service beginning Friday, N. G. Oates, postmaster, has announced. Though the flight itself is not new, mail has not been carried on it in the past, Oates said.

The flight arrives in San Angelo at 4:30 p. m., Abilene at 4:12, Mineral Wells at 5:59, Fort Worth at 6:24 and Dallas at 6:50. At Dallas, mail is transferred to a different flight which arrives at Waco at 7:41, Temple at 8:04, Bryan at 8:37, and Houston at 9:20.

Midlanders wishing to get mail off on the flight should have it in the post office at least an hour before the flight leaves, Oates advised. While it is possible mail posted later than 2:45 p. m. might make it, there is no assurance that it will, because post office employees at times might be so busy it would be impossible for them to tie out extremely late mail in time for the flight.

 from North and 200 feet from west lines of section 15, block 44, TP survey, T-1-S, ran a drillstem test in the Ellenburger at 9,493-9,520 feet.

Gas showed at the surface in seven minutes. Oil flowed at the top in 31 minutes. It flowed to pits for 11 minutes to clean, and then flowed 38 barrels of oil to tanks, in 30 minutes.

Recovery, when all the drill pipe was broken down, was 6,000 feet of clean oil. Operator was preparing to run a Schlumber survey to total depth.

Gravity of the oil produced during the test was 42.5 degrees. This well is three-quarters of a mile northwest of Gulf's No. 421-E Goldsmith, which developed water in the Ellenburger. It plugged back and has produced some oil and some water from the Devonian.

No. 430-E Goldsmith topped the Ellenburger at 9,495 feet, giving it a datum of minus 6,368 feet, and placing it 205 feet higher on that marker than was No. 421-E Goldsmith.

It is understood that the new deep discovery likely will be drilled deeper before completion activities are started. The nearest Ellenburger production is in the Andactor field to the northwest and in the TXL field to the west.



This brought totals for the first six months of 1947 to 851 killed, 8 per cent less than the 924 killed in the same period of 1946, and 6,738 injured.

Collisions between motor vehicles caused 41 deaths in June.



MAJOR LEAGUES Blackwell Loses; Dodgers Win In St. Louis Dilly

Lanky Ewell Blackwell's sensational 16-game winning streak was at an end Thursday, but another string—the 12 straight successes of the Brooklyn Dodgers—has the baseball world buzzing.

The National League leading Brooks won their 12th straight in St. Louis in as thrilling a game as played in many a season. Few of the 31,709 fans will forget it. The game, which lasted through 10 innings and 3½ hours, had all the thrills and pathos of a world series encounter.

The Dodgers opened up a 10-0 lead against Harry Brecheen and Red Minger in the first four innings.

The Cards, aided by Whitey Kurrowski's three-run homer, caused a mild stir by scoring four times in the sixth to knock Ralph Branca from the hill. So things remained until the last of the ninth.

Then Chuck Diering, Stan Musial, Enos Slaughter and Ron Northey slammed successive singles to bring in three tallies. Kurrowski walked, Marty Marion singled and pinch hitter Del Wilber also singled to drive in three more runs and deadlock the game at 10-10.

The Dodgers roared back in the top of the 10th. With one out Gene Hermanski doubled and after Bruce Edwards had made the second out, Pee Wee Reese came through with a ground ball single between third and short to send Hermanski home with the payoff run.

Lead Is Now Nine Games
The triumph increased the dodgers' first place margin over the Cards to nine full games, and St. Louis now is in third place, one percentage point behind the New York Giants.

Blackwell's string was broken by the Giants, who defeated the Reds 5-4 in a 10-inning daylight tussle in Cincinnati. It was the side-arm slinger's first defeat since May 4. His overall record now stands at 12-3.

The New York Yankees stretched their American League lead to 11½ games over the runner-up Red Sox of Boston by defeating the Detroit Tigers 8-5 at the Yankee Stadium while the Red Sox bowed to the Cleveland Indians 13-7 in a night game at Boston.

The St. Louis Browns pushed over an unearned run in the 11th to eke out a 2-1 win over the Senators in a night game in Washington.

The Chicago White Sox downed the Athletics 3-2 in a night game in Philadelphia.

Pittsburgh and Boston divided a double header, the Pirates winning the opener 5-3 and the Braves bouncing back to take the nightcap 8-5.

After taking it on the chin 13 times in 14 meetings with the Chicago Cubs, the Philadelphia Phils broke loose with an 11-hit attack against three Bruin hurlers to win 9-2 in Chicago.

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Hardin-Simmons Grid Team, Unbeaten Since 1942, To Be Better

ABILENE —(P)—Hardin-Simmons University, which hasn't lost a football game to a college team since 1941, expects to be stronger next fall than in 1946 when the Cowboys romped to the Border Conference and Alamo Bowl championships.

This despite the fact, that the team has lost the nation's leading ground-gainer, Rudolph (Little Doc) Mobley has entered professional football and won't take his remaining year of eligibility here.

But even Coach Warren Woodson says the Cowboys will be stronger although he tempers it with a statement that "the others will be stronger, too."

There will be 20 lettermen, nine of them starters from last season. Five of the players—Al Johnson, J. C. (Bullet) Cook, Red Cleveland, Jack Ellison and Moe Hedrick—were on both of Hardin-Simmons' unbeaten teams—in 1942 and 1946. In 1942—or rather on Jan. 1, 1943—Hardin-Simmons lost a game, meeting defeat at the hands of Second Air Force in the Sun Bowl at El Paso. But they don't count this on the record. No college eleven has taken the Cowboys in low in the two years. In 1943, 1944 and 1945 Hardin-Simmons was out of football because of the war.

Woodson has quite a record with the Cowboys and at Arkansas State College, where he was coach before coming to Hardin-Simmons. At Arkansas State his team won the conference championship four or five years; at Hardin-Simmons he has two championships and one tie for the title in the Border Conference—that's six championships and one tie in eight seasons.

Hardin-Simmons will play a 10-game schedule including intercollegiate tilts with San Jose at San Jose, Calif., and Mississippi State at State College, Miss., Trinity University and University of Houston of the Lone Star Conference are scheduled in addition to six Border Conference foes.

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

High Percentage Of Taxes Collected In County During Year

Tax collections in Midland County during the fiscal year ending June 30 were among highest in history, it was announced Thursday by the office of J. H. Fine, county tax assessor-collector.

Percentage of both state and county taxes collected was 96 plus. Usually, a collection percentage of 92 or 93 is considered excellent, Fine said.

During the year state taxes totaling \$45,608.77 were collected. Assessments totaled \$47,039.71, so delinquencies amounted to \$1,430.94. County taxes were collected to the tune of \$63,569.04. Assessments totaled \$65,787.02, and delinquencies totaled \$2,198.54.

State and county poll taxes failed to show up so well, but it was explained that this was expected, since it is an "off" year for voters. The county was assessed \$5,248.50 in state poll taxes, but collected only \$4,290, leaving a delinquent

Ward County Farm Road Work Is Slated

PECOS—Farm Highway 516 from Barstow, on U. S. 80, northwesterly 8.472 miles, soon will be under construction, T. J. Kelly, district engineer for the Texas Highway Department, announced.

The work consists of grading, structures, flexible base and single asphalt surface treatment. The contract provides for completion in 100 working days.

Hugh McMillan, El Paso contractor, was the successful low bidder. His bid was \$64,915.02.

The road will afford a connection with Barstow to that section of Ward County that has not heretofore been served with a highway, Kelly said. Ira R. Titus, resident highway engineer, Pecos, is in charge of the project.

No Major Injuries To Workmen On New Office Building Thus Far

Although Midland's new office building under construction at the corner of Wall and Colorado Streets may not be the tallest in the county, or even in Midland, it is unique in at least one respect.

There hasn't been a single major injury among the small army of workmen who've been employed on the job almost a year.

Usually, according to Jack Arthur, construction superintendent in charge of the project, contractors expect from one to three fatal accidents on a job of this size. The worst accident during the construction thus far was suffered by a man working for a sub-contractor. He fell and broke his wrist.

Since the most dangerous part of the work is completed, the building should be finished with this perfect record still intact, Arthur said. Carelessness on the part of workmen could still make some of the work hazardous, however.

On Schedule

Progress on the building is just about according to schedule, Arthur said, although shortages of materials have caused numerous delays in construction since the building was begun. Just now, it is the matter of metal door frames that has the superintendent worried. Coal and steel strikes put manufacturers far behind in filling orders for these items.

Unless further shortages hamper the program, the building should be completed by the middle of December, Arthur said. Bricklayers are putting finishing touches on outside work, and most of the carpenters' work is done. Electricians, plumbers and air conditioning men are working at full speed. Bricklayers will be needed again when it comes time to build the inside tile partitions. Outside stone work should be completed next week, he calculated.

An average of 65 men of all crafts have worked on the job since its beginning.

Sanitarian Promises Action Against Those Violating Food Laws

Midland food handlers and their establishments are being checked for violations of city and state health laws, and persons refusing to comply are going to be faced with court proceedings, W. M. Howard, sanitarian with the Midland-Ector-Howard County Health Unit, stated Thursday.

Refrigeration facilities are receiving particular attention at this time, he said, since summer heat makes it especially necessary that foods be kept at temperatures low enough to prevent deterioration.

During recent inspections he has discovered a number of employes in restaurants, groceries, meat markets and soda fountains have neglected to post their food handler's licenses in conspicuous places as required by law. Some licenses were found to have expired, and some employes have failed to obtain licenses at all, Howard said. He warned action will be taken against those persons who, after having been notified of the law, fail to obtain the proper food handler's permits.

Inspection of restaurants entails checking 26 separate practices of cleanliness and sanitation, Howard said, but special vigilance is being exercised in the matters of refrigeration, sterilization, health certificates, food handlers' licenses and care of garbage.

All new food-handling employes must go to the health unit and take examinations in order to get temporary health certificates permitting them to serve food. A course for food handlers will be offered by the unit in September, and by finishing that course handlers may obtain a food handler's license, Howard advised.

Meanwhile, he emphasized, there will be periodic inspections of Midland establishments to see that dishes are properly sterilized, employes follow laws regulating manner in which food is served, garbage is properly disposed of, kitchens, counters and dining tables are kept clean, toilet facilities are arranged and kept clean according to law, and other sanitation measures are enforced.

State 'Tariffs' Grow In Order To Pay Bonus In Connecticut And Elsewhere

You'll pay the "tariff," they insist, or you'll pay a \$500 fine, plus maybe a year in jail.

Tax experts, studying Connecticut's determination, just grin. It's not the first state to try to use tax—which is designed, generally, to placate state merchants who are afraid the sales tax will drive business away.

Since Washington State set the example in 1935, a total of 20 states have adopted the use tax. Oregon will hold a popular referendum on a three per cent tax in October, and Illinois has been flirting with the idea for some time without taking action.

Such taxes range from one per cent in Louisiana to three per cent in Michigan, North Carolina, Ohio, South Dakota and Washington. The list of items covered differs slightly. But in general the use tax is much the same everywhere.

It requires the buyer to pay, for the storage or use of tangible personal property, as much as the sales tax would have been if he had bought in the state. Its purpose is to see that you don't cheat your state, or its merchants, by buying in another state that has no sales tax.

Most use taxes were adopted before the war. Connecticut is one of a few which have added it to help pay for GI bonuses. Oregon's three per cent tax, if adopted; Rhode Island's one per cent tax; Maryland's and Tennessee's two per cent taxes are other newcomers.

Tax experts expect these newcomers to find what most of the old-timers have discovered—that it's much easier to write such a law than to enforce it.

There was a time, for example, when New York City police established a blockade of tunnels and bridges to New Jersey, trying to collect the city tax on cigarettes. The return didn't pay the cops' salaries.

Another time, New York tried to blockade the Connecticut border to catch scowflaw citizens bringing in liquor that was cheaper in Connecticut than in New York.

Illinois, with a three-cent cigarette tax, once patrolled the Indiana border seeking "smugglers" with tax-free cigarettes.

And Ohio tried having special inspectors follow trucks delivering tax-free cigarettes; the driv-

Marriages On Decline After Reaching Peak

WASHINGTON—(AP)—The post-war boom in romance has reached its peak; marriages are on the decline.

The National Office of Vital Statistics reported today that 427,319 couples bought marriage licenses during the first quarter of 1947. That is 20 per cent fewer than the number issued during the same quarter of 1946.

The report attributed the huge post-war increase in weddings to GI romances.

It said marriages started climbing "unusually high" as early as 1945, when veterans were returning from Europe, and lasted through most of 1946.

Last year set a new record in American marriages, a total of 2,313,795 or about 41.8 per cent more than in 1945. In the war year of 1944 only 1,432,384 licenses were issued.

While marriages have increased, the ratio of divorces to marriages has declined. In 1945 there were 31 divorces for every 100 marriages. The statisticians attribute this to the

Soldier Will Do Just Anything For Furlough

DAYTON, OHIO—(AP)—Army enlisted men will do almost anything for a 30-day furlough.

Take the case of Harold Buffinberger, master sergeant, Osborn, Ohio, and Cpl. Harlan Plummer of High Point near Cincinnati.

For 10 days Buffinberger and Plummer lived in a small chamber in the basement of the aero-medical laboratory of nearby Wright field.

As a reward for volunteering for the ordeal, Buffinberger and Plummer will get 30-day leaves.

Almost Tearless Onion Developed In College

SAN FRANCISCO—(AP)—An almost tearless onion, California hybrid red No. 1, has been produced by plant breeders at the University of California College of Agriculture at Davis.

"It's not completely tearless," says Dr. Glen N. Davis, assistant professor of truck crops who produced the new variety, "but it's much less irritating to the eyes than other onions. It is exceedingly mild, has an extraordinarily sweet flavor and is especially good for eating raw in salads."

Davis pointed out that you just can't have an almost tearless onion and still have a highly flavored one in the same variety. A volatile sulphur compound gives onions their flavor, he explained.

ANTHRACITE OPERATORS COMMENDED BY UNION

SCRANTON, PA.—(AP)—The AFL-United Mine Workers Union recently commended anthracite operators for "industrial statesmanship" in signing a new wage pact that gave 75,000 hard coal workers a \$1.20-a-day wage increase.

In an unprecedented circular distributed to Pennsylvania's anthracite miners, the union said operators "are to be highly commended for the manner in which they co-operated to work out and approve" the contract.

ers took their packages back to the store rather than embarrass customers.

It is easy to collect the use tax on an automobile bought elsewhere, by checking registration records. Oklahoma goes as far as to check transportation records to uncover out-of-state shipments that didn't pay the tax.

Washington has persuaded some Portland, Ore., stores to collect for it; Ohio and Michigan have got two big mail order houses to "offer" to "accept" the use tax on mail shipments, if the buyer wants. Kansas has tried to get permission to search the mails for contraband so it can be taxed.

But the net result of efforts as earnest and determined as those Connecticut promises have convinced many tax authorities that a use tax can not be collected on most articles.

INDIANAPOLIS (NEA)—The Contest Board of the American automobile Association may be asked to change its definition of an automobile because of plans for a novel three-wheel car designed by Edward J. Shermeister, Jr., of Sheboygan, Wis., for the 500-mile race on the Indianapolis Motor Speedway next May 30.

Shermeister sent a tiny model of the chassis and body to Wilbur Shaw, president of the Indianapolis Motor Speedway. The designer, seeking financial backing, announces he also has completed plans for a new four-cycle engine to be used as the power plant for the front-drive creation.

Shermeister believes the use of a single wheel in the rear will reduce bumps and vibration as much as 50 per cent with a hydraulic airfoil or fin providing greater stability on the turns. The fin, incorporated in the tail of the car, is designed to open automatically according to the amount of centrifugal force. exerted as the car enters a turn. It can be adjusted to provide the

right amount of air resistance to prevent skids.

Another advantage of the three-wheel principle, according to Shermeister, is that the car—like a tripod—will adapt itself to track deformities and reduce torsional strain on the chassis while providing better traction due to the increased weight placed on the right front wheel.

According to the present rules of the Contest Board, however, an automobile is a "vehicle of four or more wheels operated in contact with the ground, propelled by mechanical means embodied entirely in its own construction."

Shermeister's creation fails to meet the first requirement of that definition, but he believes he can obtain the same results from his car by modifying the design slightly if the Contest Board declines to alter the rule. If necessary, he can replace the single rear wheel with two lighter wheels operating side by side to comply with specifications.

"It is impossible to say whether or not the three-wheel-and-airfoil

greatly exceeds that of a four-wheeled car," says Shermeister's ideas, however, have a great deal of merit.
